### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held February 7, 1878.*

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the communication from the Commissioners of Docks, in relation to change of location of Piers (new numbers), 19, 20 and 21, North river, reported the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of the lines for Piers (new numbers) 19, 20 and 21, North river, being so changed, as to permit the northerly line of proposed Pier 19 to be about fifty-four feet north of the northerly line of Pier 19, as established on 27th April, 1871, instead of about forty-eight feet, as fixed on 6th October, 1875, and thereby locate the said piers about six feet northerly of the lines, as approved on said last named date by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, for the issue of \$250,000 Dock Bonds, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks, reported the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the act, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Department of Docks, fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provision of said act, relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties, on account of the requisition by the Commissioners of Docks, dated January 9, 1878, for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

The Comptroller submitted a communication from the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, relative to sale of anchors and chains formerly belonging to Schoolship "Mercury," now buoyed off Hart's Island; when, on motion, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to sell at public auction, on appraisal, in accordance with the Charter of 1873, the two anchors and chains formerly belonging to the Schoolship "Mercury," now lying under water off Hart's Island.

The Comptroller submitted the appraisal by E. I. Fitzpatrick of the value of anchors and chains formerly belonging to the Schoolship "Mercury," and now lying under water off Hart's Island; which, on motion, was confirmed.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, in relation to the sale of the premises No. 5 Duane street, under foreclosure of bond and mortgage, given by Abraham Goodman to the city, reported the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to pay the annexed bills for expenses incurred in the matter of the foreclosure of the bond and mortgage given by Abraham Goodman to the city:

Ryer against Charles Stirling, Eber F. Haight, and A. S. Knowlton; said action having been discontinued without any trial.

The application of H. C. Siller, Manager of Leonard Street Night Shelter, for use of vacant premises Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street, was received and referred to the Comptroller.
