BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Tuesday, September 23, 1879, at 12.05 o'clock, P. M.

Present—Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; Hon. William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held July 18, 1879, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, with communications dated September 2, 1879, viz.:

1. Fifty-first street, north side—Flagging full width from Broadway to Eighth avenue, where not already done.
2. Madison avenue—Fencing vacant lots on east side of, between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, and in Eightieth street, between Madison and Fourth avenues.
3. Sixth avenue—Fencing vacant lots on east side of, between One Hundred and Twenty-fourth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets.
4. Seventy-fourth street and Fourth avenue—Fencing vacant lots on southwest corner of.
5. Forty-fourth street—Fencing vacant lots between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, where not already done.
6. Sixtieth street—Flagging full width, from the Boulevard to Ninth avenue, where not already done.
7. Seventy-second street, north side—Flagging and reflagging the sidewalk, from Lexington to Third avenue, where not already done.
8. Eighty-fifth street, south side, 100 feet west of Lexington avenue—Flagging sidewalk full width, where not already done.
9. One Hundred and Fifteenth street—Sewer, between Fourth and Madison avenues.
10. Eighty-first street—Paving, with Belgian or trap-block pavement, between Fourth and Fifth avenues.
11. Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets, and Lexington and Fourth avenues—Fencing vacant lots on block bounded by.
12. First avenue, west side—Flagging sidewalk full width, between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, where not already done.
13. Madison avenue, east side—Flagging sidewalk, between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, full width, where not already done.

The foregoing assessment list being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating and grading One Hundred and Ninth street, from Third to Fifth avenue, with record of awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to buildings, by reason of change of grade on the line, and applications and objections of Brahm & Loderose, Elizabeth Meehan, Margaret Doyle and others, as to the awards in said matter, and objections of Benjamin Andrews to the assessment, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated September 22, 1879.

After consideration of the said objections and hearing Moody B. Smith, attorney, in behalf of Brahm & Loderose and Elizabeth Meehan, on motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for paving, with Belgian pavement, Seventy-seventh street, between Third avenue and Avenue A, and objections of the New York Protestant Episcopal Public School, and John H. Heckman, which were referred to the Board of Assessors at meeting of July 18, 1879, for a hearing as to said objections, the same having been retransmitted by the Board of Assessors, with communication dated September 22, 1879, including reply of the Commissioner of Public Works to said objections under date of September 9, 1879.

After consideration of the objections, on motion, they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging Ninety-ninth street, from Eighth to Eleventh avenue, together with the awards for damages and applications for the same, and objections of Ann McManus, Richard Byron, and others, ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors at meeting of February 24, 1879, for further examination and report, the same having been retransmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated September 2, 1879.

After consideration of the objections, on motion, they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging full width, where not already done, in Eleventh avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Seventy-second street, with objections of the Metropolitan Gas-light Company, I. & S. Bernheimer, and Cornelius Callahan, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated September 2, 1879.

At the request of Herbert A. Shipman, attorney for I. & S. Bernheimer, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the testimony taken in the matter of the alleged excessive assessments upon property formerly owned by George Hoffman, for regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Eighth avenue to Harlem river, confirmed September 29, 1874; and for regulating, grading, etc., Fifth avenue, from One Hundred and Thirtieth to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, confirmed September 16, 1873. On motion, the said matter was laid over.

At 12:40 o'clock, P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.
