DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Monday, August 7, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—Commissioners Meyer and Murphy. Absent—President Cram. The Board proceeded to open estimates under Contract No. 663, a representative of the Comptroller being present. Four estimates were received, as follows:

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits made by above bidders at the time of submitting their estimates, whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for preparing for and building a new crib-bulkhead, with appurtenances, between East Eightieth and East Eighty-first streets, East river, and for dredging thereat, under Contract No. 663, be and hereby is awarded to John Gillies Company, Incorporated, subject to the approval of William Beard and Charles A. Brown as sureties by the Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting held July 31, 1899, were approved.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting that the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Thirtieth street be designated for use as a dumping-board, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From Cornelius Cummings—Requesting permission to maintain watchman's house at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river.

From the Bridgeport Steamboat Company—Submitting application for a ten years' lease of the Pier to be built at the foot of Catharine street, East river, with adjoining bulkhead, together with privilege of a renewal term, and offering therefor an annual rental of \$12,000.

From the City Real Estate Company—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets, East river.

From Frank M. Holahan, attorney for Andrew H. Green—Requesting a three years' lease of the dock foot of Depot place, Highbridge.

From the Dock Superintendent—Recommending the revocation of the permit granted E. A. Hartog to maintain float between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, East river, it being impossible to place float thereat, owing to the tide currents; and

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Report on Secretary's Order No. 19332, stating that E. A. Hartog has erected a building to be used as a boat-house and platform, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, East river, in lieu of the float for which permit was granted.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, to make general repairs to Piers, old 8, 12, 13, 14 and 15, North river, to December 31, 1899.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

John N. Briggs, to maintain an ice bridge, scales and tally house on the northerly half of the Pier foot of East Eleventh street.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, to repair Pier 3, North river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Western Electric Company, to cut a trapdoor in the deck of the Pier foot of Bethune street, North river, for the purpose of gaining access to their pipes thereat, the consent of the lessee having been obtained.

Union Ice Company, to connect Croton water pipe to their office at the foot of West Twenty-fifth street, North river; all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Hartford and New York Transportation Company, to replace oak fender piles on the southerly side of Pier 24, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Henry Meyer, to drive piles in front of his dock on the easterly side of Mott Haven canal, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Advising that his certificate has been attached to Contract No. 657, for dredging in the Wallabout canal, and that the same is now a valid contract.

2d. Approving sureties on Contract No. 656, for furnishing wrought-iron screw bolts, etc., and Contract No. 665, for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Stating that it does not deem it advisable to remove its dump from the present location at the foot of Gold street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the communication to the Board of Aldermen.

From the Department of Health—In relation to the condition of the dump on the bulkhead between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-eighth streets, North river, together with report of the Dock Superintendent that the dump is at present in good condition. Secretary directed to transmit to the Health Department a copy of the report of the Dock Superintendent.

From the receivers of the Atlantic Transportation Company—Stating that they are unable to make repairs to the Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street, North river, and declining to assume the obligations of the lease of said pier. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs to the pier and to report the cost thereof for collection from said company.

From Kelsey & Loughlin—Requesting that dredging be done at the bulkhead foot of Harrison street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that any dredging thereat must be done by the owners of the water grant covering the premises.

From John Ewen, attorney—Transmitting notice of application to be made by James Douglass for grant of land under water on the Hudson river, north of Palisade avenue.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 10th day of May, 1899, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by locating and laying out a public park, bounded by the Southern Boulevard, Willis avenue, East One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Brown place, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, for the purpose of establishing an approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river, from the southerly side of the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to locate and lay out the aforesaid public park as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the southern line of Southern Boulevard with the eastern line of Willis avenue.

1st. Thence southwesterly along the eastern line of Willis avenue for 200 feet to the northern side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street.

2d. Thence southeasterly along the northern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street for 820 feet to the western line of Brown place.

3d. Thence northeasterly along the western line of Brown place for 200 feet to the southern line of Southern Boulevard.

4th. Thence northwesterly along the southern line of Southern Boulevard for 820 feet to the point of beginning.

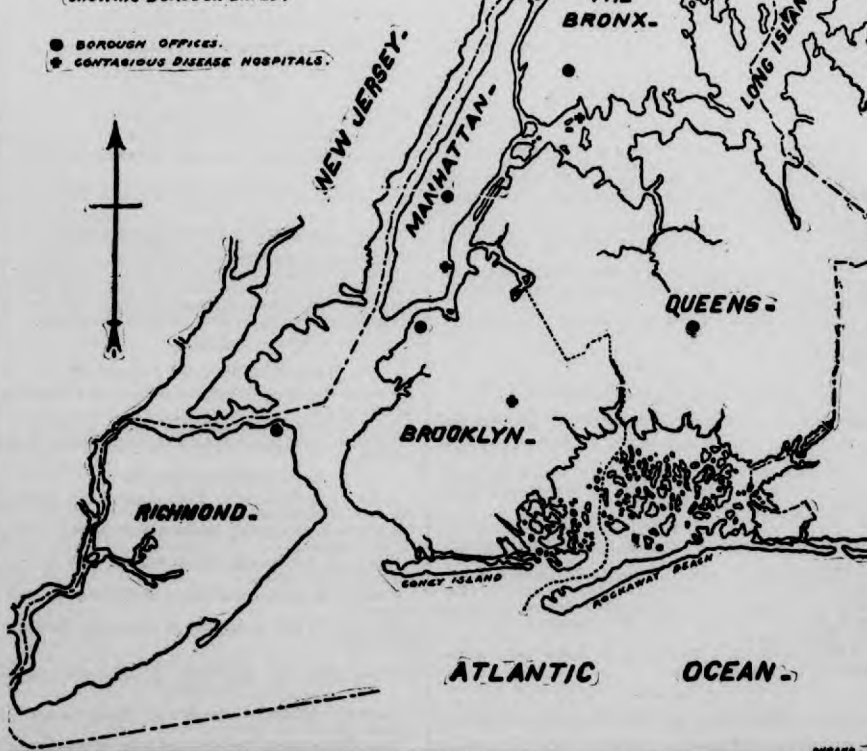
