THE MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

At meeting held at Fire Department Headquarters, Nos. 157 and 159 East Sixty-seventh street, on Monday, June 23, 1902.

The meeting was called to order by the Fire Commissioner, Chairman ex-officio, who presented a copy of the ordinance to regulate the sale, use and transportation of explosives in The City of New York, changing sections 763 and 769 of the Greater New York Charter, by virtue of which ordinance the Municipal Explosives Commission was created.

Moved and seconded that Mr. John F. Cunningham be appointed as Secretary to the Commission. Carried.

The Commission received, through the hands of Commissioner Eaton, from the office of the Mayor, certified copies of the ordinance changing sections 763 and 769 of the Charter of Greater New York, which were ordered on file.

A general discussion regarding the advisability of permitting the sale of fireworks in wooden buildings within the fire limits took place, in which the interests of various classes of persons were duly considered, and the decision arrived at that such privileges should not be granted.

Copy of preamble and resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on June 17, 1902, relative to sale of fireworks between the 10th day of June and the 10th day of July each year, was read and ordered on file.

Communication received from Otto P. Zeitfuss, druggist, No. 60 Fulton street, respecting restrictions in his license for sale of explosive chemicals. On motion, the communication was referred to Commissioner McKenna for investigation and report.

Commissioner Haskell presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the present regulations for the storage, manufacture, sale, etc., of combustibles and explosives be referred to Commissioner McKenna for the purpose of reporting an analysis of the different subjects under appropriate headings.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the name of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
