#### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

##### Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held Wednesday, May 23, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of Clause 8 of Rule XV, by adding thereto a new subdivision, to be known as subdivision "c." The Secretary presented a communication, dated May 22, from the Secretary to the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, stating that his department was in favor of the proposed amendment. T. A. Scanlan, President of the Employees' General Conference, addressed the Commission in the matter. William C. Ormond, representing the Board of Assessors, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Health at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below" and under the sub-heading "Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, N. Y. (with maintenance)," the following: "Dietitian, \$720 per annum." Robert J. Wilson, Director of Hospitals in the Department of Health, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Tenement House Department," the following: 3 Superintendents; Assistant Superintendent, The Bronx. Albert J. Frohock, Secretary of the Tenement House Department, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Part II, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Health, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," and under the sub-heading "Hospitals for Contagious Diseases in New York City," by changing the line "Domestic, \$360 per annum, with maintenance," to read "Domestic, \$540 per annum, with maintenance." There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held April 25 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That clause 8 of Rule XV. (Promotion) of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto the following:

"(e) If, on or before Sept. 1, 1917, positions appearing in Group 1 or Group 3 of Part II, the Clerical Service, shall be regraded, persons permanently appointed to such positions shall at any time thereafter be eligible for promotion, without examination, to a new higher grade, either as to compensation or title, if the maximum compensation of the former grade is included within the limits of the new higher grade."

On motion, it was

Resolved, that the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Health, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," be and the same is hereby amended by including therein, under the sub-heading "Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, N. Y.," the following: Dietitian, \$720. per annum (with maintenance).

On motion, it was

Resolved, that the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same is hereby amended by striking from the exempt class, under the heading "Tenement House Department," the following: 3 Superintendents; Assistant Superintendent, The Bronx.

The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Tenement House Department" the position of Secretary to Superintendent, The Bronx.

Resolved, that the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Part II, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Health, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," be and the same is hereby amended by changing the line "Domestic, \$360. per annum (with maintenance)" appearing under the sub-heading "Hospitals for Contagious Diseases in New York City," to read "Domestic, \$540. per annum (with maintenance)."

Duties—The Inspector of Heating and Ventilation is engaged in the preparation of specifications in accordance with the standards of the Department of Education for the equipment of school buildings, including the engines, boilers and auxiliaries, fans, ducts and temperature regulators, and all auxiliaries in connection with the heating and proper conditioning of the air of school buildings within the Borough to which the Inspector may be assigned. He will also supervise the installation of the entire heating plant and must be competent to attend to necessary repairs and maintenance and be able to instruct Janitor Engineers in the care of their plant and to make recommendations for improvement.

Requirements—The candidates must have had experience in installation, design or operation of heating plants and have served as Foreman Steamfitter, Foreman Heating Engineer at factory or Superintendent for a contracting firm or manufacturing establishment in installation of such apparatus, or superintendent in responsible charge of a heating or ventilating system in office building, loft building or factory, or engineer in charge of a power plant, or inspector for a public utility corporation supplying steam, or equivalent experience.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The compensation rates proposed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this position are from \$1,620 to \$1,920 per annum. Under the terms and conditions of the budget for the year 1917, appointments will, as a rule, be made at the lowest compensation rate.

There is one vacancy at the present time in the Department of Education for which Budgetary provision has been made for the current year at a salary of \$2,093.33.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
