NEW YORK SUPREME COURT.

In the Matter of The Appointment of Additional Inspectors of Election. } Order to show cause.

Commissioner French for himself, and in behalf of Commissioner McClave, offered the following:

Whereas, the Board of Police have this day, by order of Justice Patterson, of the Supreme Court, been commanded and enjoined to forthwith convene and forthwith appoint as additional Inspectors of Election in each and every of the Election Districts of the City of New York, the persons appointed and selected by John McClave, one of the said Commissioners, on the 16th day of September, 1887, to be further and additional Inspectors of Election of the political faith or opinion of the United Labor Party, or that the Board of Police and each and every of the Commissioners composing the same, show cause to the contrary before Supreme Court at a General Term thereof, to be held at the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on Friday, the 7th day of October, 1887, at half-past ten o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, how the said writ shall have been executed; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the persons named in the schedule or list presented by Commissioner McClave at a meeting of the Board of Police held September 16, 1887, as having been appointed and selected by him to be further and additional Inspectors of Election of the political faith or opinion of the United Labor Party, be and are hereby appointed as additional Inspectors of Election, one in each and every of the Election Districts of the City of New York.

The question being taken by ayes and noes was lost, Commissioners French and McClave voting aye and Commissioners Porter and Voorhis voting no.

Commissioner Voorhis, for himself and on behalf of Commissioner Porter, offered the following:

The undersigned members of the Board and Commissioners of Police hereby place on record as their reasons for not appointing as Inspectors of Election the persons recently named by Commissioner John McClave as the designated Commissioner of Police acting for and in behalf of the political organization known as the United Labor Party; that,

First—We are in great doubt as to our legal right to make any appointment of Inspectors of Election after the time fixed by statute, which is limited to the month of August and September in each year.

Second—The law providing for the appointment of an additional Inspector of Election requires that the political party or organization receiving such appointment shall have cast at the next preceding election 50,000 votes and upwards for at least one of its candidates, and it does not appear to the satisfaction of the undersigned, or either of them, that the party represented by Commissioner John McClave cast that number of votes at the next preceding election for any one of its candidates, nor does it appear to their satisfaction that said United Labor Party had an existence as a party or organization at the time of the last preceding election.

Third—It does not appear, and is a matter of fact, that the votes cast at the last preceding election for the candidate upon which the United Labor Party bases its claim to the appointment of an Inspector of Election, viz.: for that of Mayor, were cast by persons then or now identified and connected with three existing political organizations known as the Irving Hall Party, the Progressive Labor Party and the United Labor Party, each of which organizations are claimants before the Board of Police for appointment of Inspectors of Election representative respectively of one or another of said organizations.

Fourth—To accord the appointment of the Inspectors of Election to the United Labor Party, in view of the foregoing facts, would be the perpetration of a great wrong and an act of gross injustice to the other claimants, the members of which organization were associated with and contributed to the vote cast for Henry George the candidate in common for whom 50,000 votes and upwards were given at the preceding election as before stated.

Fifth—Proof of the correctness of the above statements fully appear in the various documents and affidavits on file with the Department of Police and heretofore presented duly verified to the Honorable Supreme Court, together with the further paper herewith submitted marked Schedule "A."

Sixth—It has not been, nor is it the desire of the undersigned to defeat or evade the provisions of the statute relative to the appointment of an additional Inspector of Election. On the contrary, they are now and have been at all times prepared and ready to appoint the same whenever the requirements of the law have been fully complied with, but to do so before that has been done would be a violation of their sacred oaths of office, which they trust no authority will call upon them to do.

The increase under this head is required for repairs to the buildings of the department, contingencies—Bureau Inspection of Buildings, fuel, general supplies, horse feed and shoeing, new hose and telegraph supplies and repairs. A considerable number of the buildings are much in need of general repairs, and some require alteration to better fit them for the uses to which they are put. An extensive overhauling of the fire-alarm boxes and replacing of sub-marine cables, etc., necessitate increased expenditure under the head of "telegraph supplies and repairs." The increase of the remaining items is rendered necessary by the growth of the department.
