

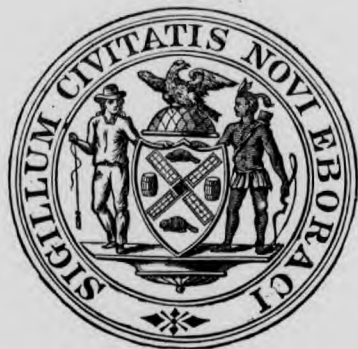

The Comptroller, to whom was referred, on June 25, 1886, a resolution of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, requesting the transfer of one appropriation of \$7,500 to that Department in 1884, to another appropriation in the same year, respectfully submits the following

REPORT :

The question of authority to make such transfer was submitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion, which is herewith submitted. He states that, "I (he) know of no reason why the transfer may not be made if the amount is in excess of the purposes of one of the appropriations and necessary for the other."

A copy of a report to the Department of Public Charities and Correction upon this subject by A. E. McDonald, the General Superintendent of Ward's Island, showing the need of such transfer, is herewith submitted, and also an estimate of the cost of the objects to which the money will be applied under the transfer, by Joseph M. Dunn, Architect.

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication under date of August 6, 1886, inclosing a resolution of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction asking me to advise whether the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has power to transfer the sum of \$7,500 from the appropriation entitled "For the Purchase of Land under Water at Ward's Island," 1884, to the appropriation entitled "For the New Pavilion, Female Insane, Hart's Island," 1884.

I know of no reason why the transfer may not be made if the amount named is in excess of the purposes of the one appropriation and necessary for the purposes of the other.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
NOS. 155 AND 157 MERCER STREET,

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to enclose herewith a resolution adopted by the Board of Fire Commissioners, requesting the transfer of \$36,000 from various appropriations for this Department for the current year to the appropriation for "Apparatus, Supplies, etc.," for the current year.

It is found that the removal of the offices of the Department and of the fire-alarm telegraph central office from the present location to the new building in Sixty-seventh street, will involve considerable expense, the amount of which could not well be determined when the estimate for the current year was made.

The cost of effecting the removal and rearrangement of the system of telegraph circuits alone, is estimated by the Superintendent of Telegraph at about \$27,000, which includes the connecting of the fire-alarm telegraphic circuits with the new building underground in various directions for an aggregate distance of about one and a half miles. This, though more expensive than to make the rearrangement entirely upon the telegraph poles of the Department, would, in view of the fact that all telegraph wires must, in accordance with the spirit of the laws on the subject, sooner or later be placed underground, be in the end much more economical and satisfactory.

When the removal of the Department offices to the new headquarters on East Sixty-second street was determined upon, the alteration of the present headquarters building to fit it for quarters of a hook and ladder company, for night quarters for the Chief of Department and for a central fuel depot, was also contemplated.

The location is a most important one for all these purposes, being in the central part of what is known as the dry-goods district, a section that annually averages a much larger proportion of fires to the number of buildings (the ratio being one to seventeen), and which also contains property in wares and merchandise of much greater value than any other in the city.

The need of a hook and ladder company is especially great in this section, the nearest hook and ladder companies being No. 3, in East Thirteenth street, near Fourth avenue; No. 5, in Charles street, near Hudson; No. 9, in Elizabeth street, near Prince, and No. 8, in North Moore street, near West Broadway. It is proposed to place the second section of Hook and Ladder No. 9 (a double company) in this location, until the organization of an independent company can be provided for.

These changes will necessitate considerable alteration to the building, but will be of great benefit to the fire-extinguishing service.

Should any balance remain after these expenditures are provided for, it is the intention to apply it to improving the condition of the apparatus-houses, many of which stand greatly in need of repairs.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

SIR—On the 12th instant I received from the Police Department a copy of a letter dated July 6th ultimo, addressed by the Chief Clerk of that Department to my predecessor, and embodying a set of resolutions of the Police Board, setting forth the necessity of placing a noiseless pavement on Mulberry street, in front of the Police Department Building, between Houston and Bleecker streets, in place of the present pavement, and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer from appropriations made to the Police Department the sum of \$2,000 for that purpose. As the present pavement at that place is of an inferior character it would be very desirable to replace it by a new and noiseless pavement of the proper quality. An estimate of the cost of such new pavement has been made and it is found that the sum of \$2,000 will be sufficient to cover the cost either of an asphalt pavement such as is now being laid on Chambers street, or a wood pavement such as was laid on Fifth avenue, between Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets, and in Reade street, between Whitehall and Broad streets, about two years ago, and which has so far proven satisfactory, and is now in good condition. If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment consent to the transfer, the transfer should be made to a separate appropriation for repaving that portion of Mulberry street in front of the Police Department Building, between Houston and Bleecker streets. Immediate

action will be necessary to enable the Department to lay the pavement this season. If the transfer is made, application will be made to the Board of Aldermen for the adoption of a resolution authorizing the repavement, and authorizing the Commissioner of Public Works to have the work done without contract at public letting, so as to avoid the delay of advertising and letting.

A copy of the letter from the Police Department is herewith inclosed.

Hon. ROLLIN M. SQUIRE, Commissioner of Public Works:

DEAR SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Police held on the 2d instant, the following proceedings were had, viz.:

Whereas, In consequence of the great and continuous travel of vehicles over the roadway on the block of Mulberry street, between Houston and Bleeker streets, in front of the Central Department Building, the noise is so great as to seriously interfere with the business of the Department and to make it frequently impossible for the telegraphic and telephonic bureau to intelligently receive and transmit messages; and

Whereas, Application has been made to the Department of Public Works for relief by having the Belgian pavement now upon said roadway removed, covered or replaced by some noiseless pavement; and

Whereas, This Board is informed that the Commissioner of Public Works will make the necessary application to the Common Council for authority to remove the pavement upon said roadway on Mulberry street, in front of Central Department Building, and twenty-five feet upon each side thereof, and to construct thereon a noiseless pavement;

Provided the Department of Public Works has placed to the credit of its account for street pavements a sum sufficient to make such alterations: the cost thereof will not exceed \$2,000.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1885, entitled "For Expenses for Detectives, Criminal Process and Contingent Expenses," the sum of \$500, and "For Supplies of Police," the sum of \$1,500, total, \$2,000, the said appropriation being in excess of the amount required for the purpose and objects thereof, to the appropriation made for the Department of Public Works for the year 1886, entitled "For Street Pavements," which is sufficient to enable the Commissioner of Public Works, when properly authorized by the Common Council, to remove the stone pavement now upon the roadway in Mulberry street, commencing at a point 35 feet north of Houston street, and extending northerly 140 feet and 6 inches, and to replace or cover the same with some noiseless pavement.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Among the streets authorized by resolution of the Common Council to be repaved this year is Sixth street, from the Bowery to Avenue B, and it was included in the public letting held June 29, 1886. Subsequently, at the earnest solicitation of the Judges of the various courts in the New Court-house and the Brown-stone Building, a resolution was passed authorizing the repavement of Chambers street with asphalt pavement, and a contract for the same was made. In consequence of this there was not sufficient money in the appropriation to cover the repavement of all the streets for which proposals had previously been received, and the contract for paving Sixth street, from the Bowery to Avenue B, has, therefore, not been executed. The estimated cost of that pavement is twenty-one thousand dollars, and a transfer of four thousand five hundred dollars to the appropriation for "Repaving Streets and Avenues" is needed to cover the amount.

As it is very desirable that the pavement be laid this season, if possible, I have to request that the said sum of four thousand five hundred dollars be transferred to the appropriation for "Repaving Streets and Avenues" for 1886, from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements and Regrading" for 1886, from which the sum can be spared.

As both appropriations are for pavement work, I presume that there will be no objection to the transfer, and I ask the early and favorable action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on this request.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, No. 300 MULBERRY STREET,
BUREAU OF ELECTIONS, NEW YORK, October 4, 1886.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts, and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-five election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beaver street, Old slip, East river, Whitehall street, and Broadway.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Battery place, and Greenwich street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Washington street, Battery place, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Albany street, Greenwich street, Rector street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Albany street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Broadway, Dey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Broadway, Reade street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, Hudson street, Harrison street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hubert street, Hudson street, North Moore street, and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Varick street, North Moore street, West Broadway, Franklin street, and Hudson street.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Franklin street, West Broadway, North Moore street, Varick street, Beach street, St. John's lane, and Light street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Light street, St. John's lane, Beach street, and Hudson street.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Desbrosses street, Greenwich street, Light street, Hudson street, Hubert street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Light street, and Greenwich street.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Greenwich street, Desbrosses street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Battery place, Bowling Green, Whitehall street, East river, Hudson or North river, Governor's Island, Bedloe's Island, and Ellis' Island.

Second Assembly District.

The Second Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-eight election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Catharine street, Catharine slip, East river, and Oliver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Chatham square, Catharine street, Oak street, and Oliver street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Bowery, Oliver street, Oak street, and James street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park row, New Bowery, James street, Madison street, and Roosevelt street.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Stanton street, Sheriff street, Rivington street, and Willett street.

within West Twenty-third street, East Twenty-third street, Broadway, East Twentieth street, West Twentieth street, and Sixth avenue.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Stanton street, Clinton street, Rivington street, and Suffolk street.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Thirteenth street, Eighth avenue, Horatio street, Greenwich street, and Ninth avenue.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Twenty-seventh street, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-sixth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-first street, Ninth avenue, West Fortieth street, and Tenth avenue.

Twenty-third Assembly District.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within road to Berrian's landing, Kingsbridge road, Railroad avenue, Morris street, Waverley street, McComb's Dam road, Morris lane, and Harlem river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within northern boundary of Twenty-fourth Ward, Bronx river, Pelham avenue, Kingsbridge road, road to Berrian's landing, and Central avenue.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held October 14, 1886.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews, and Koch.

The minutes of the meeting held October 13, 1886, were read and approved.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief, submitting new plans for the improvement of the East and Harlem river water front, extending from the northerly side of Eighty-sixth street, East river, to the easterly side of Third avenue, Harlem river, such plans being comprised in four maps, was received, read and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolutions in relation thereto, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the plans for the water front on the westerly side of the East and Harlem rivers, extending from the northerly side of Eighty-sixth street, East river, to the easterly side of the Third avenue, Harlem river, made and prepared pursuant to the provisions of chapter 517, Laws of 1884, be and the same are hereby approved, adopted and declared to be the sole plan determined upon by the Department of Docks for the section of territory embraced therein, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as required by law.

Resolved, That the President be and hereby is directed to transmit the said plans to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to respectfully request their approval and adoption of the same in accordance with the requirements of chapter 517, Laws of 1884, and the President is further directed to embody in the communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a brief state-

ment explanatory of the details, and showing the principal advantages to be derived from the adoption of the plans submitted.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting that the Department of Public Works have removed the various public baths from their summer locations and recommending that the usual order be issued to replace the backing-logs and generally restore the piers to the same condition that they were in last spring, before baths were placed thereat for summer use.

On motion, the report was received, recommendation adopted, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the repairs required in order to fit them for commercial uses and purposes.

The application of the National Line of Steamships, requesting the use of Piers, new 43 or 46, North river, for the steamship "England," from October 30 to November 6, 1886, was referred to Dock Master John M. Smith, to berth said steamer if possible.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report upon the application of the Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company for permission to extend their track across West street, at or near the foot of Chambers street, North river.

A communication from Henry A. Cram, inclosing plans and specifications for the construction of a bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets, Harlem river, was,

On motion, referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5892, approving of the plans and specifications submitted by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company for an extension of platform and the erection of sheds, etc., at Pier 27, East river, was

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to notify the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company that the said plans and specifications were approved.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to re-examine and report respecting the use being made of the boat-house on the northerly side of bulkhead foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river.

On motion, the application of E. H. Coffin, Jr., desiring additional wharfage accommodations for the Fort Lee Ferry Company, at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, was denied.

On motion, an additional penalty of \$200 was imposed on the New York and Long Island Ferry Company, for violation of Rule No. 1 of the Rules and Regulations, in failing to remove platform, bridges, ferry-racks, etc., located on land under water foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river, from October 4 to 14th instant, and the President authorized to notify them that the same must be paid forthwith to the Treasurer of this Department, or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to place a dredge at the said premises, in order to obstruct the operation of the New York and Long Island Ferry Company.

The communication from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, agreeing to forego use of Pier, new 43, North river, until after the sailing of the steamship "America," on October 27, 1886, was ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to advise the said railroad company that their offer is accepted.
