

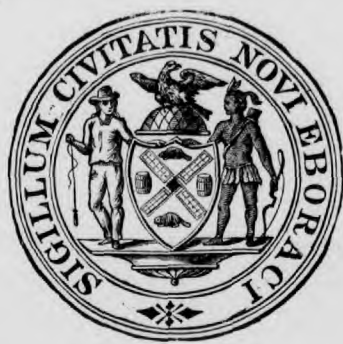

DEAR SIR—In accordance with section 132 of the Laws of 1897, a meeting of the Municipal Statistical Commission was held at the office of the Commission, Park Row Building, on Tuesday, February 13, 1900.

The meeting was called to order at 3.25 p. m., Dr. Nagle in the chair. The members present were Commissioners Antonio Rasines, Frederick W. Grube, Thomas Gillman and John T. Nagle.

The minutes of the last meeting were, on motion, dispensed with. The Chief of the Bureau submitted the following statement: That the Bureau is conducted entirely in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, and that he has collected, tabulated and prepared the material for publication that is required of it by the Charter, namely:

The results attending the work of the various departments of the City Government and other statistical facts and data relating to the City of New York which are deemed of public interest.

He desires to request the heads of the various departments and officers of the City to complete their annual reports as soon as it is possible for them to do so, as the Bureau has to depend on these reports to compile the results attending their work. It is the intention of the Bureau to obtain illustrations of some of the work done by the different departments of the City during the year 1899, so that the character of their work and the statistics relating to them will be better understood.

The duties of this Bureau are confounded by many with the duties of the Commissioners of Accounts. This Bureau is only empowered by the law to publish, in so far as it may deem advisable, the results attending the work of the various departments of the City government for the preceding calendar year, and such other statistical information and facts relating to the City of New York or its inhabitants as it may deem of public interest. It has no power or authority by law to investigate the departments or demand information from them, and its total annual appropriation of \$7,200 for clerks and assistants would not be sufficient to enable it to perform such duties if such power were vested in it by law.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, THAT THE Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to lay out and locate towers and anchorages for the proposed bridge over the East river between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, in the City of New York, and that a meeting of the said Board will be held in the office of the said Board, at Nos. 19 to 21 Park Row, Borough of Manhattan, on the 28th day of February, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which such proposed laying out and locating will be considered by said Board; all of which is more particularly set forth and described in the following resolution, adopted by said Board on the 14th day of February, 1900, notice of the adoption of which is hereby given, viz.:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 29th day of November, 1899, resolutions were adopted approving plans for a bridge over the East river, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn and the approaches thereto; and

Whereas, The Municipal Assembly by ordinance, duly approved by the Mayor on the 8th day of January, 1900, provided for the building of said bridge and approaches in accordance with said plans, and duly approved of the same; and

Whereas, The lands for the location of towers and anchorages in said boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, as the same are designated and described on the sketch or plan hereto annexed, are necessary to be taken for the purposes of said bridge and approaches, and are more particularly described as follows:

MANHATTAN TOWER.

Beginning at a point on the present bulkhead line 90 feet from the northwest corner of Pike slip and South streets measured along the continuation of the west side of Pike slip and across South street; thence along the present bulkhead line north 80 degrees 7 minutes east 236 feet to a point on the bulkhead-line approximately half way between Old Piers 41 and 42; thence south 20 degrees 30 minutes east 455 feet 6 inches to the United States pierhead-line of 1892; thence westerly along the United States pierhead-line of 1892 254 feet 3 1/2 inches to a point at the intersection of this pierhead-line and the east side of Old Pier 40 prolonged; thence northerly along the east side of this pier north 7 degrees 15 minutes west for 462 feet to place of beginning.

All distances given above are more or less.
Line marked A-B is intended to divide, as near as may be into equal parts, the water space between Old Piers 41 and 42.

MANHATTAN ANCHORAGE.
