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ART COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission Held in the Governor's Room, City Hall, on Tuesday, April 14, 1903, at 4 o'clock p. m.

Present—President Warner, presiding; Commissioners Healy, Dielman, Marshall, Proctor, Coombs and Farragut.

Minutes of meeting of March 10 were read and approved.

The President reported the appointment of the following committees on matters submitted to the Commission since the last meeting, March 10:

The President further reported that after the last meeting the Assistant Secretary called his attention to the peculiar wording of one of the papers concerning sculpture on the Hall of Records, and the apparent mistake by which it had been omitted from the documents duly certified by the Secretary of the Fine Arts Federation. Upon inquiry of the Secretary, Mr. Tryon, it was found that the recommendation of the committee, of which Mr. French was Chairman, as to sculpture was as fully endorsed by the Federation as the part relating to interior decoration, and that it had been intended to include it in the matters so certified. Mr. Tryon immediately certified the document in question and asked that this report upon sculpture be included with the one upon mural decorations transmitted upon March 10 in response to our communication to the Fine Arts Federation of January 27.

The President thereupon communicated with the Commissioners present when the communication from the Fine Arts Federation was considered, as to the propriety of including the report upon sculpture with the rest of the communication from the Fine Arts Federation, which, at such meeting, had been directed to be forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, without recommendation and by the letter then directed. Objection being raised and the shortness of time making it impracticable to hold a meeting before the following day upon which the matter might be considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the reference of such paper to the committee of which Mr. Proctor was Chairman, was continued; and the Fine Arts Federation, as well as the President of the Bor-

ough, upon his inquiry, were advised that the Fine Arts Federation had forwarded such paper, of which a copy was furnished the latter.

The communication from the Fine Arts Federation was as follows, including certificate of its Secretary afterward added:

"New York, March 9, 1903.

"To the Art Commission for The City of New York:

"The Fine Arts Federation endorses the following report of its Committee on Sculpture and begs to present the same to your Honorable Body.

"The committee appointed to consider the matter of the sculpture for the Hall of Records begs to submit the following report:

"They recommend that all the sculptures at or above the sixth story of the building be of granite, but that the two groups and the two seated figures below be of bronze.

"The sculptors shall be required to supervise the cutting of the granite and the finishing of the bronze work.

"In regard to the choice of subjects for the sculpture it is advised that the twenty-four statues should represent historic personages, possibly selected one from each decade, thus representing the age of the City.

"In the two groups at the Chambers street entrance, the earliest inhabitants, the Indians, and the first residents, the Hollanders, should be represented; while in the two seated figures on the Reade street entrance, the later settlers, the French and English, could be represented.

"It is earnestly recommended that an addition be made for interior sculpture in the main staircase hallway, to be divided as follows:

"Two newel posts in bronze, 6-foot figures.

"Twelve portrait heads in bronze, alto relief.

"One corbel in marble.

"Respectfully submitted,

Submission 96.

The Committee on Hall of Records Sculptures submitted a report, through Commissioner Proctor, Chairman, relative to a design submitted by Messrs. Horgan & Slattery (being a new work of art), which read as follows:

"Your Committee advise that Submission 96, sculptured group over doorway in Chambers street vestibule, Hall of Records, be disapproved."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate 103.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the design for a sculptured group to be placed over the doorway in the Chambers street vestibule of the Hall of Records, represented by Exhibit "25AG" of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicate of exhibit herein noted to Messrs. Horgan & Slattery.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 103.

The Committee on Hall of Records Sculptures submitted a report, through Commissioner Proctor, Chairman, relative to a design for a piece of sculpture for the central dormer of the Chambers street elevation of the Hall of Records (being a new work of art), which read as follows:

"Your Committee recommends that the group entitled 'Heritage,' by Bush-Brown, for central dormer, Chambers street elevation, Hall of Records, be approved."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 105.

The Committee on Hall of Records Sculptures reported, through Commissioner Proctor, Chairman, relative to designs for a piece of sculpture upon the west elevation of the Hall of Records, represented by Exhibits "25AD" and "25AF," recommending that the designs be disapproved.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs for sculpture upon the west elevation of the Hall of Records, represented by Exhibits "25AD" and "25AF," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Messrs. The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission 97.

The Committee on Montrose Avenue Public Bath (Brooklyn), submitted a report, through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn (on request of the Mayor), which read as follows:

"The Committee of the Art Commission in reference to the designs for the Montrose Avenue Public Bath, Borough of Brooklyn, recommend the approval of the same."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 107.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of the Montrose Avenue Public Bath (Brooklyn), represented by Exhibits "66A," "66B," "66C," "66D," "66E," "66F," and "66G," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 98.

The Committee on Zoological Park Fountain reported, through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by the New York Zoological Society for a base to the Italian fountain in Baird court (being a new work of art), recommending that the designs be disapproved.

On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 108.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs for a base to the Zoological Park Fountain, represented by Exhibits "24H," "24I," and "24J," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to the New York Zoological Society and to Hon. John E. Eustis, Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx. The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 106.

The Committee on Zoological Park Fountain reported, through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon a proposed change for the site of the Italian fountain, submitted by the New York Zoological Society, stating that as the proposed locations had not been designated by the Park authorities, the designs were not in proper form to be acted upon by the Art Commission, and recommending that a communication to this effect be sent to the New York Zoological Society.

On motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to refer the Zoological Society to our letter of June 12, 1902, and to notify the Society that as the proposed changes had not been approved by the park authorities, the submission was not sufficiently complete for consideration, but that as soon as a formal notice should be received from the proper authorities, the Commission would proceed to consider the submission.

Submission No. 99.

The Committee on Pulaski Street Public Comfort Station (Brooklyn) submitted a report through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, relative to a public comfort station at the intersection of Reid avenue, Pulaski street and Broadway (upon request of the Mayor), which read as follows:

"The Committee of the Art Commission in reference to the Pulaski Street Public Comfort Station begs to report that it advises the Commission to approve of the designs submitted, except so far as they relate to the two lamp-posts.

"That it advises the Commission to disapprove of the designs for the lamp-posts as being inadequate and incomplete."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 109.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location for a public comfort station at the intersections of Reid avenue, Pulaski street and Broadway, Brooklyn, represented by Exhibits "67A," "67B" and "67C," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to call the attention of President Swanstrom to the fact that the plans submitted had not included designs for lamp-posts, and suggested that these be submitted as early as convenient.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 100.

The Committee on Greeley Square Public Comfort Station reported through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by Hon. Jacob A. Cantor, President of the Borough of Manhattan (on request of the Mayor), recommending that they be approved.

On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 110.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location for the Greeley Square Public Comfort Station, represented by Exhibits "68A," "68B," "68C" and "68D," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. Jacob A. Cantor, President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The Committee further reported that plans had been submitted for three other locations at Union Square, Grand Circle (Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue) and Madison Square, but that they were so indefinite and incomplete as to render intelligent action impossible.

Upon motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to communicate with President Cantor, informing him that the Commission could not consider these locations until plans, drawn to scale, had been submitted.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 101.

The Committee on Chatham Square Public Comfort Station reported through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by Hon. Jacob A. Cantor, President of the Borough of Manhattan (on request of Mayor), stating that the plans did not show the exact location of the station, and that, therefore, it was impossible for the Committee to make a report.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was directed to communicate with President Cantor, calling his attention to the inadequacy of the plans submitted, and stating that upon the submission of a detailed plan drawn to scale, action would promptly be taken.

The Committee further reported that two other locations had been presented, namely Washington Square Market and Burling Slip; but as these also were inadequate, no report could be made.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was directed to confer with President Cantor regarding the submission of adequate plans showing locations.

Submission No. 104.

The Committee upon Rug for the Mayor's office reported through Commissioner Dielman, Chairman, upon designs submitted by the Persian Rug Manufactory (on request of the Mayor), recommending that the designs be approved.

On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 111.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for a rug for the Mayor's office, represented by Exhibits "64C," "64D" and "64E," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to the Persian Rug Manufactory.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 102.

The Committee upon Gates Avenue Court House (Brooklyn) submitted a report through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn (on request of the Mayor), which read as follows:

Your Committee recommends the approval of the plans marked "33K," "33L," "33M," "33R," "33S," "33T," and "33U," and the disapproval of the plans marked "33N," "33O," "33P" and "33Q."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

A minority report was also presented recommending that the facade, being Exhibit "33K," be disapproved, but otherwise accepting the recommendations of the majority.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Certificate No. 112.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves of the designs and location for the Gates Avenue Court House (Brooklyn), represented by Exhibits "33J," "33L," "33M," "33R," "33S," "33T" and "33U," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Certificate No. 113.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs for the Gates Avenue Court House (Brooklyn), represented by Exhibits "33K," "33N," "33O," "33P" and "33Q," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

The Committee on Relocation of Portraits in City Hall submitted a report, through President Warner, Chairman, which read as follows:

"Your Committee on Relocation of Portraits in City Hall report:

"First—That they have had such portraits provisionally hung as follows:

"I. Portraits of Lafayette and Mayors

"(a) Mayor's public reception room—Portrait of Lafayette over mantel; portrait of Mayor Duane to the right of Lafayette and Mayor Varick to the left. Portraits of Mayors Livingston and Clinton on the south side of the room; of Mayors Willett and Radcliff on the east side; of Mayors Wood and Opdyke on the north.

"The portrait of Lafayette not merely is well fitted for the purpose, but, as we are advised, specially appropriate for that room, in view of the fact that it was painted to commemorate a public reception given him by the City authorities. The portraits of the six Mayors, Duane, Varick, Livingston, Clinton, Willett and Radcliff, are not merely those of the first six under our State Government, but those the frames of which are not merely uniform but on the whole best comported with the style of decoration adopted for the room. The portraits of Mayors Wood and Opdyke were selected as those which for artistic effect, size of canvas and framing best fitted the spaces on the north side of the room.

"(b) Lobby to the Mayor's room—Portraits of Mayors Allen, Hone and Paulding on the east; the portrait of Mayor Colden on the south; the portraits of Mayors Lee, Lawrence and Bowne on the west, and the portraits of Mayors Brady, Morris, Clark, Varian and Harper on the north side.

These include the Mayors in succession of their incumbency after the six hung in the reception room to the year 1845, with the exception of Mayor Brady, the character of the frames and of the paintings making it necessary to change slightly the chronological order.

"(c) Clerk's room adjacent thereto—Portraits of Mayors Havemeyer, Mickel, Kingsland, Tiemann, Gunther, Strong, Westerveldt and Woodhull. These include all of the collections of Mayors' portraits owned by the City and not placed in the Mayor's reception room or the lobby thereto. This room is upon the whole well calculated to display them.

"II. Office of the President of the Borough.

"Lobby—On the south side, portrait of General McComb; on the north side the portrait of Commodore Hull.

"III. Council Chamber.

"(a) On the north wall, the portraits of Presidents Monroe and Fillmore, now in the chamber, are to be exchanged.

"(b) On the south wall, in the widest space now left (over the alcove), the portrait of General Washington, and to the right the portraits of Presidents Jackson and Taylor.

"(c) On the east wall, south, the portrait of Henry Clay; north, the portrait of President Jefferson.

"(d) Rostrum, to the right, bust of John Jay; to the left, bust of John Marshall.

"IV. Art Commission Offices.

"On the east wall, portrait of Alexander Hamilton.

"V. Governor's Room, Centre.

"(e) South wall, east to west, portraits of Governors Clarke and Fenton.

"(b) West wall, south, portrait of Governor Hoffman; centre, portrait of General James Clinton.

"(c) North wall, west to east, portraits of President Van Buren and Governors Throop, Marcy, Seward, Bouck and Wright; over doorway, bust of General Washington.

"(d) East wall, centre, portrait of General Washington.

"VI. Governor's Room—West.

"(a) West wall, south to north, portraits of Governors Dix, Clinton and Jay; over mantel, bust of DeWitt Clinton.

"(b) North wall, west to east, portraits of Governor Lewis, Commodore Tompkins and Governor Yates; two busts over doorway.

"(c) East wall, portrait of Governor King.

"VII. Governor's Room—East.

"(a) North wall, west to east, portraits of Governors Young and Fish.

"(b) East wall, north to south, portraits of Governors Hunt and Seymour.

"(c) South wall, portrait of Governor Stuyvesant.

"(d) West wall, portrait of Governor Morgan.

"(e) On a pedestal, bust of Henry Clay.

"VIII. Aldermanic Chamber.

"(a) South wall, portraits of General Swift and Commodore Bainbridge.

"(b) North wall, portrait of Jacob Hays.

"IX. Committee Room of Aldermanic Chamber.

"(a) East wall, portrait of General Anderson.

"(b) West wall, south to north, portraits of General Morton and Mr. Valentine.

"(c) North wall, west to east, portraits of Harry Howard and General McClellan.

"X. President of the Board of Aldermen's Room.

"(a) North wall, painting 'Vuelvan Cara!'

"(b) East wall, portrait of Achmet Benaman.

"(c) South wall, east to west, portraits of Generals Steuben and Boliver.

"XI. City Clerk's Offices.

"(a) Private room; west wall, portrait of General Scott.

"(b) General office; south wall, portrait of General Brown; east wall, portrait of General Burnett.

"Your Committee also report that they found it indispensable to have the series of Mayors' portraits and their frames cleaned (without, however, any use of varnish) and the portrait of Mayor Clinton relined at a total expense of \$141.45, which amount, in view of the value of the Commissioners' time and the fact that use of the Mayor's Reception Room was delayed pending this work, the Committee deemed economy to have done at once, recommending that the Assistant Secretary be instructed to secure payment therefor from the proper sources.

"We make the foregoing report as one of progress, reserving the final report until after pending renovations, when the City Hall may be considered in its entirety.

"Second—Your Committee further reports that it found that the decoration of the Mayor's Public Reception Room and Lobby, while in some respects admirable, had been so far and in such manner completed without advice or knowledge of the Commission, as to make it impracticable to hang these historic portraits as effectively as might otherwise have been done. With care, however, as to the more important furniture, especially curtains, shades and rugs, the Committee believes the effect may be made so far pleasing as a whole as scarcely to justify the expense of radical change.

"In three particulars your Committee ventures to suggest, namely:

"1. That the enlarged models of the seals used as decoration for the upper part of the walls of the Mayor's Public Reception Room be so treated as:

"(a) Somewhat to emphasize and relieve the effect of the portraits (as contrasting darker shades) which now results from the comparative lack of color in the wall decoration, and which cannot be fully met even by adding floor coverings to the curtains already existing.

"(b) By emphasizing their high lights and the deepening shadows to bring out their devices. As now placed they are of such scale and of such height as to invite inspection but defy curiosity. Though the scale is still small, your Committee believes that by such treatment their decorative effect could greatly be improved and their devices made fairly visible.

"2. That window shades be selected of such color as to harmonize with the color of the walls.

"3. That if an appropriate grill should be provided, of wrought iron or bronze, with swinging gates and of height to correspond with the base below the fascies on either side, at the entrance to the Lobby on the inside (west) of the columns; now on either side, and corresponding construction (instead of the wooden railing that shuts off the attendant's desk) further west by the window, this would greatly add to the appearance of the Lobby and fairly complete what is the peculiarly artistic and effective treatment that the architect has given it.

"In this regard, with all scruple against going beyond its duty, your Committee note that the final effect of the portraits themselves so largely depends upon their appropriate surroundings that the suggestions just made are proper upon this ground.

"For similar reason as to the Council Chamber we recommend:

"(a) That the central section of the east wall be paneled for an appropriate distance above the rear row of seats.

"(b) That such lighting be arranged for as to correct the present effect of the chandeliers in suppressing the portraits; for example, by electric lights with reflectors above the respective portraits.

"Notwithstanding the obvious necessity for somewhat of repair and renovation in the Council Chamber, the Governor's Room and the Aldermanic Chamber, your Committee find their present wall tints favorable upon the whole, not merely for general decoration, but for effective display of the City's really fine collection of portraits, and hence suggest that before any change in this regard is made the Commission be consulted."

On motion, the report was received and ordered placed on file, and the Assistant Secretary directed to send a copy to the President of the Borough and the Supervising Architect.

The Committee on Mayor's Letter in re Hall of Records, reported, through Commissioner Dielman, Chairman, stating that on March 25 the following letter was received from the Mayor:

"March 24, 1903.

"Hon. JOHN DEWITT WARNER, President, Municipal Art Commission:
"My Dear Sir—The Fine Arts Federation communicated to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a plan for the mural decoration of the Hall of Records. By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment this plan was referred to a special committee, consisting of the Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan. At a meeting of the committee, held yesterday, I was requested to transmit this document to the Municipal Art Commission, and to ask of the Commission the following questions:

"1. Does the Art Commission think that such decorations in the Hall of Records are desirable?

"2. If so, is it better that they should be made while the building is in course of construction, or after it is completed?

"3. Can they be made after the building is completed if they are not made during the construction?

"4. If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is to make any appropriation for mural decoration, how much, in the judgment of the Municipal Art Commission, should be appropriated for the purpose, and upon what conditions?

"I shall be obliged if you will submit these questions to your Commission.

The Committee recommended that the following reply be sent:

"Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and Chairman of Special Committee on Decoration of the Hall of Records:

"Dear Sir—Answering your communication of 24th ult., already acknowledged, to its first three questions the Commission now replies, viz.:

"Question No. 1. 'Does the Art Commission think that such decorations in the Hall of Records are desirable?'

"We do think such decorations in the Hall of Records desirable, and in such regard refer you to our communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, of April 2, 1902, and especially the following quoted therefrom:

"The Art Commission urges the making of such appropriation because it considers the enrichment of public buildings, grounds and parks with works of art eminently desirable and proper, not alone as beautifying the same, but also as affording opportunity for providing pictorial or other records of personages and events of interest in the history of the City."

"Question No. 2. 'If so, is it better that they should be made while the building is in course of construction or after it is completed?'

"They should be made while the building is in course of construction. The decorations in question include mural paintings, mosaic and glass work. The glass work, in especial, should be gotten under way as quickly as possible, for if postponed it would be necessary to substitute temporary glass for the protection of the interior. The putting in of mosaic involves such disturbance of other occupancy that it, too, should be put in during general construction. As to mural paintings, as such, while possible to be added after construction, they should be planned beforehand and progressed as nearly as possible with construction—modern methods by which they are executed elsewhere—and their canvasses afterward given permanent place upon the walls, permitting the greater part of the work to be done elsewhere while the wall itself is drying, and the work of adjustment being necessarily such as to make rooms practically untenable for ordinary uses while this is going on.

"It is in any case essential that the plans for decoration and interior construction and finish be settled in advance and with reference to each other. For example, the ventilators, if located as now suggested, would break space which should be decorated, and they should be moved to more inconspicuous positions.

"We concur in the recommendations of the Society of Mural Painters that the best arrangement for economy and convenience would be to complete the decoration of this building at the same time as the other finish, so that, as in case of the Appellate Court Building at Madison square, the building might promptly be turned over complete and ready for full and continuous occupancy.

"Question No. 3. 'Can they be made after the building is completed, if they are not made during the construction?'

"Provided the details of plan are now settled, the decorations could, in the main, be added after the building is otherwise completed, but at added inconvenience and considerable expense, especially in the case of mosaic and glass work, and the inevitable difficulty of so successfully planning in advance for all details that it would not be found necessary in many details to change the finished construction in view of the effect that, in actual execution, the decoration would be found to have."

"Question No. 4. 'If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is to make any appropriation for mural decoration, how much, in the judgment of the Municipal Art Commission, should be appropriated for the purpose, and upon what conditions?'

"Before answering it, the Commission feels necessary to have more full consultation with experts than it has yet had opportunity. Therefore, reserving this fourth question for further study, the Commission now answers as above noted the first three of the questions submitted."

Upon motion, the report was received and adopted, and the Assistant Secretary was directed to carry out its recommendations.

The Committee further reported that the following resolution had been received from the Board of Aldermen:

"Whereas, It is the expressed purpose in decorating the new Hall of Records now in course of construction to commemorate the great historic events associated with the history of The City of New York; therefore be it

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the Board of Aldermen, and as such it is hereby recommended to the Art Commission and such other authority as may be proper in the premises, that the granting of the Dongan Charter of The City of New York by Governor Thomas Dongan be appropriately commemorated.

"Adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 16, 1903."

The Committee recommended that the suggestion be approved and that it be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with such approval.

Upon motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to communicate to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Board of Aldermen the action of the Commission.

The Committee on National Sculpture Society Memorial submitted a report, through Commissioner Proctor, Chairman, as follows:

"Your Committee finds before it two papers:

"First, A report of a Committee on Sculpture of the Fine Arts Federation, endorsed by the Federation, similar to their report on Mural Painting, which was received at the last meeting of the Commission and transmitted to the Board of Apportionment. Your Committee reports in favor of making a similar disposition of this paper of the Fine Arts Federation.

"The second paper before it is a report of a special Committee of the National Sculpture Society forwarded to the Art Commission with a letter stating that the Sculpture Society trusts it will be of service to the Commission. In reference to this paper your Committee suggests that it be received and acknowledged formally to the National Sculpture Society as a document which might be valuable to the Commission in the future, and that they be advised that the report to the Fine

Arts Federation under date of March 9 (copy to be enclosed), had been forwarded to the Board of Apportionment in accordance with the request of this Board that the Art Commission confer with the Fine Arts Federation in the matter."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion the report of the Committee was unanimously adopted and the Assistant Secretary was directed to communicate to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Fine Arts Federation and the National Sculpture Society, the action taken by the Commission.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 35.

The Committee upon Governor Clinton Portrait reported through Commissioner Dielman, Chairman, that no painting had been submitted to the Commission and requested that it be discharged from further consideration.

On motion the Committee was discharged.

The Committee on Quarters and Staff reported progress.

On motion the meeting adjourned.

Meeting, March 19, 1903, 4 p. m.

Andros Avenue, Third Ward, Sewer Outlet.
