Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1904.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS—BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND RICHMOND.

The Arsenal, Central Park.

During the past quarter, covering the busiest season of the year, from a park standpoint, when the work of planting and the numerous other works incidental to the spring season, including the repairs and renovation made necessary by a severe winter, are taken up, and the parks themselves are put to their greatest occupation and use by the public, much has been accomplished in the way of maintenance, as well as construction, to effect important results and bring about a creditable condition of the parks generally.

The maintenance work, with its many and varied features peculiar to the spring season, has been carried on with diligence.

During the quarter many excellent improvements have been made in park plantation work. This not only applies to turf lawns, but to construction and maintenance, as will be more particularly spoken of, yet briefly, later on, and as nearly as possible, the work accomplished by the mechanical, gardening and laboring forces will be outlined. In this connection, it might be stated, that though not anticipated in last year's Budget, a considerable number of men have been employed laying sod. This work in former years was included in the contract for furnishing sod, but the results ob-

tained have been so very satisfactory that the loss to maintenance has been a decided gain to the park feature. Over 10,000 cubic yards of mold have been received and spread, the handling of which, with the other work, has taxed the laboring force to its utmost.

Great attention has been given to the preservation of the beautiful beech trees and those of other varieties on the East Green, and to the promotion of their growth, as far as practicable, by a generous treatment of compost and wholesome earth.

Passing reference might be given to the difficulties of properly protecting Central Park, as well as other parks, after 5 o'clock P. M. After this hour there is practically no one with authority from this Department remaining in the park, to look after or care for plantations, park property, etc., and if this condition could be remedied it would be very advantageous. The mechanical, gardening and laboring forces have invariably rendered during work hours an excellent day's work and satisfactory results.

An unusually large number of children have been accommodated on the lawns of Central Park during the months of May and June, and permits have been issued for such parties as follows:

During this quarter some of the lawns in the City parks were made use of for children's parties, and, in consequence, much entertainment has been given to the children of the various locations.

The usual games permitted in the parks were allowed during this quarter, as follows:

The maintenance of nearly two hundred tennis courts in Central Park entails considerable work in keeping the lawns in condition and the courts properly marked out.

In connection with the lawn tennis playing, the practice of "First come, first served," has been discontinued, and hereafter the time allowed for the use of each court will be divided into three periods, which will increase the number of players two-thirds, and it is believed will produce better and more favorable results.

The concert season in the parks was begun June 4, and will continue during the season, according to the following schedule:

Considerable work was required in connection with preparing music-stands, platforms, etc., for these concerts, as well as the care and attention required during the season.

The work of restoring the grass plots and replacing dead trees on West Seventy-second street required considerable time, the work having been pushed by two gangs of men, one doing the sodding and the other grading and removing rubbish and surplus mould. The arboriculturist force removed the dead trees and planted nine elms in their stead, cultivated around other trees in the street requiring attention, digging holes about the trees, removing the old soil and replacing it with good mould.

At West Eighty-sixth street the parkway has undergone a complete change, and the result so far has been very much valued by the residents. The change has included the preparation for planting 110 Norway maples, grading and sodding all grass plots from Central Park, West, to Riverside, removal of 1,200 cubic yards of old and waste soil, and replacing with 1,200 cubic yards of healthy mould. Two hundred and fifty iron tree guards were furnished and set, and 40,000 square feet of sod delivered for sodding of the tree plots. Weekly attention is also given to the care of the grass plots and trees.

The rustic stairway at Riverside Park near West Eighty-sixth street, recently reconstructed, has provided a very necessary and important improvement at this point. The manifest satisfaction it gives members of the Columbia Boat Club, residents in the neighborhood and the public generally, entitles it to be called a decided park improvement. The stairway is built of cedar being broken at intervals by platforms which are backed up by rustic stone walls to prevent wash-outs and planted with Japanese ivy.

In order to complete the construction of the walk on the east side of Central Park, from Eighty-fifth to Ninetieth streets, the Department force has been required to put up a three-strand wire fence for the protection of small children who otherwise might wander into the roadway. New borders were made and sodded, embankments graded and sodded, using considerable sod and mould in the work, which is more particularly mentioned in the following pages. Settees have been placed along this walk, and many more will be added; twelve ligustrums to back up east bank over transverse road were planted and an iron post and wire fence were so placed that the chance of going over the embankment has been minimized.

The work performed by the masons covers the entire maintenance and provides for cementing, stone, brick, plastering and paving work. The repairs are too numerous to mention particularly, but may be summed up as follows: Repairing cement walks; basins, fountains, paving, setting stone curb and flagging, plastering, laying sewer and drain pipes, cleaning and removing stoppage in main sewers and drains, repairs to stone dams and stone fences, concreting work in making new cement walks in Central and City Parks, many of the items of work coming under the head of "Maintenance, Construction and Improvements of Parks, Parkways and Drives." The work has been uniformly done in a good and workmanlike manner.

The area set aside in city parks for playgrounds, etc., although somewhat limited, has in the attendance and work fully realized expectations; arrangements made for the better accommodation of children have been quite successful. The early spring found the appliances very much out of repair, but, thanks to our mechanical force, this was to a certain extent remedied and before the end of April everything in the line of playground features was in excellent order in most of the parks, and with the addition of new appliances and apparatus thousands of children avail themselves of the opportunities these popular features afford. The demand for increased area for such use has been met by opening a new portion of Tompkins' Square as a children's playground. This

playground will be ready about the middle of July, and will be provided with the necessary appliances, etc.

The Playground Attendants and Instructors have taken special pains to give every child coming into the playgrounds a chance to be entertained and present conditions speak very favorably for their interest and effort in this work.

Cultivating and preparing beds for bedding plants, laying sod and planting trees and shrubs in the Central and City Parks, has been attended to by the gardening and arbicultural forces. Thirty-five thousand pansies, daisies and primroses have been set out; 10,000 herbaceous plants were taken from the nursery and set out along the East, Centre and West drives in Central Park; 8,000 moss pinks were set out at the terrace, cart rock and Cedar Hill, and 3,000 of these plants at the nursery were kept cultivated, weeded and watered. At One Hundred and Sixth street and West drive and at the block-house on walks, several new features were deemed necessary, requiring many hundred cubic yards of mould, a number of thousand square feet of sod and 260 rhododendrons, in addition to grading and filling. At the ramble north of lake, the ground was prepared and cultivated for setting out 550 rhododendrons. At the terrace, 25 hybrid rhododendrons were set out and cared for.

In the early spring the tulips and narcissus were taken from the beds located in Central, Riverside and parks north and south of Fifty-ninth street, and the said beds were prepared for the regular summer bedding plants.

The fountains have also been freed from scum, drift and weeds; the lilies in the fountains have been cared for and where dead were replaced and several measures deemed wise for successful planting have been carried out.

At Eighty-sixth street, 110 Norway maples have been planted with the very best results; Riverside, between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-third streets, 60 Norway maples were set out; on Fifth avenue 6 elms were replanted to replace dead ones which were taken out; on Eighth avenue 5 elms were planted, and on West Seventy-second street, 1 elm; 28 trees of different varieties being planted along Riverside drive.

The general work, such as planting, bedding, cultivating, watering and sodding; also the cutting down and removal of 100 dead trees, the preparation at the two nurseries for care and proper maintenance of trees, shrubs and plants has been most successfully carried out; and, without almost an exception, up to this time, the nursery stock has a hardy and vigorous look, and in all probability for fall planting will be in splendid condition.

The success attending the laying of sod has been very unusual, for up to the present none has been lost to the Department. This is largely due to the care and attention which this branch of the work has received. Also where necessary new mould has replaced that which was in a way doubtful and the ground was properly cultivated preparatory to laying the sod. A force of men was kept constantly at work, when the weather conditions required, sprinkling the recently placed sod, and in this way the 40,000 square feet of sod has been saved to the Department.

The work done in this direction has been distributed over the following-named parks, and the number of square feet laid in the different parks and parkways are approximately given as follows:

The spring output this year of bedding plants has been very large, accommodating the great demands of the gardening force in connection with the planting of flower beds in the parks of Manhattan. It was due to the excellent work at the conservatory that the Department was able to make such a satisfactory showing, as all the plants used for spring and summer bedding are propagated at the above place. The effective arrangement of the flower beds around the conservatory has been greatly admired by the thousands who visit this section of Central Park. Many new plants have been added to the collection and altogether the conservatory is in a promising condition.

The Easter flower show this year was exceptionally successful, and was attended by thousands of delighted visitors. Many fine specimens of azalea, Easter lilies, rhododendrons, primroses, daisies, cinerarias, calceolaria, corn flowers, etc., were exhibited.

It having been first sanctioned by the Landscape Architect, a general remodeling of slopes, embankments, etc., has been carried out and completed in the woodland north of the lower tennis grounds. This region was in a very unsatisfactory state, but by the application of a few thousand cubic yards of mould and grading to meet natural advantages, a marked change has been created in the landscape beauties, and vigor and health restored to the trees and shrubs, that had been suffering for the want of proper nourishment. Extensive alterations had to be made in the walks and paths, old ones being covered and new ones constructed, which involved the removal of large boulders, and arrangements have been made for the laying of a sod border and the seeding over of the cultivated spaces.

Along the line of Eighty-sixth street transverse road the embankments on the north and south sides have undergone much needed change, and a thousand cubic yards of mould has been spread and given a proper and required grade, and included in this work was the laying of twenty thousand square feet of sod and the sowing of grass seed.

At Ninety-seventh street and West drive, from where an old urinal has been removed, and for the purpose of improving this section, to fill and bring up to the necessary grade several hundred cubic yards of mould were used, grade arranged and ground cultivated, and eight thousand square feet of sod laid.

The walk along the East drive, between Eighty-sixth and Ninetieth streets, was filled in, graded and drained, new embankments made and borders and slopes sodded.

At One Hundred and Sixth street, around the block house, and on the West drive, a territory formerly in a very bad condition, has been reconstructed, including new embankments, walks, slopes, etc., requiring for the work over one thousand cubic yards of mould. In arranging the ground for planting of 500 rhododendrons for protection of slopes and embankments, it was found necessary to cover the same with sod, taking nearly thirty thousand square feet of sod.

Considerable attention has been given by the Department force to the work of cleaning the borders of the lakes, and the removal of the drift and undergrowth from the surface. This work has been continually and diligently prosecuted. Quite frequently during each month a fresh supply of water was run into the lakes, which has largely been the means of keeping the water from becoming stagnant and unhealthy.

There are other conditions existing in connection with these lakes that require very radical treatment to effect the much desired results. This will necessitate drawing off the water, removal of the mud and deposits, and concreting the bottom of the lakes.

The regular routine work has been done in Riverside Park, such as cleaning walks, basins, drains, etc., the removal of rubbish, mowing of lawns and necessary work of the sections. There has been quite a decided change in some of the park features on account of the addition of many new features. Where possible, the washouts of last season have been temporarily repaired, but conditions are still such that considerable work will be demanded before the slopes can be re-established. In my former report I particularly mentioned what would be required to restore this park to natural conditions. The drive has been kept repaired, trees planted and cultivated and careful attention given to park interests.

The work necessary to maintain good conditions has been done in St. Nicholas Park, including the usual regular work each day. The sidewalks have been improved by the laying of 350 feet of flagging. The washouts at Jasper Oval have been refilled,

about 300 loads of soil being used in this work. This was very necessary, as was the same class of work in many places in the park. Drainage has been provided where found defective. The building of a wooden stairway at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, which was completed early in the quarter, has been very much appreciated by the public. The completion of the stone stairway about on a line with One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street having been completed, the old wooden stairway that has so long served the public in crossing the park will be removed. It is contemplated for the purpose of preventing a recurrence of last year's washouts, to build a blind drain, and connect it with the sewer. This work will be started soon.

At the Department stables the horses and harness have been well cared for, and kept in good condition. The stable force was prompt and efficient while at work during the quarter ending June 30, 1904. The hay and oats delivered have very much improved in quality, and are giving entire satisfaction at the present time.

There has only been a loss of one horse by death during this quarter, and in that case it was from old age and general debility.

During the quarter the Machinist's force has been actively engaged in repairs to iron work on rolling stock, and all such work required in the proper care and maintenance of park property, including steam roller, auto-mower, hand and horse mowers, repairs to iron bridges, grating, fountains, iron urinals, tools, etc. This force has put up 5,000 feet of pipe fence.

The constantly increasing demand for repairs under the head of plumbing work may, in the near future, necessitate a small addition to the force of plumbers. One of the most decided features to expect trouble from is the old supply pipe, made from stove-pipe and cement, which has proved for a number of years a veritable source of trouble and most discouraging results. It is nearly an every-day occurrence to have breaks, which not only deprive the park section of water, but in most cases destroy lawns, turf and plantations. I would recommend that provision be made for the purpose of introducing a new ten-inch Croton main, and thereby remedying the many present disagreeable features.

The most important repairs made by the gang of Plumbers during the past quarter were repairs to toilets, etc., in cottages in Central and City Parks; the hydrants were also kept in repair throughout the different parks, and bursts of Croton water-pipes attended to.

The men composing the Painter's gang have uniformly conducted their work so that the best results have been obtained. Their work during this quarter included the painting of light wagons, signs, all the rolling stock, iron posts and fences, music stands, chairs, tables and screens, flagpoles, settees, apparatus for gymnasiums, hydrants, all buildings in Washington Square, office at Union Square, music stand, East River Park; Engineer's house, St. Gabriel's Park; toilet in Hamilton Fish Park, dressing rooms at Seward Park, urinal, City Hall Park; bow bridge and urinal north of boat house, Central Park; building at DeWitt Clinton Park, as well as the necessary glazing.

Particular reference should be made to some of the more important results obtained, as, for instance, the work at Washington Square, involving the copying of the ornamental tiling used over music stand, the originals of which in tile would have cost considerable money, and would have to be imported. The work done by the Painters was so true to the original that when in place the difference cannot be detected. The ladies' cottage and tool house in the same park were also most artistically painted, and the same may be said of all work undertaken by this force.

The condition of many buildings, inside and outside, arbors, summer-houses, rustic fences, gymnasium and playground fixtures, all of which had been more or less neglected, repairs for which required a competent force of men to properly carry on the renovation desired and demanded. Various other work by the carpenters' force must be considered, building trucks, water monitors, settees, dirt carts, grass carts, etc., to the number hereinafter mentioned. It will be readily perceived that the alterations made were both numerous and important, and in many instances since completion have proved a boon to the park visitors.

The change made necessary in buildings, etc., at DeWitt Clinton Park on account of undergoing construction, has taxed the carpenter force to a very great extent, requiring the removal of playground and gymnasium appliances, Engineer's office and garden farmhouse, reconstructing farmhouse on a larger scale than formerly with toolhouse addition.

It will hardly be possible to comment or particularize on the additional work done by this force other than to say that the work accomplished has been thoroughly and efficiently done, and thus far has given complete and satisfactory results as to construction and regular maintenance.

Rolling stock constructed by carpenter force: 7 new water monitors, 1 dumping truck, 1 gardener's wagon, 1 carpenter's wagon, 3 grass carts, 3 dirt carts, 3 farm carts, 7 road carts, 1 portable water barrel, 9 wheelbarrows, 12 pair double whiffle trees, 8 single whiffle trees, 30 pair lawn-mower shafts. Repairs to rolling stock: 17 water trucks, 2 dumping trucks, 2 dirt trucks, 2 spring trucks, 3 light wagons, 1 grass cart, 2 dirt carts, 2 road carts, 12 wheelbarrows, 2 Gem sprinklers and 2 portable water barrels.

Miscellaneous construction work: New boat landing at Fifty-ninth street lake, new boat landing at large lake, new board plank walk at Bow Bridge, new plank walk around Conservatory lake, wire fence around 54 plots on Fifty-ninth street, Fifth to Eighth avenues, 2,000 feet of wire fence, East drive Eighty-fifth to Ninetieth streets, 600 feet of fence at Jumel Mansion, new wooden steps at St. Nicholas Park, reconstructed steps at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and St. Nicholas Park, made 112 new signs, 1,200 wire fence stakes, 8 large tool boxes, 24 street water boxes, 30 new propagating frames, 4 harrows for Speedway; reconstructed 1 water trough for dump, 200 Spate chairs, 27 music racks, 661 settees, repaired 841 settees, 22 buildings in Central Park, also 26 buildings and structures in City parks; made alterations and repairs to playground appliances in John Jay Park, East Seventeenth Street Park, Tompkins Square, Hamilton Fish and Corlears Hook Parks, made new additions and alterations at Seward Park on fixtures for playgrounds.

City Parks and Parks South of Fifty-ninth Street.

The following repairs and improvements were made on buildings, to wit: Ladies' cottage, toolhouse and music stand, Washington Square; music stand, Abingdon Square; music stand, Battery Park; 10 closets at Seward Park for Attendants' use; rebuilding new farm buildings at DeWitt Clinton Park; repairs to building and music stand, East River Park; Cottage at Bryant and Madison Square, also at Union Square and East Seventeenth street and Stuyvesant Square; made new screen doors for cottage at Tompkins Square; repaired lavatory at Corlears Hook and Hudson Park; buildings in Hamilton Fish and Corlears Hook Park; and women's cottage in Battery and Mt. Morris Parks; toolhouse in St. Nicholas Park, and at Grant's Tomb, Riverside; cottages on Riverside at Seventy-ninth, Ninety-sixth and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets; music stand platforms at Morningside, Hudson and Madison Square Parks.

It will not be possible in this report to outline more particularly the amount of alterations, which in many instances amounted to almost a new building or parts of rolling stock, and the mechanical force are to be congratulated on the earnest endeavor to accomplish work which has given entire satisfaction and the best results.

The opening of baths at William H. Seward Park with an accommodation of 52 bathers, the placing of arm-chairs with rockers on the pavilion for the comfort and pleasure of women and children, and the shelter given to the gymnasium and playgrounds, have been innovations greatly appreciated by the thousands who visit the park for recreation and rest.

CONSTRUCTION WORK.

DeWitt Clinton Park.

Work on the contract for constructing DeWitt Clinton Park was continued during the quarter. The work consisted of regulating and grading the grounds, spreading mould and setting bluestone curb and edging, constructing rubble masonry for step foundations, building walk and surface basins, etc. The work is being prosecuted in a manner which will warrant my stating that the same will be completed during the next quarter. The work done during the quarter follows:

400 cubic yards of mould excavated and stored.

1,200 linear feet of 6-inch fine-axed bluestone curb furnished and set.

4,600 linear feet of 2½-inch bluestone edging delivered on site of the work.

300 cubic yards of rubble masonry built in step foundations.

20 walk basins built up to head line.

4 surface basins built up to cast-iron frame.

1,500 linear feet of 6-inch vitrified pipe laid.

540 linear feet of 8-inch vitrified pipe laid.

905 linear feet of 10-inch vitrified pipe laid.

347 linear feet of 12-inch vitrified pipe laid.

450 linear feet of the 5 foot 6 inch wrought iron picket fence around the farm garden erected.

In addition to the above work the construction of the water supply system consisting of 4-inch cast iron pipe with 2-inch galvanized branches, the necessary lead pipe connections, stop cocks, street washers, drinking hydrants and brick vaults has been completed, with the exception of the setting of the drinking hydrants. The work on the north playground, the regulating and grading of same, the sub-irrigation construction and the laying of rubble-stone foundation was completed. The work on the gymnasium ground has been sub-graded, and about one-half of the rubble-stone foundation is in place. The entire sub-drainage of the porous tile has been laid, and work is progressing favorably. The farm garden plot has been regulated and graded to sub-grade, the fertilizer has been spread, and the depositing of mould in place is now being prosecuted. The general walk systems have been practically brought to proper sub-grade by excavation and fill, and are ready to receive the rubble-stone foundation. Work is also being prosecuted on the rubble-stone foundation walls for steps, and on the placing of stones for wrought iron picket fence. Most of the latter has been delivered ready for erection.

Thomas Jefferson Park.

Work on this contract, the construction of Thomas Jefferson Park, between One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, First avenue and the bulkhead of the East river, was continued during the quarter, and, judging from present conditions, it is safe to say that the construction will be fully completed at the close of the coming quarter. The work done during the quarter follows:

100 linear feet of 6-inch curb set on concrete.

1,130 linear feet of 2½-inch edging set.

26,500 square feet of asphalt walks laid.

54,000 square feet of 8-inch rubble-stone foundations laid.

60 linear feet of 8-inch vitrified drain pipe laid.

The work of installing the water supply system was continued as follows:

326 linear feet of 2-inch galvanized iron pipe laid.

136 linear feet of 1-inch lead pipe laid.

20 linear feet of 6-inch drain pipe for hydrant waste.

In laying the sub-irrigation the work consisted of laying

570 linear feet of 6-inch vitrified drain pipe (specials).

8,625 linear feet of 3-inch porous tile pipe.

The work of constructing playgrounds consisted of

31,700 square feet of 8-inch rubble-stone foundation laid.

200 linear feet of 3-inch tile drains laid.

830 cubic yards broken stone spread.

415 cubic yards fine gravel spread and rolled.

The work of constructing the gymnasiums consisted of

47,200 square feet of 8-inch rubble foundation laid.

715 cubic yards of broken stone spread.

715 cubic yards of fine gravel spread and rolled.

50 linear feet of 3-inch tile drain laid.

2,450 linear feet of oak curbing, including posts.

160 cubic yards of sand spread.

160 cubic yards of cinders spread.

4,425 cubic yards of mould or top soil spread.

700 cubic yards of manure spread.

75,400 square feet of sod laid.

3,000 cubic yards of filling in place.

St. Gabriel's Park.

Between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, First and Second avenues.

Work on this improvement was begun during the quarter. It consisted of the general excavation of rubbish, bricks, walls, bats and all foreign materials, and placing fresh, clean, wholesome earth filling in embankment and slopes; regulating and grading the centre portion to a general sub-grade; removing the existing house connections from the surrounding water mains, and plugging the holes left in same; laying of the water supply system, constructing gymnasium and running track, laying of drainage and building of basins; laying of the tile drains and sub-soil irrigation system. The work done follows:

8,000 cubic yards of excavation of all kinds removed.

3,000 cubic yards of filling furnished in place.

1 walk basin built.

4 surface basins built.

80 linear feet of 6-inch drain pipe laid.

375 linear feet of 8-inch drain pipe laid.

80 linear feet of 10-inch drain pipe laid.

270 linear feet of 12-inch drain pipe laid.

50 per cent. of the water supply system is built.

20 per cent. of the gymnasium and running track has been constructed.

The entire taps removed from the water mains and the holes left in same by their removal, plugged.

East River Sea-wall—Extension to East River Park.

The construction of the wall proper, that is, of the unfinished portion, was completed during the quarter. The work of filling behind the wall, regulating and grading of slopes and embankments, is now being prosecuted, and the entire work should be fully completed in six or eight weeks. The work done in connection with this construction follows:

1,000 cubic yards of filling delivered in place.

485 cubic yards of excavations of all kinds.

420 cubic yards of broken range ashlar masonry built.

16 cubic yards of concrete foundations in place.

204 linear feet of granite coping set.

650 linear feet of galvanized fence erected.

St. Nicholas Park.

Construction of the bluestone steps and asphalt walk on rubble-stone foundation in St. Nicholas Park at One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

Work was resumed on this contract during the quarter and prosecuted to completion. A thoroughfare for pedestrians is now established, leading from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and St. Nicholas avenue to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and St. Nicholas terrace. The work done during the quarter follows:

161 cubic yards of rubble-stone foundations built.

1,515 linear feet of bluestone steps laid.

6,118 square feet of asphalt walk laid.

424 cubic yards of mould deposited in place.

1,030 square feet of sod laid.

Manhattan Square.

Improvement of Manhattan Square, between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets.

The contractors resumed work on this construction during the quarter. The work is still being prosecuted, but the early completion of the same is anticipated. The work during the quarter follows:

6 walk basins built.

8 surface basins built.

350 linear feet of 6-inch drain-pipe laid.

100 linear feet of 8-inch drain-pipe laid.

100 linear feet of 10-inch drain-pipe laid.

5,500 square feet of asphalt walk laid.

4,000 cubic yards of mould deposited.

1,400 linear feet of pipe rail fence built.

6,000 square feet of sod laid.

Paving with Asphalt, Setting Curb and Doing Other Work in West Eighty-sixth Street, Between Amsterdam Avenue and Riverside Drive.

Work on this contract was resumed in April and prosecuted to completion during May. The amount of the work done follows:

2,020 square yards of block pavement taken up and relaid.

2,020 square yards of asphalt pavement laid.

Central Park.

Walk adjacent to Fifth avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Ninetieth streets.

Work on this contract was resumed on April 18, 1904. The work done follows:

7,732 square feet of rock asphalt mastic laid on a rubble-stone foundation with a concrete base.

4 walk basins built.

42 linear feet of 6-inch drain-pipe laid.

44 linear feet of 8-inch drain-pipe laid.

In addition to this the park force was engaged on the general reconstruction of the slopes adjacent to this new walk, shifting the line of the drive near the Transverse road, and laying gutters, spreading mould and sod.

Sewer from Mineral Springs to Existing Sewer Near the Dairy.

Work on this contract was prosecuted during the quarter. The work done follows:

600 linear feet of 15-inch pipe sewer laid, including the excavation of earth, rock and other materials and filling in of trenches.

150 linear feet of 12-inch pipe sewer laid, including excavation, etc.

400 linear feet of 10-inch pipe sewer laid, including excavation, etc.

3,100 square feet of sod laid.

Construction of Parapet Wall in Front of Museum of Art.

The work on this contract was prosecuted during the quarter and to practical completion, the only unfinished work being the laying of the asphalt wearing surface of a strip of walk adjacent to the wall and the carving of the piers and consols. The work done during the quarter follows:

65 linear feet of granite base course set.

150 linear feet of lime-stone wall erected.

2 piers 3 feet by 6 feet by 9 feet erected.

500 square feet of walk substructure, rubble-stone foundation and concrete base for asphalt laid.

20 linear feet of old parapet wall rebuilt.

The trench back of the wall was back-filled with earth and mould, and has been sodded.

Asphalt Repairs.

Repairs were made to the asphalt roadway pavements under the Department jurisdiction during the quarter to the extent of 500 square yards.

Repairs to Walk Pavements.

The square feet of asphalt mastic walk pavement laid in Morningside Park was 9,137.

Repairs to Cement Walk Pavement.

Repairs to the cement walk pavement of Madison Square, 15,054 square feet.

168 square feet of bridge stones were laid at One Hundred and Tenth street at Lenox and Seventh avenues.

The entomological work has been carried on in the best manner. The number of men employed for the destruction of noxious insects during the past quarter has been seven, and two power spraying machines have been, during half of the quarter, at work spraying the foliage of the trees and shrubs for the destruction of noxious insects, of which there are nearly two thousand species in our parks, and also for the destruction of parasitic fungi, so abundant on the park vegetation, and which causes the foliage to turn brown early in the season.

Examinations have been repeatedly made for the discovery of Anopheles, the malaria mosquito, but with very little success, the common mosquito, Culex, however, being very abundant at times, especially after a protracted rainy period. While they are extremely annoying, they are also harmless. There seems to be no reason for anxiety in regard to Anopheles, as a search in the catch-basins and elsewhere failed to reveal any of their larva, and the borders of the lakes being in good condition the fish have an opportunity to glean well along the shores and destroy any that might find congenial habitat in some of its still coves.

The foliage in all the parks is in good condition, and with favorable weather will keep so for some time yet, although the ripening of the leaves is already begun in some cases, and these will soon begin to turn yellow and brown.

Fungi, so common on many trees in our parks, also causes whole sections to have a brown appearance, and the spraying with the sulphate of copper solution is to check its destructive working and retain the green leaves until naturally ripened. This work has been extremely successful and satisfactory, and good results have been quickly obtained. The spraying with arsenates has also been extremely satisfactory, and altogether the work done has kept the foliage in good condition.

All the parks are examined often, and as soon as any destructive agent is found destroying the vegetation this is at once treated for its destruction and the preservation of the foliage.

A large number of inquiries have been answered, and advice and remedies given as far as can be for the care of trees, shrubs and plants, and for the treatment of insects as pests, in the house, air, merchandise, and wherever they may be found destructive or cause annoyance.

Central Park.

All the trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants in this park have been carefully examined, and as occasion required have been treated in the removal of cocoons and egg-masses of the Tussock Moth, treated for scale insects, and sprayed for leaf-eating insects, plant lice and cottony-scale insects. A great number of trees have also been sprayed with sulphate solution for the destruction of fungi, and all trees affected with this parasitic growth have been treated as far as was possible.

Battery Park.

All the trees in this park have been cleared of cocoons and egg-masses, and sprayed for leaf-eating insects, scale insects and fungi attacking the foliage, and the trees are all in good condition.

City Hall Park.

The trees in this park have all been treated with the arsenate and sulphate sprays, and the cocoons and egg-masses removed, and scale insects and Erisoma treated for their destruction.

Union Square Park.

All the trees in this park have been cleared of cocoons and egg-masses, and most of the trees have been sprayed for the destruction of the Tussock Moth larva and scale insects.

Madison Square Park.

All the trees in this park have been cleaned of cocoons and egg-masses, and most of them have been sprayed for the destruction of leaf-eating insects and fungi.

Bryant Park.

All the trees in this park have been treated for scale insects, Erisoma, the Tussock Moth, by the removal of all cocoons and egg-masses and spraying the foliage for the destruction of leaf-eating insects and the trunks and branches for the destruction of scale insects and Erisoma.

Tompkins Park.

All the trees in this park have been carefully treated and cleaned during the past quarter, and are in fine condition.

Stuyvesant Parks.

The trees in these parks have been cleaned of cocoons and egg-masses, scale insects and Erisoma removed and many sprayed for the destruction of leaf-eating insects.

Mount Morris Park.

All the trees in this park have been carefully examined, the cocoons and egg-masses removed, and many have been sprayed for the destruction of parasitic fungi and leaf-eating insects.

East River Parks.

Riverside Park and Drive.

The trees on Riverside Park and Drive have been carefully looked after during the past quarter, and a large number have been sprayed for the destruction of fungi and leaf-eating insects.

Plaza at Fifty-ninth Street.

The trees on this Plaza have been cleaned of cocoons, egg-masses, and the larvae in active operation removed, and all the trees sprayed with the arsenate emulsion.

The trees on Fifty-ninth street, from Fifth avenue to Eighth avenue, have been carefully examined, and fifteen of them treated for the destruction of enosoma—a cottony plant louse that feeds upon exposed parts, causing large tumors to appear and deforming the branches.

Eighth Avenue.

All the trees on Eighth avenue, from Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, have been examined and treated for the tussock moth, enosoma and scale insects, and also the wood leopard moth.

Small Parks, Squares and Places.

All the small parks, squares and places are examined repeatedly and the trees and shrubs are given the attention they require to keep them in good condition.

The trees on Fifth avenue, from Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, have been given the attention they required, and are in fair condition.

A number of street trees, where the cases were urgent, have been cleaned and sprayed, and all communications in regard to their care have been answered and advice given.

The Entomological Experiment Garden has prospered, and many insects injurious to herbaceous material have been studied and experimented upon for their destruction and the preservation of the most delicate plant growth. A large number of small varieties of noxious insects—not before seen in the park—developed upon the plants here, showing that they exist and are able to destroy the most valuable plant life.
