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## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

### WASHINGTON HEIGHTS DISTRICT.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District, held September 19, 1906, the following members were present:

Aldermen Meyers, Davies and Grifenhagen.

On motion of Alderman Meyers, Alderman Grifenhagen was made temporary Chairman.

The Chairman presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out a new street, extending from Overlook terrace to Bennett avenue.

Mr. Jonas M. Libbey appeared in favor.

Mr. Dunn, representing Mr. James A. Deering, appeared in opposition.

On motion of Alderman Meyers this matter was laid over for two weeks.

The Chairman presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out a new street west of Riverside drive, at or about One Hundred and Ninety-third street.

Mr. Jonas M. Libbey appeared in favor.

On motion of Alderman Meyers this matter was laid over for three months.

The Chairman presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out West One Hundred and Seventy-third, West One Hundred and Seventy-fourth and West One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, between Fort Washington avenue and Haven avenue, and the extensions of Haven and Buena Vista avenue.

A petition for a new layout has been filed but not advertised.

Mr. R. Tobias, representing Mr. Jos. A. Flannery, appeared.

Mr. J. R. Brown, representing Mrs. J. Hood Wright, appeared in opposition to the original plan, but favored the amended plan.

On motion, this matter was laid over, the new plan to be advertised, both plans to be considered together.

The Chairman presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out and widening of Boulevard Lafayette, between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-first streets, and One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Boulevard Lafayette and Buena Vista avenue.

Mr. R. Tobias, representing Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, appeared in favor.

Mr. B. F. Blauvelt, representing the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association, appeared in opposition.

On motion, this matter was laid over for two weeks.

Acting President Dalton entered the meeting at this point and took the Chair.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out as a public place, triangular plot bounded by Convent avenue, St. Nicholas avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-first street.

Alderman Grifenhagen reporting in favor.

Resolved, That this Board does hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the map or plan of The City of New York be altered and changed by laying out thereon for use as a public place the triangular piece of property bounded by Convent avenue, St. Nicholas avenue, and One Hundred and Fifty-first street, as shown on accompanying diagram; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be herewith transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of paving One Hundred and Forty-third street, between Lenox avenue and the Harlem river.

This matter was returned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a change in the boundaries.



Resolved, That sections 68 and 69 of the Sanitary Code be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 68. No person shall have, sell or offer for sale in the City of New York any food which is adulterated or misbranded. The term food as herein used shall include every article of food and every beverage used by man and all confectionery.

Food as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

(a) If any substance or substances has or have been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or lower or injuriously affect its quality or strength.

(b) If any inferior or cheaper substances have been substituted wholly or in part for the article.

(c) If any valuable constituent of the article has been wholly or in part abstracted.

(d) If it consists wholly or in part of diseased or decomposed or putrid or rotten animal or vegetable substance, or any portion of any animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is a product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter.

(e) If it is colored or coated or polished or powdered, whereby damage is concealed or it is made to appear better than it really is.

(f) If it contains any added poisonous ingredient, or any ingredient which may render such article injurious to health; or if it contains any antiseptic or preservative not evident and not known to the purchaser or consumer.

(g) If in the case of confectionery, it contains terra alba, barytes, talc, chrome yellow, or other mineral substance or poisonous color or flavor, or other ingredient deleterious or detrimental to health; or any vinous, malt or spirituous liquor or compound or narcotic drug.

(h) If, in the

Lighters and barges, over 100 tons and not over 200 tons, \$1.  
Lighters and barges over 200 tons burden to pay 25 cents additional for every 100 tons or fraction thereof over 200 tons.  
The rate for unregistered lighters and barges is fixed at \$2, or as may be directed hereafter in individual cases.

The above rates will also apply to boats engaged in delivering coal in the harbor that do not go through the canals or navigate the rivers of the State of New York. The minimum rate for such boats to be 50 cents each.
