New York, January 29, 1908.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Charles N. Chadwick and Charles A. Shaw.

A letter was received from the Mayor's office, dated January 28, 1908, stating that on that date the Mayor had received and accepted the resignation of Hon. J. Edward Simmons as a member of the Board of Water Supply.

CIVIL SERVICE MATTERS.

Separations.

Leland W. Irish, Assistant Engineer, to take effect January 31, 1908; cause, resignation.

Edward J. Hughes, Axeman, to take effect January 21, 1908; cause, transferred to President of Brooklyn.

Mrs. S. T. Adams, Janitor, to take effect January 31, 1908; cause, removed, completion of work to which she was assigned; Chief Engineer's number, 2276.

The action of the Board in dispensing with the services of the following employees was rescinded:

January 8, 1908. Frank J. Wright, Laborer; cause, services required at Brookhaven, Long Island; Chief Engineer's number, 2280.

January 8, 1908. Christian Merritt, Laborer; cause, services required at Brookhaven, Long Island; Chief Engineer's number, 2280.

January 8, 1908. John R. Goubeaud, Axeman; cause, to permit transfer to another Department; Chief Engineer's number, 2273.

Commissioner Shaw reported that with reference to action of the Board at meeting of January 22, 1908, in cases of William B. Cook and James W. Laird, Rodmen, he had been advised verbally by the Secretary of the Municipal Civil Service Commission that these men could not be transferred as requested by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, their names having been placed on the "preferred list" before request for transfer was made.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Board on January 22, 1908, in the cases of William B. Cook and James W. Laird, Rodmen, be rescinded, and the action had in their cases at the meetings of January 9 and 15, 1908, respectively, stand as if not rescinded.

Police.

A communication was received from Ezra D. Strope, of Marlborough, New York, applying for position as Patrolman on the aqueduct. On motion, the Secretary was directed to write Mr. Strope that the time for filing applications for the examination for this position had closed on January 18, 1908, and that if not on the list to be prepared as the result of said examination, he would not be eligible for appointment, and that those appointed from said list would not be eligible to transfer to the New York City police force.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

Finances.

No. 2261, January 21, 1908, stated facts in reference to the necessity for pushing the work of procuring an additional supply of water from the Catskill Mountains, and urged that these matters be brought to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. On motion, this communication was referred to Commissioner Chadwick with power to take such action in behalf of the Board as he might deem advisable.

Real Estate, Hill View Reservoir.

No. 2271, January 23, 1908, reported that the design of this reservoir had not been completed and that the studies had not advanced sufficiently to enable a statement to be made as to the form the plans would take. On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit this information to the Corporation Counsel in reply to the inquiry contained in Opinion No. 211.

Agreement No. 37.

No. 2272, January 24, 1908, recommended that negotiations be commenced with the Cranford Company for a settlement of existing differences and for the modification of this agreement, so as to permit the work of sinking the test shafts on the line of the Hudson River crossing to be resumed and prosecuted to a greater depth than previously arranged. Commissioner Chadwick reported that he had sent a copy of this communication to the Corporation Counsel to be considered in connection with the request for an opinion already made.

Supplies.

A communication was received from the Engineering Bureau, dated January 21, 1908, giving certain facts as to the necessity for the purchase of photographic supplies under Orders Nos. 4516 and 5484, and, on motion, was referred to Commissioner Shaw with power to take such action in behalf of the Board as he might deem advisable.

Real Estate, Northern Aqueduct, Parcels 72A, 72B, 73A and 73B.

In relation to the contemplated additional taking in connection with Parcel 73, Section 2, Northern Aqueduct, No. 2274, January 28, 1908, was received from the Chief Engineer, forwarding for approval of the Board six similar maps entitled:

"Board of Water Supply of The City of New York. Map of Parcels 72A, 72B, 73A and 73B, situated in the Town of Phillipstown, Putnam County, New York."

On motion, these maps were approved and the Secretary was directed to transmit the same to the Corporation Counsel, requesting an opinion as to whether the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary, and if the same is not necessary requesting that the pending proceedings be amended to include these additional parcels.

Agreement No. 22.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the recommendation of the Chief Engineer in his communication, No. 2279, January 28, 1908, the time for the completion of the 200 linear feet of borings in Orange County, provided for in the third modification of this agreement, which modification was entered into with C. H. McCarthy under date of October 19, 1907, is hereby extended to and including March 1, 1908.

Relocation of Ulster and Delaware Railroad.

No. 2278, January 29, 1908, transmitted report of Messrs. F. L. Stuart and G. C. Clarke, dated January 15, 1908, and was filed.

Telephone Service, Peekskill.

No. 2275, January 29, 1908, recommended that the contract for telephone service at the Van Cortlandtville office, which was referred to the Chief Engineer on January 8, 1908, be approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the recommendation of the Chief Engineer in his communication No. 2275, the Board of Water Supply hereby approves of contract with the Hudson River Telephone Company for telephone service at the Van Cortlandtville office of this Board, to be paid for at the rate of \$6 per month; said contract to supersede the existing contract for service at No. 21 Nelson avenue, Peekskill, on February 1, 1908, or on such later date as the new service shall be installed and in operation.

Agreement No. 43.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, dated January 29, 1908, transmitting bill for \$654.90 of the Naughton Company for extra work in connection with the construction of test sections of reinforced concrete pipe near Hunters Brook, under Agreement No. 43, said bill bearing upon it the approval of the Chief Engineer and being accompanied by a memorandum explaining the various items. On motion, this bill was approved and a voucher for the payment thereof was ordered to be prepared and transmitted to the Comptroller.

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OTHER COMMUNICATIONS.

Accounts.

A communication was received from the Finance Department, dated January 22, 1908, relative to bill of Walter E. A communication was received from the Secretary, dated January 23, 1908, raising certain questions in reference to the bond of \$5,000 to be furnished by each contractor, to each municipality where labor is engaged in construction work under section 31 of chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, as amended by chapter 314 of the Laws of 1906. On motion, the Secretary was directed to write the Corporation Counsel, requesting his opinion on these questions.

In reference to opinion No. 209, the Examiner of Real Estate and Damages reported, under date of January 27, 1908, giving the information desired by the Phoenix Construction Company in connection with the trial of its libel in admiralty against the "Poughkeepsie" of the Central Hudson Steamboat Company, on account of the loss of hole No. 10 on August 30, 1907. On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit this information to the Corporation Counsel and to request an opinion as to whether the same should be furnished to the Phoenix Construction Company.

Real Estate, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 8, Parcel No. 328.

Commissioner Chadwick submitted the following resolution, and on motion the same was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Water Supply, pursuant to the recommendation of Commissioner Chadwick and in accordance with chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, as amended, and subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, hereby approves the purchase from Cornelius M. Winne, for twenty-three hundred dollars (\$2,300) cash, of Parcel No. 328, Section 8, Ashokan reservoir, containing about one acre of land, a 2-story and attic frame house, icehouse and outbuildings; and that when and if said purchase shall be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Corporation Counsel is hereby requested to prepare all necessary agreements and other instruments for the signatures of the Board of Water Supply and to take such other steps and proceedings as may be necessary and proper.

Real Estate, Taxes.

A report was received from the Examiner of Real Estate and Damages, dated January 24, 1908, in reference to certain taxes upon property acquired by The City of New York for the purposes of this Board, in the Town of Phillipstown, Putnam County. Dear Sir—I send you herewith report of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ending September 30, 1907, attaching reports of the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Bureau of Incumbrances, Topographical Bureau and General Bookkeeper.

Assistant Commissioner.

During the quarter, fifty-nine contracts were entered into, amounts aggregating \$674,438.06, divided among the Bureaus, as follows:

The contracts entered into during the quarter, chargeable to the Repaving Fund amount to \$216,233.85; chargeable to Street Improvement Fund, \$181,362.93, and chargeable to Labor, Maintenance and Supplies, \$1,401.75; making in all a grand total of \$398,998.53.

The preliminary estimates made for original improvements number eighty and amount to \$1,469,400.

The laboratory report shows an increase of about 10 per cent. over the amount of work accomplished in the same quarter last year.

The Repair Division report shows an increase in work done in 1907 over 1906, as will be seen by the following table:

This division also repaired and relaid 50,787 square yards of macadam, cleaned 24.1 miles of dirt road and attended to repairs in general.

Our Own Asphalt Plant.

The report of the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways, attached herewith, presents in detail the work done by the asphalt plant during the quarter, together with a statement showing cost of work done by plant as compared with the cost of similar work if done under the old contract system.

Bureau of Sewers.

During the quarter 6.086 miles of sewers were built, including pipe, reinforced concrete and brick sewers. One hundred and forty-five sewer basins were also constructed. In addition to the bids received for the construction of new sewers, bids were also received for all three sections of the Gold street sewer and the first half of the Scott avenue and St. Nicholas avenue sewers.

Borough Hall.

A much needed improvement has been completed in the Bureau of Buildings by the installation of metal filing cases for the filing of plans and permits for the business of that Bureau which will enable them to readily place their hands on plans and permits when required. Considerable miscellaneous work has also been furnished in the Bureau of Buildings by placing shelving in the document room. Three bins for holding plans and a number of new pigeon holes for the filing of old permits were also constructed.

The motor room on the ground floor has been painted. Old decayed steam pipe covering has been removed from the piping in the elevator shaft and new asbestos covering put in place. New door jambs, door and trim, also new closet for holding Engineers' tools, have been installed in the motor room.

Alterations and repairs to boilers, furnishing and placing new valves for same, and repairing brick work in the boiler room, have been made at the cost of \$700.

Much needed improvement has been accomplished by the painting of the tower, and the clock in same has also been overhauled. In this connection it is well to note that the ringing of the bell at the noon hour has been favorably commented on.

Kings County Court House.

The County Judges' private rooms and toilets have been painted, embracing ceilings, side walls and woodwork.

As per estimate furnished, alterations in Rooms 27 to 32 and in Room 45, for the use of the Supreme Court, have been completed. These alterations consist of new robing rooms for the Judges; new oak railings have been furnished in Rooms 27 and 45, and Judge's platform in Room 32 has been remodeled.

New cement floor has been put in place in the boiler room, and the brickwork around the boilers has been repaired, at a cost of some \$200.

Hall of Records.

Decayed flooring in the Commissioner of Record's room on the fourth floor, Surrogate's office on second floor and County Clerk's office on the first floor has been taken up and replaced with new yellow pine flooring.

Miscellaneous repairs have been made to folding shutters and filing cabinets and desks in the Register's office. Shelving has been placed in this building to accommodate the Bureau of Buildings so that old plans and permits may be stored therein.

The ceilings in the Register's office were found to be imperfect covering quite an area, and had to be removed and replaced with a new ceiling.

Steam pipes in the basement were repaired and two new sets of grates and miscellaneous repairs to brickwork were completed on the two boilers.

Municipal Building.

Alterations are under way to complete Rooms 1 and 3 for the accommodation of the Coroners, who will move from the Borough Hall so that rooms formerly occupied by them may be altered to suit the requirements of the Borough President's office.

Kings County Jail.

Side walls in the men's prison have been scraped and whitewashed. Ironwork connected with the gearing that operates on windows has been repaired.

Miscellaneous repairs have been made to ventilators and kitchen range in the men's prison.

Public Baths and Comfort Stations.

Two iron ventilators in sidewalk have been furnished in the Huron Street Bath. The entire interior of the Pitkin Avenue Bath has been repainted.

Miscellaneous repairs, covering plumbing, have been made in all the baths and comfort stations.

REPORT OF THE TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU FOR THE QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1907.

Office of the Assistant Engineer in Charge, }

Hon. DESMOND DUNNE, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith the quarterly report for the three (3) months ending September 30, 1907.

The work of the Topographical Bureau consists of matters relating to the determination, the preservation, and the changes in the established lines and the established elevation of public streets, parks, etc.; the preparation of maps for the legal opening of streets, etc.; the making of reports on the legal status of streets, etc.; the preservation and maintenance of lines, monuments, records, etc.; and connecting to the several secondary stations in this Borough, the traverse lines, monumented street lines, and the monumented lines holding the triangulation stations.

The work of this Bureau is directly for the use of the Local Boards for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the Corporation Counsel's office in the matter of condemnation proceedings for street openings, and for the various other departments of the City. Hence it affects the map of the City, which is the basis of all city improvements; and, therefore, not only the local improvements, such as highways, sewers, etc., but in a greater or less degree, the work of all the other departments of the Borough depend upon the work of the Topographical Bureau.

To make surveys and to prepare plans and profiles for all original improvements that are made by the Bureau of Highways; to determine for all contracts let by the Bureau of Highways the amount of excavation, the amount of fill, the number of linear feet of curbing, the number of square feet of sidewalks, the number of cubic yards of concrete, and the number of square yards of asphalt and to furnish the contractors with line stakes, grade stakes, and monthly estimates.

There has never existed a map of the Borough of Brooklyn showing all the changes that have been made in the street system of the various sections of the Borough since the original Commissioners' maps were adopted. I am now preparing such a map on a uniform scale of two hundred feet to the inch. Upon this map it is intended to note all the changes in street lines that were made in the past, and also, such changes in the map of the City as may be hereafter adopted. As a result of this work there will be in this office a map which will be complete and always up to date.

A—FIELD WORK.

The field work, which was required for and which is included in the maps and reports under the head of "Office Work," consists of chaining, line work, angular measurement, leveling, and damage survey work. The amount of this work, which was done as required, completed during this quarter, is as follows:

2. Triangulation of the Borough of Brooklyn.

In accordance with chapter 406 of the Laws of 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in co-operation with the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, is authorized to extend and complete the triangulation of The City of New York. The field parties have been engaged in reducing the triangulation stations to the ground, or, in other words, tying each triangulation station to the street lines or the monument lines in its immediate neighborhood. This is the most difficult and tedious part of the triangulation and requires a great amount of work and of care, because the triangulation points, as a rule, are points upon high buildings, and, therefore, it is impossible to bring them down to the ground, except by a small system of triangulation. The following triangulation station was connected with the street lines in its neighborhood.

Hon. JAMES DUNNE, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith report of the operations of the Engineering Division of this Bureau for the third quarter, ending September 30, 1907.

As you will note from the tables next attached, 32,133 linear feet of sewers of all sizes were laid during the quarter, or the equivalent of 6.086 miles. Three thousand three hundred and six linear feet of this amount, due to reconstruction or abandonment of old sewers, does not affect the total mileage of the sewerage system; therefore, during the quarter the sewer system was increased 5.358 miles. The total amount of sewers, divided among sewers of various sizes, built during the quarter, is as follows:

—the increase in mileage being 5.358 miles, making the total mileage of the Borough on September 30, 1907, 796,932 miles.

Of six-inch house connection drains, there were laid 19,338 feet, or 3.662 miles, which makes the total amount of six-inch house connection drain built by the Bureau to date of this report, 9,652 miles.

The number of basins built during the quarter has been 145, which makes the total number of basins now connected with the sewerage system, 9,833.

There remained upon June 30, 1907, thirty-seven resolutions for sewer improvements, for which plans and specifications had not been completed, to the value of \$3,094.100. During the quarter plans and specifications have been completed for twenty-nine of these, the cost being \$1,270,000.

Fifteen sewer improvements were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment during this quarter, the estimated cost being \$136,000. Plans and specifications for ten of these have been completed, the cost being \$96,000.

Plans for the remaining resolutions are under way and will be completed without delay.

On July 1 there remained one petition for a sewer to be built under private contract, and this has been withdrawn by the petitioner, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has authorized its construction by public contract.

During the quarter petitions have been received for ten improvements to be built under private contract, plans for seven of which have been completed.

One hundred and thirty-eight reports upon sewer improvements, in response to petitions for paving and in reply to petitions for sewers, have been made, the estimated cost being \$497,400, covering 14.1 miles of sewers. Thirty-seven of these reports are in response to petitions for paving, the estimated cost of the sewer improvements being \$135,400. One hundred and one of the above reports are in response to petitions for sewers, the estimated cost being \$362,000.

During the quarter bids were received for all three sections of the Gold street sewer at prices which are considered reasonable and fair. Bids have also been received for the first half of the Scott avenue and St. Nicholas avenue sewers.

I received your notice about those fraud Civil Service schools too late, as I paid my money in July to O'Brien. Kindly direct me. I need your advice. Do you think O'Brien can possibly get away from this fraud offer? Hoping to hear from you, I remain,

The Secretary was directed to take the matter up with the District Attorney of Kings County.
