## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Thursday, July 5, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Darwin R. James, Jr., Commissioner. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed adoption of a special resolution waiving the provisions of clause 11 of Rule VII to permit the Commission to grant Mrs. Margaret Ryan, Mrs. Susan Green and Mrs. Margaret J. McCormack, employees of the Department of Correction, a special examination for promotion to the position of Matron. Frederick T. Newell, Secretary of the Department of Correction, appeared in favor of the proposed resolution. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Classification by striking from the Exempt Class the following:

"Coroners. Clerk to each Coroner in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Richmond, The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens."

Ernest C. Wagner, Coroner, Borough of Brooklyn; Carl Voegel, Coroner, Borough of Queens; Timothy Healy, Coroner, Borough of Manhattan; William J. Flynn, Coroner, Borough of The Bronx; James L. Vail, Coroner, Borough of Richmond; Harry Leiserson, Clerk to the Coroner, representing Israel L. Feinberg, Coroner, Borough of Manhattan; Philip J. Coffey, Chief Clerk, Coroner's Office, Borough of Brooklyn; and Abraham L. Eisner, Clerk to the Coroner, Borough of The Bronx, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. Philip A. Johann, Esq., representing the Commissioner of Accounts, appeared in opposition thereto. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held June 6 and June 12, 1917, were approved.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, a promotion examination for the competitive position of Matron in the Department of Correction, open to persons serving in various positions appearing in the Non-Competitive Class of the Department of Correction, was held by the Municipal Civil Service Commission on May 17, 1916; and

Whereas, Mrs. Margaret Ryan, Mrs. Susan Green and Mrs. Margaret J. McCormack were unable to participate in said examination either because of illness or conditions arising out of special services rendered to the Department of Correction; and

Whereas, clause 11 of Rule VII prohibits the holding of a special examination for any candidate "unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the Commission that his failure to appear for or gain admission to or complete such examination or test was due to a manifest error or mistake for which the Commission is responsible, the nature of which shall be set forth in its minutes, or that such failure was due to compulsory attendance before any court or other public authority having the power to compel such attendance"; and

Whereas, the above mentioned examination was held in order to permit the adjustment of assignments of employees of the Department of Correction and resulted in the appointment of all candidates who passed therein and would have resulted in the appointments of Mrs. Margaret Ryan, Mrs. Susan Green and Mrs. Margaret J. McCormack, had they competed in and passed such examination; and

Whereas, the conditions in the cases of Mrs. Margaret Ryan, Mrs. Susan Green and Mrs. Margaret J. McCormack are not covered by clause 11 of Rule VII; therefore be it

Resolved, that, with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of clause 11 of Rule VII, be and are hereby waived so that the Municipal Civil Service Commission may grant a special examination to the above named employees of the Department of Correction for promotion to the position of Matron, in said department, such action, however, not to be regarded as any precedent for waiving the requirements of clause 11 of Rule VII.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of the Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, the following was laid over:

"Coroners, Clerk to each Coroner in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Richmond, The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens."

Frederick T.
