The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

REPORTS.

From Standing Committees.

Committee on Finance and Budget.

Department of Education—Approval of Plans, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 2).
(On February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 105), the request of the Board of Education in this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 29, 1918, from the Board of Education, transmitting plans and specifications for furnishing fire buckets for Public School 158, Brooklyn, at an estimated cost of \$125; and the following report of the Comptroller, Chairman, Committee on Finance and Budget, recommending approval thereof:

February 14, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 105), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated January 29, 1918, requesting the approval of plans and specifications for fire buckets for P. S. 158 of Brooklyn, at an estimated cost of \$125.

At its meeting on February 11, 1918, your Committee determined to recommend the approval of such plans and specifications.

The annexed resolution, if adopted, will give effect thereto.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves the plans and specifications for the purchase of fire buckets for P. S. 158, Brooklyn, at an estimated cost of \$125, to be paid from corporate stock account C. D. E.—9A, Department of Education, submitted by the Secretary of the Board of Education January 29, 1918.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Queens Boulevard, from Vandam Street to Hillside Avenue, Borough of Queens—Authority to Include City's Share of Cost and Expense of Proceeding for Acquiring Title in Tax Levy for 1918 (Cal. No. 3).

(On October 19, 1911 (Cal. No. 21), the Board adopted resolutions authorizing the proceedings in this matter and determining that 20 per cent. of the cost and expense be placed upon local areas of benefit, 30 per cent. upon the Borough of Queens and 50 per cent. upon the City.)

(On December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 84), a communication from the President, Borough of Queens, in this matter was presented and laid over until January 4, 1918. Communication printed in Minutes of December 28, 1917. On January 4, 1918 (Cal. No. 31), the communication was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget. On January 18, 1918 (Cal. No. 16), a report of the Comptroller, dated January 15, 1918, was presented and referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget. On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 139), the matter was laid over, pending the report of said Committee.)

The Secretary presented the following reports of the Comptroller and the Committee on Finance and Budget:

January 15, 1918.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Under date of October 19, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized a proceeding for acquiring title to the lands and premises required for the Opening and Extending of Queens Boulevard, from Vandam Street to Hillside Avenue, Borough of Queens, City of New York.

On June 26, 1914, the Board amended the proceeding so as to conform to certain map changes, and the resolution adopted by it on that date contained the following provisions with reference to the distribution of cost:

Resolved, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, That 20 per cent. of the entire cost and expense of the proceeding as authorized and amended shall be assessed upon the following area:

* * * * *

Resolved, That 30 per cent. of the entire cost and expense of the proceeding as authorized and amended shall be borne and paid by the Borough of Queens; such 30 per cent. of the cost and expense to be borne by the said Borough of Queens shall be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said Borough, becoming due and payable in the year in which such cost and expense shall have been fixed and determined, provided that such cost and expense be ascertained in time to be included with the taxes on the real property of said Borough in the same year; and if not determined in time the same shall be levied and collected with the taxes of the succeeding year;

Resolved, That the remaining 50 per cent. of such entire cost and expense of the proceeding as authorized and amended shall be borne and paid by the City of New York."

The proceeding above mentioned was fully confirmed by the Supreme Court and entered in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens November 19, 1917. The total cost was determined to be \$4,122,728.11, which, in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted June 26, 1914 was assessed as follows:

Against property benefited \$824,545.62
Against the Borough of Queens 1,236,818.43
Against The City of New York 2,061,364.06

It will be noted that the resolution above referred to provided that the Borough's share of the cost of the proceeding should be included in the tax levy, but no reference was made as to the manner in which the City's share should be provided. The awards and other expenditures which enter into the total cost are payable from the Fund for Street and Park Openings and it is necessary that the City's share of the cost be paid into that fund in cash in order that the payments of the awards may be made to the owners of the properties affected.

Section 247 of the Charter, as amended by Chapter 396 of Laws of 1917, provides that—

" * * * In case said board shall determine that the cost of such acquisition or physical improvement, or both, shall be paid in whole or in part by the city of New York, or by a borough or boroughs thereof, the said board may also, in its discretion, determine that all or any part or portion of such cost and expense, both for the acquisition of property and the cost of the physical improvement shall be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said city, or in said borough or boroughs, or both, as the case may be, becoming due and payable in the year in which the cost and expense of the improvement shall have been fixed and determined or in the next succeeding year. * * *

The report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal setting forth the cost and expense of this improvement was confirmed by the Board on September 11,

1917, and I therefore recommend that the amount due by the City to the Fund for Street and Park Openings as the City's share of the cost of the aforementioned proceedings, viz., \$2,061,364.06, be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property within the City subject to taxation for the year 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 18, 1918, the matter of meeting the cost of acquiring title to the lands and premises required for the opening and extending of Queens Boulevard from Van Dam Street to Hillside Avenue, Jamaica, was referred by your Board to its Committee on Finance and Budget. The Committee respectfully reports as follows:

On October 19, 1911, a public hearing was had by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the proposed distribution of the cost of acquiring title to Queens Boulevard between Van Dam Street and Hillside Avenue, in the Borough of Queens. A report was presented stating that "the cost of this proceeding will probably reach at least \$1,000,000." The purpose of this report was to show that the proceeding in question was within the purview of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911 (known as the Gerhart law). This act added section 247 to the Greater New York Charter. It provided that before a public improvement involving the acquisition or physical improvement of property for streets, parks, and various other public purposes, the estimated cost of which exceeded \$50,000, "shall be authorized, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may determine in what manner and in what shares and proportions the cost and expense" thereof shall be paid by The City of New York, by one or more boroughs, or by assessment upon property deemed benefited; and that in case the Board shall determine that the cost of such acquisition or improvement shall be paid in whole or in part by a borough, or boroughs, it may in its discretion determine that all or any portion of such cost shall be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said borough, or boroughs, becoming due and payable in the year in which the cost and expense of the improvement shall have been fixed and determined, or in the next succeeding year.

At the time of the passage of the Gerhart law and the authorization of the proceedings herein referred to, section 980 of the Charter provided, among other things, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment might determine in any case whether any portion of the cost and expense of such a proceeding shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, or by an entire borough or boroughs, as well as determine the area of assessment for local benefit.

At its meeting on October 19, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of section 980 of the Greater New York Charter, 50 per centum of the cost and expense of said proceeding, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17 of said Charter, as amended, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and of the awards, if any, for damages, caused by intended regulation, and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York.

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911, 30 per centum of such costs and expense shall be borne and paid by the Borough of Queens.

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911, all such costs and expense to be borne by the said Borough of Queens shall be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said borough becoming due and payable in the year in which such costs and expense shall have been fixed and determined, provided that such costs and expense be ascertained in time to be included with the taxes on the real property of said borough in the same year, and if not determined in time the same shall be levied and collected with the taxes of the succeeding year.

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of section 980 of the Greater New York Charter, 20 per centum of the cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the improvement herein authorized and included in the following area of assessment."

On June 26, 1914, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted resolutions modifying the area of assessment to conform to certain map changes theretofore approved; but such resolutions did not make any change in the distribution of the cost and expenses of the proceeding.

Briefly speaking, the proceeding in question involved the widening of Queens Boulevard from a short distance east of the Queensborough Bridge to Hillside Avenue in Jamaica, a distance of about eight miles, so that it would have a width for nearly the whole of this distance of 200 feet; and it would, therefore, constitute one of the great boulevards and roadways leading to and from Long Island over the Queensboro Bridge.

On November 19, 1917, the awards for the property acquired for this proceeding were finally confirmed. The total cost was determined to be \$4,122,728.11; so that instead of the cost reaching "at least \$1,000,000," as it was originally stated it probably would, it was more than four times this sum.

In 1912 the dual subway contracts were under consideration in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which included the extension of a line through that part of Queens boulevard to Corona. In connection with this, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in a report made to it under date of July 8, 1912, Stated:

"Queens boulevard has been laid out on the city map at a width of 200 feet, and proceedings for the acquisition of title to that part of the street not already acquired have been authorized * * *. The Board in its treatment of this street has considered it as a parkway or a part of the city's park system. The building of a three-track elevated railroad of the conventional type through the middle of this street would not only detract greatly from its appearance, but would spoil it as a pleasure drive. * * * It is possible that a treatment which would be consistent with the purposes for which the street is to be acquired and improved would involve such an additional expense that the conversion of this line into a subway instead of an elevated railroad would be justified."

The matter was thereupon taken up with the Public Service Commission, with the result that on November 19, 1912, the Commission approved of a type calling for a solid reinforced concrete structure which has since been built. This type of structure was approved on December 24, 1912, by the Art Commission. The reinforced concrete structure on Queens boulevard extends for a distance of 4,310 feet. It has cost \$262.75 per foot as against a cost of \$115.10 per foot for the ordinary elevated steel structure. This is an increase of 128 per cent. in the cost for the purpose of affording an ornamental structure on the boulevard. The expense occasioned by the concrete structure exceeds by \$636,802.50 that which would otherwise have been required.

It is to be observed that while the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was authorized to determine in what manner, and in what shares and proportions the cost and expense of the Queens boulevard proceeding should be paid by The City of New York, or the borough or local area, that it did not in fact determine "in what manner" the 50 per cent. of the cost and expense imposed upon the city at large should be paid.

By the provisions of section 174 of the Charter, all damages awarded for the acquisition of property for street, park, boulevard and like purposes, must be paid "from the said fund for street and park openings and not otherwise."

Section 173 provides that such fund for park and street openings shall consist, among other things, of "such sums as may be raised by taxation in The City of New York."

At the time of the enactment of chapter 615 of the Laws of 1916, known as the "Pay-as-you-Go" law, it was provided by section 174 of the Charter that in every case where the cost and expenses of any proceeding payable out of the fund for street and park openings are in any part to be borne and paid by The City of New York, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in its discretion might direct that the amount so to be borne and paid by The City of New York should be raised by the issue and sale of corporate stock. The "Pay-as-you-Go" act provides (with certain exceptions not here applicable), that after January 1, 1918, The City of New York shall not expend any part of the proceeds of sales of corporate stock for other than revenue-producing improvements.

By chapter 396 of the Laws of 1917, section 247 of the Charter was amended so as to provide that in case the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine that the cost of the acquisition or physical improvement shall be paid in whole or in part by The City of New York, that the Board may also in its discretion deter-

mine that all or any portion of such cost and expense shall be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said city becoming due and payable in the year in which the cost and expense of the improvement shall have been fixed and determined or in the next succeeding year.

As above pointed out, the cost and expense of this proceeding, amounting to \$4,122,728.11, was fixed and determined on the 19th day of November, 1917. No action whatever was taken by your predecessor Board prior to the expiration of their term of office, December 31, 1917. The present Board of Estimate and Apportionment is therefore confronted with the fact that the whole of this cost and expense must be levied and collected with the taxes for the year 1918; for the statute does not permit of the inclusion of the cost and expense in any other tax levy than that of the year in which it was determined (in this case 1917), "or in the next succeeding year." The discretion of the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment is therefore limited to the inclusion of this sum in the tax levy of 1918.

Your attention is further directed to the fact that while the acquisition of title for the opening of the Queens Boulevard, as extended, has thus cost \$4,122,728.11 as against the original estimate that such cost would reach \$1,000,000, and that the increased cost of the Corona Division of the subway by reason of its location along the Boulevard amounted to \$636,802.50, and while under the operation of the "Pay-as-you-Go" law the taxpayers of 1918 are required to bear the entire burden and expense of the widening proceeding, the benefits thereof will be enjoyed by posterity for generations to come. The taxpayers who now must bear the burden of this cost and acquisition obtain no present benefit whatever, for while title has been acquired for the widened Boulevard, no physical improvement can be made for years to come. As matters now stand the ownership of eight miles of clay bank along the Queens Boulevard represents all that the taxpayers have to show for this enormous expenditure. The cost of the physical improvement, that is, the cutting down of the clay banks, and the regulating, grading and paving of the Boulevard, as widened, for a distance of eight miles to make the same usable, is a matter that still rests in the future and the cost of which must greatly exceed that of the land, title to which has been thus acquired for this purpose.

The City's share of the cost and expense of the proceeding as determined by the resolutions adopted in 1911 and 1914, as aforesaid, amounts to \$2,061,364.06, and that amount must now be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property within the City subject to taxation for the year 1918.

The adoption of the annexed resolution will give effect to the recommendations of your Committee.

Department of Parks, Borough of Queens—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 4).

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 102), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 17, 1918, from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, requesting an additional appropriation of \$623.41 to provide means for meeting the contract for the construction of a concrete roadway across Jacob Riis Park, Rockaway; and the following report of the Comptroller, Chairman, Committee on Finance and Budget, recommending approval thereof by transfer of funds within appropriations:

Gentlemen—On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 102), your Board referred to this Committee a communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Queens, requesting an additional appropriation of \$623.41 to provide means for meeting the contract for construction of concrete roadway across Jacob Riis Park, Rockaway. Under date of February 1, 1918, the Commissioner advised your Committee that this additional authorization was made necessary because the actual work in certain respects exceeds the work estimated on the contract, namely, 90 linear feet of longitudinal concrete headers, resulting from a change in the intersection of the concrete road with the transverse road, necessitated from erosion by the sea; 102 cubic yards of concrete pavement, 19 cubic yards of which was due to the same cause, and 83 cubic yards of which was because the original estimate was that much too low; there were two other slight changes.

As the work has been done, and the above amount is necessary to make final payment, your Committee recommends that an appropriation of \$623.41 be made, to be obtained by transfer from Code 1395 (Highway Materials, Department of Parks, Queens), to a fund for this purpose.

The annexed resolution, if adopted, will give effect to this recommendation.

Sir—On January 30, 1918, your Committee referred to me a communication from the Department of Health, dated January 15, 1918, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to your Committee on January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 112), one item of which requests the approval of plans, specifications and estimate of cost, \$2,500, for electric lighting fixtures for the dormitory for female help at the Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island.

The cost is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled "C. D. H.—3B, Construction of Dormitory for Female Help, Riverside Hospital," for which an appropriation of \$90,000 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911. On January 6, 1918, an unencumbered balance of \$9,875.24 remained in the fund.

The plans and specifications provide for furnishing all labor and materials required for the installation of 275 lighting fixtures of various types, together with their shades and globes; also the wiring and connections necessary to place them in serviceable condition.

The Building is approximately 46 feet by 116 feet and contains a basement and five floors.

It is proposed to equip the basement with stock lamp ceiling receptacles.

The first floor contains bed rooms, matrons' room, infirmary and toilet, which will have standard type fixtures and globes suitable for the location.

The second to fourth floors inclusive contain bedrooms and bathrooms. Each room will be provided with an inexpensive brass spun crown and glass reflector.

At the main entrance of the building it is proposed to install two type "A" fixtures, which will consist of a bronze bracket fixture and a weatherproof glass globe. These are necessary to provide proper illumination at the entrance and form part of the general scheme for the lighting of the grounds. The design of the fixtures is similar to those installed on the other buildings comprising this group.

Plans, specifications and estimates of cost for the electric wiring circuits and the location of outlets for these fixtures were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 25, 1914. The outlet locations were designed for the reception of fixtures of a type suitable for this building and to give economical illumination, in accordance with modern practice.

The wiring work is now completed and in readiness for the installation of the fixtures.

The number of each type required, together with a detailed estimate of cost, follows:

Sir—On January 31, 1918, your Committee referred to me a communication from the Department of Health, dated January 15, 1918, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to your Committee on January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 112), one item of which requests the approval of plans, specifications and estimate of cost,

\$1,200, for furnishing and installing electric lighting fixtures for the Venereal Pavilion at the Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island.

The cost is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled "CDH-3E, Construction of Concrete Pavilion for Venereal Diseases, Riverside Hospital," for which an appropriation of \$5,000 was appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911. On January 6, 1918, an unencumbered balance of \$7,100.72 remained in the fund.

The plans and specifications provide for furnishing all labor and materials required for the installation of 132 lighting fixtures of various types, together with their shades, and globes, also the wiring and connections necessary to place them in serviceable condition.

This building is approximately 28 feet by 130 feet and contains a basement and two floors.

The basement is divided into a kitchen, dining room, machinery room and two unfinished wings.

The first and second floors contain wards, examination, toilet and bath rooms.

The proposed fixtures will be installed at the outlet locations, which were designed for fixtures of a type suitable for this building and to give illumination in accordance with economical and modern practice. The plans, specifications and estimates of cost for the electric wiring circuits and the location of these outlets were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 25, 1914.

At the main entrance of the building it is proposed to install two type "A" fixtures, which will consist of a bronze bracket fixture and a weather-proof glass globe. These are necessary to provide proper illumination at the entrance and form a part of the general scheme for the lighting of the grounds. The design is similar to those installed on the other buildings comprising this group.

The work of wiring the building has been completed and is in readiness for the installation of the fixtures.

The number of each type required, together with a detailed estimate of cost follows:

Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 7).

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 89), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 16, 1918, from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting an appropriation of \$6,368.88 to cover the cost of removing the Old Iron Steamboat Pier at Seaside Park, Borough of Brooklyn; the following report of the Comptroller, Chairman, Committee on Finance and Budget, recommending approval thereof by transfer of funds within appropriations; together with a communication, dated February 13, 1918, from the Commissioner requesting said transfer:

February 14, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Board on January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 89), you referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated January 16, 1918, from the Commissioner of Parks, Brooklyn, requesting an appropriation of \$6,368.88 for the purpose of removing the old Iron Steamboat Pier at Seaside Park, Coney Island. This pier was transferred back to the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks from the Department of Docks and Ferries by action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on January 31, 1918. Under date of February 8, 1918, the Commissioner of Parks reported to this Committee that in its present shattered condition this pier is utterly unfit for the uses for which it was constructed, is so badly out of repair, and has suffered such damage from the elements, that it is a menace to navigation, and cannot be repaired or placed in condition for use except at a prohibitive cost, and that it constitutes a constant source of danger to the adjacent structures, and in the summer season to the bathing public. There are also claims from adjoining property owners that the piles and other large pieces of lumber are being washed against their property with resulting damage, for which they threaten to make claim against the City. Your Committee has examined into the matter and is convinced that the pier should be removed in accordance with the recommendation of the Park Commissioner, without further delay.

On April 17, 1914, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated a corporate stock fund of \$7,000 "to provide means for the removal of the piles and foundations of the Old Iron Pier, and for the removal of other piers and jetties from the beach fronting Seaside Park at Coney Island under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks"; this being the exact sum for which the request had been made by the then Commissioner of Parks of Brooklyn. The whole of this appropriation was expended or encumbered, however, except \$1,881.12, in the removal of the other structures, leaving the Old Iron Pier untouched.

The Park Commissioner reports that there remains an unencumbered balance of the previous authorization of \$1,881.12, which agrees with the unencumbered balance of this authorization on the books of the Department of Finance, to which it is proposed to add the \$6,368.88 now applied for, making a total of \$8,250 available for this purpose, which is now estimated to be required by the Park Commissioner.

It is to be observed that originally the cost of removing these structures, as authorized by the previous administration, was to be met by the issue of 50-year corporate stock. The "Pay-as-You-Go" act was well designed to preclude such authorizations after January 1, 1918.

Your Committee therefore recommends that an appropriation of \$6,368.88 be made for the purpose, to be obtained by transfer from Code 1318, Contract or Open Order Service, Department of Parks, Brooklyn, to a fund for this purpose; in which latter recommendation the Commissioner of Parks has already concurred.

The annexed resolution, if adopted, will give effect to this recommendation.

Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn—Appropriation for Restoring Pavement on Eastern Parkway (Cal. No. 8).

(On February 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 61), this matter was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 22, 1918, from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting an appropriation of \$91,548 to restore the permanent pavement on the main roadway of Eastern Parkway over the Rapid Transit Subway; and the following report of the Comptroller, Chairman, Committee on Finance and Budget, recommending denial thereof:

February 14, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 61), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication dated January 22, 1918, from the Commissioner of Parks, Brooklyn, requesting an appropriation of \$91,548 to provide for the cost of laying a permanent pavement on the main roadway of Eastern Parkway, over Section No. 3, Route No. 12, of the Eastern Parkway Rapid Transit Subway. This is the section between New York and Buffalo avenues, and the subway construction work is being done under a contract by Rodgers & Hagerty, Inc. The contract provides for the restoration of the pavement upon the completion of the work. The suggestion of the Park Commissioner was that it would be in the interest of economy for the City to lay a permanent pavement at the present time rather than to have restoration made of the gravel pavement in existence at the time the subway construction was undertaken; and that an arrangement be made with the subway contractor by which it should make an allowance to the City of \$28,302 for work that it is required to do under its contract, so that the City could have the benefit of this allowance in laying a permanent pavement with a 6-inch Portland cement concrete foundation and a 2-inch bituminous wearing surface. At its meeting on February 4, 1918, your Committee determined to request the Park Commissioner to advise your Committee whether the appropriation asked for was for the purpose of having the work done by contract, or by the force and equipment of the Park Department, and for other particulars deemed essential.

On February 7, 1918, the Commissioner advised your Committee that if the appropriation were authorized the work would be performed under contract as the Park Department had no facilities for doing it; and that if not granted, the contractor would restore on the main highway the temporary gravel pavement and the Belgian block pavement which were removed for the purposes of subway construction; and the Commissioner further advised that the moneys could not be made available from any appropriation of the Park Department, or from the repaying fund for the Borough of Brooklyn. The Commissioner also appeared personally with one of his engineers before your Committee and made an oral explanation of the matter. It developed that there are several feet between the roof of the subway and the surface of the parkway which must be filled in and which is subject to settlement from time to time; and the question arose as to what the effect of such settlement would be upon the permanent pavement. Thereupon your Committee requested Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of this Board, to express himself upon this aspect of the subject, which he did as follows:

"I should confidently expect that pavement to settle for three or four years over the backfill construction; to lay a new pavement, a modern pavement, would entail a good deal of risk from weakness and necessarily a great amount of waste; the contractor had better restore the condition of the pavement that was there before, and has been on the Parkway since it was built, a generation ago, and let that pavement do the work it is capable of until the continuity of the Parkway from the Plaza to the upper end is complete, and after allowing for proper settlement."

In the light of the views expressed by Mr. Lewis, your Committee recommends that the request of the Commissioner of Parks be denied.

The annexed resolution, if adopted, will give effect to this recommendation.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 70), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication from the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, dated January 22, 1918, requesting the approval of specifications and form of contract for cartage of coal and ashes from the municipal ferry boats and terminals in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and Richmond.

At its meeting on February 4, 1918, the Committee referred this matter to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for investigation and report.

At the meeting of the Committee on February 11, 1918, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn reported:

"I looked the matter over and found that nearly \$300,000 worth of property, which the City purchased for the purpose of improving the entrance to the 39th Street Ferry, had been filled in to about three feet above the grade with ashes taken from the ferryboat; it extends from the ferry entrance up to 2d avenue, a stretch of approximately 600 to 700 feet long and about 150 feet wide. There is no place immediately adjacent to the ferry vacant upon which these ashes can be dumped. From what I can learn these ashes are worth about 40 cents a load, which is hardly enough to pay for carting them. Incidentally, there will be a request, or there is now a request, for about \$600,000 to improve the entrance to the 39th street ferry."

Your Committee, therefore, recommends the approval of the form of contract and specifications as requested.

The annexed resolution, if adopted, will give effect thereto.

A detailed examination of the various accounts affected has been made. This examination disclosed several additional outstanding liabilities for which funds must be provided.

Following is a statement showing the character of the charges and the amounts of the deficits for which provision is necessary:

Code No. 3494, Supplies, \$16.30, for the payment of office supplies.

Code No. 3497, Communication, \$274.75, to supplement a balance of \$14.03 for the payment of telephone bills amounting to \$288.78 for the months of November and December. This deficit was caused by the use of 6,339 local calls in excess of the amount allowed by the contract for the year and by toll charges in December of \$9.63.

It should be noted that these telephone charges cover the County Clerk's office and the private wires of the five County Judges in addition to the Naturalization Bureau and the County Court service.

The balances in the accounts from which the transfers are requested are sufficient to permit of the transfers except that in Account 3496, Transportation, only the sum of \$76.94 is available for transfer, as there is an outstanding bill for \$5.20 against this account.

As the amount requested for transfer is not sufficient to meet the deficits in the accounts referred to, it will be necessary to provide the balance of \$22.18 by transfer from the Kings County Fund for Salary and Wage Accruals.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—By resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 23, 1884, and approved by the Mayor June 24, 1884, permission was given to Thomas E. Crimmins to install a six-inch pipe under and along East 51st Street, in the Borough of Manhattan, from the East River to the premises on the southeasterly corner of Fourth Avenue and 51st Street, the pipe to be used for the purpose of obtaining salt water. The property in question was occupied by the F. & M. Schaefer Brewing Company's plant, and the salt water was to be used for condensing purposes.

Under date of October 2, 1917, the F. & M. Schaefer Brewing Company requested the revocation of the consent in order that the assessment placed upon the pipe by the Department of Taxes and Assessments might be cancelled, and at the meeting of the Board held October 26, 1917, the petition was referred to the Bureau of Franchises for investigation and report. Examination disclosed that the brewery was discontinued and the property sold in July, 1915, to St. Bartholomew's Protestant Episcopal Church, and the church has been erected upon the property.

The consent granted by the Board of Aldermen, as above recited, was in the form used at that period, and required no payment to the City for the privilege and no security deposit or bond for the ultimate removal of the structure. In view of such fact, a communication was addressed to the attorneys for the brewing company, requesting that the mouth of the pipe where it enters the premises be broken up and sealed, so as to render it impossible of future use, and a communication was addressed to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, advising of the petition, in order that said department might require any necessary work of removing the river end of the pipe or restoring the bulkhead. Under date of October 27, 1917, the Dock Department informed me the river end of the pipe had been removed and there was no further work necessary to be done. In a communication dated February 16, 1918, the brewing Company has advised that the pipe was sealed up. As the church has been erected upon the said premises, it can in no way be made use of in the future.

In view of the facts, as hereinabove recited, I can see no good reason why the consent should not be revoked, and a resolution to that effect is herewith submitted for adoption. Respectfully, JOHN A. McCOLLUM, Acting Chief of Bureau.

Sir—Under date of January 30, 1918, the Merchants Refrigerating Company submits to the Board its annual report and financial statement for the year ending December 31, 1917, as required by section 2, Eighteenth, of its franchise contract of October 2, 1910, as amended. This report was presented to the Board at its meeting of February 8, 1918, and referred to this Bureau.

The Company reports that its authorized capital stock is \$4,000,000, of which \$3,680,000 is paid in. Its funded debt is \$3,037,000, as compared with \$1,037,000 at the end of 1916. The Company's floating debt has also increased from \$38,000 at the end of 1916, to \$176,000 at the end of 1917. The total amount of funded and floating debt, therefore, is \$3,213,000, upon the former of which an average rate of interest of 6 per cent. is paid. During 1917 the Company paid quarterly dividends of 1 1/4 per cent. on its \$2,000,000 preferred stock. The Company still maintains three plants—at Reade, North Moore and Staple Streets—as stated in last year's report. The capacity of the plants has not been increased during the year. The amount of refrigeration produced during the year was 5,131,661 cubic feet, an increase over last year's output of about 100,000 cubic feet. Of the amount produced, 1,437,520 cubic feet was used for the refrigerating boxes of the 150 outside consumers supplied by the Company, the balance being used in the Company's own warehouses, of which it maintains thirteen. The total expenses of operation amounted to \$255,541—a considerable increase over the 1916.

The Finance Department informs the Bureau that the Company has made the following payments for the year ending December 31, 1917:

The Company reports capital stock of \$100,000, all of which is paid in. Its funded debt has been reduced from \$48,000, as reported for 1916, to \$45,000. Its floating debt is about the same. The average rate of interest paid on funded debt is 6 per cent. Semi-annual dividends of 2 per cent. each were paid on the outstanding capital stock during 1917. The Company's plant has not been increased during the year. The total quantity of refrigeration produced during the year was 850,000 cubic feet, and the average price received was 143.5c per cubic foot. Of the total quantity purchased, 140,000 feet was furnished to the Company's outside consumers, numbering thirty. The remainder was used in the Company's own warehouses, of which it has several. The total expenses of operation during the year were \$129,715.

From information received from the Finance Department, it appears that the Company has paid, for the year ending December 31, 1917, the following sums:

No additional conduits have been constructed during the year. Sir—By contract dated August 12, 1915, the Marconi Telegraph Cable Company, Inc., was authorized to construct, maintain and operate electrical conductors in the streets of the City for the purpose of connecting its various telegraph offices with each other and with certain wireless stations.

Section 2, Sixteenth, of the contract provides for the filing by the Company, not later than February 1 of each year, of a report for the year ending December 31 next preceding, containing certain detailed information. Pursuant to such provision, the Company, under date of January 9, 1918, transmitted a report for the year ended December 31, 1917. Such report was presented to the Board at its meeting of January 18, 1918, and referred to this Bureau.

An examination of the information contained in the report reveals the following:

The amount of stock issued and paid in is \$7,500, the same as for the previous year. The Company is still without funded or floating debts. No dividends were paid during the year. A majority of the stock is held by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America. The Company owns no real estate and has two offices in the Borough of Manhattan located, respectively, at 42 Broad Street and 233 Broadway. In the letter transmitting the report, the Company states that it has no wires in use. The total receipts of the Company were \$32,249.71, or \$13,064.02 less than for the previous year. The proportion of the above receipts retained by the Company as compensation for its services was \$3,238.98, or \$4,271.83 less than in 1916. The

total expense for operation, including salaries, amounted to \$13,013.50, or \$4,570.85 less than during the previous year.

The Company states in its report that its contract with the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America is identical with the one filed with the Board, which was reviewed in a report of this Bureau presented to the Board at its meeting of March 24, 1916.

Under the contract, the Company is required to pay as annual compensation to the City \$100 per mile for each metallic circuit used or operated within the City, with a minimum of \$1,000, such payment to be made to the Comptroller on or before February 1. I am advised by the Department of Finance that although the Company has been billed for the 1917 payment, it has not yet been made.

As the Company has complied with the provisions of its contract regarding the filing of an annual report, it is recommended that the papers in the matter be filed.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Request for Transfer of Laboratory Apparatus and Materials (Cal. No. 34).

(On February 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 31), this matter was referred to the Secretary of the Board for report.)

Dear Sir—There has been referred to me a communication directed to you by the Assistant Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by Mr. C. E. A. Winslow, Chairman of the New York State Commission on Ventilation, requesting that certain pieces of apparatus and materials loaned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the above Commission be transferred to the Department of Hygiene of the College of the City of New York, where they are now stored, and in reply I beg to state as follows:

I have gone carefully over the list of apparatus submitted, had one of the chemists examine them and have come to the conclusion that this request should be denied. The apparatus in question should remain the property of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for use by this laboratory, which has been carrying on work of an

exactly similar nature in sanitary investigations and in the investigation of public nuisances.

A list of this apparatus is herewith given, and it is requested that they be turned over to this laboratory at the earliest possible date.

In the care of Dr. Storey in the Gymnasium Building of the College of The City of New York: 9 thermometers, engraved scale 20-120 degrees F.; 13 glass adapters, 7½ by 2 by ¾ inches; 6 glass adapters, 4 by 1 by ½ inches; 12 glass adapters, 4 by ½ by ½ inches; 1 graduated 1 c.c. pipette, 20 No. 1 rubber stoppers, 20 No. 0 rubber stoppers, 20 feet rubber hose, ¾-inch; 3 Pettersson-Palmquist CO₂ apparatus, 1 gas meter, 1 Wallace & Tierman dust sampling machine, 10 Tycas recording thermometers, 200 charts for recording thermometers, 6 sling psychrometers, 5 pounds of mercury, ½ pound corks, 4 feet ½-inch rubber hose, 1 Underwood typewriter, 1 double suction bicycle pump.

Winslow, Chairman of the New York State Commission on Ventilation, dated January 22, 1918, for the retention of certain enumerated laboratory apparatus and material by the College of the City of New York for use by its Department of Hygiene, be and the same is hereby denied, the said apparatus and materials being required by the Central Testing Laboratory of this Board, to which the same is hereby assigned.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Coney Island Drainage Canal, Borough of Brooklyn—Acquiring Title (Cal. No. 35).

(On December 22, 1916 (Cal. No. 162), this matter was referred to the Committee on Port and Terminal Facilities and the Committee on Assessments.)

(On December 7, 1917 (Cal. No. 26), a report of the Committee on Assessments was presented and a resolution adopted discharging the Committee from further consideration of the subject. The matter was then laid over until the first meeting in January, 1918. Report of Committee printed in minutes of December 7, 1917.)

(On January 4, 1918 (Cal. No. 14), the matter was referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.)

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 86), the communication of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn referred to in the opinion from the Corporation Counsel, was presented and the matter was laid over until February 1, 1918.)

(On February 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 85), the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether in view of the order of the Court under which the Corporation Counsel was requested to continue the proceeding, the Board is in a position to ask for the suspension of the proceeding pending the enactment of the bill now before the Legislature; and also in the event of the proceeding being discontinued and the property appropriated for a Barge Canal Terminal under the legislation now pending, what action the Board should take in order to recover the amount expended by the Bureau of Street Openings in the proceeding.)

The Secretary presented a communication, dated January 21, 1918, from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting that the Corporation Counsel be directed to suspend proceedings in relation to the acquisition of title to lands required for the Coney Island Drainage Canal, in the Borough of Brooklyn, until after the adjournment of the Legislature, for the reason that if the legislative bill now introduced is enacted into law, the Coney Island Drainage Canal will become part of the State Barge Canal system; and the following opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel relative thereto:

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, February 18, 1918.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication from your Assistant Secretary, dated February 1, 1918, transmitting a copy of a communication addressed to the Secretary of the Board by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 22, 1918, asking that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment request the Corporation Counsel to suspend proceedings in relation to the acquisition of title to lands required for the Coney Island Drainage Canal, in the Borough of Brooklyn, until after the adjournment of the Legislature for the reason that if a legislative bill, introduced by Assemblyman Sutherland, is enacted into law the Coney Island Drainage Canal will become part of the State Barge Canal system.

The communication of the Assistant Secretary states that at the meeting of the Board, held on February 1, 1918, this matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether, in view of the order of the Court under which the Corporation Counsel was requested to continue the proceeding, the Board is in a position to ask for the suspension of the proceeding, pending the enactment of the bill now before the Legislature.

The order of the Supreme Court referred to in the communication of the Assistant Secretary was entered in the office of the Clerk of the County of Kings on the 7th day of July, 1916, and reads in part as follows:

"Ordered that The City of New York, acting by and through its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same hereby is ordered and directed on or before the 1st day of November, 1918, to either resume the proceeding as originally instituted and carry the same to a completion in accordance with the statutes in such cases made and provided, or

"To make some application to this Court for leave to amend this proceeding in accordance with a plan that may be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, pursuant to the statutes in such cases made and provided, or

"To apply to this Court for leave to discontinue this proceeding now in existence pursuant to the provisions of section 1000 of the Charter of the City of New York, revised as amended."

In view of the above provisions of the order I do not think it would be proper for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to request the Corporation Counsel to suspend hearings in the proceeding pending the enacting of the bill before the Legislature.

If the Board should, however, request the Corporation Counsel to apply to the Court for the modification of the above provisions of the order, I think that the Court, upon the presentation of the facts, would modify its order so as to permit the suspension of the proceeding until such time as the Legislature shall adjourn.

The communication of the Assistant Secretary also states that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 1, 1918, your Board requested advice from the Corporation Counsel as to whether "in the event of the proceeding being discontinued and the property appropriated for a barge canal terminal under the legislation now pending, what action the Board should take in order to recover the amount expended by the Bureau of Street Openings in the proceeding."

The resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 6, 1911, authorizing the above proceeding, directed that no portion of the cost and expense thereof, should be borne and paid by The City of New York but that the whole of such cost and expense incurred on account of said proceeding should be assessed upon the real property deemed to be benefited thereby, and said resolution fixed and determined upon an area of assessment which included the real property to be assessed in the proceeding.

If the Legislature should appropriate for Barge Canal Terminal purposes the real property affected by the City's proceeding prior to the time title to said real property should vest in the City, the proceeding by the City would, of course, be rendered inoperative and the City would also be prevented from reimbursing itself by an assessment in the proceeding for the cost and expense incurred on account thereof, and there would be no way in which the City could reimburse itself therefor.

In case the Legislature should appropriate said real property before the City acquired title thereto, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should avoid adopting a resolution discontinuing the City's proceeding for the reason that if the Board should adopt a resolution of discontinuance it would render the City liable to the claimants in the proceeding "for the reasonable actual cash disbursements necessarily

incurred and made in good faith * * * after the same shall have been taxed by a justice of the supreme court."

By not adopting a resolution of discontinuance liability to the claimants in the proceeding would be avoided. Respectfully yours,

Dear Sir—Referring to your letter of the 25th ult., which transmitted copy of a communication dated January 15, 1918, from the Twenty-eighth Ward Taxpayers' Protective Association, of Brooklyn, calling attention to the necessity of certain improvements in the Fire Department in that Borough, I beg to advise you that I am in favor of having a new fire alarm system replace the old, worn-out, inadequate service in Brooklyn, but I do not know where we will get the money to build it. From the data I have at hand it would cost at the very lowest estimate \$1,000,000.

Fire Department—Compensation of Moulders and Core Makers (Cal. No. 37).

Dear Sir—Request is hereby made that the supporting schedules attached to the Budget of the President of the Borough of Manhattan and of the President of the Board of Aldermen for the year 1918 be amended as follows:

Code No. 2—President, Board of Aldermen: Eliminate line for "Clerk and Messenger, \$1,800" and insert line, "Unassigned Balance, \$20."

Code No. 350—President, Borough of Manhattan: Insert a new line of "Messenger (per annum), \$1,780."

Transfer the sum of \$1,483.33 from Code No. 2, President, Board of Aldermen, to Code No. 350, President, Borough of Manhattan.

The foregoing modification is desired in order to effect the transfer of John J. Traynor from the exempt position of Clerk and Messenger at \$1,800 per annum in the office of the President of the Board of Aldermen to the position of Messenger at \$1,780 per annum in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan. The exempt position in the office of the President of the Board of Aldermen is to be abolished.

Prior to his appointment in his present position, Mr. Traynor was employed as Messenger in the Borough President's office and is now eligible for retransfer.

Action necessary to establish a grade for Messenger in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan was taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held February 8th, and the matter is now pending in the Board of Aldermen.

It is desired that the modification be made effective as of March 1, 1918. The amount of the transfer of \$1,483.33 is the amount required to pay Mr. Traynor's salary in the new position from March 1st until the end of the year. On Changes in the City Map.

Borough of Manhattan.

Riverside Drive and the Adjoining Service Street, Between West 162d Street and a Point About 77 Feet Southerly Therefrom; and Territory Bounded by West 158th Street, Riverside Drive, West 165th Street and Broadway, Borough of Manhattan—Changing Lines (Cal. No. 79).

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted October 23, 1917, by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, initiating proceedings for this improvement and the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 17350. February 16th, 1917.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, adopted on October 23rd, 1917, recommending a modification in the City Plan by changing the lines of Riverside Drive from West 161st Street to West 162nd Street, and by adjusting the block dimensions within the territory bounded by West 158th Street, Riverside Drive, West 165th Street and Broadway.

From information presented with this resolution it appears that a large apartment house which has been erected at the southeasterly corner of West 162nd Street and the Service Street adjoining Riverside Drive encroaches upon the lines of the Service Street a maximum of about 1 1/2 inches. In order to perfect the title of the owner of this building it is proposed to exclude the area encroached upon from the street and as shown upon the plan now presented.

In order that the width of the Service Street may be retained at 40 feet and that of Riverside Drive at 100 feet, corresponding modifications are proposed in the position of the line separating these streets as well as in the westerly line of the Drive.

The Board is informed that upon the approval of the map the owner of the property abutting upon the portion of the Service Street to be closed will negotiate with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the reconveyance to him of the closed portion of the street.

The change proposed is of a very minor character extending from 162nd Street southwardly about 77 feet. Title to all of the land required for Riverside Drive under the plan heretofore adopted has not yet been acquired and the change now planned will involve the acquisition of an additional area of about 6 square feet.

Information is presented to show that the owners of the frontage on the Service Street between West 161st Street and West 163rd Street as well as of the major portion of the frontages on West 161st and West 162nd Streets favor the change.

On June 23rd, 1905, a map was adopted making provision for laying out east and west streets between Broadway and Riverside Drive in the section located between West 158th Street and West 165th Street, at which time it appears that an effort was made to adjust certain errors in the general plan of the territory as approved by the Commissioners of Central Park in 1868. The property subdivisions which have been made are based on the dimensions shown on the original plan with the result of bringing about inconsistencies between the dimensions which appear in deeds and those given on the map. In order to harmonize these differences the local surveyors of the district have united in the preparation of a map showing the readjustment of the block dimensions to conform with the standard used by the Commissioners of Central Park, the approval of which is requested by more than one-half of the owners of property in the territory. The attention of the Borough President has been called by this office to the fact that the dimensions shown on the plan are not based on the United States standard, and to remove this objection he has had incorporated upon the plan a note setting forth the fact that a special standard has been used and in this connection he calls attention to a similar inconsistency which generally exists throughout the Borough of Manhattan.

With the understanding that negotiations will be entered into by the owners of land abutting upon the portion of the Service Street which it is proposed to close and discontinue with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for its purchase, I would recommend that the map now presented be approved after giving the statutory hearing. Respectfully,

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on Friday, March 15, 1918, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 15th day of March, 1918.

Borough of Queens.

Middleburg Avenue, from Barnett Avenue to Woodside Avenue, Borough of Queens—Changing Lines (Cal. No. 80).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated November 30, 1917, from the Secretary, Borough of Queens, transmitting for approval map showing proposed change; and the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 17349.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of November 30th, 1917, presenting for approval a map showing a change proposed in the lines of Middleburg Avenue, from Barnett Avenue to Woodside Avenue.

As originally laid out Middleburg Avenue was designed to extend from Jackson Avenue to Woodside Avenue, with a width of 100 feet. On February 15th, 1907, a radical change was made in the street plan of this territory to permit of the development of the Sunnyside Yard, with the effect of separating Middleburg Avenue into two disconnected sections, one comprising a short length adjoining Jackson Avenue and the other a length of about 2,300 feet, the latter section being the subject of the plan now under consideration.

Barnett Avenue is designed to have a width of 60 feet north of its intersection with Middleburg Avenue and of 80 feet to the south, while Woodside Avenue is generally 60 feet wide, excepting in one short block to the north of Middleburg Avenue, where the width has been made 80 feet in order to permit of an adequate connection with Stryker Avenue, which has been given a width of 75 feet. All of the intersecting streets between Barnett Avenue and Woodside Avenue have been given a width of 60 feet, with the exception of Gosman Avenue, which is to be 80 feet wide, and Lincoln Avenue, to which a width of 50 feet has been assigned. It would, therefore, appear that there is no longer any occasion for the liberal width originally planned for this street, and the change now proposed is based on decreasing it to 75 feet.

East of Carolin Street, Middleburg Avenue is in use, and through a portion of this distance it has been roughly graded, while in other sections the use is limited to a narrow roadway. The narrowing now proposed consists of taking 25 feet from the southerly side of the street, the northerly line being apparently made to coincide with that of old Woodside Avenue, which falls within this street in the two blocks east of Dickson Street. One old building has been erected upon the abutting property and may possibly encroach upon the street.

In my judgment the change is a proper one and its approval is recommended after a public hearing. Respectfully, NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer.

On Franchises.

Rapid Transit Railway—Modification of Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line (Cal. No. 81).

The Secretary presented the following:

February 18, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District transmits herewith for your consent and approval and for the consent and approval of the Mayor as required by law a certified copy of resolutions adopted by it on February 18, 1918, determining and establishing a route and general plan of construction for a new rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Brooklyn known as the Modification of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line (Route No. 66). This route is adopted in order to permit a relocation of a part of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line which the City is under obligation to construct by the terms of the contract dated March 19, 1913, with New York Municipal Railway Corporation for additional rapid transit railroads known as Contract No. 4. The portion of said Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line to be so relocated is the portion between Bushwick Avenue and Bogart Street. This portion of said line as last determined upon, forms part of the Bushwick Station-East New York Route (Route No. 59) as adopted by the Commission on July 1, 1914, and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 30, 1914, and by the Mayor on July 30, 1914. As so determined upon, the portion of said Line leaves Bushwick Avenue near Meserole Street and thence passes under private property and the tracks of the Long Island Railroad and extends generally in a direction parallel to and south of Montrose Avenue to Bogart Street. As proposed to be relocated, the portion of said line will leave Bushwick Avenue near Johnson Avenue and extend thence to Bogart Street through private property in the blocks between Johnson Avenue and Boerum Street. It has been found in the course of preparing the detailed plans for this portion of said Line that the relocation of this portion would afford a better operating route and result in a saving in construction as well. If the proposed modification be promptly approved there will be no delay in construction. For these reasons the Commission recommends that your Honorable Board and the Mayor consent to and approve the proposed route herewith transmitted.

MATTERS LAID OVER FROM PREVIOUS MEETINGS.

Department of Street Cleaning—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds for Removal of Snow and Ice During 1917-1918 (Cal. No. 82).

(On February 1, 1918 (Cal. No. 64), and February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 114), the requests of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for this appropriation were referred to the Comptroller.)

(On February 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 11), the matter was laid over until this meeting, under Rule 19.)

The Secretary presented two communications, dated January 23 and 31, 1918, from the Acting Commissioner of Street Cleaning requesting issues of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$954,000 to provide for the removal of snow and ice during the

winter season of 1917 and 1918; and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof:

February 8, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 23, 1918, the Acting Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning requested that the Comptroller be authorized to issue special revenue bonds to an amount not to exceed four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for the removal of snow and ice during the snow season of 1917-1918. (Board of Estimate and Apportionment meeting of February 1, 1918. Cal. No. 64.)

On January 31, 1918, an additional request for five hundred and fifty-four thousand dollars (\$554,000) was made for the same purpose. (Board of Estimate and Apportionment meeting of February 8, 1918. Cal. No. 114.) Both of the above communications were referred to the Comptroller.

The request is made for the reason that there is not a sufficient balance available in the snow removal funds to pay the amounts due laborers, contractors, etc., for snow removal work.

Section 546 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 615 of the Laws of 1917, provides that

"If the necessary cost of removing snow or ice from the streets and avenues shall in any one year exceed the amount appropriated therefor, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize the Comptroller to provide for such expenditure by the issue and sale of special revenue bonds."

Your Board has lately adopted resolutions authorizing the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds on the dates and for the amounts as follows:

December 14, 1917.....	\$400,000 00
December 28, 1917.....	400,000 00
January 11, 1918.....	400,000 00

Total \$1,200,000 00

Of the amounts authorized, \$625,120.24 of special revenue bonds was issued during 1917. This amount is redeemable from the appropriation provided for such purpose in the 1918 budget. The redemption of the balance of the bonds authorized will have to be provided for in the 1919 budget.

The vouchers and open market orders registered on the ledgers in the Department of Finance for the removal of snow and ice to February 6, 1918, aggregate:

For the latter part of 1917..... \$1,044,792 68

For 1918 to February 6..... 774,277 78

Total for 1917-18..... \$1,819,070 46

The estimated cost so far chargeable to snow and ice during the winter of 1917-1918 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn to February 6, 1918, is \$2,300,000. The extremely low temperatures throughout December and January caused the snow to freeze to the pavements, and this greatly impeded its removal and added materially to the cost thereof.

The adoption of the attached resolution granting the requests is therefore recommended. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 546 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 615 of the Laws of 1917, hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding nine hundred and fifty-four thousand dollars (\$954,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue, the proceeds thereof to be used to defray the cost of emergency removal of snow and ice in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, during the snow season of 1917-1918, as certified by the Department of Street Cleaning, and audited by the Department of Finance.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Approval of Contract with the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for Necessary Material and Performance of Work to Raise the Power and Other Wires of Said Railroad Where the Same Crosses the Railroad Company's Right of Way; and Issue of Corporate Stock Therefor (Cal. No. 83).

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller recommending that the Public Service Commission be authorized to enter into a contract with the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for the supply of necessary materials and the performance of work required to raise the power wires and other wires of the railroad company in order to permit of the construction of section No. 2, Routes Nos. 19 and 22, of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad where said railroad crosses the right-of-way of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company in the Borough of The Bronx, at an estimated cost of \$6,871, provided that it be stipulated and agreed upon by and between the Commission and the Railroad Company that the latter shall abide by the decision of the Corporation Counsel in the matter and shall carry out the contract in all of its essential requirements without cost to the City should the Corporation Counsel's opinion so determine.

Pending the receipt of this opinion, the Comptroller recommends an issue of \$6,871 in corporate stock to carry out the City's obligations in the performance of the work.

The Comptroller reports that the cost of the work provided for in the proposed agreement was included in the contract for the construction of this section of the rapid transit railroad and will therefore be a charge against the remainder of the total amount authorized for the work.

The Comptroller further states that from his Engineer's report it would appear that there is some question as to whether the cost of moving and relocating these wires should not be borne by the railroad company, and it is suggested meanwhile that this question be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to where the cost properly lies.

(On January 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 74), the request of the Public Service Commission for the First District for the consent of the Board to this proposed contract and for an appropriation of \$6,871 for the purpose of providing means to meet the City's obligations thereunder was referred to the Comptroller.)

(On February 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 57), the matter was laid over until February 15, 1918, under Rule 19, and referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.)

(On February 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 70), a communication dated February 8, 1918, from the Public Service Commission for the First District, requesting that there be set aside from the unexpended balance of the appropriation for the construction of Section 2, Routes 19 and 22 of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, the sum of \$6,871 for the purpose of carrying out this agreement was presented and the matter was laid over to this meeting.)

The matter was laid over until Friday, March 1, 1918.

Department of Health; Law Department—Nuisance Due to Acid Fumes in the Upper West Side Section of the City (Cal. No. 84).

(On February 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 18), the matter was laid over until this meeting.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Counsel for the West End Association, and memorial relative thereto:

West End Association v. Barrett Manufacturing Co.

Hon. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, New York City:

Dear Sir—Enclosed herewith is a memorial addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the West End Association of the City of New York, regarding the so-called acid fumes nuisance in the west end section of this city.

We would appreciate it if you would have this communication placed on the calendar of the Board of Estimate for a hearing at its next regular meeting, to be held Friday, February 15, 1918, and an opportunity be afforded the West End Association to be heard thereon. Yours very truly,

Before the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York—In Re Acid Fumes Nuisance in the West End Section of New York City—Memorial of The West End Association to Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Memorial of the West End Association of the City of New York to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment respectfully shows as follows:

(1) That the West End Association of New York is an association incorporated under the laws of the State of New York. It is composed of residents and taxpayers residing in the West End section of said City, between Manhattan Street on the north, 59th Street on the south, Central Park West on the east, and the Hudson River on the west; that said association has a membership of 503 and was organized for the improvement of that district and the bringing together of the residents for their better acquaintance and for their social and mutual benefit; that the residents of said West End section number more than 250,000.

The West End section is purely a residential neighborhood and embraces Riverside Drive, West End Avenue, Central Park West and the adjacent streets and avenues.

(2) That certain industrial plants, located in and adjacent to the Borough of Edgewater, County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, and situated on the west bank of the Hudson River and opposite the West End section of New York City, are engaged in the manufacture of certain chemical and coal-tar products; that such plants emit and discharge so-called acid fumes and gases which are poisonous and noxious, and which blow over from such plants into said West End section of New York City as well as other portions of the City; that such practice has continued for years and is now continuing.

These fumes and gases are injurious to the health, comfort and property of the people of The City of New York, and constitute a serious continuing nuisance.

(3) That the Department of Health of The City of New York reported on or about November 20, 1917, that such fumes and gases were still continuing and were observed in the West End section of said city, "in volume sufficient to create a nuisance."

(4) That the 1917 session of the Legislature of the State of New York enacted a law, as Chapter 292 of the Laws of 1917, providing that any corporation organized under the laws of this or any other state which should so conduct its business without the state by the omission or discharge of offensive, noxious or noisome odors or fumes, so as to unreasonably endanger the health or safety in this state of any considerable number of people of this state, should be guilty of a nuisance, and further providing that the charter or certificate of authority to do business in this state held and possessed by such offending corporation may be revoked and annulled by appropriate proceedings.

Said Chapter 292, Laws of 1917, is hereby made a part hereof, as if the same were set forth at length herein.

(5) That, pursuant to said Chapter 292, the West End Association filed a petition with the State Commissioner of Health, under date of May 22, 1917, against the following corporations, with plants situated at Edgewater, New Jersey, as aforesaid: Barrett Company of West Virginia, Corn Products Company, General Chemical Company, Midland Linseed Products Company, Valvoline Oil Company, Bulls Ferry Chemical Company; that said petition alleged that the corporations above-named owned industrial plants in and about Edgewater, New Jersey, and that said plants continued to emit and discharge noxious and poisonous fumes which are carried over into the City of New York and are injurious to the health, comfort and property of the people of said City.

(6) That, pursuant to said petition of the West End Association and under authority of said Chapter 292, the State Commissioner of Health instituted a proceeding against said offending corporations, which proceeding is entitled:

The West End Association v. Barrett Company of West Virginia, et al.

That said proceeding is now pending before the State Commissioner of Health.

(7) That such acid fumes still constitute an acute and existing nuisance in the City of New York, and are a menace to the health, comfort and safety of the people of this City; that, as heretofore stated, the Department of Health of this City has found that such fumes are still existent and constitute a nuisance, even penetrating to the East Side of the Borough of Manhattan, beyond Third Avenue; that said Department stands ready and willing to assist in the suppression of such nuisance, but is of the opinion that under the existing circumstances it has power to take action to abate such nuisance.

That more than two hundred and fifty (250) citizens of The City of New York have certified to the fact that this nuisance and menace still exists. A list of the names of the people so certifying is attached hereto and made part hereof.

(8) That The City of New York, as such, is materially interested in the outcome of the aforesaid proceedings, now pending before the State Commissioner of Health, entitled:

The West End Association v. Barrett Company of West Virginia, et al.—particularly by reason of the wide-spread menace to the health, comfort and property of its citizens, not only in the West End section of said City, but in various other portions thereof; that although The City of New York has power and authority under its charter summarily to abate nuisances within its borders, said charter powers are ineffective against nuisances emanating from the State of New Jersey; that if The City of New York becomes a party to this proceeding, and takes an active part in prosecuting the same as a party complainant, together with the said West End Association, this nuisance may be abated, so that redress and permanent remedy may be obtained for the citizens of this City.

Wherefore, The West End Association, your petitioner herein, respectfully requests that The City of New York, through its proper officers, intervene in and become a party complainant in this proceeding, and take such other and further steps as in its judgment may be wise and proper in the premises.

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the City of New York intervene in the proceeding which is entitled the West End Association against Barrett Company of West Virginia, Corn Products Co., General Chemical Co. and other companies, now pending before the State Board of Health, and the Corporation Counsel and the Commissioner of Health are hereby instructed to take the necessary steps to accomplish this end, and such other proceedings as may be necessary to protect and assert the rights of the city and the citizens and their property in the premises through the city as a party to such proceeding or proceedings.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

5th Street, from Smith Street to the Bulkhead Line of Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn—Closing, Discontinuing and Changing Grade (Cal. No. 85).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated February 7, 1918, from the Corporation Counsel, advising that the Brooklyn Union Gas Company has complied with all the conditions imposed by the Board in the matter of changing the map or plan of the City of New York by changing the lines and grades of 5th street, from Smith street to the bulkhead line of Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

(On April 13, 1917 (Cal. No. 4), the Board adopted a resolution making provision for decreasing the width of 5th street from 60 feet to 55 feet in the block from Smith street to Hoyt street, and for discontinuing the street between Hoyt street and the canal. The effect of the plan will be to release to the Brooklyn Union Gas Company, the abutting owner, a strip five feet wide, located on the southerly side of the street between Smith street and a line about 233 feet easterly therefrom.)

(The Gas Company agreed, upon the approval of the map, to cede to the City a parcel having an area of 3,345 square feet, located within the street lines, and to pay the expense which has accrued in connection with a proceeding authorized in 1909 for acquiring title to the street, this amounting to \$511.72, providing that the proceeding is discontinued.)

(The Mayor was requested to withhold his independent approval until such time as the Gas Company (1) has made payment to the City of the sum of \$511.72; (2) has executed a release of all claims which might be presented by reason of the discontinuance of the opening proceeding pursuant to the provisions of section 1000 of the Charter; and (3) has presented a deed in form satisfactory to the Corporation Counsel ceding all right, title and interest which it may have in the block between Smith street and Hoyt street as now proposed.)

(On February 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 20), the matter was laid over until this meeting.)

Mayor's Committee on Taxation—Appropriation to Defray Expenses.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Transfer of Materials and Office Equipment of Former Committee on City Plan to the Chief Engineer of the Board (Cal. No. 87).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Chairman, Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements:

February 20, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—When the staff of the former Committee on City Plan was abolished by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, no action was taken as to the disposition of the records, accumulated correspondence and material in the room formerly occupied by that Committee, but it is undoubtedly supposed to be in the custody of the present Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements. The Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan has been designated as Secretary of the Committee, and the present policy of the Committee is to have such investigations as are not conducted by the Borough Presidents made by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who will also prepare the reports of the Committee on changes in the zoning plans and other matters affecting the city plan which may from time to time be referred to the Committee.

On behalf of the Committee, I would recommend that these records, materials and office equipment be placed in the custody of the Chief Engineer of the Board, in order that he may report to the Committee on City Plan and Public Improvements as to how much of the same is necessary, for the work of the Committee, and how much should be stored for possible use in the future. When the Committee has this information, it will be possible to transfer the records needed for current use to the office of the Chief Engineer, and turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the remaining furniture and office equipment for assignment to other departments which may need them. A resolution to this effect is herewith submitted. Respectfully,

Dock Department—In the Matter of the Application, on Behalf of Soldiers and Sailors, for Free Transportation Over Municipal Ferries.

The following was received from the Corporation Counsel:

New York, February 14, 1918.

The Honorable the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:
Sirs—I received a communication from the Secretary of your Board under date of January 31, 1918, which reads as follows:

"At the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held this day a communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, reading as follows:

"There are several thousand United States soldiers and sailors on Staten Island and near the terminus of the 39th Street Ferry, Brooklyn, who use the Municipal Ferry going to and from Manhattan on the business of the United States Government and also to visit their families.

"An application has been made to this department that the soldiers and sailors in the uniform of the United States be allowed free transportation over the Municipal Ferries, together with motor vehicles and equipment.

"The above is submitted for the consideration of your Commission."

"Which was referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to what power, if any, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have in the matter."

While I find no specific authority upon the point the suggested action would in effect violate the limitation contained in the organic law of the State upon the power of the City to devote its property or money to other than a technical public or City purpose, and, therefore, in spite of my personal sympathies in the matter, I am constrained to advise you that there is no authority in your Board to permit free transportation in the cases mentioned. Dock Department—Lease to the Richmond County Lunch Company of Lunch Counter Privileges at the Manhattan Terminal of the Staten Island Ferry.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, February 7, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—On April 27, 1916, the Richmond County Lunch Company was awarded, after sale at public auction, the privilege of maintaining and operating a lunch counter within the terminal building at the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, for the term of five years from May 1, 1916, at an annual rental of \$6,000.

The company has now made application for permission to extend said lunch counter ten feet towards the northerly side of the ferry house, and as I am of the opinion that the best interests of the City would be served by leasing said additional space to the company I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of the following described lease:

Lessee—The Richmond County Lunch Company, a domestic corporation having its principal office at the foot of Whitehall Street, Borough of Manhattan.

Term—Commencing from the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which this lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and co-terminous with the existing lease of the lunch counter privilege held by the Richmond County Lunch Company in the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, viz., May 1, 1921.

Description—Permit, privilege or license to maintain and operate a lunch counter within the terminal building at the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, using and occupying therefor ten feet of space on the easterly side of the terminal building, extending northerly from the northerly end of the existing lunch counter.

Rental—The rental shall be \$2,000 per annum, payable quarterly, in advance, in addition to the \$6,000 per annum paid under existing agreement.

Conditions—The lunch counter shall be erected and equipped by and at the expense of the company, the design and dimensions thereof to be first submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks, and the stand so erected, with all fixtures attached to or forming any part thereof, including sinks, piping, wiring and water or other connections, shall become the property of the City of New York at the termination of the lease.

Remaining Terms and Conditions—The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in the lease of the existing lunch counter dated August 29, 1916. Respectfully yours,

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On February 7, 1918, the Commissioner of Docks requested that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Richmond County Lunch Company of a privilege to maintain and operate a lunch counter within the terminal building at the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, using and occupying therefor the ten feet of space on the easterly side of the terminal building, extending northerly from the northerly end of the existing lunch counter.

The rental to be at the rate of \$2,000 per annum, in addition to the \$6,000 per annum paid under the existing agreement; the term to commence on the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which this lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and be co-terminous with the existing lease of the lunch counter privilege held by the Richmond County Lunch Company in the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, or May 1, 1921.

The lunch counter to be erected and equipped at the expense of the company, the design and dimensions to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks; the stand and its equipment to become the property of the City at the termination of the lease.

The lessee was awarded the privilege of operating a lunch counter about 30 feet in length on the easterly side of Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry on April 27, 1916, as the result of a sale at public auction, for a five year term expiring May 1, 1921, at an annual rental of \$6,000.

The proposed lease covers the extension of this lunch counter toward the north, increasing the lessee's present counter space by one-third.

The rate paid by the lessee for his present counter privilege is \$25 per square foot per annum, and the proposed lease carries the same rate of return to the City.

I am advised that the highest price bid for this lunch counter privilege about two years ago was a sum equivalent to slightly in excess of \$20 per square foot per annum.

I consider the offer of the Richmond County Lunch Company, for an extension of its lunch counter privilege, to be fair, and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Richmond County Lunch Company, a domestic corporation having its principal office at the foot of Whitehall Street, Borough of Manhattan, of a permit, privilege or license to maintain and operate a lunch counter within the terminal building at the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, using and occupying therefor the ten feet of space on the easterly side of the terminal building, extending northerly from the northerly end of the existing lunch counter. The lease to commence March 1, 1918, and be co-terminous with the existing lease of the lunch counter privilege held by the Richmond County Lunch Company in the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, viz., May 1, 1921; the rental shall be two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per annum, payable quarterly in advance, in addition to the six thousand dollars (\$6,000) per annum paid under existing agreement. The lunch counter shall be erected by and at the expense of the company, the design and dimensions thereof to be first submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks and the stand so erected with all fixtures attached to or forming any part thereof, including sinks, piping, wiring and water or other connections, shall become the property of The City of New York at the termination of the lease. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in the lease of the existing lunch counter dated August 29, 1916.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Dock Department—Recommendation to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment That the Comptroller Be Authorized to Issue Corporate Stock for Salaries and Wages.

The Comptroller called the attention of the Board to the fact that the report in regard to this matter had not yet been completed, but would be ready for action later in the day. He therefore suggested that when the calendar had been disposed of the Board take a recess and reconvene at 3:45 p. m. for the purpose of taking action in the matter, which was agreed to.

There is no City-owned property in the City that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is Joraelmon, Court and Fulton Streets. It is not available, as it is used as a park with Borough Hall thereon.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use that could be made available for the purpose of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rent in the vicinity, is as follows:

The rent of \$1 per sq. ft. charged the City is the same as paid by other tenants in the same building.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease, to wit:

Rooms 8, 9 and 10, with a total floor area of 1,880 sq. ft., on the second floor of the premises known as 381-387 Fulton Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Licenses, for a period of one year from February 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,880, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat, light and janitor service, the lessee agreeing that it will not alter, change or add to the electrical appliances in the premises or in said buildings, without the written consent of the lessors, and that the provision calling for the lessors to furnish heat, light and water be understood and interpreted that it shall not be liable for any temporary interruption due to necessity for repairs or other unavoidable cause, providing the lessors exercise all diligence in making such necessary repairs and in removing the cause of such interruption. Lessors, Mary Campbell, Sadie Campbell Denby, Susan Campbell Kiernan and Alice Campbell Good, 381-387 Fulton Street, Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from Mary Campbell, individually, and as attorney in fact for Mary E. Campbell, Sadie Campbell Denby, Susan Campbell Kiernan and Alice Campbell Good, of rooms 8, 9 and 10, with a total floor area of 1,880 square feet on the second floor of the premises known as Nos. 381-387 Fulton Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Licenses, for a period of one year from February 1, 1918, at an annual rental of eighteen hundred and eighty dollars (\$1,880), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat, light and janitor service; the lessee agreeing that it will not alter, change or add to the electrical appliances in the premises or in said buildings without the written consent of the lessors, and that the provision calling for the lessors to furnish heat, light and water be understood and interpreted that it shall not be liable for any temporary interruption due to necessity for repairs or other unavoidable cause, providing the lessors exercise all diligence in making such necessary repairs and in removing the cause of such interruption; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter as amended.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

First District Municipal Court—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 106-110 Court St., Brooklyn.

At meeting held February 14, 1918, the Comptroller presented a report recommending a lease of the entire second floor and five rooms on the third floor in the building Nos. 106-110 Court Street, Brooklyn, and the store floor of Nos. 104-106 Court Street, Brooklyn, together with 17/8 square feet in the basement under said store, for use of the First District Municipal Court, for a term of five years from February 15, 1918, which was laid over to this meeting.

The Comptroller in his report mentioned that the nearest property owned by the City is located at the southeast corner of Court and Joraelmon Streets, which was acquired for park purposes, and at 146-148 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, acquired for a Library.

A question was raised as to whether or not it would be for the interest of the City to put the premises at Nos. 146-148 Pierrepont Street in condition for use by the Court and the matter was referred to the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the preparation of a report showing the time required and the cost of putting the building in condition for occupancy for court purposes.

The matter of the proposed renewal of the lease was again laid over.

State Department of Excise—Rescindment of Resolution Authorizing a Lease to, of Rooms in the Hall of Records.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Accounts transmitting for the consideration of the Board certain correspondence with the Trustees of Public Buildings and the State Commissioner of Excise relative to a request of the State authorities for the cancellation of the lease of rooms in the Hall of Records for use of the Excise Department (correspondence attached to the papers).

Mr. John T. McNeill, Special Deputy Commissioner of Excise for the County of New York, representing the State Commissioner of Excise, explained to the Board the reasons why the State authorities desired the cancellation of the lease.

The Comptroller called his attention to the fact that the request was not properly before the Board in that no written application had been made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Mr. McNeill stated that the request had been made to the Commissioner of Accounts, as he made all the arrangements with the state authorities to move into the building, and that they did not know that the Sinking Fund Commission was the proper body to communicate with.

Discussion followed.

At the request of the Board Mr. McNeill agreed to prepare a written request for the cancellation of the lease addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and present it at 3:45 p. m., when the Board would reconvene. It being understood that upon receipt of said communication the request would be complied with.

(For action see minutes at end of this meeting.)

Commissioner of Accounts—Communication from, with Reference to Building Owned by the City at 49 Fulton St., Brooklyn.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Accounts dated February 9, 1918, relative to the assignment of space in the City owned building at 49 Fulton Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the Department of Street Cleaning and the Board of Elections in lieu of the leased quarters now used by them.

Which was ordered filed.

State Superintendent of Public Works—Payment to, of the Sum of \$3,641.33.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 23, 1918.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On October 24, 1917, the State Superintendent of Public Works made application to the Comptroller for payment of the State's share of the revenues derived from the use of Piers 5 and 6, East River. These piers were formerly owned by the City of New York and were conveyed to the State of New York as a site for a Barge Canal terminal, under an agreement executed on May 27, 1916, between The City of New York and the State Canal Board.

The fourth clause of the above-mentioned agreement, relative to the division of revenues to be derived from the use of the property conveyed by the City to the State, reads as follows:

"Fourth—It is hereby further understood and agreed that the respective rights of the City and State to the income to be derived from the use of the said terminal and docks to be so conveyed, namely, Piers 5 and 6, shall be as follows, viz: The State shall fix the rates to be charged for the use of said terminal and docks and the income therefrom, after the expenses and disbursements incidental to the operation and maintenance of the Barge Canal Terminal at this locality have been deducted, shall be divided and apportioned as follows:

"The State shall receive fifty per cent thereof.

"The City of New York shall receive fifty per cent thereof, which amount shall be paid to the Commissioner of Docks of the City of New York to be disposed of as provided by law."

The State Superintendent of Public Works, under an arrangement made by him with the Commissioner of Docks, continued the schedule of charges heretofore fixed in this City and he also agreed, pending the appointment of a State harbor master, that the income derived from the piers in question should be collected by a dockmaster of the Department of Docks and Ferries and that in consideration of such services, there should be deducted from the State's share of the revenues a sum sufficient to cover the State's share of this expense. In a communication from the Acting Secretary of the Dock Department, under date of January 21, 1918, it was stated that the Commissioner of Docks felt that the State's share should, for the present, be 25 per cent of the dockmaster's salary. It should be noted that the entire time of the City's dockmaster is not devoted to the operation of these piers.

The subjoined statement is a summary of the gross revenues derived from the piers in question and has been prepared from vouchers certified and transmitted to this department from time to time by the Department of Docks and Ferries:

These revenues were deposited as collected from time to time, with the Chamberlain of the City of New York to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of City Debt No. 1.

In order to make the above payment to the State for its share of these revenues, the adoption of the attached resolution is respectfully recommended.

Resolved, That a warrant payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of City Debt No. 1, be drawn in favor of the State Superintendent of Public Works for the sum of \$3,641.33, said amount representing the State's share, less portion of Dockmaster's salary, of the income derived from the use of piers 5 and 6, East River, from August 1, 1916, to December 31, 1917, such division of income being made in accordance with the terms of an agreement executed on May 27, 1916, by and between the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, acting for the City of New York and the Canal Board, acting for the State of New York.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Application of Deacon Murphy, First Lieutenant, S. C., U. S. N. A., on Behalf of Surgeon General, for Permission to Occupy Space in a City Building.

This matter was on the calendar of meeting held February 14, 1918, laid over, and the Secretary directed to request Mr. Murphy to be present at this meeting.

The Secretary reported that two communications had been addressed to Mr. Murphy requesting him to be present. Mr. Murphy not appearing the application was ordered filed.

St. Agnes Roman Catholic Church—Petition of, for the Cancellation of Certain Assessments.

This matter was on the calendar of meetings held December 27, 1917; January 17 and 31, and February 14, 1918, and laid over.

Which was again laid over.

Refund of Amount of Fine to William J. Burns.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 21, 1918.

Hon. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—In the matter of the People of the State of New York against William J. Burns, the defendant appealed to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, from a judgment of conviction of the Court of Special Sessions of the City of New York, First Division, on the 26th day of January, 1917, wherein the defendant was adjudged guilty of a violation of subdivision 3 of section 553 of the Penal Law of the State of New York, and a fine of \$100 was imposed, which was paid, and subsequently deposited with the Chamberlain of the City of New York, to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt.

The appeal was argued before the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, and the judgment of conviction reversed and the defendant discharged.

The People of the State of New York appealed to the Court of Appeals, which Court affirmed the order of the Appellate Division and on the 15th day of January, 1918, the remittitur of the Court of Appeals was filed with the Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions of the City of New York, and by an order of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 8th day of February, 1918, it was ordered, in accordance with the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, that the Comptroller of the City of New York refund to the defendant the sum of \$100.

I attach hereto a resolution for adoption to carry into effect the provisions of such order. Yours very truly,

Burns in the sum of \$100, refunding him that amount paid as a fine in the Court of Special Sessions of the City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, pursuant to an order of the Court of Special Sessions of the City of New York, First Division, held in the Borough of Manhattan, on the 8th day of February, 1918.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Refund of Amount Due on Revoked Taxicab License to Ralph Chauvin.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 21, 1918.

Hon. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Application has been made by Ralph Chauvin for amount due on taxicab license which was revoked by the Mayor on July 31, 1913.

On June 23, 1914, the Board of Aldermen passed an ordinance granting refunds to licensees whose licenses were so revoked. The ordinance took effect July 7, 1914, and the application has been approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Licenses and the amount to be refunded (\$2.53) is certified to by him.

Said amount was deposited to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1, and the refund will be made from that fund through an account known and designated on the books in this office as "Code T-47, Refunds, Licenses, Taxicabs, etc., for the amount to be refunded.

The attached resolution is necessary to replenish the said account for the amount to be refunded. Yours very truly,

Application of Matthew J. Sullivan to Rent 28 City Hall Place.

A communication was received from Matthew J. Sullivan making application to rent premises No. 28 City Hall Place, Borough of Manhattan, at a rental of \$100 a month.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Note—At this point the Board took a recess until 3:45 p. m.

At 3:45 p. m. the Board reconvened, the same members being present as at this morning's session.

State Department of Excise—Rescindment of Resolution Authorizing a Lease to, of Rooms in the Hall of Records.

The Special Deputy Commissioner of Excise presented the following communication requesting the cancellation of the lease of the rooms in the Hall of Records Building (see minutes in regard to this matter above).

State of New York, Department of Excise, Albany, New York, February 28, 1918.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Excise of the State of New York has specifically directed that the undersigned make, on his behalf, the following statement and request:

Sometime before assuming office as State Commissioner of Excise arrangements were made with the City of New York to house as many as possible of the New York Offices of State Departments having branches in New York City, in the Hall of Records Building, and a lease was entered into between the City of New

York and the Trustees of Public Buildings of the State of New York, on behalf of the New York County office of this Department.

Further, that he did not learn that this Department was to be one of these until long after the lease had been signed by the Trustees of Public Buildings of the State of New York, and upon being so informed he immediately took the matter up with the Trustees and pointed out reasons why he believed the Department of Excise should not be moved from its present location.

The following is a quotation from the letter sent by the State Commissioner of Excise to the Trustees:

"In our present location, which is practically in the center of the Borough of Manhattan, convenient to subways and other means of transportation, are also located the offices of the Excise bonding and surety companies, brewers' agents, the Liquor Dealers' Association, the Brewers' Board of Trade, a large auditing company which audits accounts of liquor dealers—in fact, the building is a clearing house for the brewing and liquor trades in general doing business with this Department.

"If this Department is removed to the proposed Hall of Records quarters it will necessitate the removal of the above mentioned parties with whom we are very closely allied. It will also be impossible for them to secure office space in the Hall of Records, as that is a public building.

"At the time of the issuing of liquor tax certificates, which occurs a few days before October 1 of each year, it is common for the Excise Department to be open far into the night for the accommodation of persons who wish to take out liquor tax certificates. Our present location is in the heart of the city, and as much of the money paid for such certificates is paid in cash it would be unwise, and perhaps unsafe, for these transactions to take place in the locality of the Hall of Records on account of the street being practically deserted after office hours in that part of the city."

Under all the circumstances the Commissioner submits that some Department or public office other than this, which would not be so much inconvenienced by a change, or the removal of which would work less inconvenience to the public generally, might be moved into the rooms originally assigned to this Department.

For the reasons above stated the State Commissioner of Excise therefore respectfully requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York to rescind the lease heretofore entered into between the Trustees of Public Buildings of the State of New York, and the City of New York, on behalf of the New York County Office of the State Department of Excise. Which resolution was unanimously adopted.


