SIR—There were 541 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 28, 1880, which is an increase of 22, as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 59 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending February 21, 1880, was 519, which is 40.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.38 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,106,795.
