

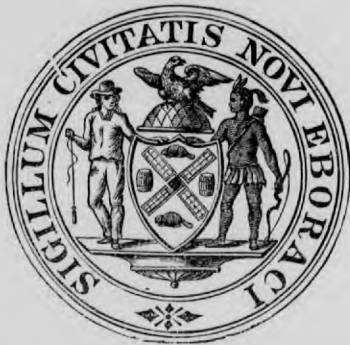

Resolved, That the application be and is hereby denied.

John Stemme appeared before the Board in respect to light and ventilation, No. 165, and asked to be relieved from the requirement that ten feet be left at the rear of the premises therein described. A survey was ordered by the Board.

The application of D. T. Atwood, for permit upon light and ventilation, Plan No. 3313, was presented and tabled for further consideration.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 9, 1885 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,235.

The number of causes of complaint returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,779.

During the past week 570 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 73 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 6 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 60 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 257 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 45 visits were made, and 37 disinfections, and 14 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 3.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,639, of which 1,110 were primary and 529 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 10,585 pounds of meat and 15,600 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 115.

The certificates of 541 births, 38 still-births, 291 marriages, and 705 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 9, 1885. This shows an increase of 2 births, 23 marriages, and 67 deaths, and a decrease of 32 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 51 births, 57 marriages, and 110 deaths, and a decrease of 17 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 5; diphtheria, 4; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 3; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 7; alcoholism, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, 23; convulsions, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; premature and preterm births, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 13; croup, 16; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 7; heart diseases, 11; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and

scrofula, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 11; apoplexy, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 19; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 12; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning, 4. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, inanition, aneurism, hydrocephalus, and tubercular meningitis, and cyanosis and atelectasis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 149 were in institutions, 388 in tenement-houses, 151 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 137 on the first, 160 on the second, 142 on the third,

69 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 705 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 95 were stated to be single, 175 married, 86 widowed, and the condition of 349 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 705; still-births, 38; bodies in transitu, 11; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 93 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 541 births, 291 marriages, 38 still-births, 705 deaths; 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 108 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 73 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 9, 1885, was 51.0 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.750, the mean humidity was 49, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,281, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.73 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 619 deaths and still-births, or 83.31 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 15; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 265; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 80; Greenwood (undenominational), 36; Lutheran (undenominational), 87; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 25; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 22; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending May 2, 1885, was 682; this is 26 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 17.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.50 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,390,837.
