

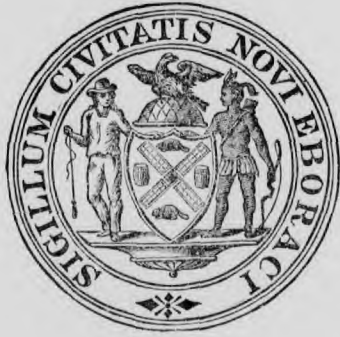

The Honorable HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, etc.:

SIR—Pursuant to the provisions of section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments submit the following as their

REPORT

of the "operations and action" of this Department for the three months ending September 30, 1890:

The assessment rolls of real estate in the several wards, and of personal estate, duly certified, were delivered to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July as required by law.

Upon the delivery of the said assessment rolls to the Board of Aldermen, the Commissioners, in compliance with section 9, chapter 269, Laws of 1880, advertised that the same would be open for inspection for the period of fifteen days in the office of the Clerk of said Board, and during such period there were served upon the Commissioners several writs of certiorari by corporations and individuals, which were transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his official action thereon.

Upon the delivery of the said assessment rolls to the Board of Aldermen, the President of said Board, by virtue of the authority vested in him by sections 831 and 832 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, made a request in writing for the computation of the tax upon the assessed valuations of real and personal property contained in such rolls, and the Commissioners, in compliance with such request, caused the computation of said tax to be performed by the clerical force of the Department and without additional expense to the City.

For such purpose the books containing the assessment rolls were received from the Board of Aldermen on the 5th day of September, and returned to said Board with the computation of the tax completed on the 30th day of September, 1890.

The amount (\$122,061,343) which has been added to the assessed valuation of the real estate in this county, as fixed by this Department, makes the total equalized value of real and personal estate in this county for the year 1890 \$1,676,794,411, which is 45.5 per centum of the total equalized value of the real and personal estate of all the counties of the State, as against 45.2 per centum for the year 1889.

The assessment of real and personal property for purposes of taxation for the year 1891, was commenced by the Deputy Tax Commissioners on the first Monday of September, in conformity with the requirements of section 814 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

On the 6th day of August the State Assessors visited this Department and were afforded facilities for informing themselves relative to the assessed value of real estate in this city.

The following is a summary of the report of the Board of Assessors, made to this Department, for the three months ending July 31, 1890:

SIR—You will please issue notices for a meeting of the Board, to be held on Wednesday next, 5th proximo, at 11 o'clock A. M., to consider and formulate a reply to the Mayor concerning the report of the Commissioners of Accounts.

A quorum not being present, no business was transacted.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 12, 1890—STATED MEETING, 11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Gallup (President), Borden, Hutchins.

Mr. E. G. Marsh, representing the Comptroller, being present, and the meeting open to the public, the President, in the presence of the representative of the Comptroller and such of the parties making proposals as were present, opened the estimate-box and publicly opened and read all the estimates or proposals which had been received in accordance with advertisements duly published in the CITY RECORD for the following works:

For furnishing materials and labor necessary to complete the ventilating work, fire service, partitions, etc., in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, E. Rutzler, \$47,686.

For the north extension of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, no bids were received.

On motion of Commissioner Borden, the proposal received for the ventilating work, etc., was rejected.

Messrs. Cyrus Clark and Kilian Van Rensselaer, representing the West End Association, requested that facilities be afforded the Grant Monument Association to proceed with their work at Riverside Park, and that measures be taken to make the railroad in Transverse Road No. 3 of immediate use.

On motion of Commissioner Borden, an application of the Executive Committee of the Grant Monument Association in relation to the commencement of work in connection with the monument, was referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

On motion, the reading of minutes of previous meetings was dispensed with.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution, urging the commencement of work on the bridge to be erected over the Harlem river at Seventh avenue. Filed.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Advising the Department in relation to the bids received on 24th of September for constructing sewers in Tinton and other avenues, etc. Filed.

2d. Advising the Department relative to the employment of A. P. Boller as Supervising Engineer, and other matters in connection with the proposed bridge over the Harlem river at Seventh avenue. Filed.

From A. P. Boller, Consulting Engineer of the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct, relating to the commencement of work on the McComb's Lane Abutment of the Viaduct, which will interfere with a portion of McComb's Dam Bridge, and suggesting that an arrangement be made with the contractor to maintain traffic on the bridge. Referred to the Engineer of Construction for a detailed report.

From the Clerk of Street Openings, advising the Department of the confirmation, by the Supreme Court, of the proceedings for the opening of the following named streets:

East One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, from Railroad avenue, East, to Third avenue, November 3, 1890.

East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, from Weeks street to Third avenue, October 18, 1890.

German place, from Westchester avenue to Brook avenue; Rac street, from St. Ann's avenue to German place and Carr street, from St. Ann's avenue to German place, November 6, 1890. Filed.

From the President of the Department of Docks, stating that directions had been given for making borings for the Seventh Avenue Bridge. Filed.

From Lieut.-Col. G. L. Gillespie, U. S. A., calling attention to the necessity for providing for a bridge to span the improved Harlem river channel at Kingsbridge road.

On motion of Commissioner Hutchins, the matter was referred to the Engineer of Construction for report.

From the Hancock Monument Committee, requesting permission to erect a statue of Major-General Hancock in the triangle at One Hundred and Twenty-third street and Avenue St. Nicholas. Filed.

From the Presidents of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the National Academy of Design and the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, reporting favorably upon the statue of Hancock proposed to be erected on the parks.

Commissioner Borden offered the following:

Resolved, That the statue of Major-General Hancock, offered to be erected on the parks, be and hereby is accepted, and that a site therefor be designated on the triangular small park at Avenue St. Nicholas and One Hundred and Twenty-third street.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

From the Pearson Monument Committee, requesting permission to erect a statue of Henry G. Pearson in the City Hall Park. Referred to the Presidents of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the National Academy of Design and the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects for examination and report.

From the Executive Committee of the Letter Carriers of New York City, requesting permission to erect a statue of S. S. Cox on the parks. Filed.

From Thomas Graham, architect, requesting that the sculptor's model of the statue of S. S. Cox, proposed to be erected on the parks, be examined as to its artistic merit. Referred to the Presidents of the National Academy of Design, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, to examine and report.

From Berg & Clark, architects, asking permission to erect a projecting window on the dwelling of William Arenfred, at the northeast corner of Second avenue and Seventeenth street. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From F. B. Jennings, asking permission to erect projections on his proposed house at the northwest corner of Park avenue and Thirty-ninth street. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From I. G. McCullagh, asking permission to erect projections on a house to be erected by him on Park avenue, north of Thirty-ninth street. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From J. C. Cady & Co., architects:

1st. Recommending the purchase of a sample iron case for the American Museum of Natural History.

On motion, an order was authorized to be issued to Paulson & Eger for a sample iron case to be constructed in accordance with the architects' specifications, for the sum of \$484, by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

2d. Recommending the purchase of a sample table case.

On motion, an order was authorized to be issued to B. & B. W. Smith for a sample table case, in accordance with the architects' specifications, for the sum of \$472.50, by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

From M. Loeb, asking permission to pass through the Central Park barefooted at all seasons of the year. Denied.

From R. M. Watson, license asking permission to erect a temporary shed in Pelham Bay Park. On motion, the matter was referred to the President, with power, by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

From A. E. Putnam and others, petitioning for certain changes in the lines of Fieldston road at Spuyten Duyvil. Referred to the Topographical Engineer for report.

From the Topographical Engineer:

1st. Reporting upon a petition to change the lines of Anthony avenue and to close a portion of Valentine avenue, and submitting a map showing the changes asked for.

On motion, said map was ordered placed on exhibition and advertised.

2d. Submitting a map showing the proposed revision of the street system in that part of the "Hunt's Point District," bounded by the Southern Boulevard, Dongan street, the Bronx river and Long Island Sound.

On motion, said map was ordered placed on exhibition and advertised.

3d. Submitting maps showing proposed change of width of Cammann street, from Fordham road to Harlem River Terrace; change of lines of Osborne place between Loring place and Burnside avenue, and proposed change of street system between Johnson avenue, the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway, Riverdale avenue and the street along the northern line of the former Wetmore estate in the Spuyten Duyvil district.

On motion, said maps were ordered placed on exhibition and advertised.

4th. Returning the map showing change of Heath avenue at Fordham Heights station of the New York and Northern Railway, with certain figures showing dimensions inserted.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, this Board does hereby alter, amend and revise the maps or plans heretofore adopted by it by authority of law, and change the location and lines and discontinue and close a portion of Heath avenue from the Fordham road to about one hundred and sixty feet north thereof, at the Fordham Heights station of the New York and Northern Railway, as shown on a map or plan entitled "Map or plan showing change of Heath avenue at Fordham Heights station of the New York and Northern Railway, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York," dated New York, September 16, 1890, and signed S. F. Chalfin, Topographical Engineer, D. P. P., and does hereby approve and adopt said map or plan, the same being deemed of the proper extent in order to show such alteration, amendment and revision; and that the President of this Board be and he is hereby designated and directed to cause three similar maps or plans to be made, to be certified to by him, and to cause the same to be filed as provided by chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

5th. Submitting a map showing Gerard street between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Bergen avenue as proposed to be laid out under chapter 495 of the Laws of 1890.

On motion, said map was ordered placed on exhibition for ten days.

6th. Submitting a map showing plan of drainage for Sewerage District No. 33 T, Twenty-fourth Ward.

Commissioner Hutchins offered the following:

Resolved, That this Board does hereby adopt the plan entitled "Plan of Drainage for Sewerage District No. 33 T, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York," dated October 31, 1890, and signed S. F. Chalfin, Topographical Engineer, D. P. P.; and that the President of the Board be and is hereby designated and directed to cause five similar plans to be prepared and filed, one copy in each of the following offices, namely, the Board of Parks, the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Health, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works of this City.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

7th. Submitting maps and catalogues showing buildings, fences, etc., to be sold at auction on the lines of several streets acquired by the city.

On motion, an auction sale of the buildings, fences, etc., was ordered by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

From the Engineer of Construction:

1st. Submitting plans and specifications for the construction of wrought and galvanized iron boiler and engine house over the centre of the draw span of the Madison Avenue Bridge over Harlem river.

Commissioner Borden offered the following:

Resolved, That the plans and specifications, this day received for an iron boiler and engine house on the Madison Avenue Bridge be and hereby are approved and the specifications ordered printed, and when printed and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation that the Secretary be directed to insert an advertisement in the CITY RECORD inviting proposals for doing the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

2d. Submitting a time statement on the contract for regulating, grading and macadamizing Morningside avenue, West, showing an excess of 146 days in the time taken for the completion of the work. Approved.

3d. Recommending that action be taken upon the application of the contractors for an extension of the time for the completion of the work of improving the Parade Ground in Van Cortlandt Park.

On motion of Commissioner Gallup the time stipulated for the completion of the contract for improving the Parade Ground, was extended sixty days, as recommended by the Engineer of Construction.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of streets and sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

1st. Submitting plans and specifications for the following named works:

Constructing sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, between Morris avenue and a point west of Courtland avenue.

Cleaning, etc., the Brook avenue outlet sewer.

Regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Webster and Third avenues.

Constructing a sewer, etc., in One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between Railroad avenue, East, and Courtland avenue.

Constructing sewer, etc., in One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, from Third to Elton avenue, and in Elton avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-seventh and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth streets.

Constructing sewer, etc., in One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Washington and Elton avenues, and in Elton avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets.

Constructing sewers, etc., in One Hundred and Seventy-third street, between the New York and Harlem Railroad and a point fifty-five feet west of Anthony avenue.

Regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Railroad avenue, East, and Morris avenue.

Commissioner Hutchins offered the following:

Resolved, That the plans and specifications this day received from the Engineer of Construction in charge of streets and sewers, be approved and the specifications ordered printed, and when printed and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation that the Secretary be directed to insert an advertisement in the CITY RECORD inviting proposals for doing the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins—3.

SIR—I have the honor to report as to the approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment asked for by the Board of Education by resolution at their meeting of the 9th inst., of the several appropriations herein named, as follows:

1st. For the purpose of paying the bill of James H. Brady for additional mason-work done at Primary School No. 43, now known as Grammar School No. 91, \$560.65.

This expenditure is made necessary by the fact that incorrect lines were given by the Surveyor first employed, and the work partially prosecuted on these lines had to be torn down and new work on the proper lines put in. The claim of the contractor on account of this error is just.

The water will be pumped from Hutchinson's river, and the company will make a contract covering all points necessary to fully carry out this offer, either containing the clauses so far as applicable embodied in the contracts with Williamsbridge, New York, and Westchester and Mount Vernon, New York, a copy of which is herewith submitted, or of any similar character that may be desired.

DEAR SIR—According to your directions, I have inspected the proposed route of a pipe-line from the Mount Vernon pumping station to Hart's Island, a distance of 7.39 miles.

A pipe of eight inches diameter should be laid from City Island to Hart's Island, and 300 feet of six-inch on the Island. To lay this line from the pump-house will cost \$81,121.98. In order to give sufficient pressure, I have calculated on using larger size pipe than eight-inch between City Island and Mount Vernon.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

DEAR SIR—In regard to proposal submitted to furnish water for Hart's Island.

It is found on visiting the Island that about twelve thousand gallons of fresh water per day, is now obtainable, which is pumped from wells, which we are informed have been in use since about 1863, and which are in danger of contamination, and constitutes the fresh-water supply of about 1,500 people, now on the Island (outside of condensation of salt water).

Salt water is pumped to wash and flush with.

The price of \$3,000 per year is figured to the lowest point, as the water will all be pumped under pressure, and is a less figure for pumping alone than, as we are informed, the City has been paying Yonkers for water furnished from the Yonkers works.

It is only about one-half the estimated cost, from any other source of supply, for the Island.

The entire improvement, including all construction and piping, and the delivery of water in the mains on the Island, will be borne by the company, any measures or guaranties necessary to assure the supply and its maintenance, that the City may require, will be accepted by the company.

The water crossing from shore to island is nearly a mile, and will evidently be an expensive work to construct and maintain, as the water is about thirty feet deep. No other water supply can be at present obtained for the Island under one-half the pressure at which the proposed supply will be delivered.

protect the interest of the City, the said contract to be submitted for the approval of this Board, and the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct be directed to confer with the Counsel to the Corporation as to the terms of the contract.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, editors, editorial writers or reporters of daily newspapers, licensed pharmacists or pharmacists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible), and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors, are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement and every case will be fully prosecuted.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
