

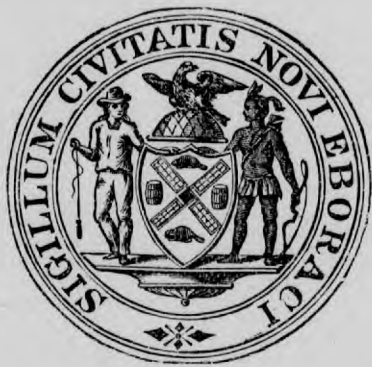

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Wednesday, March 30, 1892, at 1.20 o'clock P. M.

Present—Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; William H. Clark, Counsel to the Corporation; Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

On motion, the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings not yet approved was dispensed with.

The following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 4, 1892, were presented by the Comptroller, viz.:

1. Regulating, grading, curbing and flagging One Hundred and Forty-second street, from Boulevard to Twelfth avenue.

2. Sewer in One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Hamilton place and Amsterdam avenue, and in Amsterdam avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Fortieth and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets.

3. Sewer in Amsterdam avenue, east side, between One Hundred and Thirty-first street and a point one hundred and eighty feet north of north house-line of One Hundred and Thirty-third street.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 15, 1892, viz.:

1. Sewer in Seventy-first street, between Boulevard (Sherman Square) and summit west.

2. Sewer in Amsterdam (Tenth) avenue, east side, between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Forty-first streets, connecting with present sewer in One Hundred and Forty-first street, east of Amsterdam (Tenth) avenue.

3. Sewers in Boulevard, east side, between One Hundred and Twelfth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, and in One Hundred and Thirtieth street, between Boulevard and Amsterdam (Tenth) avenue.

4. Receiving-basins on the northwest and southwest corners of One Hundred and Tenth street and Pleasant avenue.

5. Alteration and improvement to sewer in South Fifth avenue, between Canal and Broome

streets, with overflow at junction with sewer in Broome street, and connection with existing sewer in Grand street.

6. Sewer in One Hundred and Nineteenth street, between Avenue St. Nicholas and Eighth avenue, connecting with present sewer east of Avenue St. Nicholas.

7. Sewer in First avenue, between Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 21, 1892, viz.:

1. Extension of sewer outlet in Rivington street, at East river.
2. Flagging and reflagging, curbing and recurbing south side of Rivington street, from Mangin to East street.

3. Receiving-basins on the northeast, northwest, southeast and southwest corners of Webster avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and at a point of grade depression north of Samuel street.

4. Sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Washington to Third avenue.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 24, 1892, viz.:

1. Regulating, grading and paving with gravel pavement, with Telford and macadamized foundation and trap-block gutters, the roadway of the avenue bounding the Morningside Park on the westerly side, from the northerly curb-line of One Hundred and Tenth street to the easterly curb-line of Tenth avenue, setting curb-stones, laying crosswalks, flagging the westerly sidewalk where not already done, and alteration to receiving-basins.
2. Flagging and curbing north side of Eleventh street and south side of Twelfth street, between Second and Third avenues, at the entrance to Stuyvesant alley.

3. Flagging and reflagging both sides of Madison avenue, from Seventy-first to Seventy-second street.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 28, 1892, viz.:

1. Sewer in Ninety-fifth street, between Harlem river and First avenue.
2. Flagging and reflagging and curbing both sides of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, from Lexington to Park avenue, and east side of Park avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-eighth to One Hundred and Thirtieth street.

3. Flagging and reflagging, curbing and recurbing north side of One Hundred and Third street, from Central Park, West, to Columbus avenue, and west side of Central Park, West, from One Hundred and Third to One Hundred and Fourth street.

4. Flagging and reflagging, curbing and recurbing southwest corner of Thirty-second street and Sixth avenue, extending about one hundred feet on Thirty-second street, and about thirty feet on Sixth avenue.

5. Flagging and reflagging, curbing and recurbing south side of Rivington street, from Norfolk to Suffolk street.

6. Paving One Hundred and Thirteenth street, from Madison to Fifth avenue, with granite blocks.

7. Paving One Hundred and Fifteenth street, from Eighth to Manhattan avenue, with granite blocks.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for flagging and reflagging and recurbing north side of Seventy-second street, extending one hundred feet easterly from Amsterdam avenue, and objections of John Edward Marsh and William L. Marsh, executors and trustees, filed by Henry A. Himmelmann, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 28, 1892.

No person appeared in opposition after notice.

Upon motion, the objections filed were overruled and the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for flagging and reflagging, curbing and recurbing block bounded by Seventy-fifth and Seventy-sixth streets, Columbus avenue and Central Park, West, and objections of Charles F. Tag and others, as owners, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 24, 1892.

No one appeared in opposition after notice.

On motion, the objections filed were overruled and the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for flagging east side of Amsterdam avenue, extending a distance about one hundred feet north of Seventy-second street, and objections of John Edward Marsh and William L. Marsh, as executors and trustees, filed by Henry A. Himmelmann, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 29, 1892.

No one appeared in opposition after notice.

On motion, the objections filed were overruled and the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for improving and constructing Riverside avenue, between Seventy-second and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, and objections, ordered to be referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of March 1, 1892, for further consideration, were presented by the Comptroller, the same having been returned by the said Board without alteration, under date of March 3, 1892.

T. H. Baldwin, attorney for the Orphan Asylum, Augustus Whiting, The Mutual Life Insurance Company and others, submitted for consideration an additional brief memorandum in the case.

On motion, the consideration of the said assessment was postponed until Friday, April 1, 1892, at 1 o'clock P. M.

At 1.40 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

The minutes of the meeting held the 17th instant were read and approved.

Messrs. Masterson and Neary appeared respecting the order of the 17th instant, requiring them to show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for dumping cellar dirt at foot of Eightieth street, East river.

On motion, the charge was dismissed.

A. T. Decker appeared and protested against paying the bill of June 25, 1891, for repairing the Pier foot of Jane street, North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Counsel to the Corporation to discontinue the legal proceedings instituted for the recovery of the claim.

The charge against Hydrographer George E. Rodgers, preferred
by David O'Shea, March 10, 1892.

The charge preferred by said O'Shea was that Hydrographer George E. Rodgers had intimidated him while in the performance of his duty as a Leveler.

David O'Shea having been duly sworn, testified in support of said charge.

Commissioner Post moved that the charge be dismissed for the reason that no evidence was produced by the said O'Shea corroborating his testimony, which was adopted by the affirmative votes of President Cram and Commissioners Post and Phelan.

The following communications were received, read and
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz:

From the Finance Department—Returning the proposal of Fearon & Jenks for building a new pier on the site of Pier 22, East river, and for repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat under Contract No. 413, with the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Transmitting quadruplicate copies of agreements for the purchase and acquisition of certain wharf property between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets; also between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, North river, with his approval as to form indorsed thereon. The officers of the Board authorized to execute the same in the form as approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

From John H. Cheever—Requesting permission to construct a crib-bulkhead on the easterly side of the Harlem river, extending about three hundred and forty-one feet from the northerly side

of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, north, in accordance with plans and specifications submitted. The President moved that permit be granted, but his motion was not seconded.

On motion, referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, the President voting in the negative.

There was a decrease of 9 in the deaths from measles, of from diarrhoeal diseases, of 20 from phthisis, and of 10 from croup, with an increase of 6 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 7 from cancer, and of 5 from pneumonia.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and from scarlet fever also in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

(2.) No extra compensation beyond the amount payable for each class of the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed at the price therefor, to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

The work to be done under the contract is to be commenced on or about the 2d day of May, 1892, and all the work contracted for is to be fully completed on or before the 31st day of July, 1892, and the damages to be paid by the contractor for each day that the contract may be unfulfilled after the time fixed for the fulfillment thereof has expired are, by a clause in the contract, determined, fixed and liquidated at Fifty Dollars per day.

All the old material taken from the crib-bulkhead to be removed under this contract will be relinquished to the contractor, and bidders must estimate the value of such material when considering the price for which they will do the work under the contract.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in each class, in conformity with the approved form of agreement and the specifications therein set forth, by which prices the bids will be tested. These prices are to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay from any cause in the performing of the work thereunder. The award of the contract, if awarded, will be made to the bidder who is the lowest for doing the whole of the work comprised in both classes, and whose estimate is regular in all respects.

Bidders will distinctly write out, both in words and in figures, the amount of their estimates for doing each class of the work.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect; and in case of failure or neglect so to do, he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation; and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on, until it be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them therein, and if no other person be so interested, the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also, that the estimate is made without any connection

with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. *Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed to by all the parties interested.*
