

basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 81 privies and water-closets, 28 streets, gutters, and side walks, 11 dangerous stairways, 1 piggery and 2 dangerous chimneys, 2 other nuisances, together with 93 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 458. During the past week 35 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

21 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

14 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 53 houses where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 46 houses, 46 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 36 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue by

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending December 25, 1875: Typhus fever, 1; typhoidatever, 12; scarlet fever, 39; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1; measles, 29; diphtheria, 122, and small-pox, 56.

137 cans and 12 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending December 25, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending December , 1875: Cattle, I carcass; calves (bob), 9 carcasses; sheep, 3 carcasses; and fish, 415 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 25, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 541 buria permits for city deaths, 14 for bodies in transitu, and 50 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 541 deaths, 78 marriages, 454 births, 50 still-births, 14 applications for transit permits, and 55 returns from Coroners.
