The increase in telegraph account is explained as follows: The number of connections, signal-boxes, etc., on the elevated railroad structure has been increased by reason of the extension of the alarm system during the current year, and the increase will be required to meet the expense for rentals during 1902. The new signal-boxes are necessary in the rapidly growing suburban sections of the Borough of Brooklyn, and to place additional boxes in Long Island City (Borough of Queens). The new electrical apparatus is required for new companies to be organized. The increase in the number of buildings in the suburban sections necessitates the extension of the telegraph system for which the increase for new wire is asked. The cables, terminals, etc., are necessary for the placing of the department wires under ground, where conduits are available.

The increase asked for apparatus, fuel lighting, general supplies, horses forage, shoeing.

New fire-boat.

The increase asked for apparatus, fuel, lighting, general supplies, horses, forage, shoeing, harness and hose is necessary for the proper equipment and maintenance of new companies for which appropriations for sites and buildings have been made.

An additional fire-boat is necessary for the proper protection of property along the

water-front, and this appropriation is urgently requested.

The Village of Far Rockaway was allowed \$1,500 during the year 1901 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the extension of the fire-alarm system, this being the only allowance made for this purpose under the provisions of chapter 82, Laws of 1900.

Since the enactment of chapter 82, Laws of 1900, the operation of the fire-alarm system in the volunteer firemen's territory of the Borough of Queens has been unsatisfactory and at

the volunteer firemen's territory of the Borough of Queens has been unsatisfactory and at times extremely hazardous.

Prior to the passage of that law the volunteer fire departments in said borough received for their maintenance such amounts as were authorized by the Charter of the City. This was discontinued by the Law of 1900, and in lieu thereof a specific sum has been paid annually to the treasurer of each volunteer fire company; that is to say, for an engine company, \$1,200; hook and ladder company, \$1,000; hose company, \$800. Those amounts represent an aggregate annual increase from \$21,636 to \$62,800, notwithstanding which fact many of the companies have failed or refused to detray any portion of the expense of maintaining the fire alarm telegraph, and the Paid Department is without any available funds to defray this expense, and has been compelled, so far as it could, to keep the lines in working order. This is a condition much too hazardous to be continued. Our resources are insufficient for the purpose. To remedy this condition of affairs it is proposed to establish a sub-central station in the Village of Jamaica, install telegraph systems in the villages now dependent on bell-towers only, extend and improve the present systems, and connect all with the sub-station at Jamaica, and thence by telephone to the Headquarters in Borough of Brooklyn.

The location of a sub-station as suggested, the installation of new systems and the improvement and extension of the old lines will give only needed protection. The entire plant to be under control and direction of the Fire Commissioner, as provided in section 729 of the Greater New York Charter.


