MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Thursday, October 10, 1907, at 10 a. m.

Present—President William F. Baker and Commissioner R. Ross Appleton.

The President, Mr. William F. Baker, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of exempt positions by including therein, under the heading "Department of Taxes and Assessments," the following title:

"Custodian of Records."

Lawson Purdy, Esq., President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, addressed the Commission in behalf of the amendment. There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session the minutes of the meeting held October 2 were approved.

Resolved, That the application of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, for an amendment of the classification of exempt positions in that department, by including therein the title "Custodian of Records," be and the same hereby is laid over, pending the establishment of such position by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

The report was ordered filed.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 5, calling the attention of the Commission to the result of the recent examination for Chemist. It appeared that twenty candidates took the examination, and of that number not one succeeded in reaching the eligible list; that Dr. Kene, the second Examiner of the papers, could not see his way clear to pass any of the applicants; and that, in the opinion of the Acting Chief Examiner, that was due to the fact that the advertised salary of the position was only \$1,200, which was not sufficient to attract men possessing the qualifications required by the departments employing chemists. The Acting Chief Examiner recommended that, as the same situation had presented itself several times before, the Commission make such representations to the departments as would prevent a recurrence of the matter. The report was ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with open competitive examinations for the following positions, and to advertise the same for a period of one month in order to secure a sufficient number of applicants to answer the needs of the service:

Gardener.
Structural Steel Draughtsman.
Topographical Draughtsman.

A communication was presented from the Mayor, dated October 7, requesting an amendment of the classification of exempt positions in his department by striking therefrom the following titles:

Chief Clerk and Bond and Warrant Clerk.
Executive Clerk.

The Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment, in accordance with Rule III.

The Secretary was directed to also advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the classification of non-competitive positions by adding thereto the following:

"Positions in the Municipal Civil Service Commission:
"Monitor."

A letter was presented from the Clerk to the Charter Revision Commission, dated October 5, transmitting a resolution of that Commission requesting the heads of departments to submit, in writing, their views upon the present charter, its defects and operation, and their suggestions of desirable changes. The communication was referred to the President for consideration.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Fire Department, dated October 2, stating that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 723 of the Laws of 1907, William H. Weise had been reinstated as a first grade Fireman, with salary at the rate of \$1,400 per annum, to take effect October 1, 1907, and assigned to Hook and Ladder Company 16, the time intervening between the date of his dismissal and that of his reinstatement to be applied to his time of service in the department. It appearing that chapter 723 of the Laws of 1907 required the consent of the Mayor to all such reinstatements, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Fire Commissioner and request that a copy of such consent be forwarded to the Commission to complete its records, and the matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated October 3, stating that the efficiency records of candidates for promotion to the rank of Assistant Foreman would be forwarded to the Commission at the earliest possible date. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated October 3, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, for two months from October 1, granted Mrs. Mary A. Sheehan, Attendant in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the leave of absence was required on account of illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan, dated October 3, requesting approval of the reassignment to duty of Veronica Le Bourveau, Attendant in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, and stating that her absence from July 13 was due to illness. The reassignment was approved.

A communication was presented from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Bridges, dated October 2, requesting approval of the reassignment to duty of William Maloney, Inspector of Masonry in that department. It appearing from the certificate furnished that his absence from August 3, 1907, was due to illness, the reassignment was approved.

A communication was presented from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Bridges, dated October 3, requesting that the title of H. E. Cunningham, an employee of that department be changed from Stenographer to Clerk. It appeared that in May, 1893, Mr. Cunningham was appointed to the position of Clerk in the office of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, which was then under the jurisdiction of a Board of Trustees, and that his name appeared upon the payrolls under that title from that date until January 1, 1898, when the Board of Trustees was abolished and the New York and Brooklyn Bridge came under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges; that, in the general assignment of employees of the several divisions, Mr. Cunningham's title was arbitrarily changed from Clerk to Stenographer; that his work, however, had been wholly clerical and that his title should have been clerk in order to conform to the provisions of the Civil Service Law.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the title of H. E. Cunningham, an employee of the Department of Bridges of the City of New York, be and the same hereby is changed from Stenographer to Clerk, he originally having been appointed under the latter title, and the Secretary is hereby directed to issue a certificate authorizing such change.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated October 1, requesting that Mr. J. H. Williams, Mechanical Draughtsman in the employ of that Board, be permitted to compete for promotion to Mechanical Engineer. It appearing that Mr. Williams was the only Mechanical Draughtsman in his bureau, the request was granted, and the Secretary was directed to conduct the examination in the month of November.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the appointment of George Keys, of Peekskill, N. Y., as a "Pump Runner" in the Board of Water Supply be and the same hereby is approved, pursuant to the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 7.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated October 9, replying to the letter of the Commission dated September 27, asking for a statement of the duties performed by William R. Smith of High Falls, N. Y., and Raymond Suter of Valhalla, N. Y., employed by that Board as Office Boys, and transmitting reports from the Chief Engineer of the Board of Water Supply, giving the desired information. The communications were ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated October 4, requesting that Mr. George A. White, a Clerk in that department receiving a salary of \$900 a year, be granted a non-competitive examination for promotion to the grade of Bookkeeper at a salary of \$1,200 a year. It appearing that Mr. White was the only person in the department eligible for such promotion, the request was granted, and the Secretary was directed to conduct the examination in the month of November.

A letter was presented from the Acting Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn, dated October 5, requesting that Mr. George L. O'Neill be permitted to qualify in an examination for promotion from the position of Notice Server, at a salary of \$1,050 per annum, to (new) third grade Clerk. It appearing that Mr. O'Neill was the only Notice Server in that bureau, the request was granted, and the Secretary was directed to admit him to the examination for promotion to (new) third grade Clerk, to be conducted in the month of November.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to a supplementary payroll of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for salary of Martin Kavanagh, Gardener, from September 15, 1906, to December 19, 1906, during which period he was unable to report owing to illness contracted in the performance of his duties. The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
