## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

New York, May 7, 1907.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the Corporation Counsel—

1 (72047). Transmitting eight checks aggregating \$46,978.76 in payment of a portion of the arrears of rental due the City from the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York. Receipt of checks acknowledged and Corporation Counsel notified that there is still due rental for the Roosevelt, Grand and East Twenty-third street ferries from August 1, 1905, to October 15, 1906, and for the East Forty-second street ferry, from September 1, 1905, to October 16, 1906, also that the company has not paid any rental on the ferry from Grand street, Manhattan, to Broadway, Brooklyn, since May 1, 1905; requested to collect the amounts due.

2 (72018). Suggesting that as the Department's evidence in the matter of its claim against the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company is insufficient on which to bring an action to cover the cost of repairs to the pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street, East river, damaged by the company's floats and tugs, amounting to \$318.37, the claim be canceled. Claim canceled.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1 (72383). Authorizing the reassignment of Albin Johnson, Dockbuilder. Johnson ordered reassigned as Dockbuilder.

2 (71187). Submitting list of persons eligible for promotion to seventh grade Clerk. Patrick O'Sullivan's compensation fixed at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, to commence June 1, 1907.

From the Commissioner of Public Works for the Borough of Richmond (71740)—Suggesting that when the City acquires the property in the vicinity, a pier be constructed at the foot of Jersey street, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond. Notified that no steps will be taken until necessity for the pier is shown.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity (71770)—Stating, in response to request from this Department that the hydrant on Pier (old) 56½, North river, will be removed as soon as possible, but asking that on account of such removal permit be issued for the placing of two hydrants on Pier 62, North river, or on either of the two piers south of Pier 62. Advised that it will be impossible to place hydrants on the leased piers in the Chelsea section, but that two hydrants may be located on the pier foot of Thirtieth street, North river; Department requested to remove, on the installation of hydrants on the West Thirtieth street pier, the hydrant on Pier (old) 56½ together with that on the "L" of the pier, the latter portion of the pier having been assigned to the Fire Department.

From the New York Horse Manure Transportation Company (71383)—Requesting permit or lease for the maintenance of their manure dump on the southerly half of the pier foot of West Forty-fifth street, North river. Privilege granted to use and occupy so much of the south side of the pier foot of West Forty-fifth street, North river, as is occupied by the company's dumping board, rental to be at the rate of \$4,400 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier, the privilege to commence May 1, 1907, and to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner until April 30, 1908; notified that the portion of the pier not covered by the dump will be used for public wharfage purposes.

From the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company (72004)—Disclaiming responsibility for damage to extension to Pier 21, North river, alleged to have been caused by tug "Baltimore" with float "161-N" in tow, on January 21, 1907, and declining to pay Department's claim therefor amounting to \$106. Claim sent to Corporation Counsel for collection.

From the Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company (71963)—Complaining that the curb and basins set by them at the Rector street section, North river, are out of plumb, caused by Department contractors and permittees at the locality. Filed; notified that the complaint is too trifling to warrant consideration by this Department.

From Somerville & Somerville (71908)—Requesting permission to fill in the Amstel canal on the Jamaica Bay side of Arverne, Borough of Queens, as well as property contiguous thereto. Denied.

From George M. Dickerson (71896)—Requesting berth for hay barge on either the north or south side of Pier 4, Wallabout basin, Brooklyn. Answered that request for permanent berth is denied, but that berth can be obtained from the Dockmaster, whenever one is available, at the regular rate of wharfage.

From the Consumers' Manufacturing Company (71805, 71648)—Requesting permanent berths for their lighters foot of Forty-ninth street, East river, and Thirty-ninth street, North river, for the removal of offal. Denied, notified to apply to Dockmaster for berths when required.

From the Port Chester Transportation Company (71791)—Requesting permission to occupy 125 feet of the south side, inner end of Recreation Pier (new) 30, East river, for the steamer "Glenville." Filed; notified that permanent berths on the pier are not being granted, but that the Dockmaster will provide berth at regular wharfage rates whenever available.

From George B. Loud, Chairman Memorial Committee, G. A. R. (71768)—Requesting to be informed as to the reasons why John T. Hilton, veteran, employed as Transitman in this Department, has not received an increase in compensation with others employed in the same grade. Answered that Hilton by his continuous obstructive actions shows an unfitness for promotion.

From the New York Steamboat Company (71759)—Requesting berth on the north side of Beekman street Pier (new) 18, East river, for small freight steamer, to ply between New York and points on Gravesend Bay. Advised that there is no available berth on Pier (new) 18, but that on application to the Dockmaster landings may be made at the East Third street pier at regular wharfage rates.

From the Algonquin Canoe Club (71655)—Requesting permission to change the location of its clubhouse from Two Hundred and Nineteenth street, Harlem river, to Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river. Denied.

From the Anchor Line (71650)—Making application for a lease of one of the new piers to be constructed between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-sixth streets, South Brooklyn. Notified that the matter will be taken up in the near future.

From Hermann G. Friedmann (71580)—Requesting, on behalf of the South Bronx Property Owners' Association, that the College Point Ferry Company be required to publish and post a time table, run commodious and adequate boats according to such table and keep its ferry house foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street open for the accommodation of its patrons in connection with the operation of the ferry between East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, Port Morris, and College Point, L. I. Answered that an investigation shows that the schedule maintained by the company is ample to meet all requirements.

From Al. Foster (71467) and Superintendent of Docks (71749)—Complaining of sewer underneath pier at foot of Eighteenth street, East river, and stating that same is broken and a menace to health. Answered that the sewer barrels are in good condition and that there is no menace to health.

From Rosoff Contracting Company (71381)—Making application for lease of bulkhead foot of Division avenue, Brooklyn, which was revoked on February 1, 1907, lease to go into effect as soon as the company is ready for same. Notified that the Department sees no reason to issue a permit such as is requested and that the application is therefore filed.

From the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company (71270)—Complaining of damage to its barge while lying at the outer end of pier foot of Fifty-fourth street, North river, evidently caused by submerged pile. Notified that the broken fender pile has been removed.

From the Porters of the Department (71806)—Asking that their wages be fixed at the same rate as is paid to Dock Laborers at the ferry terminals and elsewhere, viz.: 31¼ cents per hour. Denied.

From Frederick W. Collins (72002)—Requesting reinstatement as Pilot in the Department. Notified that there are no vacancies at the present time.

From Frederick L. Klee and Robert A. Winslow (72413)—Tendering their resignations from the position of Topographical Draughtsman in this Department. Resignations accepted. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to submit eligible list from which the two vacancies can be filled.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1 (72461). Submitting report of work done under his charge and supervision for quarter ending March 31, 1907. Filed.

2 (B. O. 5014). Reporting that the cost of repairing Pile Driver No. 23, where damaged by tug "Confidence" of the Southern Pacific Company, on February 16, 1907, amounted to \$17.44. Amount ordered collected from the company.

From the Secretary (72404)—Submitting form of contract for printing and binding annual report of 1906 and binding minutes of Department for year 1905, with index and annual report for the same year, and printing the index for 1905. Ordered printed as Contract No. 1076.

From John J. Herrick, Mechanical Engineer (71927)—Reporting as to the dilatory method in which Curtis-Blaisdell Company are making deliveries under Contract No. 1034 for coal. Filed.

From the Superintendent of Docks (71918)—Reporting that in December, 1906, George H. Mott hauled up on City property a house boat, in the vicinity of railroad station at Broad Channel, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, and that although notified by the Dockmaster to do so, he has failed to remove the boat, and recommending that the house boat be removed to anchorage by the force of this Department. Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove the house boat and report the cost for collection from Mott. Mott so notified.

From John J. Herrick, Mechanical Engineer (71964)—Reporting that the work of repairing municipal ferryboats under Contract No. 1049 was commenced March 20, 1907, by James Shewan & Sons. Comptroller notified.

Classes I. and II. of Contract No. 1061, for furnishing and delivering miscellaneous office supplies and stationery were awarded to Gerry & Murray, the lowest bidders, subject to the approval of the Metropolitan Surety Company, as surety, by the Comp-



troller; Class III. of the same contract was awarded to the J. W. Pratt Company, lowest bidders, subject to the approval of the Title Guaranty and Surety Company as surety by the Comptroller; bids on this contract were received and opened on May 6, 1907.

Permit was granted T. G. & W. R. Patten (72420) to repair the surface of pier foot of Bloomfield street, North river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Privilege was granted Patrick Harrington to maintain stand for the sale of newspapers at approach to Pier 10, North river (privilege heretofore held by Joseph Martin), compensation to be at the rate of \$2 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dockmaster.

Messrs. Warren & Wetmore, architects, were requested to report as to whether the front wall as proposed for the Chelsea Section Improvement, North river, can, as at present designed, be considered a permanent structure with conditions, as they exist, of a probable settlement and movement, or whether it would be proper to abandon to some extent the effect of this front in order to secure one which would allow of a deformation without so cracking the front as to make it imperative that it should be removed soon after its erection.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company (71555) having complained that Pier 3, Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, is not in a proper condition, the company was notified that if it desires to surrender the pier a request to that effect will be entertained.

John A. Bensel was appointed Commissioner of Docks of The City of New York, with compensation at the rate of \$7,500 per annum, to succeed John A. Bensel, resigned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
