MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Fischer might qualify for promotion from Typewriting Copyist and Dictaphone Operator to Stenographer and Typewriter, no adequate reason having been advanced for the holding of the examination after the regular yearly examinations for promotion in the Clerical service had been held.

Reports (2) were presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 25, recommending that an examination be ordered to qualify Frank S. Parker, a 2d grade Clerk in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, for promotion to the 3d grade, under rule 15, clause 8a, and that pending the result of such promotion examination his increase in salary to \$1,200 per annum be approved under the provisions of clauses 3 and 4 of rule 12. The recommendations were approved, and the Commission construed the open competitive examination in which the said employee qualified for appointment as equivalent to the non-competitive examination required by clause 3 of rule 12.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 31, relative to the request of Michael F. Doherty, a Process Server in the Law Department, that his name be transferred from the promotion list for Process Server, 2d grade, for the Bureau for the Collection of Personal Taxes, to that for the Tenement House Branch, for the reason that on the day succeeding the promotion examination he had been transferred to the latter bureau. The Examiner recommended that the request be denied for the reason that it was the practice of the Commission to divide promotion lists in accordance with the bureau or other subdivision in which the candidate is employed on the date of the mental examination. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 31, relative to the request of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of March 29, that the Commission approve the increase in salary from \$1,150 to \$1,350 per annum of Mr. James J. Hogan, pending the result of the examination which he took for promotion to 3d grade Stenographer and Typewriter. The Examiner recommended that the assignment of the said employee at a salary of \$1,350 pending the result of the examination be approved under clauses 3 and 4 of rule 12. The recommendation was adopted, and the Commission construed the open competitive examination in which he qualified for appointment as the equivalent of the non-competitive examination required under clause 3 of rule 12.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 31, relative to the request of George F. Browne, Engine Company 239, for a special examination for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant, on the ground that he was ordered by the Medical Officer of his department to remain in bed on February 26 and 27, 1912, the dates of the mental examination, and recommending that the request be granted for the reason that Browne's case was similar to those for whom the Commission ordered a special examination in accordance with the decision in the case of Tormey vs. Polk. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions, dated March 27, relative to the corrected transcript of record of Engineer of Steamer Louis Lange, a candidate in the examination for promotion, to the position of Lieutenant, Fire Department, held February 26, 1912, and recommending that Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, be instructed to inspect the original records of the Fire Department and submit a report of his findings to the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions. 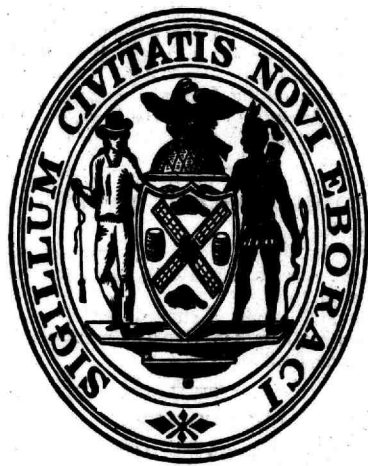

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, or purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
