Abstract of Proceedings of the Park Board for the Week Ending July 19, 1913.

Stated meeting, July 17, 3 p. m.

Present—Commissioners Stover (President), Higgins, Kennedy, Eliot.

Sealed bids were received for constructing 6-inch tile underdrains in bridge path of Ocean parkway, between Coney Island Creek and Neptune ave.

Communications were received from the Corporation Counsel and from the Standard Testing Laboratory, relative to the paving, etc., of Riverside drive, between 94th and 110th sts., Manhattan.

An injunction was served upon the Board against the award of the contract for said work.

Commissioner Stover reported that he had conferred with Mr. Gallagher and Mr. Murray, of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, in relation to titles, etc., of Playground Workers.

Time for the completion of the contract dated April 5, 1913, with William Young,

for furnishing grass sod for parks and parkways in Brooklyn, was extended forty additional working days, on account of interference with the delivery of material, caused by the dryness of the weather.

All the bids received this day for constructing tile underdrains in the bridge road of Ocean parkway, Brooklyn, were rejected.

It was ordered that following the meeting to be held August 7 next, adjournment should be taken until September 18 next unless specially convened in the case of emergency.

A communication was received from Denis R. O'Brien, requesting opportunity to be heard relative to Gardeners and Foremen of Laborers receiving a per annum rate of pay. Granted.

Section 32 of the Park Ordinances was amended by adding thereto the words "Richmond and Queens," making the section read as follows:

32. No person or persons shall throw, cast or lay, or direct, suffer or permit any servant, agent, employee or person in his or her charge to throw, cast or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, paper, dirt, filth or rubbish of any kind whatsoever in any park or parkway or on any lake, lawn, path, walk, road or drive thereof in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Richmond, Brooklyn, Queens and The Bronx, except that in the morning, before 8 o'clock, or before the first sweeping of the roadway of any parkway by the Department of Street Cleaning in those Boroughs, dust from the sidewalk may be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time.

The time for completion of a contract dated March 27, 1913, with the Standard Utility Company for additional exhibition cases and bookshelves in the Central Mu-

seum of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, was extended 18 days.

Leave of absence with pay was granted Col. Clinton H. Smith, Secretary of the Board, to September 18, 1913, on account of illness.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING JULY 26, 1913.

FOURTH INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS ON SCHOOL HYGIENE.

The Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene will be held in the United States in the City of Buffalo, August 25 to 30. The Mayor of Buffalo in August, 1910, sent a delegate to the Third International Congress on School Hygiene which, at that time, was being held in the City of Paris, inviting the Permanent International Committee having charge of these congresses to hold the next in Buffalo. Several public spirited citizens of Buffalo had personally guaranteed the expenses of this Congress. The invitation was accepted by the Permanent International Committee and the officers of the American School Hygiene Association are making every effort to support their obligations successfully.

The First Congress on School Hygiene was held in Nuremberg in 1904. It may be truthfully said that no particular field of work in the line of health improvement offers a better opportunity than the movement for the betterment of the schools of to-day.

Public Health Officers will occupy a prominent position on the program of the Congress and some fifty of these public officials will discuss various phases of the work from the viewpoint of medical, hygienic and sanitary inspection. Topics for discussion will include the organization of health departments in schools; the relationship of the school to the board of health; the equipment, training and compensation of school physicians; school nurses; school clinics; relation of health supervision in the schools to the practice of the physician, the dentist and the hospital; the relation of medical and hygienic supervision in the schools to health supervision in the home; sanitary supervision of school rooms, locker rooms, swimming pools, school books and school furniture; supervision of disease carriers; prevention of epidemics; follow-up methods and results; medical inspection and treatment.

Among the 250 contributors to the program are college presidents and professors; state, city and county commissioners of education; teachers of public schools; professors of medical colleges; state, county and city health officers; physicians in private practice; engineers, and architects. Moving pictures will be employed in many instances to illustrate the subjects under discussion, and the vexed question of sex instruction for teachers in universities, colleges and normal schools and the preparation of suitable books upon this topic for school use are scheduled for consideration.

Two thousand Boy Scouts will act as guides, interpreters and messengers, and will be of special service to the foreign visitors. As the foreign delegates step from the train at the Union Station they will be met by scout guides wearing badges which, as the case may be, will read, "I speak German," "I speak Polish," "I speak Spanish," etc.

The Department of Health of the City of New York will be represented by an exhibit on school inspection, and the following officers of its Division of Child Hygiene will attend the Congress. Dr. S. Josephine Baker, Director; Dr. John J. Cronin, Assistant Director, and Dr. Jacob Sobel, Borough Chief of Manhattan. These delegates will read papers on the various aspects of the hygiene of the school child. There is no doubt that the holding of this Congress will give a great impetus to the movement for the improvement of school hygiene throughout the country, and the importance of this subject merits consideration from all who are interested in the welfare of children. The Secretary of the Congress is Dr. Thomas A. Storey, with offices at the College of the City of New York.

DISCONTINUANCE OF REMOVAL OF BEDDING AFTER CERTAIN INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

After cases of diphtheria have been removed to the hospital during the height of the disease, or the patient has died during the same period, fumigation of the premises will be performed, but bedding will not be removed. After cases of diphtheria which terminate in recovery, fumigation will be omitted and bedding will not be removed. The woodwork of the room in which the patient has been isolated must be thoroughly scrubbed with a hot soda solution, one-half pound to three gallons, and the room thoroughly aired for at least twenty-four hours before again being occupied.

After death or recovery from scarlet fever, or after removal of the patient to the hospital, the premises will be fumigated but the removal of bedding will be discontinued.

When cases of measles have died during the height of the disease or have been removed to the hospital during that period, the premises will be fumigated but bedding will no longer be removed. When cases of measles terminate in recovery the woodwork must be scrubbed with a soda solution as above described, but bedding will not be removed.

After cases of cerebro-spinal meningitis and anterior poliomyelitis have been removed to the hospital during the height of the disease or have terminated in death during the same period, the premises will be fumigated but the removal of bedding will be discontinued. After recovery, the premises will be cleaned and scrubbed, but bedding will not be removed.

In exceptional instances, as for example, when physicians or members of the patient's family particularly request that goods shall be removed for sterilization, the Borough Chief will direct that this shall be done provided he deem it advisable.

In special cases where proper and efficient fumigation cannot be performed on account of the nature of the premises, bedding will be removed and disinfected. The bedding will also be removed as formerly after cases of smallpox, cholera, plague and yellow fever.

CEREBRO-SPINAL MENINGITIS IN NEW YORK CITY DURING 1912.

There has been but little cerebro-spinal meningitis in New York City during the past two years. During 1912, 268 cases were reported, with a case fatality of 72 per cent., and a death rate per 10,000 of 0.36. The corresponding figures for 1911 were 314 cases, case fatality 74 per cent., and death rate 0.47. Outbreaks of this disease are not very frequent, and show remarkable periodicity, occurring about once in every ten years. Thus the last four outbreaks occurred in 1872, 1881, 1893 and 1904, the death rate for those years being 8.7, 4.2, 2.7 and 5.4 per 10,000 of population respectively. All of these years were characterized by hard winters with much snow. In the year following each outbreak, the death rate was still above the average but was very low during the remaining intervening years. From 1872 until 1904, the interim death rate averaged 1.5 per 10,000 of population.

Since the introduction of lumbar puncture, bacteriological diagnosis and serum treatment, the interim average has fallen below 1. per 10,000. This fall has been due as much to the exclusion of cases due to tuberculosis and other causes, as to the improvement in the results of treatment.

These periodical outbreaks are partly due to the presence in the community of an accumulated number of susceptible individuals, just as occurs in the case of infantile paralysis.

Judging by the past, we may expect a sharp increase in the prevalence of cerebro-spinal meningitis during the next two or three years, especially if meteorological conditions favor its development.

Cases are reported to the Department of Health by telephone, postal or death certificate. Every physician or institution reporting a case is offered, free of charge, the services of the skilled physicians and bacteriologists of the Research Laboratory of the Department of Health, who diagnose and treat the case by means of lumbar puncture and the injection of the anti-meningococcus serum in the subdural space. The increased frequency of recovery since the beginning of the serum treatment has, in some sense, lowered the fatality of the disease though it still continues high owing to the delay in notification and treatment.

The most unsatisfactory feature in connection with this disease is the large number of cases reported for the first time by death certificate. Out of 105 consecutive deaths in Manhattan, 48 had not been previously reported. Confusion often arises in connection with pneumonia and its accompanying meningitis. Many deaths prove to have been due to tuberculosis meningitis. When the physician consents, the Bureau of Records of the Department of Health is requested to amend its records.

All cases of the epidemic type are quarantined for at least two weeks, this being the period during which the specific organisms are found in the nose and throat.

DEATH RATE FOR THE WEEK.

There were 1,249 deaths and a rate of 12.13 per 1,000 of the population reported during the week ending July 26, 1913, as against 1,315 deaths and a rate of 13.26 during the corresponding week of 1912, a decrease of 66 deaths and 1.13 of a point. If the increase in population be taken into consideration the decreased mortality is represented by 116 deaths. The most noteworthy increases were in the mortality from whooping cough and from broncho-pneumonia, diseases which affect early life. Decreases appear in the mortality from diarrhoeal diseases among infants and from violence.

Viewed from the standpoint of age grouping, there were 52 fewer deaths among infants under one year of age, 5 fewer deaths of children between one and five years, and 35 fewer between the ages of five and sixty-five. The only age group showing an increased mortality was that among the aged, there being 26 more deaths reported at ages over sixty-five years.

The death rate for the first thirty weeks of this year was 14.67 per 1,000 of the population as against 14.83 during the corresponding period in 1912. The continuance of a lower death rate this year is especially a matter for congratulation when it is remembered that 1912 was a low record year.

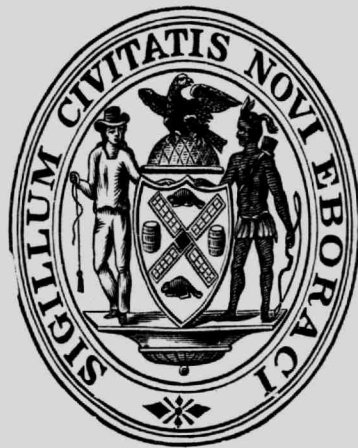

First—That the undersigned, Commissioners of Estimate, have completed their estimate of damage, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objection thereto, do file their said objections in writing, duly verified, with them at their office, in the Municipal Building, Court House square, Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, on or before the 11th day of August, 1913, and that the said Commissioners will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at their said office on the 8th day of September, 1913, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Second—That the undersigned, Commissioner

of Assessment, has completed his estimate of benefit, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objection thereto, do file their said objections in writing, duly verified, with him at his office, in the Municipal Building, Court House square, Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, on or before the 11th day of August, 1913, and that the said Commissioner will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at his said office on the 9th day of September, 1913, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Third—That the Commissioner of Assessment has assessed any or all such lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises as are within the area of assessment fixed and prescribed as the area of assessment for benefit by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 4th day of June, 1909, and that the said area of assessment includes all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate and being in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz:

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the materials of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
