AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their offices, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, November 11, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Comptroller, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, and Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Fieley, Consulting Engineer Davis and Chief Engineer Birdsall, and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works, and several citizens, amongst whom were Messrs. O. B. Potter, William H. Webb and Joseph Benedict. Vice-President Dowd presided, and opened the meeting for public hearing, pursuant to the public notice, which was read.

The maps and plans of all the dams and reservoirs prepared by the Department of Public Works, and also all those prepared by the Engineer of this Commission, were on exhibition; and the Vice-President announced that the Commissioners would hear any one who desired to be heard in relation to the said dams and reservoirs.

Mr. William H. Webb and Mr. O. B. Potter addressed the Commissioners, both asking delay, to give them an opportunity to have the plans and estimates prepared by the engineers of this Commission examined by other engineers; and asked that they be furnished copies of the engineers' estimates, now before the Commissioners; and the Secretary was directed to furnish the copies.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the Chief Engineer was directed to prepare another estimate of the proposed Sodom Dam and Reservoir I., for comparison with the former estimate made by the Department of Public Works.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Comptroller moved that the hearing be adjourned until Wednesday the 25th instant, and thereafter continued from day to day until finally concluded.

The motion was carried, and the Secretary directed to give public notice of the continuance of the hearing.

The regular order of business was then taken up, and the minutes of the stated meeting of November 4, read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1225 to 1232; and of the first sub-estimate of section A, for O'Brien & Clark, Voucher No. 1233; all of which vouchers were, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made reports, dated November 9, as follows:

1st. Recommending an appropriation of \$40, for work upon the Auxiliary Office of the Engineers at South Yonkers, for the protection of fuel stored there, and for storm-door.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer this recommendation was approved, and the appropriation made by the Commissioners.

2d. Reporting that recent surveys of the lands and levels at Shaft Site 21, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, showed that no culvert was required for drainage at that place.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer the report was ordered placed on file.

The Secretary read a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated 10th instant, in relation to the Engineers of this Commission attending as witnesses before the Commissioners of Appraisal, whereupon Commissioner Spencer offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby authorized and directed to issue an order directing the Engineers in the employ of this Commission to appear, without subpoena, and testify before the Commissioners of Appraisal upon any reasonable request of the Counsel representing the City, before said Commissioners, and to give to the said Counsel all information and assistance in their power, in properly representing the interest of the City, before the said Commissioners.

The resolution was adopted, and the Secretary directed to notify the Counsel to the Corporation of this action of the Commissioners.

The Secretary called attention to the limit of time within which the culvert and drain at the dumping-ground of Shaft 23 was to have been completed by the contractors, and explained why an extension of time for such completion was necessary; whereupon Commissioner Spencer offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work to be done under the agreement between the Aqueduct Commissioners and O'Brien & Clark, dated September 17, 1885, for the construction of a culvert and drain upon the dumping-grounds of Shaft No. 23, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, be and the same is hereby extended to the 1st day of January, 1886.

This resolution was adopted, and the Secretary directed to notify the contractors of this extension.

A letter was received from M. H. Meyer, asking for an adjustment with him by agreement, for the lands taken from him for dumping-grounds at Shaft No. 14, near Ardsley, in Westchester County.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin the matter was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for investigation.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Section 206. That no privy-vault, or cesspool, shall be
allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging-
house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of
a greater depth than three feet; nor unless it be con-
nected at the upper end with the Croton water and at
the lower end with the street sewer, and provided
with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom,
so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents
whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is
flushed with water. The outlet shall be kept closed,
except during the process of flushing, with a tight-fitting
plug, so as to effectually prevent the escape of gases and
offensive odors; and sufficient water shall at all times be
kept in the vaults or sink to prevent solid matter adhering
to the bottom. The sides and bottom of every privy-
vault, cesspool, or school-sink in the City of New York
must be impermeable and secured against any saturation
of the walls or the ground about the same.

The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
