The man object of the use of water-closels, sinks, etc., with, the man object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warentable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing ayment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-oponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Water is therefore - one to all householders that, in all urther applications for reduction of water events, no allowance will be made on account of water of water or plumbing, or wasteful use of water ly tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leads go or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the oners of the buildings.
