## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, April 13, 1895.

In accordance with the provisions of section 51, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending April 6, 1895:

**Public Moneys Received during the Week.**—For Croton water rents, \$39,974.80; for penalties, water rents, \$153.45; for tapping Croton pipes, \$460.50; for sewer permits, \$793.56; for restoring and repaving—Special Fund, \$1,912.50; for vault permits, \$4,932.56; total, \$48,227.37.

**Public Lamps.**—3 new lamps lighted, 11 old lamps relighted, 37 lamps discontinued, 3 lamp-posts removed, 9 lamp-posts reset, 20 lamp-posts straightened, 19 columns relaid, 2 service pipes refitted.

**Permits Issued.**—104 permits to tap Croton pipes, 58 permits to open streets, 28 permits to make sewer connections, 24 permits to repair sewer connections, 180 permits to place building material on streets, 39 permits, special, 5 permits to construct street vaults.

**Repairing and Cleaning Sewers.**—61 receiving-basins relieved, 108 receiving-basins and culverts cleaned, 2,205 lineal feet of sewer cleaned, 1,100 lineal feet of sewer relieved, 17,200 lineal feet of sewer examined, 3 lineal feet spur pipe laid, 25 lineal feet sewer bottom concreted, 5 basin heads repaired, 3 new manhole heads and covers put on, 2 new basin covers put on, 3 new basin grates put in, 1 new basin bend put in, 4 new manhole covers put on, 38 cubic feet of brickwork built, 28 square yards of pavement relaid, 14 cubic feet of earth excavated and refilled, 3 cart-loads of earth filling, 268 cart-loads of dirt removed, 68 square feet of flagging laid.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).
