## BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 346 Broadway, on Wednesday, January 25, 1899, at two o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice. The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers (Deputy Commissioner Donohue), the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The following resolution, presented by the Secretary, was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the minutes of December 5, 1898 (page 1157), be changed, so that the resolution for laying water-mains in the Borough of Brooklyn shall read "Fortieth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues," instead of "Fiftieth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues," the error being a typographical one.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, inclosing a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to Montgomery street, between the east line of Franklin avenue and the west line of East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, I have to report as follows:

Montgomery street, between the above-mentioned limits, intersects the former division line between the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Flatbush at several places; and the northern portion of the area occupied by Montgomery street is shown on the map of Brooklyn which was prepared by the Commissioners appointed under an act passed April 23, 1835, and the southern portion of the area occupied by Montgomery street is shown on the map of the Town of Flatbush which was filed in the office of the Clerk of Flatbush, November 18, 1874.

There is a record in the office of the Deputy Commissioner of Highways of the Borough of Brooklyn that Montgomery street, from Franklin avenue to the city line, which is the line of Flatbush, was declared legally opened by resolution of the Common Council of the former City of Brooklyn, on March 20, 1893.

There does not seem to be any legal obstacle against acquiring title to Montgomery street, and I recommend, therefore, that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to Montgomery street, from the division line between the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Flatbush, where the same crosses Montgomery street, between Franklin avenue and Perry avenue, to East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn. There are buildings within the lines to be acquired for the opening of said street.

The papers in this matter are herein returned.

And thereupon, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of sections 970 and 990 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deems it for the public interest that the title to the lands and premises required for the opening and extending of Montgomery street, from the division line between the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Flatbush, where the same crosses Montgomery street, between Franklin avenue and Perry avenue to East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New York at a fixed or specified time.

Resolved, That it appears to this Board, from the surveys made and information furnished to it by the President of the Board of Public Improvements, that there are buildings upon the lands that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending said Montgomery street, from the division line between the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Flatbush, where the same crosses Montgomery street, between Franklin avenue and Perry avenue to East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Resolved, That this Board directs that upon a date to be hereafter more fully specified, not less than six months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of title to such street or avenue, that the title to any piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of such Montgomery street, from the division line between the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Flatbush, where the same crosses Montgomery street between Franklin avenue and Perry avenue to East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a special term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title, whenever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Montgomery street, from the division line between the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Flatbush, where the same crosses Montgomery street between Franklin avenue and Perry avenue to East New York avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Affirmative—Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges, and President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Beginning at a point in the eastern line of Marcher avenue, distant 14.57 feet westerly from the intersection of said line with the western line of Jerome avenue.

1st. Thence westerly along the eastern line of Marcher avenue for 17.85 feet to an angle point in said line.

2d. Thence northerly still along the eastern line of Marcher avenue for 76.38 feet.

3d. Thence southerly for 76.68 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of lines of the above-named avenue, and the location of the immediate adjacent or intersecting open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Whereas, The consolidation of the various localities into the present great City of New York particularly affects the material welfare and development of that portion of the said city known as the Borough of Queens; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the following suggestions, carefully acted upon, will tend to develop to a very high degree the natural advantages and utility of this beautiful borough, and make it the most desirable residence section of The City of New York:

First—That a careful survey be made and a topographical map of the borough be prepared.

Second—That a map be prepared for the whole Borough of Queens, providing for broad avenues leading from the various ferries and bridges (built or projected); running thence practically easterly, as the trend of travel is in that direction, with transverse streets at proper intervals; all of the said streets, where not incompatible with the general scheme to conform as nearly as possible to the streets and highways already existing; and as there are at present many independent water and sewerage systems, their consolidation should also be considered and provided for at this time, and plans formulated for obtaining an adequate and pure water supply and a good system of sewerage for the future.

Third—While land is comparatively cheap suitable sites for school-houses and ample playgrounds adjacent thereto for parks, engine and hose houses, police stations, building for the Street Cleaning Department, and other lands necessary for municipal purposes, should be selected and acquired.

Fourth—That cheaper and better rapid transit facilities are indispensable.

Fifth—That more bridges connecting Long Island with Manhattan should be constructed, especially the one known as the Blackwell's Island Bridge.

Sixth—That, on account of the magnitude and importance of the work, none but the most competent should be placed in charge.

Seventh—That it is especially important that the foregoing suggestions be acted upon at once, in order that the many and costly mistakes made in laying out the old City of New York be not repeated here.

Eighth—That a copy of these resolutions be presented to the proper authorities.

IN THE MATTER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS IN THE TWENTY-SIXTH WARD, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 310, LAWS OF 1892.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—In reply to your communication in relation to the improvement of certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, I beg to state that these improvements were authorized by an act of the Legislature, known as chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892, and were not in any way affected by the provisions of the Charter of the former City of Brooklyn relating to the improvement of streets and avenues and the collection or levying of assessments therefor.

The act above referred to provides, among other provisions, that to meet the cost of improving the streets and avenues as provided for in said act, the Mayor, Comptroller and City Clerk shall, on the requisition of the Commissioner of City Works, and from time to time as required, prepare and issue certificates of indebtedness of the City of Brooklyn, to be called Twenty-sixth Ward Improvement Assessment Certificates, and that the proceeds of sale of said certificates shall be paid into the City Treasury of said city to the credit of a fund to be known as the Twenty-sixth Ward Street Improvement Fund; to be paid out from time to time as may be required for the purposes of said act; and that the said certificates, so authorized to be issued, and the interest thereon, are payable at maturity out of the moneys collected from the assessments levied for the improvements (see section 7, chapter 310, Laws of 1892). Section 8 of said act provides that whenever one-fifth of any assessment authorized has been collected, the Commissioner of City Works, with the preliminary assent of the Mayor, may authorize a contract for the work to be made, provided, however, that no such contract shall be made unless the amount unappropriated of the said Twenty-sixth Ward Improvement Fund is sufficient to pay the cost of said work, as fixed by the contract, and that upon the making of such contract, the Comptroller of said city was to appropriate and set apart so much of the said assessment fund as shall be necessary to pay the cost of said improvement.

It appears to me that it was clearly the intention of the Legislature to permit the city authorities to advance the money for these improvements by the issue of Assessment Certificates, payable not more than five years from their date of issue, in anticipation of the collection of the assessments, and not to permit the use of the moneys collected on account of the assessment for one improvement for the payment for work on another, as was done by the former officials in Brooklyn in the original grading and paving improvements, as the act clearly implies that the assessments collected on an improvement shall be applied to the redemption of the principal and interest of the certificates issued to meet the cost of said improvement.

Under the provisions of said act, the former officials of said city issued \$80,000 of said Improvement Assessment Certificates, which sum was deposited to the credit of the fund, and disbursed as follows:

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On account of the above condition of the fund it will be necessary, in order to proceed with improvements in the Twenty-sixth Ward, for which assessments have been levied and no work done, to issue bonds to meet the cost of the contemplated improvement.

The records show that there are nine improvements in the Twenty-sixth Ward on which the assessments have been levied, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892, and on which no work has been begun, except the levying of the assessment.

The following table will show the amounts collected on account of the assessments for these improvements, as appears by the records of this Department, in the office of the Deputy Receiver of Taxes in the Borough of Brooklyn, on December 31, 1898:

It is necessary that the Law Department of the city should pass upon several questions before it will be possible for me to act in connection with these improvements. With the object of getting said improvements under way at the earliest date in the spring, I have requested an opinion of the Corporation Counsel on the following points:

First—As to the method of procedure. Whether the Commissioner of Highways, in the matter of these improvements, is the successor to the former Commissioner of City Works of the City of Brooklyn; and, if so, whether said Commissioner of Highways may, with the consent of the Mayor, authorize contracts for said improvements (section 7, chapter 310, Laws of 1892), (section 527 of the Greater New York Charter), or whether said contracts must be first authorized by the Board of Public Improvements, or by the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly.

Second—Does chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892 give authority to The City of New York to issue bonds for the completion of said improvements. If so, should said bonds be issued pursuant to said law, or should the issue be of assessment bonds when authorized, pursuant to the Greater New York Charter (section 181).

Third—If no issue of bonds is permissible, from what fund should moneys be advanced for completion of said improvements, which must be completed under the provisions of chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892.

In conclusion, I will state that I realize fully the injustice to the taxpayers of the Twenty-sixth Ward, growing out of the delay in these improvements, which has been aggravated by the financial difficulties incident to consolidation. The Corporation Counsel, however, has already held, in the matter of other pending improvements in the former City of Brooklyn which were to be paid for entirely by assessment, that the completion of the same is mandatory upon The City of New York, and I do not doubt that relief may be obtained for these Twenty-sixth Ward improvements, which are in the same general class.

STATE OF NEW YORK.

(No. 69—Int. 69.)

In Senate, January 17, 1899.

Introduced by Mr. Wagner—read twice and ordered printed, and when printed to be committed to the committee on affairs of cities.

AN ACT relating to the discontinuance of proceedings for the improvements of certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of the late city of Brooklyn.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York is hereby authorized in its discretion to cause to be discontinued any of the proceedings hereinafter named for the improvement of the streets and avenues in the twenty-sixth ward of the late city of Brooklyn, instituted under the provisions of chapter three hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-two, at any time before a contract has been legally entered into for the work authorized to be done under such proceeding. The grading and paving of Richmond street, between Jamaica avenue and Fulton street, with asphalt; the grading and paving of Sutter avenue, between Rockaway avenue and Alabama avenue, with asphalt; the grading and paving of Berriman street, from Atlantic avenue to New Lots road, with belgian block; the grading and paving of Snediker avenue, from Liberty avenue to Dumont street, with belgian block; the grading and paving of Logan street, from Atlantic avenue to New Lots road, with belgian block; the grading and paving of Sackman street, from Eastern parkway to Livonia street, with belgian block; the grading and paving of Vermont street, from Jamaica avenue to Eastern parkway, with asphalt; the grading and paving of Hinsdale street, from Atlantic avenue to Sutter avenue, with belgian block; the grading and paving of Ashford street, from Jamaica avenue to Arlington avenue, with belgian block, or the grading and paving of Ashford street, from Jamaica avenue to Arlington avenue, with asphalt.

Sec. 2. When any proceeding shall have been discontinued in accordance with the provisions of the first section of this act and any person or persons shall have paid any money as an assessment for the expense of said improvement, said person or persons shall be entitled to receive back the amount so paid, and the comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized to repay the same to the person entitled thereto.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.



## STATE OF NEW YORK.

(No. 145—Int. 145.)

In Assembly January 17, 1899.

Introduced by Mr. McKeown—Read once and referred to the Committee on Affairs of Cities.  
**AN ACT** to amend chapter three hundred and seventy-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, entitled, "An Act to unite into one municipality under the corporate name of The City of New York the various communities lying in and about New York harbor, including the city and county of New York, the city of Brooklyn and the county of Kings, the county of Richmond and part of the county of Queens, and to provide for the government thereof."

The people of the state of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section four hundred and twenty-two of chapter three hundred and seventy-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 422. In all cases where the board of public improvements or the municipal assembly or the board of public improvements and the municipal assembly together, with or without the concurrence of any other board or officer, are authorized to determine that a local improvement is to be made, the said board or the said municipal assembly or both, as the case may be, shall determine whether any, and if any, what proportion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and the assessment shall be laid out and confirmed and collected in accordance with the provisions of chapter seventeen of this act. The words 'local improvement,' as used in this section, shall be construed to mean (with respect to each borough of The City of New York) any work the payment of which was, prior to the passage of this act, provided for by the laws in force (in such borough) in the territory of the corporation formerly known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of The City of New York, in whole or in part, by assessment upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby or the owners thereof, other than assessments—which are confirmed by a court of record."

Sec. 2. Section nine hundred and forty-eight of chapter three hundred and seventy-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 948. Unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the front feet), on the line of the proposed improvement, no assessment shall be imposed for the paving of any street, or any portion thereof, which has been once paved, and the expense thereof paid by the owners of the adjoining property. (This section, however, shall apply only to the streets within the territory of the corporation formerly known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of The City of New York.)"

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, The Common Council of the City of Brooklyn did, on June 28, 1897 (Resolution 21, page 1133), authorize the repaving of Gates avenue, from Bedford avenue to Nostrand avenue, with asphalt pavement, under the provisions of section 50, title 15 of the Brooklyn Charter, one-half the cost to be assessed upon the property benefited and the other half to be borne by the city at large, but no steps were taken by the Department of City Works toward making such contract; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Eighth District hereby recommends that the said Gates avenue, from Bedford avenue to Nostrand avenue, be repaved with asphalt pavement on a concrete foundation, and that the curb be reset, new curb being supplied where needed, and that the sidewalks be reflogged where necessary, one-half of the expense of the improvement to be assessed upon the abutting property and the other half to be borne by the city at large.

SIR—In answer to communication of James J. Coogan, President of the Borough of Manhattan, inclosing resolution of the Board of Local Improvements—meeting of January 17, 1899—viz.:

"Resolved, That the Board of Local Improvements of the Twelfth District of the Borough of Manhattan, recommend to the Board of Public Improvements that East Fourth street, from the end of the existing pavement to the easterly line of Tompkins street, be regulated, graded and paved with granite-block pavement."

I would state that a similar resolution from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, including the part of Tompkins street, from Stanton street to East Fourth street, was transmitted to the Board of Public Improvements August 8, 1898, and reported upon by me under date of September 6, 1888, as follows:

"Tompkins street, from Stanton street to East Fourth street, does not exist upon the Commissioners' Map of the city. The street was discontinued by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and a marginal street, wharf or place, 175 feet wide, was laid out and maps filed on December 19, 1888."

The part of East Fourth street for which pavement, etc., is requested is within the lines of the marginal street; and that part of old East Fourth street which is east of the marginal street will be discontinued when the bulkhead is built, the marginal street being under the control of the Department of Docks, no new work on said street can be assessed or collected under the Commissioner of Highways.

I would further state that old East Fourth street, for a distance of about 250 feet, and which includes the part requested to be paved, is a bulkhead or landing place to an open slip now in use on the northerly side of said street.
