## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 12 o'clock M. on Thursday, April 25, 1901.

Present at roll call—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held April 10, 1901, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to bonds maturing in 1901, and offered the following resolution:

APRIL 18, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Bonds and Stock of The City of New York, amounting to \$6,219,000, which are held by the public and which are payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), mature during the current year, as follows:

On July 1.....	\$5,252,500 00
On November 1.....	500,000 00
On December 23.....	466,500 00
Totals.....	\$6,219,000 00

In addition to the foregoing amounts there will be required to be paid on July 1, 1901, out of said fund, such proportion of the County Consolidated Stock, amounting to \$8,885,500, also held by the public, as may not be extended under the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900.

These obligations are the largest that the said fund has ever been called upon to meet in one year, and it would appear that the ordinary income of said fund will not provide sufficient cash to meet said obligations at maturity.

I therefore recommend that an amount of bonds now held by said fund sufficient to provide for such deficiency be sold and transferred to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 2), which fund has no obligations maturing for several years, and I would select for such sale bonds which are redeemable from said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 2).

I present herewith resolutions authorizing the sale and transfer from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 2), of the following-described stock, viz.:

- \$950,000 of two and one-half per cent. Additional Water Stock of The City of New York, payable October 1, 1907;
- \$300,000 of two and one-half per cent. Additional Croton Water Stock of The City of New York, payable November 1, 1904;
- \$2,427,000 of three per cent. Additional Croton Water Stock of The City of New York, payable November 1, 1904.

Whereas, Bonds and Stock of The City of New York, held by the public, mature during the year 1901, which are payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), amounting to six million two hundred and nineteen thousand dollars (\$6,219,000); and

Whereas, There may also be required to be paid from said fund a proportion of the Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, which matures on July 1, 1901, if the whole amount of said stock (\$8,885,500) is not extended, as provided for by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900; and

Whereas, It appears that a sufficient amount of cash cannot be accumulated in said fund from the usual sources of income to redeem said bonds and stock at maturity; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to transfer upon the books of his office

\$950,000 of two and one-half per cent. Additional Water Stock of The City of New York, payable October 1, 1907;

\$300,000 of two and one-half per cent. Additional Croton Water Stock of The City of New York, payable November 1, 1904; and

\$2,427,000 of three per cent. Additional Croton Water Stock of The City of New York, payable November 1, 1904;



—from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), which now holds them, to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 2), and to draw a warrant for the par value thereof and accrued interest thereon upon the said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 2), in favor of the said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), and to deposit said warrant, when executed, with the City Chamberlain to the credit of said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1).

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

"I inclose herewith the proposition of the landlord for putting the Saratoga site, No. 1031 Putnam avenue, in order for occupancy by the Library."

"A resolution was passed recommending a lease at this location February 19, 1901. This resolution was amended at the following meeting, recommending the lease at \$1,000. This was due to the fact that the first figure was an approximate figure offered by the real estate agent without understanding what was the extent of the necessary repairs; and, after a full consideration of the subject, the Committee recommended a lease for three (3) years at the rate of \$1,000 per annum."

"The sketch of the front, referred to in this letter, I have seen and approved. If your engineers desire to see it they can do so by an arrangement with Mr. Burtis, who will show them the room."

The premises proposed to be leased consist of the first story and part of the basement of the four-story brick warehouse building, known as Nos. 1031 to 1035 Putnam avenue, the floor space of which amounts to about 2,250 square feet. The building has a frontage of 37 feet, 9 feet in the rear and about 65 feet deep, being very irregular in shape.

In order to fit these premises for the proper occupation of the Library, various improvements to the building are necessary, as enumerated in the offer of the owner, which is inclosed.

In my opinion the rental asked, namely, \$1,000 per annum, is sufficient to cover, in addition to a normal rent of the premises, the greater part of the improvements which the owner proposes to make.

These improvements I consider are largely a matter of permanent improvement in the building, and I see no reason why the City should be compelled to reimburse the landlord for the same in rental.

The proposition is practically to change a warehouse building into a store building, and if this were done at the expense of the landlord I consider that a full and fair rental would be \$850 per annum, which sum I would recommend for a lease of three years.

The assessed valuation of the entire premises is \$10,000.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution relative to the use and occupation by the Department of Street Cleaning of premises at the southeast corner of Ninety-sixth street and Broadway, Borough of Manhattan:

APRIL 22, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. P. E. Nagle, Commissioner, Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of April 18, 1901, states:

"I desire the consent and approval of your Board for a lease, pursuant to section 541 of the Greater New York Charter, from Philip Cosgrove, of the store of the premises at the southeast corner of Broadway and Ninety-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of this Department, for a term of one (1) year from May 1, 1901, at the annual rental of \$480, payable monthly; the lessee to put and keep the premises in good repair and to furnish the Croton water during the term of the lease."

"The store is 20 feet by 35 feet, thus making a space of about 700 square feet, and though the premises are not in very good repair now, will, after the necessary repairs are made, be an excellent section station for this Department."

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of the store floor of a two-story frame building, 25 feet by 35 feet, situated on the southeast corner of Broadway and West Ninety-sixth street, containing about 788 square feet.

The owner agrees to put and keep the premises in good repair and pay for the Croton water tax. He will also agree to a renewal for another year, upon the same terms, provided he still continues to be the lessee of the premises.

Mr. Cosgrove is the lessee from the estate of John Jacob Astor, and his lease, which is for the term of one year, contains clauses to the effect—

First—That the lease may be terminated on three days' notice; and

Second—That the place shall be used for gardening and dwelling purposes only.

Under these circumstances it would not appear that Mr. Cosgrove is able to enter into a lease with the City for a term of one year except under the same conditions, and, in consequence, I would recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to pay for the use and occupation of these premises from May 1, 1901, at the monthly rate of \$40 while occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning as a section station.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to pay for the use and occupation by the Department of Street Cleaning, of the store of premises on the southeast corner of Broadway and Ninety-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, to Mr. Philip Cosgrove, a monthly rental of forty dollars (\$40) while occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning as a section station, commencing May 1, 1901.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

At this stage of the proceedings the Chamberlain appeared and took his seat in the Board.



The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises at Third and Wendover avenues, Borough of The Bronx, for the Department of Buildings:

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. James G. Wallace, Commissioner of Buildings, boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in a communication under date of April 25, 1901, states:

"Application is hereby made for a lease of the second floor of the building at southeast corner of Wendover and Third avenues, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the Department of Buildings as a branch office, for the term of one year, from May 1, 1901 (with the privilege of four years), at an annual rental of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) payable quarterly. The owner is Mr. Robert C. Wood, of No. 30 Broad street, and he is to make all necessary alterations required by the Department, and is to furnish a janitor and steam heat, and is to construct a fireproof vault for the records of the Department, as may be directed by the Commissioner, all at his, the owner's expense."

Under date of April 3, 1901, I reported upon this building, and also upon the present quarters at No. 2775 Third avenue, and a resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 10, 1901, as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Buildings be and is hereby requested to enter into negotiations at once with the owner of the premises now occupied by the Department of Buildings at No. 2775 Third avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and to secure from him an offer of renewal of the lease for one year, from May 1, 1901, of the second floor alone at a proportional reduction in the rental."

I am now informed by the Commissioner that he has been unable to come to any understanding with the present lessor, as regards a renewal, and he therefore recommends a lease of the building at Third and Wendover avenues.

Under the terms as named in the application, I consider the rental asked, namely, \$1,000 per annum, to be full but not excessive.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from Robert C. Wood of the second floor of the building at the southeast corner of Wendover and Third avenues, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the Department of Buildings as a branch office, for the term of one year from May 1, 1901, with the privilege of a renewal for four years, at an annual rental of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), payable quarterly, the lessor to make all necessary alterations required by the Department, to furnish a janitor and steam heat and to construct a fireproof vault for the records of the Department, at his own expense; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to the terms and conditions of the proposed sale of the ferry franchises of the Fulton, Wall, Catharine South and Hamilton avenue ferries.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

The following resolution was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Whereas, Senate Bill No. 1597, entitled 'An Act to facilitate connections with wharves, docks and piers in the cities of this state,' passed the Assembly of the State of New York on April 23, 1901, and is now before the Governor of the State of New York awaiting his official action; and, therefore, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, be it

"Resolved, That the following representation be made to the Governor of the State of New York, and ordered transmitted to him immediately by the Secretary of this Board:

"This bill should not receive the Executive approval (1) because it is designed to throw the commerce of the Port of New York into the hands and under the control of a private corporation and (2) because it attempts to dispose of immensely valuable franchise privileges and property rights without adequate return to The City of New York.

"While this bill purports to be general in its terms, it is in effect a special bill designed to further the aims and purposes of the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company. This company, incorporated under the laws of the States of New York and New Jersey, possesses, under the act of Congress approved June 7, 1894, the right to construct and maintain a bridge across the Hudson river between New York City and the State of New Jersey.

"This act requires that the location of the approaches of said bridge in The City of New York shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that no railroad or railroads shall be operated except on such approaches as shall have been approved by the Sinking Fund Commissioners of The City of New York.

"On February 11, 1896, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, after careful consideration and repeated public hearings, approved the location of the approach to said bridge in The City of New York terminating at Fifth street and Broadway, in accordance with the similar approval theretofore obtained of the State Commission appointed under chapter 233 of the Laws of 1890 of the State of New York.

"Thereupon, the rights of the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company became fixed and definite, and it would seem that nothing remained to be done except the actual physical construction of the bridge in accordance with the State laws and the act of Congress. It appears, however, that the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company has never been able to secure the requisite capital for the construction of this bridge. Recently an application was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a so-called additional 'approach,' which, after leaving the main approach at Fifty-fifth street, west of Eleventh avenue, strikes Twelfth avenue at or near Fifth street, and runs thence along the water front of Manhattan Island southward to the Battery.

"It is manifest that this is in no proper sense an approach to a bridge. Bridge approaches have frequently been construed by the courts to include only structures necessary to convey traffic from street grades to the grade of the main bridge structure, and such a definition is to be found actually incorporated in the act of Congress of June 7, 1894. This connecting railway, as it should more properly be termed, would really constitute an integral part of the public dock system of The City of New York, and would revolutionize the manner in which the commerce of the Port of New York is conducted.

"The bill provides that 'such corporation may construct and maintain such bridge, appurtenances, approaches, stations, extensions and connections,' as changed or extended from time to time by such Commissioners over the public streets and also by overhead structures upon docks, wharves and piers, and passageways forming part thereof whether known as a marginal wharf or otherwise. The idea of a railroad to connect the docks of the City is not new.

"On December 15, 1897, a Board of Consulting Engineers, composed of experts of the highest national reputation, made a report to the Board of Docks, which included a recommendation for a railroad along the water front of The City of New York designed to facilitate the interchange of traffic between the land and water lines of transportation, and at the same time to improve the means of reaching either class of transportation from the City.

"This plan, however, contemplated a railroad owned or controlled by the municipal authorities and forming an essential part of the dock system of The City of New York. The connecting railway desired by the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company would, on the contrary, subordinate, if not annihilate municipal ownership and control of the dock system by sacrificing public interests to the welfare of the private corporation which would own or operate this bridge.

"For generations, the policy of the State of New York and of The City of New York has been one firmly and consistently in favor of municipal ownership and control of the dock system. The City of New York has, in addition to the value of its land and wharf rights, derived under its ancient charters and by grants from the State, devoted to the development of this dock system up to January 1, 1901, the sum of \$44,148,335.95.

"Improvements now under way contemplate an additional expenditure in the near future of at least \$20,000,000. The present value of New York City's water-front property has been estimated at \$100,000,000, but it is really beyond price, since it cannot be duplicated. One of the chief arguments in favor of municipal ownership and control of the dock system of The City of New York has been the ability to prevent monopolization of its commercial facilities in the hands of any one special interest or combination of interests.

"The commercial supremacy of the Port of New York does not depend primarily upon the terminal facilities offered to railroads, but to its position in relation to international, and especially transatlantic commerce.

"The report recently presented by a State Commission, of which ex-Mayor Schieren was Chairman, has demonstrated that increased port facilities designed to benefit railroad transportation inure not to the benefit of the commerce of the Port of New York, but to the railroads themselves, by reason of differential rates agreed to by the railroad companies between themselves and not discontinued by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

"It has even been plausibly alleged that if it were not for the municipal ownership of docks in New York City the great railroads having termini at the Port of New York could absolutely control and monopolize all the City's wharf property, to the complete destruction of many forms of water transportation.

"It can scarcely need argument to demonstrate that if transportation to and from docks of Manhattan Island can be controlled by a private corporation, the docks themselves become useless to the public, and valueless to the City except to the extent to which this private corporation may permit.

"With the exception of the vague and indefinite reference to the power of the Department of Docks to establish reasonable rules and regulations affecting the construction, maintenance and operation of this bridge, there is no provision in this bill for municipal regulation and control. No reference is made to the rates of fares or tolls to be collected by this bridge company.

"Extortionate rates may be charged, nor would it be a hindrance to the speedy monopolization of commercial traffic if those rates were to be uniform to all users, since the control of the bridge by one or more railroad corporations would enable such corporations easily to pay such extortionate rates themselves, in view of the fact that the receipts would only flow back into their own treasuries.

"Attention is also called to the fact that this bill affords no guarantee that a bridge will ever be built across the Hudson river as a result of obtaining this railroad franchise. The West street marginal railroad might be built first and operated for years with enormous profit to the company securing the franchise, while the building of the bridge proper might be delayed indefinitely.

"The foregoing arguments are designed to show that such a connecting railroad, owing its great value to its intimate and essential connection with the dock system, should not be permitted to be owned by a private corporation. Assuming, however, that it would be proper to make such a grant under any circumstances, the fact still remains that this bill attempts to dispose of immensely valuable franchise privileges and property rights of The City of New York without adequate compensation.

"So valuable does this Board regard these property rights and franchise privileges that it hesitates to estimate the money value thereof. Even the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company has never attempted to deny their value. An informal offer was made in behalf of that company that if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund would approve the location of this so-called approach with its dock connections, it would engage that after the expiration of ten years of private ownership and operation the whole bridge structure, together with its approaches and appurtenances, should become forever thereafter the property of The City of New York.

"This proposition was not favorably regarded by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, because the term thereof appeared to be too long, being double that provided in the case of the rapid transit subway. Inadequate as this arrangement appears to be, however, it is infinitely more advantageous to the interests of the City than the plan of compensation provided by Senate Bill No. 1597. The Legislature should not be more generous in disposing of the property of The City of New York than the beneficiaries of this grant themselves.

"It is not true, as has been publicly alleged, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have wilfully refused to negotiate with the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company with respect to the compensation which should be paid to The City of New York as a consideration for the grant of these valuable franchises.

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are without power to enter into such arrangement in behalf of The City of New York. That question was carefully considered at the time when the approval of the main approach was under consideration in 1896.

"An opinion in regard thereto was rendered by the Hon. Francis M. Scott, Counsel to the Corporation, in which, after citing the Mayor vs. the Second Avenue Railroad Company, 32 N. Y., 261, and the matter of the Kings County Elevated Railroad, 105 N. Y., 97, it was held that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund possessed no power to 'impose pecuniary burdens as a condition of granting their approval to some location.' If the local authorities possessed requisite power by legislative grant to deal with the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company in this matter they would willingly consider this question on its merits and endeavor to reach some conclusion which would adequately protect the interests of The City of New York.

"Apart, therefore, from the many constitutional objections which appear to be present in the form and substance of this attempted grant of a railroad franchise, it is respectfully submitted that by the passage of this bill a disastrous blow has been struck at the commerce of the Port of New York and that the interests of the Corporation of The City of New York as proprietors have been wantonly and unnecessarily sacrificed."

In connection therewith the Mayor offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and concur in said resolution.

Which was unanimously adopted.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, March 22, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held March 15, 1901, were approved.

A representative of the firm of Ellis & Co. appeared in relation to the order of the Board for the removal of the oil boat from the slip in front of the bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify Ellis & Co. and the Pure Oil Company that their oil boats must be removed from in front of the bulkheads between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, and between Piers, old 58, and old 58½, North river, not later than April 1, 1901, and that no further extension of time beyond that date will be granted for the removal of such boats.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting a plan for the improvement of the water-front between Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets, North river, was tabled for two weeks.

The applications of Vogelmann & Simpson and of the Cobweb Yacht Club for permission to maintain boat-houses at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, North river, were referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from the North Side Board of Trade, calling attention to the necessity for a boat landing at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Harlem river, in the Borough of The Bronx, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Sea Gate Association, to land the steamboats "William Coleman" and "Ossining" at the Battery wharf, the compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer and the time of landing to be fixed by the Dock Superintendent.

James Donlon, to maintain the watchman's house heretofore occupied by James L. Gerrity, now deceased, on the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river. Syracuse and New York Canal Line, to maintain two derricks, tally-house and tool-box on Pier, new 6, East river.

Lehigh Valley Transportation Company, to maintain derrick, tally-house and tool-house on Pier, new 6, East river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to make repairs to its water-front property on the North river for a period of six months from April 1, 1901, all work to be kept within existing lines and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to repair Pier 17, North river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

J. W. Arkell & Co., to repair water pipe leading to the Pier foot of Twenty-ninth street, North river, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost of the permittee.

Bernard Roff, to make temporary water connection for the Fort Lee ferry house with the water-supply pipe on the Pier foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, the said connection to be made under the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply.

Peter Doelger, to repair salt-water pipe at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, East river, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at his cost and expense.

New York Mutual Gas-light Company, to repair the Piers foot of East Eleventh, East Twelfth and East Thirteenth streets, and adjoining bulkheads and coal hoist foot of East Twelfth street, the work to be kept within existing lines.

J. M. Ceballos & Co., to place mooring post on the bulkhead north of Pier 10, East river.

J. T. Story, to repair derrick, mast and gaff foot of North First street, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Louise Segulne, to repair her pier at Rossville, Staten Island, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Catskill and New York Steamboat Company, to place an office 4 by 6 feet on the south side of Pier, new 43, North river, and to repair and extend the existing office thereat.



A. C. Gundersleere, to lay a water-supply pipe at the foot of Ninety-eighth street, North river, all pavement that may be taken up to be replaced by the force of this Department at his cost and expense.

H. Irving Fay, to construct a bin around the sewer outlet under the Pier foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, instead of under the Pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, the location of said sewer outlet having been changed accordingly.

John Roshary, to erect a dock at Rockaway Point, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

W. H. Desierre, to construct a platform at Holland's Station, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contract No. 701, for furnishing coal and that same is now a valid contract.

2d. Approving salaries on Contracts Nos. 699, 700 and 702.

From the Corporation Counsel—In relation to the application made by Edward F. Cragin to the New York Harbor Line Board for permission to construct a dry dock between Ellis and Bedloe's Islands.

On motion, the report of the President recommending that the application of Edward F. Cragin to construct an island between Ellis and Bedloe's Islands be opposed by this Board, as such island if built would cut off the approach by water to many improvements existing along the Jersey shore, and it being doubtful whether the Board of Riparian Commissioners of New Jersey, in granting the riparian rights, had jurisdiction over the site of the proposed island, was placed on file, said recommendation approved, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Corporation Counsel.

From Isaac A. Hopper & Son—Requesting permission to load cellar dirt on scows at night at the south side of Pier 6, North river. Application denied.

From Conroy Brothers—Requesting permission to run a water-supply pipe through the proposed bulkhead-wall south of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North river. Application denied.

From Willson, Adams & Co.—Requesting permission to construct a platform and shed south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, on the easterly side of the Harlem river. Secretary directed to state that before permit will be granted an agreement must be filed by the owners of the property that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual value of such platform and shed, in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water-front.

From Al. Foster—Requesting that a water-supply pipe be installed at the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Twenty-second street, for the steamer "Angler," and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to lay the pipe and to report the cost for collection.

From Herbert B. Co.—Requesting that dredging be ordered in front of the bulkhead, between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, and on the south side of the Pier foot of East Nineteenth street.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to state that it is not the intention of the Department to use the existing bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, for wharfage purposes, as the Department proposes to construct a new bulkhead-wall thereat; and the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to order dredging to a depth of twenty feet at mean low water on the south side of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Requesting that additional fender piles and cleats be placed on the sides of Pier, new 4, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to place the piles and cleats thereat.

From the President—Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Quebec Steamship Company for the use of the bulkhead on the easterly side of the approach to Pier, new 47, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$500 per annum, commencing May 1, 1901, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer—Recommending that the leases of the ferry franchises and wharf property used in connection therewith, be sold separately at the upset prices or rentals per annum of \$29,124.65 for the Hamilton Avenue Ferry; of \$19,381.66 for the South Ferry; of \$9,797.65 for the Wall Street Ferry; of \$15,462.96 for the Fulton Street Ferry, and of \$14,636.26 for the Catharine Street Ferry, and that the Comptroller and the Union Ferry Company be requested to nominate each a disinterested person to act as appraisers of the boats, buildings and other property owned by the Union Ferry Company and used in connection with said ferries, in accordance with present leases thereof. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Reporting his inability to collect from Brown & Roberts the sum of \$3,637.32 and from Antonio Kizzola the sum of \$7,276.45, the excess cost of granite purchased under Treasurer's Orders over prices named in Contracts Nos. 643 and 673 respectively, and recommending that said claims be sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection. Recommendations adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Thomas F. Mehan for the privilege of landing the steamer "Edmund Butler" at the Battery Wharf, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Al. Foster for the privilege of landing the steamer "Angler" at the Battery Wharf be fixed at the rate of \$4 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Citizens' Steamboat Company for the berth to be occupied by the steamer "Holmdel" at Pier, old 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company for the inner berth on the south side of Pier, new 43, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$3,333.33 per annum, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Benjamin Griggs for the berth to be used by the steamer "William V. Wilson" at Pier, old 58½, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Bosker Contracting Company for the berth between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Frederick Geggus for the privilege of maintaining a boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged William Ruth for the privilege of maintaining a boat-house south of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$1 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Recommending that a lease of Pier, old 58, adjoining the north side of Bloomfield street, North river, be granted T. G. & W. R. Patten for a term of ten years from April 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$5,000.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto T. G. & W. R. Patten, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue and become due at the southerly side of Pier, old 58, North river, a distance of about three hundred and thirty (330) feet, and at the westerly side of the "L" adjoining the outer end of the southerly side of said pier, about one hundred (100) feet, together with the surface of said pier, about fifty feet in width, and the surface of said "L," about fifty feet in width, with the privilege of maintaining on said pier a coal bin, waiting-room, baggage-room, and watchman's house; the lease to be for a term of ten years from April 1, 1901, at an annual rental of three thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer. Provided that said T. G. & W. R. Patten shall file in this Department within ten days their written acceptance of the terms of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, March 29, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held March 22, 1901, were approved.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 20705, submitting plan for the improvement of the water front between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, on the south side of the Harlem river, was again called; and a subsequent recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief that plans, specifications and form of contract be prepared for the construction of a wooden cribwork in front of the property now owned by the City between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, and between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, to make said bulkhead available for wharfage purposes, was approved.

The communication from the Chief Clerk, stating that the franchise granted by County Judge Stephen B. Stephens, of Richmond County, on April 22, 1896, to operate a ferry between Howland's Hook, Staten Island and Elizabethport, New Jersey, will expire April 22, 1901, was referred to the Treasurer for the purpose of fixing the upset price for the sale of said franchise at public auction.

The following reports of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 20490, cost of removing sunken barge in the vicinity of the Grand Street Bridge, at Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, amounting to \$693.52, from Henry Dinglemeyer.

No. 20520, cost of driving two clusters of piles at the foot of East Sixty-eighth street, amounting to \$221.05, from the Central Brewing Company.

No. 20565, cost of repairing the pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, where damaged by boats, amounting to \$377.13, from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.



No. 20718, cost of repairing Pile Driver No. 4, where damaged by Transfer Boat No. 15, amounting to \$98.77, from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From the Carroll Box and Lumber Company—Requesting permission to run a ten-inch salt-water condensing pipe through the bulkhead and under the pier at the foot of East Eighteenth street.

From Charles Fisher—Requesting permission to maintain a float in front of the bulkhead south of Metropolitan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

The application of John W. Earl for permission to place a float on the southerly side of the pier foot of Main street, City Island, a stairway to be placed thereat by the City, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

United Electric Light and Power Company—To maintain a portable scale on the pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river, the compensation to be paid therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Mary A. Leyh—To construct a boat-house east of Holland's avenue, Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by him.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Union Ferry Company—To repair the ferry premises at the Hamilton, South, Wall, Fulton and Catharine ferries, until April 30, 1901, the work to be kept within existing lines, and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—To repair Piers 26, 48, 50, 51 and 52 and bulkhead between Piers 51 and 52, East river, and pier foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

John J. O'Hare, to repair the ice-bridge and derricks on the bulkhead between Third and Houston streets, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Metropolitan Street Railway Company—To grade the filling already deposited between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, Harlem river, it being understood that no encroachment will be made into the stream beyond the line of the present filling.

Norton Point Land Company—To remove its pier at Sea Gate, Coney Island, and to construct a protection for the bank along the beach thereat, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company—To repair its dock property at St. George, Staten Island, during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines, and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—Advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contract No. 702, for furnishing piles, and that the same is now a valid contract.

From the Department of Water Supply—Granting permission for the use of the hydrants along West street in connection with the sprinkling of the new-made land thereat.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Advising that in proceedings for the condemnation of wharf property no liability accrues until the confirmation of the report of the Commissioners appointed to appraise same, or until title is vested in the City.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to enter said communication in full upon the minutes as follows, and to transmit copies thereof to his Honor the Mayor and to the Comptroller:

" To the Board of Docks:

" SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication, bearing date 28th February, from Hon. J. Sergeant Cram, President, stating that he is directed by you to ask whether in proceedings for the condemnation of property for the Dock Department, where Commissioners have been appointed but no report made, any liability accrues, and, if there is a liability, what it is.

" In reply to this communication, I have to say that in proceedings in which Commissioners have been appointed, but wherein no report has been made, the liability in the sense of being a liability presently due and which is legally enforceable, accrues at the time of the confirmation of the report of the Commissioners, or in cases where title vests before confirmation under special laws, at the time of the vesting of title.

" As to the liability before the vesting of title, or the confirmation of the report, it is an unliquidated obligation only, which technically does not come within the legal definition of a liability.

Second—Stating that he has entered into an agreement by which the 88 feet of bulkhead in the vicinity of Clinton street, East river, is to be surrendered to the City on April 1, 1901.

On motion, the application of Willis A. Winne for permission to occupy said 88 feet of bulkhead north of Pier 48, East river, was placed on file and permission granted said Winne to continue during the pleasure of the Board, commencing April 1, 1901, with the privilege of maintaining an ice-bridge, scales and tally-house on the bulkhead, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From T. G. & W. R. Patten—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted March 22, 1901, granting a lease of Pier, old 58, adjoining the north side of Bloomfield street, North river, with the "L" at the outer end thereof. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare form of lease.

From James Shewan & Sons—Transmitting consent of surety to the subletting of the bulkhead return on the north side of the pier foot of Fourth street, East river.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Stating that for the purpose of repairing the ferry premises at the foot of West Forty-second street, the ferry-boats will be run from the terminal of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company at West Twenty-third street, from 6 A.M. on April 1, to 6 A.M. April 6, 1901.

From the Canarsie Tax Payers' Association—In relation to the necessity for wharfage accommodations at the foot of Ninety-second street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the communication to the Corporation Counsel, and to notify said Association that the matter of the ownership of the pier thereat was referred to the Corporation Counsel November 16, 1900.

From the Bronx Gas and Electric Company—Requesting permission to construct a pile platform and bulkhead at its property at Westchester creek, Borough of The Bronx. Secretary directed to state that before permit will be granted an agreement must be filed by the owners of the property that no additional item of value beyond the actual value of the structures shall be claimed in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water front.

From W. J. Kidney—Requesting that dredging be done at the dumping-board foot of West Seventy-ninth street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging thereat to a depth of 15 feet at mean low water.

From Kane & Wright—Requesting that dredging be ordered in front of the bulkhead between Forty-sixth and Forty-seventh streets, East river. Secretary directed to state that the shoaling in front of said bulkhead is due to the dumping of manure thereat, and that the owners of the dumping-board must do the dredging.

From Albert H. Hastorf—Requesting permission to construct an extension to the southerly end of the dumping-board on the bulkhead between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river. Application denied.

From Arthur A. Koble—Requesting permission to construct a board walk at his boat-house at Holland's Station, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens. Application denied, as the proposed board walk would extend outshore of high-water mark thereat, and no grant of the land under water having been made by the State.

From William C. Moquin—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 685.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of furnishing coal under Contract No. 685, William C. Moquin, Contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including March 20, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties of said contract is filed in this Department.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Sea Gate Association for the privilege of landing the steamers "William Coleman" and "Osining" at the Battery Wharf be fixed at the rate of \$3 per day for each boat, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the application of Dover Post for permission to occupy the boat-house at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Harlem river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Thomas Liberty for the use of the bulkhead foot of Railroad avenue, Harlem river, with the privilege of maintaining a derrick

thereon, be fixed at the rate of \$300 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the application of the Cobweb Yacht Club for a lease of the water-front at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, North river, be denied, and that permission be granted Vogelmann & Simpson to erect and maintain a boat-house at the foot of said street, compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$2 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dockmaster. Recommendations adopted.

5th. Recommending that the permit granted the Columbia College Boat Club to maintain a boat-house and float between Lexington and Fourth avenues, Harlem river, be revoked, said Club never having entered upon the premises. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that a lease of the south half of the pier foot of East Fourth street be granted James Shewan & Sons, the injunction restraining the Department from leasing said premises having been vacated March 27, 1901; and also recommending that the permit granted said Shewan & Sons to maintain a floating dry dock temporarily on the south side of said pier be revoked, the permittees not having availed themselves of the privilege.

On motion, the recommendations of the Treasurer were approved and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let unto James Shewan & Sons all and singular the wharfage and craneage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of the southerly half of the pier at the foot of East Fourth street, with the privilege of berthing a dry dock thereat, for a period of ten years from April 1, 1901, at an annual rental of one thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, which said lease and occupation shall terminate, as to any right or privilege to maintain a dry dock, upon the termination of the lease from Charles L. Dimou, Caleb A. Dyer and Frederic D. Phillips, as trustees, their successors or assigns, demise the bulkhead on the East river, from East Third street to East Fourth street, to said James Shewan & Sons, provided that said James Shewan & Sons shall file in this Department, within ten days from receipt hereof, their written acceptance of the terms and conditions of the above recited resolution, and agree to execute a lease, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, containing, in addition to the provisions above recited, the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department, except that the lessees shall do all the dredging.

7th. Recommending the revocation of certain permits to take effect April 1, 1901, the permittees neglecting to pay the rental therefor.

On motion, the recommendation of the Treasurer was adopted, and the permits revoked as follows:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 15, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN:—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incuring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

## CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1.
