To the Police Board:

The Committee on Rules and Discipline, to which was referred the following resolutions, adopted at a meeting of the Police Board on August 24, 1900:

"Communication having been received from the Hon. Randolph Guggenheimer Acting Mayor, in which he requests that an investigation be made as to the riotous rising that occurred on the night of August 15 in the vicinity of Eighth Avenue and Forty-first street it is

Resolved, That the President be and is directed to communicate with said Mr. Ludlow and request him to submit such affidavits or other evidence as he may have bearing upon said subject."

Reportable Report.

The communication referred to as being received from Mr. Ludlow, in substance states:—That he had facts in the form of affidavits or witnesses in reference to the unprovoked clabbing by the Police on the night of August 15, and that he would lay same before the Board on any day following August 29. A communication was forwarded to Mr. Ludlow requesting him to submit such facts on August 30 at 2 P. M. On such date Mr. Ludlow failed to appear in person, but sent by messenger an affidavit of one William J. Elliott, who claimed he was assaulted in the Twentieth Precinct Station-house on the night of August 15. This was the only affidavit submitted to your Committee, and was the only specific complaint made by any person as to mistreatment at the hands of the Police during the trouble beginning on August 12.

Pursuant to the directions of the resolution of the Board, the Committee proceeded to investigate the subject matter referred to in the communication of the Honorable Acting Mayor, being the rioting that occurred on the night of August 15.

Communications were addressed to Mr. Israel Ludlow, Rev. W. H. Brooks and Mr. Frank Moss, requesting that they submit any facts in their possession in reference to said riots. No answer was received from Rev. W. H. Brooks. Answers were received from Mr. Ludlow and Mr. Moss, copies of which accompany this report.

At the first hearing before your Committee the charges made by William J. Elliott were investigated.

At the hearing, Mr. Israel Ludlow requested to be permitted to appear as counsel, and claimed the right to examine and cross-examine witnesses. In view of the fact that he is counsel for a large number of colored people filed claims against The City of New York, claiming damages in large amounts for alleged assaults committed by Police officers, and believing that the desire and intention of said attorney was to use the investigation of the charges made by Elliott before your Committee, more as a means to aid him in his litigation than to assist the Committee in arriving at the true facts, he was denied the right to appear as counsel. Elliott, and every other person who was shown in any way to have any knowledge in regard to the assault was examined by your Committee under oath; the testimony accompanies this report. From an examination of the same it will appear that Elliott's conduct on the night of August 15 was such as to justify his arrest.

No claim is made that he was assaulted on the street, or while in custody on the way to the station-house, but that the assault was committed in the muster-room of the station-house.

The testimony of Elliott is corroborated by that of three disinterested newspaper men who, while not in all respects agreeing as to the particulars of the occurrence, substantially agree in stating that Elliott was pushed or misused while on his way through the muster-room to the cell. At the time of the occurrence there were sixty or seventy officers in the room which made it necessary for the Doorman to push his way, and the way of the prisoner, Elliott, through the officers while going to the cell-room which was at the extreme end of the muster-room.

The testimony of Elliott and the other witnesses is fully contradicted by the Acting Captain, the Doorman and a number of officers. Elliott, both in the station-house and in the trial-room during the investigation, stated that he could not identify any officer who had assaulted him, and when asked if it would be possible for him to identify any such officer, if every officer who was in the station-house at the time of the assault was placed before him, he stated that he could not identify any one.

The other witnesses who had in part corroborated Elliott were just as emphatic in their statement that they could not identify any officer as having assaulted Elliott. This practically



disposes of the specific complaint of assault, except in so far as the Commanding Sergeant might be responsible for knowingly permitting a prisoner to be abused in his station-house and failing to take action thereon. Acting Captain Cooney swears positively that no assault was committed in his presence or to his knowledge; that he was in the station-room at about the time of the alleged assault, and that he would have seen it had it occurred. He is corroborated by this by a number of witnesses. An officer who would commit an assault on a prisoner in a station-house, or permit such an assault, is a coward and unfit to wear the uniform of the force. The gravity of such a charge is apparent, and the evidence to sustain it should be clear and convincing. The evidence in this case is very contradictory and the bias of the complainant is apparent, and no conviction of a violation of the Rules of the Department could be sustained on this evidence, and it is not such as would justify the placing of a commanding officer on trial charged with such an offense.

Your Committee took means to ascertain the names of every person who claimed to have been maltreated by the Police; such names were taken from the blotter of arrests and also from the public prints. They were subpoenaed and publicly examined under oath, as well as all officers who were shown to have any connection with the different cases or with the riotous trouble as a whole.

While it is apparent from the testimony taken that many people were clubbed, it must be borne in mind that the conditions existing in the neighborhood of the trouble were very serious. A few days previous a policeman, while in the discharge of his duty, had been killed by a colored man, which created an uneasy feeling on the part of the colored residents of the district.

On the evening preceding the day of the funeral of the officer, a colored man named Walters was arrested for attempting to shoot a white man named Healy; during the trouble a large crowd gathered, and Walters, breaking away from Healy, discharged his revolver in the direction of the crowd. Walters was placed under arrest, and while being conveyed to the station-house the crowds of people increased. This was undoubtedly the immediate cause which led to the disorder and the assaults which followed.

Your committee has had submitted reports from the Inspector of the District and the Acting Captain of the Twentieth Precinct, in which precinct most all of the trouble occurred; they have also had reports showing the number of officers and men performing duty in this district, and the means taken for the protection of the public peace during the existence of the disorder in the district; and while it is apparent that the officers on duty used their clubs in their effort to restore order, there is nothing in the evidence taken by your committee which will justify the preferment of charges against any officer for the use of his club, as in the specific cases where the officer has been identified by a complainant the evidence taken is of such a contradictory character and the bias of the complainant is so apparent that the fact of clubbing would not on the trial of a charge be so proven as to justify a conviction.

In the case of Officer Olin, who was accused by one John Haines of having assaulted him, Haines was not examined by your Committee for the reason that he could not be found, having been sentenced by a magistrate to prison for six months. This charge was examined by Mr. Magistrate Haines. On the hearing, the complainant, Haines, being represented by Frank Moss, Esq., as counsel, the officer by Louis J. Grant, Esq., the Magistrate in his written opinion deciding the case, in part stated:

"Although a more extended hearing of the case was had before me, and a greater volume of testimony taken than when it was before Magistrate Cornell on the charge of disorderly conduct, still I am inclined to the same conclusion as that which my brother magistrate reached on the trial before him, namely, that Officer Olin simply did his duty. During the examination before me nearly 100 pages of testimony were taken, which has been carefully read, together with the brief of counsel since the submission of the case, and this evidence furnishes no reason in my mind for questioning the disposition made of the disorderly conduct case by Magistrate Cornell. It therefore follows that the application for a warrant should be denied."

The disorderly conduct case referred to by the Magistrate was the charge against Haines, on which he was convicted and sentenced for six months, and it was in making this arrest that Officer Olin was charged with assaulting the prisoner. Copy of the opinion of the justice accompanies this report.

A similar disposition was made by the Magistrate of the complaint against the same officer made by William J. Johnson.

The Grand Jury also considered the case against Officer Olin. The Grand Jury in its examination of the case called and examined a large number of witnesses, and it is fair to assume that the whole subject of the trial was considered by it, and after such investigation refused to indict Officer Olin, or any other officer, or otherwise censure them.

In the matter of the assault alluded to have been committed upon one George L. Myers by Officer John J. Cleary on August 26, at No. 227 West Sixtieth street.

Your Committee desires to state that no complaint has ever been made to the Police Board by Myers or any other person in this case. The alleged assault occurred at a time after the disorder in the Twentieth Precinct was over. Upon investigation it appears that Mr. Frank Moss, as counsel for the said George L. Myers, applied to Magistrate Haines for a warrant against Officer Cleary. A summons was issued and a hearing on the charge was heard, the complainant appearing by his counsel, Mr. Moss, and the officer appearing by counsel. The Magistrate disposed of this case in an opinion that states in part:

"A full and thorough investigation of the whole case was had; eight witnesses were examined by the complainant and ten for the defense. One hundred and thirty-nine pages of testimony were taken. The complainant and all of his witnesses, at it in number, are colored, while the defendant and four of his witnesses are Policemen; five other witnesses for the defense being white men, aware that they save the whole affair from beginning to end. According to their testimony, and so far as the Court is able to observe, they were impartial, the conduct of this officer was not only justifiable but deserving of commendation. The complainant is malicious."

Four hundred pages of testimony were taken in the investigation had by your Committee, and a large number of records and reports was examined, and the fullest opportunity offered to any person to submit any facts or evidence that would prove or tend to prove an assault or other violation of duty on the part of any officer of the Department. No such fact or evidence was offered. Certain counsel appeared before your Committee demanding the right to appear as the representatives of the colored people of the City of New York. Proper authority to appear in such capacity was not shown. It was known to your Committee that the neighborhood in which the trouble occurred was covered by agents of some of these attorneys seeking complainants; that the personal columns of newspapers were used for the purpose of inviting persons to submit their grievances to counsel. Your Committee did not feel justified in permitting itself to be used in the furtherance of such purposes, but did believe that the self-respecting, colored people of the City would permit themselves to be placed in the position of sustaining disturbances of the public peace. It may be that some innocent people, both colored and white, were injured during the progress of the trouble, but it should be borne in mind that a portion of the district in which the trouble occurred is thickly populated with a mixed class; that it calls for at all times extra vigilance on the part of the Police; that it is the duty of the Police to preserve the peace, and in unusual and extreme conditions they are required to act vigorously, and in so doing much must be left to the good judgment of the officer in immediate command at the place of disturbance. It was important to the citizens of this City as a whole that peace and order should be promptly restored and maintained, and from the evidence taken by your Committee, and the reports of the officers, this is shown to have been promptly accomplished. Every specific case of assault examined by the Courts and Grand Jury has resulted in the exoneration of the officers.

From the evidence taken by your Committee, and considering the action of the Courts in cases before them, your Committee find no facts which would justify it in recommending the preferment of charges against any officer.
