The minutes of the meeting held March 17, 1911, were approved as printed.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN. Sewer in Hamilton Avenue.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in Hamilton avenue, between Court and Bush streets, and an outlet sewer in Bush street, between Hamilton avenue and Court street, with objections thereto, which matter was adjourned for one week, at meeting of March 17, 1911. 
