Rectory of Saint Agnes' Church, 141 E. 43d St., November 18, 1911.

To the President of the Board of Aldermen, New York City, Borough of Man-
hattan:

Dear Sir—I am informed that an ordinance has passed the Board of Aldermen
authorizing E. 43d and E. 44th st., from Lexington ave., 60 feet east to 3d ave., to
be used as a hack stand. The passing of this ordinance hurriedly, without considera-
tion for the interests of the residents and without giving them an opportunity to
protest, is an outrage upon them and the neighborhood, as the following facts will
show:

Firstly, there is a large church in E. 43d st., near Lexington ave., and the only
free sidewalk to it from said avenue is the one now given to the hackmen. Their
hacks line the street and the hackmen line the sidewalk. A liquor store 50 feet long
has lately been opened at the very corner which the Aldermen have made a hack-
stand. Women and young girls have constantly complained to me of the conditions
of things in this neighborhood; your ordinance has made the condition intolerable.

Secondly, in E. 44th st., connected with the church in E. 43d st., is a parochial
school with 1,100 children. Your ordinance blocks the street to them, makes it filthy
and dangerous for them going to and from school.

Thirdly, the proper place for a hackstand is on the Grand Central ground, where
there is plenty of space. Why did the Aldermen not make the hackstand there, where
it properly belongs? What right have the Aldermen to put a nuisance in front of
the citizens' doors, because the Aldermen are afraid to insist that the Hudson River
Railroad shall give a place to the hackmen? Is it too late to repeal this ordinance?
If not I hope you will help to do it.

I am going to appeal to my people in the matter both in speech and in writing and
would like to avoid denouncing this outrage on our neighborhood, done for the
benefit of a rum shop and a few hackmen. The police always faithfully protected
us; but now the Aldermen have rendered them powerless. Respectfully,

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—Pursuant to the provisions of chapter seven hundred and one (701) of the
laws of 1911, I appointed the following officers in my office as Sheriff of the County

of Richmond on the 1st day of September, 1911: Under-Sheriff, Peter J. Finn; Deputy Sheriff, Edward Peterson; Counsel, Alfred V. Norton.

Under the said chapter seven hundred and one (701) of the Laws of 1911, the salaries of these officers were to be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The said Board has fixed the said salaries as follows: Under-Sheriff, \$1,500, Deputy Sheriff, \$1,000, Counsel, \$500.

City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, 3d Ave. and 177th St., Office of the President, November 15, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I forward herewith a sketch showing a street which connects Spuyten Duyvil parkway with Broadway and has on the official maps several names. It is called W. 244th st., from Spuyten Duyvil parkway to Waldo ave.; from this point it is called Waldo ave. for a distance of about 300 feet; and from Waldo ave. to Broadway it is called W. 242d st., and has a branch which is called Corlear ave. These streets were laid out originally at a width of 60 feet and are now widened to 100 feet, forming one continuous connection between Spuyten Duyvil parkway and Broadway.

In view of the above I would request that your Board legally name these streets under one name, "Spuyten Duyvil parkway." This street is in reality a continuation of said parkway as at present existing. Respectfully,

Office of the Sheriff, Queens County, County Court House, Long Island City, November 17, 1911.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, New York City, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—The plumbing system in the Queens County Jail and Administration Building has suddenly become in such a condition as to cause unsanitary conditions to arise.

A major portion of the water pipes in the Administration Building have bursted, causing a continuous flow of water through the walls and ceiling of said building, and considerable damage.

The outpour is so strong as to deprive the offices in the County Court House adjoining of a sufficient supply of water, so much so that the County Judge of Queens County has served an order on me directing the immediate repair of the plumbing (a copy of which order is herewith enclosed).

In view of the foregoing facts, I most respectfully request that your honorable Board recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under section 188 of the Charter, an authorization to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of five hundred dollars to meet the costs of the immediate repairing of the plumbing system in the Queens County Jail and Administration Building. District Attorney's Office, Queens County, Long Island City, November 18, 1911. Hon. P. J. SCULLY, Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—I respectfully request that a resolution be presented to the Board of Aldermen at its next meeting, pursuant to section 56 of the New York Charter, creating the position of Confidential Investigator to the District Attorney of Queens County, at a salary of five dollars per diem.

There has been such a position in this office for upwards of 12 years, the incumbent being paid at a per diem compensation at the above rate from the contingent fund in this office. This has been done up to August 1 of this year, when the matter was taken up with the office of the Comptroller, and it was then found that the position had never been created pursuant to the provisions of the Charter, although the incumbent had been paid regularly.

I always understood that the position had been created either by the Board of Supervisors before consolidation, but I cannot find any minutes of that Board covering the matter, or by the Board of Aldermen after consolidation and before my incumbency to this office.

The present incumbent has been performing the services of this position since August 1 without pay. I would therefore request that this position be created as of August 1 of this year.

This position is necessary in view of the fact that heretofore this office has had a detail of three Policemen, which has been discontinued several months now; but we have no County Detective attached to this office, the only employees here, outside the legal staff and Stenographers, being three Process Servers.

Gentlemen—On November 14, 1911, the Secretary to the Mayor requested the establishment in the Office of the Mayor, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the following grades of positions:

Secretary to the Mayor	1	\$6,500 00

Four of the grades are for increases in compensation, as follows:

Robert Adamson, Secretary to the Mayor, from \$6,000 to \$6,500 per annum. Mr. Adamson was appointed on January 1, 1910, at the present rate.

Philip J. Kohler, Assistant Secretary, from \$3,000 to \$3,100 per annum. Mr. Kohler was appointed on February 1, 1910, at the present rate.

John J. Glennon, Executive Clerk, \$2,100 to \$2,250 per annum. Mr. Glennon was appointed on March 19, 1906, at \$1,500 per annum. On April 1, 1906, he was increased to \$1,800, and on June 16, 1908, to the present rate.

Arthur H. Allen, Telephone Operator, from \$900 to \$1,050 per annum. Mr. Allen was appointed on May 10, 1910, at the present rate.

The total yearly increase of \$900 for the four positions is to be provided by decreasing the compensation of the position of Confidential Stenographer from \$3,000 to \$2,100 per annum. This position is now vacant.

The proposed establishment is for rates of compensation included in the 1912 Budget, as approved by your Board.

We recommend that the request be granted by the adoption of the attached resolution.

Department of Docks and Ferries, City of New York, Pier "A," North River, November 18, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—An examination of the south rack in the southerly ferry slip at the St. George terminal, in the Borough of Richmond, shows the same in need of reconstruction. The estimated cost of the work is fixed at about \$6,235, of which about \$3,200 represents labor.

In view of the constant use of the ferry terminal, it is impracticable to reconstruct the south rack of the south slip under a contract, as the property could not be turned over absolutely to a contractor; and the great amount of interference that would result by reason of this constant use of the slip would make the work under a contract most expensive. The material required in effecting the reconstruction is now available in the Department's stores.

I request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen authorizing this Department to do the work otherwise than by contract, that is, by the force of this Department. Yours respectfully,

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, 51 Chambers St., New York City:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith for the consideration of your honorable body the draft of a proposed ordinance to amend section 530 of article 14 of the Revised Ordinances, with relation to walks and bridges over gutters.

The purpose of the proposed amendment is to repeal the present section 530, which permits the construction of gutter bridges, and to insert in its place the new section to be also numbered 530, which shall provide for the lowering of the sidewalk for the purpose of providing a carriageway into the abutting premises.

The experience of the Bureau of Highways has been that these gutter bridges are constantly becoming clogged and prevent the flow of water into the sewer; furthermore, as soon as permission for a gutter bridge is allowed the tenant of the abutting premises immediately begins blocking the sidewalk by backing wagons across the same and leaving them there while they are being loaded with merchandise for shipment.

The original purpose of the gutter bridge was merely to make it possible for a carriage to drive over the sidewalk into the adjoining premises. It was never intended for the purpose to which it is now being put. I am of the opinion that the elimination of the gutter bridges and the substitution of a carriageway leading directly into a yard or loading station on the adjacent property will make it possible for us to prevent wagons being permanently stationed on the sidewalk, and will at the same time relieve the difficulty experienced through the blocking up of the gutter bridges.

The adoption of the ordinance is therefore urged. Respectfully,

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 530 of article 14 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 530 of article 14 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897 with relation to walks and bridges over gutters is hereby repealed and the following section substituted:

"Section 1. Section 530—It shall be lawful for any person, firm or corporation who so desires to lower the curb and change the grade of a sidewalk in front of any building owned by such person, firm or corporation, for the purpose of providing a carriageway across such sidewalk, upon complying with the following conditions, namely:

"First—Application shall be made in writing by the owner to the President of the Borough within which such premises are located.

"Second—In consideration of the granting of such permit, the Borough President having jurisdiction is hereby authorized to charge a fee for such privilege to cover all expenses in connection with the inspection of the alteration of such sidewalk and its ultimate restoration to original grade; and to make such rules for its proper care and cleaning as he deems desirable.

"Third—Every such carriageway shall be constructed under the supervision and subject to the direction of the President of the Borough having jurisdiction, and on condition that upon failure to comply with all the terms of the permit the privilege may be revoked, and the sidewalk restored to its original grade at the expense of the person, firm or corporation to whom the permit was granted, or of the grantee then having title to the abutting property.

"Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately."

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan, N. Y.:

Sir—Pursuant to provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby respectfully make application to the honorable Board of Aldermen for permission to award, without public advertising, certain additional work, shown on plan of the Zebra House, now being constructed in the Zoological Park, the estimated cost of which additional work is \$1,565.

This proposed work is for the purpose of restoring several desirable features included in the original plan of the Zebra House, but which were excluded from the revised plan owing to the fact that the architects were of the opinion that the amount of money appropriated would not suffice to complete the building upon the original design.

The plan sent herewith will show distinctly what is required in order to restore this building to the original design, and the amount named, \$1,565, is that which the contractor, who is at present erecting the Zebra House, has agreed to accept in full payment for making the change, which sum is, in the opinion of the architects and our Chief Engineer, a fair and equitable one.

I transmit herewith a letter of Dr. William T. Hornaday, Director of the Zoological Park, which fully explains the entire situation. It would be decidedly inadvisable to have this work let to any person other than the present contractor, as it would undoubtedly cause confusion and delay in the construction of building.

New York Zoological Park, 185th St. and Southern Boulevard, New York, September 7, 1911.

Hon. THOMAS J. HIGGINS, Park Commissioner, Borough of The Bronx, Claremont Park, New York City:

Dear Sir—I am directed by the Executive Committee of the Zoological Society to apply, through you, to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for the passage of a resolution authorizing the expenditure of \$1,565 for the placing of an ornamental terra cotta cornice on the Zebra House in place of the severely plain cornice that appears on the architects' plans now in the hands of the contractor. The improvement desired is shown in the right hand half of the architects' drawing submitted herewith, and the plain cornice as called for by the contract now under way is shown in the left half.

In making this application, we respectfully point out:

First—The appropriation made by the Board of Estimate for the Zebra House was \$36,000.

Second—The architects' original plans, showing an ornamental cornice on the building such as the Society desires, and also various other desirable features afterward omitted, led the architects to estimate the cost of the building at \$45,000.

Third—On account of the estimate being in excess of the money available, the Zoological Society required the architects to redraw the plans, and after retaining all the absolute necessities of the building, strip it of all the ornamentations that originally were designed to make the building in keeping with similar buildings in the Zoological Park.

Fourth—On May 11, the lowest bid for the construction of the Zebra House was only \$25,181, for which a contract has been made with Joseph Balaban, and under which the building is now in actual course of construction.

Fifth—At this date there remains in the Zebra House appropriation of \$36,000 an unexpended balance of \$10,819, of which only a small portion can legally be used for architects' fees and small extras.

Sixth—The erection of this building without the ornamental cornice originally designed will render the building severely plain and not at all up to the architectural standard of similar buildings in the Zoological Park.

The Zoological Society is sincerely desirous of restoring to this building the most necessary of the ornamental features that were shown from the plans in order to bring the building within the appropriation available.

Inasmuch as a considerable sum of money in excess of the cost of the building as now in the contract has once been appropriated by the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, the Zoological Society respectfully requests authority to expend from the excess in the appropriation for the Zebra House, and in accordance with the forms of law governing such cases, the sum of \$1,565 for the purposes of placing on the building an ornamental terra cotta cornice, as shown in the drawing submitted herewith. The cost of this improvement has been estimated by the builder, Mr. Joseph Balaban, at \$1,565. In making this application we respectfully point out that in case this request is granted, the utmost expedition is necessary, in order to secure the desired improvement in the building before it is too late to include it in the construction. The foundations of the building are now complete, and the walls are going up. Respectfully submitted,

Fire Department of The City of New York, Office of the Commissioner, November 21, 1911.

To the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to request that you authorize me to purchase in the open market, and otherwise than by contract at public letting, fire apparatus, automobiles and equipment for the use of the Fire Department in the various Boroughs in The City of New York to an amount not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$695,180, that sum being a part of the amount given to my Department by the Corporate Stock Budgets of 1910 and 1911 for the purchase of new apparatus in the various Boroughs.

Some of the reasons why I ask that I be authorized to purchase in the open market and otherwise than by contract at public letting are as follows:

First—Because of the unusual character of the apparatus required, namely, apparatus so designed as to meet the severe requirements of the Fire Department service, which calls for fast-moving machines carrying great weight over miscellaneous pavements and roads.

Second—Because of the danger to be apprehended and delays due to awarding contracts to the lowest bidder, who might prove to be unreliable and irresponsible.

Third—Because of the danger and delay due to nonconformity to the terms of the specifications.

Fourth—Because of the danger due to delay in giving contracts to firms with plants of insufficient capacity to turn out machines fast enough to meet the needs of the Department.

Fifth—Because the difference in prices of two pieces of fire apparatus built to do the same work is no measure of the difference in quality if built by different manufacturers.

As we are now building thirty-five new fire houses, it is extremely necessary that we immediately begin to make our arrangements for the purchase and delivery of apparatus to properly equip the same, in order that it shall be ready at the time of completion of the new fire houses.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen, deeming such course to be in the public interest, hereby authorizes the Fire Commissioner to purchase in the open market and otherwise than by contract at public letting fire apparatus, automobiles and equipment for the use of the Fire Department in the various Boroughs of The City of New York to an amount not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of six hundred and ninety-five thousand one hundred and eighty dollars (\$695,180).

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 4823.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 6, 1911, the Budget for 1912, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 31, 1911, respectfully

REPORTS:

Section 226 of the Charter limits the authority or power of the Board of Aldermen with respect to the Annual Budget. The Board may reduce any item or items of appropriation contained therein, but may not increase any appropriation or change any of the terms or conditions fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under which the appropriations are to be expended. Although with regard to the numerous appropriations made by the City throughout the year, which are met by the issue of corporate stock, the Board is given six weeks to investigate and exercise the function of approval or disapproval, the time fixed by the Charter for the consideration by the Board of Aldermen of the Annual Budget is limited to twenty days, and this time includes holidays and Sundays intervening, notwithstanding that the amounts involved in the Budget aggregate more than three times the amounts usually appropriated and provided by the issue of corporate stock.

The Committee has given careful consideration to the suggestions and arguments presented at the hearing afforded citizens and taxpayers. It fully realizes the necessity of proper and sufficient appropriations to the various departments and branches of the City Government in order that their functions may be properly performed. On the other hand, it also realizes the seriousness of the situation confronting the rent and tax payers of the City in the large increases from year to year in the Annual Budgets and the resultant taxation. For these reasons the members of the Committee feel that they would be neglectful of their duties as representatives of the people of this City if they did not exert every effort towards economy and exercise their full authority in that direction.

The Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. Code No. 77—Interest on Revenue Bonds and Revenue Bills. \$3,500,000 00

This appropriation is made to provide for interest on loans made to the City in anticipation of the collection of the annual taxes. The loans of necessity are very extensive, and are made to carry on the business of the City from January until the taxes become payable. The amount appropriated for this purpose in the Budget for 1911 is \$4,500,000.

The Legislature of 1911 enacted a statute providing for the payment of the annual real estate taxes in two installments. The entire tax on personal property and the first installment of one-half the real estate tax are made payable May 1 and the second half thereof on November 1. This act takes effect with the taxes for 1912.

The Comptroller, in an explanatory pamphlet on the subject of financial legislation affecting The City of New York, passed during the session of 1911, says: "The plan of collecting taxes semi-annually alone will at least cut in half former revenue bond borrowings, thus saving the City \$2,000,000 annually in interest charges." It would seem, therefore, that this appropriation might have been reduced from \$4,500,000 appropriated for 1911 to \$2,500,000 in 1912. The amount to be inserted in the Budget for 1912 may with safety be fixed at \$3,000,000, instead of \$3,500,000, a reduction of \$500,000. This allows ample margin for possible overestimate of saving made by the Comptroller.

2. Code No. 87a—Deficiency on January 1, 1911, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for (chapter 209, Laws of 1906) \$10,000,000 00

These deficiencies, as shown in detail in the annual statements thereof submitted by the Comptroller, are made up of:

(a) Discounts allowed on payments of taxes in advance of penalty date.

Prior to 1908 taxpayers were allowed a discount on the payment of their taxes during the month of October, but this practice no longer prevails, as the statute under which it was authorized has been repealed.

(b) Cancellation of taxes.

These cancellations are due to reductions in assessed valuations of real and personal property by the Courts and the Tax Commissioners, etc., due to overvaluations, errors, exemptions, etc., and will continue to occur from year to year.

(c) Uncollected personal taxes deemed to be uncollectible.

The deficiencies arising from this source will continue to embarrass the City until taxes on personal property are abolished.

(d) Deductions from special franchise taxes, pursuant to section 48 of the General Tax Law.

These deductions represent payments made to the City for rent, license fees, etc., by corporations holding franchises from the City. Under the terms of their franchises they are required to pay percentages on gross receipts, fixed sums for licenses, rentals, etc. These payments have been construed by the Courts as payments in the nature of a tax, and, under the provisions of section 48, above referred to, are required to be deducted from the special franchise taxes levied against such corporations as payments thereon. The corporations must be given credit for these payments as payments on account of their special franchise taxes. These deductions represent cash payments to the City, which the City has the benefit of. The amount of these deductions are not deficiencies in the product of taxes, and should not be included in the Budget as deficiencies in the collection of the taxes. They are not deficiencies, but payments. The cash thus received is either deposited to the credit of the Sinking Fund or to the fund

known as the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. If deposited to the credit of the former fund, it finds its way as a surplus into the General Fund. Thus, on the one hand, this cash is used to reduce taxation, and, on the other, an amount equal thereto is attempted to be put in the Budget as a deficit. It certainly cannot be a cash asset and a deficiency at the same time. If this item be added to the Budget as a deficiency, the Budget is made to appear larger than it really is, thus creating discontent and unjust criticism. There is no such deficiency. A deficiency is made to appear only by false bookkeeping.

The statement of deficiencies submitted by the Comptroller shows a total of \$12,721,807.58, of which \$10,000,000 was included in the Budget. The items included in such statement as such deductions from special franchise taxes aggregate \$7,452,264.88, which, deducted from the total deficiency of \$12,721,807.58, leaves a balance of \$5,269,542.70, which is the total true deficiency.

Another item included in the statement of deficiencies is that of uncollected personal taxes of the levy of 1910, deemed to be uncollectible, amounting to \$1,982,175.96. This is an anticipated deficiency. The amount of it cannot be known until the process of collection is complete, which will not be for some months hence. It has not been customary to put this deficiency in in advance, and it should be deducted from the Budget.

If the recommendation of your Committee be approved, the deficiency item in the Budget for 1912 will, therefore, be reduced to \$3,287,366.74, instead of \$10,000,000. This wipes out the entire true deficiency. A false deficiency has been created by erroneous bookkeeping, as we have shown above, namely, by setting down credits resting on actual payments on franchise taxes as deficiencies.

3. County Budgets—State taxes levied in pursuance of section 174, chapter

62, of the Consolidated Laws of 1909, and chapter 868, Laws of 1911—

For several years no direct State taxes have been imposed in this State. Section 1595 of the Charter provides: "It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the state annually to transmit to the comptroller of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, for levy and collection by said city, a statement of the amount of tax for state purposes to be paid by the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively. The amount, of which a statement is thus transmitted by the comptroller of the state to the comptroller of said city, shall be levied upon and collected from the entire property within the territorial limits of said city in like manner as other expenses of said city."

When State taxes were heretofore imposed they were included in the City Budget, to be levied without regard to County lines, and that is what the said provision of the Charter requires.

The Committee recommends the transferring of these items from the several County Budgets in which they are included to the City Budget, where they belong.

Concerning the Budget allowances to cover the administrative cost of the several departments, and any allowances for new projects or experiments, we are clear in our opinion that the increasing and unavoidable financial demands upon the City require that a definite rule of treatment be laid down and followed. Such a rule we have observed in the recommendations made herein, namely, that increased appropriations, except where they are mandatory, or are to be used in the protection and safeguarding of the lives, health and property of citizens, as in the Health, Fire and Street Cleaning Departments and in the hospitals, or for the care of the poor, as in the Charities Department, and appropriations for embarking upon new and elaborate undertakings, be stricken out of the Budget. With a very few minor exceptions, where special reasons were shown, we have adhered to this rule. We feel that the rent and tax payers insist that careful and discriminating reductions and eliminations be made. This is not a year when the City should spend the large sum of \$220,000 for such a purpose as "budgetary publicity and the standardization of salaries, wages and grades," or \$85,000 "for the restoration of the City Hall." The City, among its 60,000-odd employees ought to be able to find plenty of men capable of doing the work of standardizing salaries, wages and grades. The Commissioner of Accounts is able to do this work, and do it well, with his large staff. It is easy to get a committee of competent citizens to serve in the matter without pay. We can afford to wait for a more favorable year for the restoration of the City Hall. For the same reasons we believe that those heads of departments not engaged in work affecting the preservation of human life and property should get along with their present force. We have recommended striking out increases where they occur, in conformity with this policy. It must be borne in mind that a very large part of the increases made in the Budget is mandatory and cannot be touched by this Board. These mandatory items include the automatic increases in the pay of Policemen, Teachers and Firemen; increases in the Police Pension Fund, and increases for the extension of the City's lighting system, which, while not legally mandatory, is made so by the force of conditions.

Because of an effort to tie the hands of the Fire Commissioner and lodge in the hands of some members of the Board of Estimate powers which do not belong to them, we would recommend disapproving the appropriation for the creation of the new Fire Prevention Bureau, if this could be done without endangering the lives and property of the City. This appropriation is made with the condition attached to it that the Fire Commissioner is to be allowed to expend it only as he may be directed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. We cannot, however, strike out this appropriation without leaving the City deprived of its customary safeguards against fire, since a new law has only recently gone into effect concentrating the powers of fire prevention in the hands of the Fire Commissioner, subject to the Mayor, and if he were left without the means to comply with this law the City would be exposed to peril. Reluctantly, and disapproving as strongly as possible of the conditions attached to it by the majority in the Board of Estimate, we feel compelled to allow this appropriation to stand, even with its obnoxious terms, which we are competently assured are illegal.

We will not undertake to give in detail in this report the changes we recommend. These are all given, with the identifying code numbers and Budget lines, in the accompanying resolution, which we present for your adoption. We refer here only to the more important changes.

We recommend striking out the appropriation, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and reading:

1390. Contingencies and Expenses, "including expert service for the work of budgetary appropriation, budgetary publicity and the standardization of salaries, wages and grades" \$220,000 00

We also recommend striking out the appropriation of \$5,000 for a Consulting Architect for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

We believe that had our time not been so limited we would be able to recommend larger reductions in the appropriations for the Board of Education. We recommend that the appropriation for Special Teachers in the day elementary schools, amounting to \$651,003.14, be reduced to the sum appropriated for this purpose in 1911, namely, \$500,000. This means a reduction of \$151,003.14. There is a wide difference of opinion concerning the usefulness of these Special Teachers. The schools will not suffer if their number is not increased. We understand that Superintendent Maxwell has stated that these special studies could be done away with entirely within the next five years. Nevertheless we here find the appropriation for them increased by \$151,000. It is time to consider whether this whole item should not be eliminated from future Budgets.

We also recommend the reduction of \$50,000 in the appropriation for supplies and materials for the different Boroughs. It is understood that this reduction is not to apply to the purchase of school books.

We note that, whereas the increase over last year's appropriations for the departments and bureaus to which the Mayor appoints the heads is only a little over 4 per cent, the like increase in the case of the Borough Presidents is nearly 12 per cent, it being over 17 per cent. in the case of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

In relation to the appropriation for the Borough President of Manhattan, the Committee believes that substantial reduction may be made, and it recommends that the proposed allowance be changed as follows, "Repairing block and asphalt sheet pavement," from \$525,000 to \$400,000. The 1911 allowance for this purpose was \$317,000, and revenue bonds to the amount of \$215,000 were granted in the latter half of the present year. The work for which the bond issue was made should certainly carry well into 1912. "Repairs and improvements to public buildings, baths and comfort stations," from \$197,525 to \$75,000. The 1911 allowance was \$60,940, and this proposed appropriation will give a margin of \$14,000 for emergent repairs.

Errors in addition have been made in the appropriation for the Department of Street Cleaning, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and in the footings in the supporting schedule giving the totals for The City of New York and the Counties of New York and Kings, but the Committee has not undertaken to change these, believing that the Finance Department can take care of this matter in its bookkeeping division.

The total reductions in the Budget which we recommend amount to \$8,151,193.38. Resolved, That the Budget for 1912, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same is hereby reduced and amended as follows:

1. BUDGET FOR 1912.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, the total amount appropriated being one hundred and eighty-nine million two hundred and ten thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars and thirty-three cents (\$189,210,950.33), divided as follows:

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business and to meet the debt charges of said City for the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, one hundred and sixty-eight million nine hundred and eighty-seven thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$168,987,796.25).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1911, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, ten million dollars (\$10,000,000).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and to meet a direct State Tax levied upon the said counties for the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, ten million two hundred and twenty-three thousand one hundred and fifty-four dollars and eighty cents (\$10,223,154.08).

Resolved, That, this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—(a). That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Regular Employees."

(b). That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."

(c). That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees."

(d). That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriations or schedules than "Wages, Temporary Employees."

(e). That no transfers shall be made from appropriations classified as "Vehicular Transportation," to any appropriation other than the one classified as "Vehicular Transportation."

(f). That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees" or "Compensation" to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees" or "Compensation."

(g). That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service."

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees," "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Regular Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," "Fees" or "Compensation," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a). In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

All appropriations made in this Budget for the use of charitable institutions are hereby declared subject to the following conditions, and the acceptance of a payment of money made from the City treasury, in pursuance of these appropriations, shall be deemed to be an acceptance by such institutions of the conditions under which the appropriations are herein made:

1. The accounts and records of all institutions shall be so kept as to show the receipts of the institution from all sources, and all its expenditures, and shall in other respects be in such form as the Comptroller of The City of New York may require, except that a record shall be maintained in which expenses shall be recorded under the following classification:

A. Expenses incurred in the operation of the institution as follows:

- Food stuffs.
- Clothing.
- Linen and bedding.
- Fuel.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Educational supplies.
- Other supplies.
- Salaries and wages.
- Professional services.
- Light.
- Forage and care of animals.
- Telephone.
- Printing, stationery and advertising.
- Postage and telegrams.
- Hospital and sanitarium charges.
- Funerals.
- Recreation expense.
- Miscellaneous expense.
- Expense for boarded-out children.

B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:

- Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
- Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.

All accounts of institutions shall, so far as practicable, be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the following appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for the recurring expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by the Commissioner as public charges. Expenses for care, support and maintenance as herein used shall be taken to mean all expenses incurred by the institution for food, clothing, attendance upon, medical service to, and other expenses properly incurred in behalf of inmates committed or accepted by the City, as shown in the classification set forth in Condition 1 governing these appropriations. Such expenses shall not include any expense incurred for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, nor insurance, taxes, rent, interest on loans or mortgages, or repayments of the principal thereof. Recurring expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors, and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving payments of public moneys in pursuance of appropriations made in this Budget and all their books of record and all their accounts relating to all institutional funds, from whatsoever source received, shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Department of Public Charities shall be deemed to have the right to visit and inspect any institution receiving City funds at any time whatsoever and at all proper times have access to all the records of such institution.

4. All institutions shall in each year, at a time to be designated by the Comptroller, submit in a manner and form prescribed by him, a statement of their financial operations, and they shall state specifically in their printed annual reports the amount of money received by them from the City treasury.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made to private charitable institutions upon a per capita basis of payment for services to inmates, the bills of the institutions for such services shall show the names of the inmates and the period of service for which payment is claimed, and no payment shall be made for any inmate who has not been accepted by the Commissioner of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim for services rendered committed inmates by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this Budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. All child-caring institutions shall maintain for each inmate accepted as a public charge by the Commissioner of Charities a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools of The City of New York.

All such institutions shall examine and make a record of the physical condition of each of their inmates for whose care or education City money is received, at least once in every six months, noting the presence or absence of defects, as stated in the preceding paragraph of this condition.

12. All child-caring institutions shall submit quarterly to the Comptroller and to the Commissioner of Charities, and oftener if required, a sworn statement of the dietary actually employed for the feeding of their inmates for the preceding quarterly period, together with a statement of the approximate quantities of each kind of food allowed each inmate.

13. Each institution shall submit to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of all persons, for whose care City or county funds are received, within twenty-four hours after their arrival at or discharge from the institution.

14. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

Gentlemen—On June 22, 1911, the Commissioner of the Fire Department requested the establishment in his Department of the position of Chief Medical Officer, at \$6,000 per annum, for one incumbent. In connection therewith we report as follows:

Chapter 392, Laws of 1911, amending section 740 of the Greater New York Charter, which became a law on June 21, 1911, provides as follows:

"Sec. 740. The rank and salaries of officers of the fire department shall be as follows: * * * battalion chiefs, whose annual salary shall be not more than three thousand three hundred dollars; medical officers, whose rank and salary shall be the same as that of battalion chiefs, one of whom shall be appointed chief medical officer, whose annual salary shall be not more than six thousand dollars. * * *"

There are eleven Medical Officers in the Department, at the rate of \$3,300 per annum, and distributed as follows: Manhattan, 4; The Bronx, 1; Richmond, 1; Brooklyn, 3; Queens, 2. To comply with the provisions of the law, the Commissioner proposed to appoint the Chief Medical Officer to have general supervision of the medical work of the Department, and requests the rate of \$6,000 per annum as the maximum amount fixed by the law. It seems that \$3,600 would be a reasonable compensation for the position.

Section 2. The Commissioner of Police of The City of New York is hereby authorized within his discretion to divert all heavy, noisy vehicular traffic from the immediate block or blocks upon which public schools are located during the period of the day between 8.45 a. m. and 3.15 p. m.

Section 3. The several Borough Presidents are hereby authorized within their discretion to repave the streets immediately contiguous to the public schools with wooden block or sheet asphalt pavement or such other noise lessening pavement as may meet with their approval.

Section 4. Any person guilty of making any unnecessary noises or driving at a speed faster than a walk or violating any traffic rule or regulation of the Police Department on any of the streets, avenues or thoroughfares which have hereunder been designated as "Public School Streets" and for which such warning signs as described in section 1 hereof have been erected, shall upon conviction thereof by a City Magistrate or upon a confession of guilt, be fined, in a sum not exceeding ten dollars (\$10), and upon failure to pay such fine, be imprisoned in the City Prison for a term not to exceed ten (10) days.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, Widening the roadway 6 feet on the east side and 4 feet on the west side of Central Park West, taking this much from both sides will leave a clear space on the east side walk of 21 feet for pedestrians and trees that must be replaced, which seems quite sufficient for the purpose without injuring the value of the Central Park nor marring its beauty in any respect. Central Park is accessible only at 86th and 96th st. The widening of the roadway as suggested will make a thoroughfare of 110 feet instead of 100 feet, and there is no doubt that property values will be increased, and

Whereas, The continually increasing traffic on this thoroughfare and the safeguarding of both vehicles and pedestrians demands that this much needed improvement be considered and that the rails of the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company be replaced so that if the improvement is made they will be in the centre of the roadway, thereby avoiding many accidents and the immense traffic on the roadway can move readily and without interference and blockades which frequently occur may be avoided, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize an issue of corporate stock in pursuance of the provision of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter in a sufficient sum for the purpose of providing means for widening the roadway of Central Park West, between 59th st. and 110th st., Borough of Manhattan, and other work in connection therewith, such as asphaltting the pavement, curbing, replanting trees and repaving the easterly sidewalk.

Quarterly Report.

During the Quarter ending June 30, 1911, the mechanics assigned to this Bureau have been kept continuously busy making repairs and alterations in the various buildings under the supervision of this Bureau. Among the most extensive jobs were painting the Town Hall, Jamaica, and altering the first floor, west side, of said Hall in order to provide a courtroom for use of the Fourth District Magistrates' Court. Extensive repairs have been made to the electrical equipment in the various buildings in order to comply with the requirements of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The grounds adjoining the public buildings were put in good condition and flower beds made where practicable. The Free Floating Bath, located at the foot of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Long Island City, was placed in commission on June 15th, and, although the location is not the most desirable, the average daily attendance was 348.

The Interior Bath located in 8th street, Long Island City, is well attended. During the heated term the bathers will frequently exceed 1,000 per day.

The Cleaning Force have performed their labors efficiently and kept the buildings and offices in a cleanly condition. All office furniture and supplies that were considered necessary were furnished upon requisition.

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the work done under my charge during the months of April, May and June, 1911:

The Topographical Bureau is charged with the following duties:
To make topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans, and profiles and reports in connection with the following work, viz:

The preparation of a design of a street system in those parts of the Borough of Queens where a design is not yet adopted, and making surveys and maps showing changes in adopted street systems and grades.

The actual demarcation on the ground by monuments of the lines of the adopted avenues, streets, etc., and the resetting of monuments where necessary.

The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions and profiles for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of Acquiring Title by The City to Avenues, Streets, etc.

Filing maps and records of all matter pertaining to the work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau.

Making reports of the physical condition and the legal status of streets upon petitions for legal opening and for improvement.

Making examinations, maps and reports upon miscellaneous matters referred to the Engineer in charge.

Work Done by the Field Force:
Obtaining location of street lines for tentative map purposes in various portions of the Borough.

Establishing additional bench marks.

Making additional ties between triangulation towers and traverse monuments in the vicinity of same.

Obtaining miscellaneous additional topographical survey data.

Final drilling of monuments in the Laurel Hill section of the Borough.

Accurately referencing, resetting and placing covers on monuments as required, and upon some of the alterations noted below.

Alterations or additions engaged upon (either wholly or partly completed) as follows: Maspeth (sections 17 and 18), Barnett street, Proctor street, etc., Glendale, Old Cooper avenue (Cypress Hills), Borough Line at Cypress Hills, Hancock place, Card avenue, Grout avenue, etc., Woodside avenue, Forest avenue, Walnut Court, etc. (Richmond Hill), Harvard avenue (Jamaica), Flushing avenue, between Creek street and the Borough Line, Martin street and Zeidler street, Henry Street (Winfield), L. I. R. R. (Flushing), North Side Branch, L. I. R. R. (Flushing). Port Wash-

ington Branch, Old Lawrence street (Flushing), Broadway (Flushing), from Prince to Collins streets, Richmond Hill (north of Hillside avenue and east of L. I. R. R.), Homer Lee avenue (Jamaica), Lexington avenue and Scott street in Richmond Hill, Meadow street at Metropolitan avenue.

Final traversing in Ridgewood (general alteration), Rockaway boulevard, North Beach section, North Woodside section and Broadway (Third Ward).

The following triangulation stations were tied in: Van Siclen Tower, Metropolitan, Woodhaven School, Jager, Newtown Heights.

Additional street locations and levels by transit, level and plane table, supplementing the topographical survey of the Borough, were taken in Queens, Creedmoor, South Jamaica, Springfield, Far Rockaway and Jamaica Estates. Completed surveys in the matter of legally opening the following streets, which surveys were begun during the last quarter: Ashland street, Cypress Hills Cemetery to Myrtle avenue; North Curtis avenue to Metropolitan avenue; Birch street to Spruce street. Corona avenue, Hampton street to Rodman street. Penelope street, Woodhaven avenue to Juniper avenue.

Completed surveys in the matter of legally opening the following streets, the surveys having been begun during the quarter: Calamus avenue, from Maurice avenue to Woodhaven avenue; Jay avenue, from Willow avenue to Mueller street; Ditmars avenue, from 43d street to Astoria avenue; 43d street, from Ditmars avenue to bulkhead line; 50th street, from Astoria avenue to Polk avenue; 51st street, from bulkhead line to 100 feet south of Polk avenue; Toledo street, from South Railroad avenue to Queens boulevard; Fowler street, from Lawrence street westerly 1,730 feet; Blossom avenue, from Lawrence street to Saull street; Saull street, from Blossom avenue to Cherry street; Cherry street, from Saull street to Colden avenue; Colden avenue, from Hillside avenue to 75 feet northerly of Jacinth street.

Surveys in the matter of legally opening the following streets were begun, but not finished: Milton street, from Flushing avenue to Grand street; Fresh Pond road, from Myrtle avenue to 200 feet southerly of Anna place; Newtown road, from Jackson to 13th avenue; Chicago street, from Corona avenue to Queens boulevard; Parcell street, from Gay street to Corona avenue.

Levels for profiles were completed (and started during the quarter) in the following of the above-mentioned streets: Ashland street, Corona avenue, Penelope street, Calamus avenue, Jay avenue, Ditmars avenue, 43d street, 50th street, 51st street, Toledo avenue, Fowler street, Blossom avenue, Saull street, Cherry street, Colden avenue and Milton street.

Map establishing the lines and grades of Redfern avenue (Remsen avenue) Fifth Ward, from Carlton to McNeil avenue. Map establishing the lines and grades of Union street and Bowne avenue, from Marston avenue to Amity street (Third Ward). Map establishing the street lines and grades of a portion of final section No. 76. Map establishing the lines and grades of Atlantic Boulevard (Fifth Ward), from Grand View to Channel avenue.

Three copies of portions of final sections were prepared and transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for filing purposes:

Map establishing the grades of Rockaway road, from the Conduit to the City line.

Map establishing the lines and grades of Saull street, from Bank to Cherry street. Map establishing a street system and grades of that portion of the Fifth Ward known as "Rockaway Park." Final sections Nos. 10, 39 and 40 have been completed. Final sections Nos. 21, 62, 63 and 9 have been almost completed. Final sections Nos. 8, 6 and 318 are in various stages of completion. Monument sheets Nos. 17, 24, 25, 31, 32, 106, 107, 118 and 119 were corrected. Work has been done on the following monument sheets: 5, 6, 11, 12, 27, 82, 95, 120, 132, 140.

The following monument sheets were started: Nos. 611, 616, 617, 623, 624, 630, 631. Tentative map of Jamaica was completed and one print sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval. Alterations were made in the Aqueduct map, and one print sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval. Tentative map of Flushing was started. Final section No. 45 was prepared for photolithography, and two proofs inspected. The house numbering map of Maspeth was corrected and ten prints of the same distributed. Alteration map establishing the lines and grades of Alden avenue, from Cooper street to L. I. R. R. was prepared. Map reducing the width of 48th street, from Polk to Burnside avenue, was prepared. Profiles of the following divisions of L. I. R. R. were prepared to accompany the Jamaica tentative map: Main line, from Van Wyck avenue to Farmers avenue; Montauk division, from main line to Farmers avenue, and Old Southern R. R., from main line to Farmers

avenue. One blue-print showing the lines and elevations of Broadway, from Cemetery Lane to the City line, was prepared and sent to Mr. Weinberger, Engineer-in-charge of Highways. The total mileage of pavements in the Borough on March 31 was 132,932 miles, of which 488 miles were trap rock, 282 miles medina block, 38,404 miles granite block, 38,737 miles sheet asphalt, 49,338 miles asphalt block, 3,397 miles wood block and 741 miles brick; 1,545 miles iron slag pavement and 135 miles macadam pavement.

The total amount paved during the quarter ending March 31, 1911, was 347 miles. During the quarter ending March 31, 1911, 8,082.8 feet of vitrified pipe sewer from 12 inches to 30 inches in diameter, or 1.531 miles; and 95 linear feet of brick sewers, 33 inches in diameter, or 0.018 miles; wooden stave, 4 feet 9 inches in diameter, or 2 linear feet; concrete, 36 inches to 9 feet 3 inches by 8 inches in diameter, or 1,300 linear feet, or .246 miles, were built, making the mileage of the sewerage system 1.795 miles; 13 basins were also built, which makes a total of 3,365 basins connected with the sewerage system.

There were 19 contracts completed during the quarter to the amount of \$267,065.21, and work is going on in connection with 40 contracts, amounting to \$2,307,865.02, on which \$599,583.72 in payments have been made.

There are 43 contracts, representing an estimated cost of \$956,868.90, either executed or being advertised.

A total of 43 plans and specifications were prepared during the quarter for contract construction work, consisting of regulating, grading, paving, repaving, sewers and receiving basins.

Twenty-five assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors during the quarter.

The work in the Bureau of Subsurface Structure consisted in locating existing subsurface constructions to the number of 632, and measuring 102,928 linear feet of transit and offset lines.

Permits for openings in streets to the number of 1,777 were issued, and 502 permits for openings other than streets.

The total number of contracts entered into during the quarter was 28, apportioned among the Bureaus as follows:

Of the petitions considered 49 were adopted and resolutions forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The total estimated cost of the improvements forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was \$1,034,517.

During the quarter there were 128 violations of the building law for defective plumbing, 2 for defective elevators, 419 for defective construction and material, 431 for erecting and altering without permit and 199 for unsafe buildings. Notices were issued to remove violations of law to the number of 1,147; to remove unsafe buildings, 391, and to repair passenger elevators, 2.

Complaints to the number of 563 were received, and, upon investigation, were remedied, except in 398 instances, where complaints were unfounded.

Passenger elevators to the number of 115 were investigated and 2 were found not to be in compliance with the law.

The Building Bureau reports that during the quarter plans and specifications were filed to the number of 185 for 246 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$3,456,500.

Of the number of applications received, 60 were for other than frame dwelling houses, to cost less than \$20,000 each; 61 for frame dwellings, estimated at a total of \$282,100; 11 stores, at an estimated cost of less than \$15,000 each, to cost about \$33,100; 57 tenement houses, over \$15,000 each, to cost in the aggregate \$2,204,000; and 2 tenement houses, costing less than \$15,000 each, to be built for \$23,000.

There were 123 alterations to buildings; plans being filed amounting to an estimated cost of \$122,855. Work was begun on 225 new buildings during the quarter, and

there were completed in the same time 335, leaving 782 new buildings in progress. Alterations were commenced on 95 buildings; alterations completed on 105 buildings, leaving alterations on 164 buildings in progress. Respectfully,

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on July 6, 1911, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as September 21, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "Evening Mail" and the "Globe," newspapers designated by the Mayor and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to The New York Magnaphone and Music Company and the adequacy of the amount of compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The New York Magnaphone and Music Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The New York Magnaphone and Music Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this _____ day of _____ 1911 by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The New York Magnaphone and Music Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right or privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in the conduits under the streets and avenues within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan and that part of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River; such wires to connect only the premises of subscribers with the central stations of the Company and to be used for the purpose of maintaining a system whereby music and information in relation to matters of general interest may be distributed electrically from the central stations of the Company to two or more subscribers simultaneously and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The rights and privileges herein granted shall not be construed to in any way give the Company the right or privilege to engage in a business permitting communication between subscribers and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not in any way engage in a business which will permit communication between its subscribers or claim the right to do under this contract and the right and privilege herein and hereby granted and conferred; it being understood that this is not a grant to do a telephone business within the general accepted meaning of the term.

Second—The said right to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, without any privilege of renewal thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts,

if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying westerly of the Bronx River.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to The City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—The right and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires, electrical conductors and other property of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires, electrical conductors and other property, or any portion thereof, constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—Said wires, electrical conductors and other property shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction shall be commenced by the Company until written permits therefor have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits issued, such officials may also impose such conditions as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Eighth—All wires or other electrical conductors of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan or the portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and electrical conductors in such subways, and the City agrees to lease to the Company during the term of this contract such space as may be required for the business herein authorized.

Ninth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish its service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half (1/2) mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Tenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are used by the Company on the 30th day of September next preceding, and the streets and avenues in which the same are located, and also those which were put in during the preceding year.

Eleventh—The Company shall commence the operation of its system of distribution of music and matters of general interest, as herein authorized, within six (6) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and shall have in operation the apparatus for the delivery of such service at one thousand (1,000) points upon subscriber's premises within five (5) years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to install its apparatus and neces-

sary appurtenances thereto in any or all of the free wards of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and in the assembly halls of any or all of the public schools within the portion of the City for which a franchise is hereby granted. Upon notice by the Board to the Company that any such resolution has been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus and the necessary appurtenances thereto, free of charge, and shall furnish service, as directed, at one-half the regular rates charged by the Company for similar service, provided that the Company shall not be required to extend its wires for the purpose of connecting with such hospitals or schools a distance greater in any case than one-half (1/2) mile.

Thirteenth—It is agreed that the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates for services rendered by the Company to subscribers pursuant to this contract, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair, but the Company shall not at any time within the term of this contract charge more than twenty dollars (\$20) per month for an unlimited music service.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of the cost to it of apparatus leased or furnished to the subscriber on its premises, and of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills shall never be charged against property unless due from the owner thereof, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Seventeenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Eighteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at reasonable rates or at the rates herein fixed, or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Nineteenth—For a period of any three (3) consecutive months after the commencement of the operation of the system proposed by the Company, as herein provided, such system shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of any six (6) months out of any consecutive twelve (12) months after the commencement of operation, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Twentieth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of subscribers served by the Company.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or security, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided, and in default of the payment of such annual charges, the City shall collect the same with interest from said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company. In case of failure by the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual state-

ments, the furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other Municipal officer, made pursuant to the terms of this contract or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such cases, and in any of these events, the Company shall, except as herein otherwise provided, pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation, which sum or sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-third—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the wires and electrical conductors constructed and in use by virtue of this contract, shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written

That your petitioner is a railroad corporation of the State of New York, and is engaged in constructing its railroad in The City of New York in accordance with a certain ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen of the said City on the 26th day of July, 1904, approved by the Mayor on August 2, 1904, granting to your petitioner the right to cross streets, avenues and public places as therein specified, which ordinance was subsequently amended by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted July 14, 1905, and approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and by contracts between New York, Westchester & Boston Railway Company and The City of New York, dated January 29, 1909, and August 2, 1911, respectively; that the entire route of your petitioner in the said City is set forth in the said contracts dated January 29, 1909, and August 2, 1911.

That on the 10th day of December, 1910, the Board of Directors of your petitioner, for the purpose of improving the line of the railroad, by affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the said directors, at a meeting duly called in the manner provided by law, adopted a change of route of a portion of its main line in The City of New York, so that the same should be in accordance with a certain map then adopted by the said Board of Directors, entitled "Map and Profile of New York, Westchester & Boston Railway Company, New York County part of Section 1, December 10, 1910, being map and profile of that part of the route of the main line of said Railway Company within said county, extending from a point near the intersection of Willis avenue and 132d street in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to a point between 134th street and 135th street, east of Willow avenue in said Borough and City, as altered, changed, amended and adopted by affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the directors of said Company on the 10th day of December, 1910. E. J. Langford, Chief Engineer, New York, Westchester & Boston Railway Company."

East 132d street, about 210 feet easterly from Willow avenue.
East 133d street, about 300 feet easterly from Willow avenue.
East 134th street, about 340 feet easterly from Willow avenue.

—and also omits the crossing of Willow avenue. Submitted herewith is a map to accompany this petition, showing thereon the location of the present route in black and the proposed route in red, and showing also the location of The Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad.

That the object of the said change is in order to improve the route of your petitioner and avoid an unnecessary width in crossing the streets between The Harlem River and 134th street, and also so that the said route shall adjoin the route of The Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company, so that the two railroads may be operated in common under a contract which has been duly approved by the Public Service Commission for the First District on the 11th day of July, 1911.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Depart-

ment of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
