Starke, a candidate in the examination for promotion to third grade Inspector of Electrical Conductors in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, who had understood that the passing mark of "70 per cent. in the mental examination" applied to the average of Experience and Duties papers and not to the Duties papers alone, and recommending that his average mark on the mental examination be raised from 70 per cent. to 75 per cent., also recommending that the following candidates, who were similarly affected, be marked as follows:

B-30, mark raised from 70 technical to average 71 per cent.

D-1, mark raised from 61 technical to average 64 per cent.

D-2, mark raised from 64 technical to average 65 per cent.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, dated June 19,

recommending that the eligible list of Estimator be established and calling attention to the cases of Alfred Harvey Eccles, of 162 Main st., Long Island City, N. Y., and Alexander Rothenberg, of 124 Amboy st., Brooklyn, whose names appeared upon the said list. It was ordered that Mr. Eccles be summoned before the Commission on Wednesday, July 17, 1912, relative to his experience statements, and that Mr. Rothenberg be marked "Not Qualified" on the eligible list pending further investigation of his experience statements.
