MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR.

No. 1661.

His Honor the Mayor—Disapproval of Ordinance (Int. No. 1661) Entitled "An Ordinance to Repeal Section 155, Article 11, Chapter 10 of the Code, Relating to Oil Separators."

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, September 17, 1917.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith disapproved proposed Ordinance, Int. No. 1661, entitled:

"Ordinance to repeal section 155, article 11, chapter 10 of the code relating to oil separators."

This proposed amendment to the Code of Ordinances would repeal subdivisions 1, 2, 3 and 4 of section 155 of chapter 10.

The sections to be eliminated require an oil separator or some similar device to be installed in all garages where more than four motor vehicles are stored. It also provides that such oil receptacle shall not exceed 50 gallons capacity, and to be emptied and cleaned when required. Each separator is also to be connected with the house drain. The Fire Commissioner, under subdivision 1, may exempt from the present requirements a garage that drains into a short sewer line.

This appeal is similar to the one presented to me in 1914, and which I returned disapproved in a message to your honorable Board on September 21 of that year. I sent your Board a further message in relation to another sewer accident on September 22, 1914, in which an explosion occurred at First avenue and 42d street.

My action at this time was taken on the reports received from the Sewer Bureau in Manhattan and from the Fire Department.

I have asked the Chief Engineer in charge of sewers in Manhattan to give me a further report on present conditions, which brings this matter down to date. After referring to the explosions charged to gasoline in 1914 the Chief Engineer states:

"Since that time, either due to the agitation of the subject or to the installation of oil separators, there has been much less difficulty and practically no explosions until the present summer. This does not mean that the sewers have been free from gasoline, but our workmen have been provided with means to protect themselves from serious injury in cases where there has been no explosion. We have provided a gas mask and also a blower which is able to force fresh air into the sewers in sufficient quantities to expel steam or gas.

"On June 14, 1917, another explosion occurred in the East 42d Street sewer. Less damage was done by this explosion than by the one in 1914, but this is probably due to the fact that the greater part of the lining of this rock tunnel was destroyed at that time and only a small part of it remained to be destroyed by this explosion. Another reason for less damage was that the easterly end of this sewer was open into the excavation of the Lexington Avenue subway and served as a vent for the expanding gases. In this case, as in previous cases, the explosion started near the East River and was probably caused by the sparking from the third rail of the crosstown trolley. The manhole covers were blown up into the air, but the tops of the manholes were not destroyed as in the previous explosion.

"On July 23, 1917, at about 2 p. m., an explosion occurred in the sewer in West 23d street. This explosion also appeared to start near the outlet. Twelve of the manhole covers were blown up into the air and broken and, while we have no exact facts, our men upon arriving on the ground were told that a number of people were injured by the flying covers and had been taken away in ambulances. The wooden barrel sewer under the dock was found to be on fire and had to be partially destroyed before the Fire Department could get control of the flames. The garage of the Adams Express Company in Tenth Avenue is suspected of being one of the chief sources of the gasoline causing this last explosion. The sewer structure itself, aside from the manhole covers and the wooden barrel sewer, was not injured by the explosion.

"On June 14, 1917, the day of the explosion in the 42d Street sewer, Assistant Engineer McNamee, of the Sewer Bureau, entered the sewer to make measurements and investigations. The gas fumes were so strong, however, that he and his assistants were compelled to abandon their work and leave the sewer. Previous to this Assistant Engineer N. B. Gardiner, while examining a sewer in 15th Street near Avenue C, was made seriously ill by the gas fumes. At this place the odor of the gas did not seem to be very perceptible and Mr. Gardiner did not realize that he was being affected until he came out of the sewer."

The Fire Commissioner has also made a report in reference to the present conditions, the same reading in part:

"I am of the opinion that the danger of sewer explosion from gasoline is confined to a limited section of the city, where many garages may drain into a single sewer and that it is entirely unnecessary to require garages in the less congested districts to install separators. A very careful investigation made by this department shows that no explosions have been recorded in the Borough of Queens, none have occurred in Richmond and there is a record of only one explosion of any importance occurring in Brooklyn. This explosion occurred at Crescent street near Fulton street about three years ago and tore up the pav-

ing. Two or three minor explosions occurred of which no record was kept. One explosion occurred in the Bronx on February 10, 1911, and three men who were at work cleaning the sewer were slightly burned and had to be taken to the hospital. This explosion occurred opposite a large meat packing house, belonging to Conron Brothers, who make their own ice, and in the opinion of Josia H. Fitch, Engineer of Sewers in that Borough, the explosion was caused by the discharge of something from the artificial ice plant.

"Practically all of the sewer explosions of any moment which have occurred in the city within recent years have occurred in Manhattan. There have been about fourteen of these in the last eight years. It is striking fact that most of these have occurred in a concentrated area bounded roughly by 42d and 54th streets. The dates and locations of these explosions are as follows:

"522 W. 46th st. Oct. 16, 1910. 51st st. bet. 8th and 9th aves., March 17, 1910. 43d st. bet. 2d and 3d aves., Oct. 12, 1912. 333 W. 49th st., June 10, 1913. 354 W. 49th st., June 27, 1913. 54th st. and Broadway, Nov. 8, 1913. 43d st. bet. 2d and 3d aves., Jan. 5, 1911. 42d st. and 1st ave., July 1, 1914.

"Another report states that there is an explosion practically once a year in the East 42nd St. sewer; Broadway, bet. 119th and 120th Sts., Jan. 23, 1912; Central Park West, bet. 92nd and 93rd Sts., Mar. 13, 1912; 10th St. and Lexington Ave., June 22, 1914; Rector St., bet. Washington and West Sts., June, 1913; Hubert and Washington Sts., Oct. 21, 1911.

"The record of these explosions indicates that they have been confined to certain congested localities, but whether the explosions in these localities have been due to the fact that a considerable number of garages drain into the sewers of these localities or whether they are due to the peculiar structure of the sewers themselves is a matter about which there is considerable dispute."

From the report of the Fire Commissioner I am informed that there have been no records of explosions in either Queens or Richmond, and but one or two have been recorded in Brooklyn and The Bronx. The main difficulty seems to have been in the so-called automobile district in Manhattan.

I might draw to your attention the case of *Stubbs vs. Adamson*, 220 N. Y., 459, decided by the Court of Appeals at the April Term, 1917. This opinion sustained the constitutionality of the present ordinance requiring oil separators, Chief Justice Hiscock, in the course of the opinion, stating that the present ordinances, which were brought over from the regulations of the old Municipal Explosive Commission, had the force and effect of statutes and were to be considered as such. At page 469 the Court said:

"The legislature is justified in guarding against evils both real and fairly to be anticipated by any legislation which reasonably tends to prevent them, and it has a wide discretion in formulating the means which shall be adopted to this end. It is a sufficient basis for legislative action if only there are reasonable grounds for belief that the evil may occur, and even though there be an earnest conflict of serious opinion on the subject."

Further at page 470, after referring to the affidavits presented in behalf of the garage people, the opinion continues:

"These affidavits on the whole make it perfectly clear that the questions whether such danger did exist and whether such separator would eliminate it if it did exist, were largely questions of opinion and judgment in the decision of which reasonable men might differ, and they make it apparent that we should not say that there was such an entire absence of possibility of danger and that the proposed remedy was so utterly ineffective that the legislature was without power to adopt the legislation if it saw fit. We must always remember that the limitation upon its right to adopt police measures to avoid dangers is that the latter may fairly be anticipated, although vigorously denied, and that a wide range of discretion is allowed in determining when a possible evil ought to be guarded against and in fixing upon the means by which this shall be done."

In view of the report I have received from the Bureau of Sewers for Manhattan, I feel very strongly that some legislation providing for oil separators is necessary, at least in the Borough of Manhattan. It may be that in the outlying neighborhoods these machines could be dispensed with, without damage to the sewers or endangering the lives of the sewer workmen. That is a matter for your honorable Board to determine. If you should deem it expedient to take the matter up along this line, I would most strongly urge that you consider the advice of the sewer officials and employees in any neighborhood in which you consider eliminating the oil separator. I feel that the safety of these men, who are required to work daily in the sewers, should be considered before oil separators are eliminated. The inconvenience of installing oil separators and their maintenance by garage owners should not be controlling when the lives or health of the City employees may be endangered.

For the reasons above set forth I have disapproved the total repeal of the provisions on oil separators throughout the entire City, and return the matter for reconsideration. Respectfully, JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on May 29, 1917 (Minutes, page 425), the annexed ordinance to repeal section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "oil separators," respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the repeal of this particular section to be advisable in that it will be of inestimable benefit to owners of private garages, particularly in the outlying sections of the City.

It therefore recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to repeal section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to oil separators.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to oil separators, is hereby repealed in its entirety, said section reading as follows:

[\$155. Oil separators.

1. *When required.* No garage permit authorizing the storage of volatile inflammable oil shall be issued for any premises, storing more than 4 motor vehicles, which are not provided with an oil separator, trap or other similar apparatus attached to the house drain, for the purpose of preventing volatile inflammable oils from flowing into the sewer; provided, however, that the fire commissioner may exempt from the requirements of this section a garage draining into a short sewer line. (O. R., §376.)

2. *Oil receptacle.* The oil-receptacle of an oil separator shall not exceed 50 gallons capacity, and shall be emptied as often as may be necessary to prevent the oil from overflowing; and such oils as are recovered from the separator shall be removed from the garage within 24 hours after being taken from the separator. (O. R., §397.)

3. *Sewer connection.* Each oil separator shall be connected to the house drain, and shall be so arranged as to separate all oils from the drainage of the garage. (O. R., §396.)

4. *Waste oil.* All oils spilled on the floor of a garage shall be removed by sponging or swabbing, and poured into the drain leading to the oil separator. (O. R., §398.)

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

In our public advertising there were alternate bids requested on plumbing, providing a bid for faucets, made of brass and plated with nickel, and an alternate of the same equipment to be constructed of Benedict metal. The lowest bidder, the William Gordon Corporation, was unable to give an alternate bid on Benedict metal. But one alternate bid was received, and the additional price asked by that bidder for the Benedict metal was \$4,800. The next lowest bidder, Post & McCord, Inc., is thoroughly competent and experienced.

In Classes 2 and 3 I am willing to award to the lowest bidders.

In order that the awards suggested it will be necessary to obtain additional money in the sum of \$49,279. At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on the 26th ultimo, a resolution was adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the additional corporate stock be provided, and the matter is now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Under a recent decision of the Supreme Court it is not permissible to award contracts on advertised bids under the provisions of section 419 of the Charter except where the necessary money is appropriated and available at the time the bids are opened.

I request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to enter into a contract, without public letting, with Post & McCord, Inc., for the work called for in Class 1.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Chapter 802 of the Laws of 1917 known as "The Farms and Markets Law" provides for the establishment of a Department of Public Markets in this City by a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved by the Board of Aldermen. It is extremely important that such steps as are necessary to make the law operative in New York City be taken at once. The duly authorized agencies of the federal government are at present making comprehensive studies of the food supply conditions of the United States, both present and future, with a view of adopting such measures for the control and distribution of food supplies as may be deemed best for the public welfare. A special session of the state legislature has been called for July 30, in order that the state authorities may enact such legislation as will enable the state to maintain intelligent and adequate control of its food production and distributing activities.

The law provides that existing powers, duties and responsibilities having to do with the control and development of the public market system of the City of New York vest in the Department of Public Markets immediately upon the appointment by the Mayor of a Commissioner for this department. The position and salary of the Commissioner of the Department of Public Markets were established by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 29, 1917, under the provisions of Section 56 of the Charter, and the Department has been established subject to the approval of the Board of Aldermen in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 802 of the Laws of 1917.

In order that there may be no failure in the orderly operation and maintenance of the existing public markets of the City, it is necessary that transfers be made of certain employees now engaged in market work from the Bureau of City Revenue and Markets of the Finance Department, the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, President, Borough of Manhattan, and the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, President, Borough of Brooklyn. The law gives discretion to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to determine the need for such employees in the new department and provides that they shall be transferred by act of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without change of salary. Until a careful survey of the existing situation in the City of New York has been made by the Commissioner of Public Markets, it will be impossible to determine upon a complete organization for the work to be done. For this reason, the Committee has deemed it wise at this time to recommend the transfer of only those employees directly engaged in existing public market activities and the establishment, under Section 56, of such positions as will be immediately required for the proper conduct of the department leaving for consideration later in the year or in the budget for the year 1918 such appropriations as may be necessary to provide for the development of the market system along such lines as the Committee may recommend.

It is clear that the Commissioner of Public Markets will require immediately the assistance of an officer in charge of the actual, current, physical and financial operation of existing and future public markets. In view of the urgent public necessity, which is the basis for the legislation already enacted, and the expressed intention to enlarge greatly the public market system of the City of New York, your Committee believes that a salary of \$5,000 a year should be provided for this position.

The Commissioner will also require immediately the advice and assistance of a Deputy Commissioner, who will act as his principal consultant and adviser in the study of the numerous problems which are pressing for solution and in establishing such relations for co-ordinate activities of the federal and state government as are necessary to the intelligent development of the market system of this City. This officer will be co-ordinate in rank with the Superintendent of Markets and will have a relation to the head of the department on theoretical and policy determining side similar to that of the Superintendent of Markets on the side of practical operation. Your Committee recommends a salary of \$5,000 a year for this position.

It will be necessary to provide an office force for the immediate assumption of the duties and responsibilities connected with the administration of the department. The Committee recommends the establishment of the following positions:

Whenever used in this article, the term vault shall be deemed to mean every description of opening below the surface of the street that is covered over, as limited by subdivision 8 of this section, in front of any improved or unimproved property, except cesspools and openings which are used exclusively as places for descending to the cellar floor of any building or buildings, by means of steps, and openings over which substantial and safe fixed gratings have been erected in accordance with the provision of article 17, provided said openings be used primarily for light and ventilation, except that where the same are covered with iron gratings of sufficient strength to sustain a live load of 300 pounds per square foot as provided in subdivision 8 of section 53 of article 3 of chapter 5 and contained at least [60] 40 per cent. of opening shall be exempted from payments of fees for permits for vaults.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The commissioners may, in their discretion, lease any of said lands for such term of years, with such covenants and for such annual rentals, as in their judgment, shall be for the best interests of the city, or continue the use of the same as a public market.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution to Permit Political Associations to Hold Public Meetings, to Erect Banners, Etc., Under Certain Restrictions.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the various political organizations and associations of The City of New York to erect stands for the purpose of holding political meetings on the sidewalks or carriageways of The City of New York, providing said stands shall be removed within twenty-four hours after having been used; and be it further

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to all political organizations and associations to erect, place and keep transparencies, erect poles and swing banners therefrom, the Presidents of the Boroughs consenting thereto, and where banners are swung from houses the property owners consenting thereto, the work to be done and material supplied at their own expense;

Resolved, further, That permission be and the same is also hereby given to all political organizations and associations to parade through the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of The City of New York with vehicles containing bells or bands of music, the last privilege to be under the direction of the Police Department; and the first two privileges to be under the direction of the Presidents of the Boroughs,

respectively; the several permissions hereby given to continue only until November 10, 1917, any resolution or ordinance heretofore passed to the contrary notwithstanding.

Provided, however, that when a permit is issued and there is likelihood of any loss or damage to The City of New York through the exercise thereof, such permit shall take effect only upon the filing of a bond, in form and amount to be approved by the Corporation Counsel, indemnifying The City of New York against any loss or damage sustained thereby.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 6 of section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Signs and Showbills."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 6 of section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Signs and Showbills," is hereby amended to read as follows:

6. Restrictions. a. No illuminated sign shall extend more than 8 feet from the building line, except that *authorized pivot signs, hanging not less than 10 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk beneath the same, may be swung out to within 2 feet of the curb line, between the hours of 5 P. M. and 11 P. M.*, and that on authorized marquis awnings the illuminated signs may extend the entire length and width of the awning, but not more than 2 feet above, nor 1 foot below said awning; nor any such sign be less than 10 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk [beneath] to meet the same.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 1837.

Preamble and Resolution Requesting Board of Estimate and Apportionment to Take Immediate Steps Looking Towards the Construction of Two Municipal Bathing Pavilions on Land Owned by the City at Coney Island.

By Alderman Drescher—

Whereas, during the summer just past thousands of the citizens of Greater New York of modest means have been unable to secure bathing accommodations at Coney Island, especially on holidays, Sundays and in extremely hot weather unless they would pay exorbitant rates to the private bathhouses, in such cases, as much as \$2 for the use of a locker for a limited time; and

Whereas, the facilities of the Municipal Bathhouse now in use at Coney Island are wholly inadequate to take care of the pressing needs of the thousands of city workers and their families, whose only recreation is surf bathing; and

Whereas, bathing in the surf at Coney Island furnishes the one form of health-giving recreation that all the members of the family can participate in at one time; and

Whereas, the only opposition to additional municipal bathing pavilions at Coney Island is that of the so-called "bathhouse interest," which opposition is based on the fallacious ground that the present Municipal Bathhouse is a financial burden to the City; and

Whereas, the last fiscal report of the Municipal Bathhouse showed that the municipal service, on the basis of a dime per bather, with children free, was rendered for 1,640,501 persons up to January 1st of this year. The gross income on this small fee basis was \$164,050.10; while the cost of maintenance for salaries, repairs, gas and electricity was \$148,831.21. This left a surplus over all running expenses of \$15,218.89, to apply on the retirement of the bonds, and

Whereas, the apparent argument against the erection of additional municipal bathhouses on the ground of "financial burden" disappears completely on an examination of the current fiscal report; and

Whereas, on August 5th of this year the Municipal Bathhouse took in 12,512 paid admissions, July 1st 12,303 and July 22d 13,793; but despite these large figures thousands of persons, many of them mothers with small children, have been turned away from the Municipal Bathhouse for lack of accommodation. There is therefore a real and vital need for additional municipal bathing pavilions at Coney Island.

Be it Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen do hereby respectfully request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York to take immediate steps looking toward the immediate construction of two municipal bathing pavilions on land already owned by the City at Coney Island.



Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the consent or right applied for by the Merchants Refrigerating Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said contract of October 21, 1910, as amended by said contract of May 15, 1913, such modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said contract of October 21, 1910, as amended by said contract of May 15, 1913, which said contract of October 21, 1910, as amended, otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the same and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT, made and executed in duplicate this day of September 1917, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and the Merchants Refrigerating Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, By contract dated October 21, 1910, the City granted to the Company the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate conduits of a maximum outside diameter of twelve (12) inches in and under the surface of the streets in certain districts in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, upon certain conditions therein set forth, and

Whereas, By resolution adopted April 28, 1913, approved by the Mayor April 28, 1913, and by contract dated May 15, 1913, said contract of October 21, 1910, was amended and modified by extending District No. 2 named and described in Section 1 thereof, and by increasing the annual payments and security deposit specified in Section 2, Subdivisions Second and Twenty-third thereof; and

Whereas, By a petition dated April 16, 1917, the Company has applied to the Board for a further modification of said contract of October 21, 1910.

By increasing the maximum outside dimensions of the conduits which may be constructed thereunder from 12 inches in diameter to 35x20 inches.

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the increased annual payments herein provided for and of the mutual covenants herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of said contract of October 21, 1910, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended by changing and modifying the first paragraph of said section to read as follows:

Section 1. other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the districts bounded and described as follows:

Section 1 of said contract is further amended by adding to said section, at the end thereof, the following new paragraph:

In the following locations the company shall have the right to construct, maintain and operate a conduit of an outside diameter, including insulation and other covering not to exceed 35x20 inches:

In North Moore street from a point about 138 feet 6 inches east of the easterly line of Hudson street, westerly along North Moore street to Hudson street, thence southerly along Hudson street to Harrison street; then westerly along Harrison street to the southwesterly corner of Staple and Harrison streets with a branch from the Hudson Street line westerly along Franklin street to a point about 187 feet west of the westerly line of Hudson street.

In Staple street from a point about 87 feet north of the northerly line of Duane street, southerly along Staple street and across Duane street, and the triangle known as Duane Park to 86th st. and 84th st., from 25th ave. to a point about 125 feet west of westerly line of Hudson street.

In the following locations the Company shall have the right to construct and maintain a conduit of an outside diameter, including insulation and other covering not exceeding 20 x 14 inches:

In Staple street from a point about 85 feet north of the northerly line of Duane street to a point about 85 feet north of the northerly line of Jay street with two connections to abutting buildings between Duane and Jay streets.

In Jay street from the center line of Staple street to a point about 92 feet west of the westerly line of Staple street with one connection to an abutting building.

In Franklin street from a point about 197 feet east of the easterly line of Greenwich street to the center line of Washington street with four connections to abutting buildings.

In Washington street from the center line of Franklin street to a point about 20 feet south of the southerly line of North Moore street with two connections to abutting buildings.

Section 2, Subdivision Second, Clause (b) is amended to read as follows:

Section 2, Subdivision Second, Clause (c) first and second paragraphs are hereby amended to read as follows:

(c) An annual payment for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of the streets (excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business), as follows:

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, not exceeding 12 inches in diameter, twenty-five cents (25 cents).

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, exceeding 12 inches in diameter, but not exceeding 20 x 14 inches, thirty cents (30 cents).

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, exceeding 20 x 14 inches, but not exceeding 35 x 20 inches, thirty-five cents (35 cents).

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

SECTION 2. It is mutually understood and agreed that except as expressly provided herein, nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to affect in any manner the provisions of the contract entered into between the City and the Company, dated October 21, 1910, as amended by said resolution adopted April 24, 1913, approved by the Mayor April 28, 1913, and by said contract dated May 15, 1913; and the Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in such contract of October 21, 1910, as modified by said resolution and by said contract as further modified by the provisions of this instrument.

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
