

APPROVED PAPERS

Approved Papers for the week ending April 16, 1887.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Mary Corcoran to sell newspapers without using or occupying a stand, at and near the entrance to the Fulton Ferry, at the foot of Fulton street, East river; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 29, 1887. Approved by the Mayor, April 11, 1887.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, from Seventh avenue to Eighth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 29, 1887. Approved by the Mayor, April 11, 1887.

Resolved, That a crosswalk of three courses of blue stone be laid across the north and south sides, and a crosswalk of two courses of blue stones across the east and west sides of Tenth avenue and One Hundred and Thirteenth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That an additional course of flagging, four feet wide, be laid on One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Eighth avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, and that the old flag-stones, where not laid or set in accordance with the established lines and grades, be taken up and reset and relaid, and new flagging laid where the old flag-stones have been broken or removed, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Ficke Brothers to place and keep a movable barber-pole (to be put out in the morning and taken in every evening), on the sidewalk near the curb, in front of No. 1595 Avenue A, provided such pole shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public, nor exceed ten feet long by six inches in diameter, placed on a base not to exceed one foot square; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Sir.—There were 771 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 9, 1887, which is an increase of 9, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 70 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending April 2, 1887, was 742, which is 12.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,470,508.
