



The Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Sec. 92. "That neither the contents of any such tub or of any receptacle, cesspool, privy, vault-sink or water-closet, cistern, nor anything in any room, excavation, vat, building, premises or place, shall be allowed to become a nuisance, or offensive, so as to be dangerous or prejudicial to life or health."

Ladue at Forty-fourth street and East river to render fat, steam and grind bones and dry fresh blood for one week."

Whereas, Dr. E. G. Janeway, Dr. A. Jacobi, Dr. C. R. Agnew, Dr. Stephen Smith, Dr. D. M. Stimson, Dr. G. F. Shady and Dr. J. D. O'Dwyer, have been invited by this Board to act as consulting physicians and surgeons of the Willard Parker and of other hospitals of this Department in East Sixteenth street; and

Whereas, They have all willingly accepted the trust; be it therefore

Resolved, That Dr. E. G. Janeway, Dr. A. Jacobi, Dr. C. R. Agnew, Dr. Stephen Smith, Dr. D. M. Stimson, Dr. George F. Shady and Dr. J. D. O'Dwyer, be and are hereby appointed consulting physicians and surgeons of the Willard Parker and other hospitals of this Department on East Sixteenth street, without compensation, and that they be requested to meet and organize at their earliest convenience and to submit to this Board, for its approval, a plan contemplating the best interests of the sick in these hospitals.

Resolved, That Dr. T. M. Prudden and Dr. H. M. Beggs be and are hereby appointed pathologists of the Health Department and of the hospitals under its control, without compensation.

Resolved, That on and after January 1, 1888, the Lay Sanitary Inspectors be graded as follows:

First Grade—This grade shall consist of all such Lay Sanitary Inspectors as may thereafter become connected with this branch of the Health Department, together with such other Lay Sanitary Inspectors as are then connected with this branch of the service who have served the Health Department satisfactorily in the capacity of Lay Sanitary Inspectors for three years or less. The salary of this grade shall be \$1,200 per annum.

Second Grade—This grade shall consist only of such members of the First Grade as shall have served satisfactorily in that grade for the term of three years. The term of service of each member of this grade shall be five years, and the salary shall be \$1,500 per annum.

Third Grade—This grade shall consist of only such Lay Sanitary Inspectors as shall have served satisfactorily in the Second Grade for the full term of the same. The salary of this grade shall be \$1,800 per annum.

Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of September, 1887, be and are hereby approved, and the President and Chief Clerk directed to sign certificates and forward the same to the Comptroller for payment.

Resolved, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Comptroller for the following sums of money, which is required to enable the Board of Health to pay to the Board of Police for the month of September the amount of the salaries of forty-four policemen detailed to the service of the Board of Health, pursuant to the provisions of section 5, chapter 399, Laws of 1886, and section 296, chapter 84, Laws of 1887, being one-twelfth part of the amount estimated, levied, raised and appropriated for the support and maintenance of the Sanitary Company of Police during the current year, to wit: forty-four patrolmen, \$4,400.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 17, 1887:

There were 7,794 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 1,431 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 305 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 64 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 51 permits.

The certificates of 755 births, 54 still-births, 358 marriages and 670 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 17, 1887.

This shows an increase of 64 births and 69 marriages, and a decrease of 111 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 223 births, 58 marriages and 9 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; diphtheria, 14; croup, 4; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 13; mania, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 22; pneumonia, 7; heart diseases, 26; aneurism, 2; marasmus and tabes mesenterica, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 14; convulsions, 4; brain and nervous diseases, 11; gastritis, enteritis, gastro-enteritis and peritonitis, 10; Bright's and nephritis, 8; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; measles, 1; whooping cough, 5; alcoholism, 3; cancers, 8; bronchitis, 1; apoplexy, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suicide, 2; drowning, 2. Premature and preterm births was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 113 were in institutions, 398 in tenement-houses, 141 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 121 on the first, 177 on the second, 140 on the third, 70 on the fourth, 30 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 659 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-residents; 73 were stated to be single, 179 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 348 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 670; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 73 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 755 births, 358 marriages, 54 still-births, 670 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 132 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 82 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 17, 1887, was 62.1 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.100; the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 887, and the total amount of rain-fall was .81 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 651 deaths and still-births, or 89.92 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 21; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 270; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 93; Greenwood (undenominational), 20; Lutheran (undenominational), 110; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 33; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 10; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Macphelah, L.
