Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending 11, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary

Inspectors was 1,407, as follows, viz.:

6 public buildings, 461 tenement-houses, 141 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 17 manufactories and workshops, 31 stores and warehouses, 58 stables, 93 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 24 manure dumps, 16 soap factories, 2 tripe houses, 1 stock yard, 34 fat-rendering establishments, 1 public sewer, 52 sunken and vacant lots, 24 fertilizing works, 1 dangerous building, 46 yards, courts, and areas, 44

cellars and basements, 144 waste-pipes and drains, 110 privies and water-closets, 27 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 violation of the Code, 2 piggeries, and 16

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspector was 409.

During the past week 168 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 76 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

154 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 46 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 44 houses, 44 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 persons sick with contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending May 11, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 455 burial permits for city deaths, 19 for bodies in transitu, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 455 deaths, 192 marriages, 448 births, 44 still-births, 19 applications for transit permits, and 58 returns from coroners. There were 44 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage and 31 of death were issued from this Bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, May 14, 1878.

SIR—455 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, May 11, which is a decrease of 12, compared with the mortality of the preceding week, but an increase of 15 compared with the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending May 4 was 456, which is 54 below the average for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.93 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,081,104.

The number of deaths from contagious diseases during the week is as follows, viz.: Smallpox, I; measles, 3; scarlatina, 17; diphtheria, 19; whooping cough, 6; and typhoid fever, 4. The most fatal of the contagious diseases reported during the week was diphtheria, which caused 19 deaths, of which 15 were in tenement houses, 3 in institutions, and I in a house which contained three families or less. Five of the deaths from this disease were in the Nineteenth ward, 3 in the Thirteenth, 2 each in the Eighth, Seventeenth, and Twentieth, and I each in the Tenth, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Sixteenth, and Twenty-first, and the average age of those who died from it was 2 years, 7 months, and 21 days. There was, however, a decrease during the past, compared with the preceding week, of 7 deaths from measles, 5 from diphtheria, 1 from erysipelas, 2 from cerebro-spinal fever, 3 from malarial fevers, 2 from cancer; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; pneumonia, 9; diseases of the heart, 6; marasmus and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; and premature and preternatural births, I; and an increase of I death from small-pox, 2 from scarlatina, 4 from croup, 3 from whooping-cough, 3 from typhoid fever, I from puerperal diseases, 7 from diarrheed diseases, 3 from inanition, I from alcoholism, I from rheumatism and gout, I from bronchitis, 6 from diseases of the heart, 2 from aneurism, and 2 from diseases of the brain and nervous system. The following diseases caused 20 deaths and more during the week: Phthisis pulmonalis, 80; pneumonia, 52; bronchitis, 26; diseases of the heart, 29; and diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4I.

During the past week 37 returns were received by this Bureau from foreign cities, and a comparison was made, which showed that the death-rate of New York was lower than 34 of them. The cities which had a lower death-rate than this were Copenhagen, Christiania, and

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 92 were in institutions, 230 in tenement houses, 123 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 131 on the second, 66 on the third, 43 on the fourth, 12 on the fifth, and 1 on the sixth; 453 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents; 39 were stated to be single, 136 married, 46 widowed, and the condition of 234 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 459 deaths and still-births, or 91.98 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 11; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 195; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 63; Greenwood (undenominational), 40; Lutheran (undenominational), 75; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 19; Woodlawn (undenominational), 11; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 0; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 11.

MEETING HELD MAY 8, 1878.

New York, April 29, 1878.

Hon. Smith E. Lane, Commissioner of Parks:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit through you to the Board of Commissioners of Public Parks a proposition for the erection of a bronze drinking fountain in one of the public parks of the City of New York, which, if accepted by your honorable body. I propose to donate to the city.

The fountain is now being modelled in Stuttgart, in the Kingdom of Wurtemburg, by Professor Adolph Doundorf, Professor of Sculpture in the Art Academy of that city.

Upon a granite basis four feet in height, approachable by steps on four sides, rises a pedestal of bronze seven feet high, provided with basins and cups; and upon this pedestal rises a group of bronze seven feet in height, representing a mother bringing her two children to a fountain.

That the entire sculptural work will be executed in the highest style of art, there is sufficient assurance in the name of Prof. Doundorf, the pupil of the late Ernest Reitschel, the sculptor of the famous Luther monument, at Worms, and the chief artist in the completion of that great work after the death of his master. Hon. SMITH E. LANE, Commissioner of Parks:

Prof. Doundorf has in hand, besides the proposed fountain, several great monumental works commemorative of some of the most distinguished men of the present time, among whom may be

commemorative of some of the most distinguished men of the present time, among whom may be mentioned Peter Cornelius and Sebastian Bach.

He is pronounced by Prof. William Lübke, whose name has lately become widely known in this country through his "History of Art," to be one of the ablest sculptors in Germany, and I may add that this distinguished historian and critic, having seen the model of the proposed fountain, has expressed his highest approval of its artistic excellence and its fitness to the purpose contemplated. Having carefully looked at various localities in the city, and it being my earnest desire as far as practicable to promote the benefit of the large masses of the people who rarely find it possible to visit Central Park, and likewise to put a work of art of the first quality within easy access of the more cultivated classes, I have decided to request the Commissioners of Public Parks to allow the erection of the fountain on the west side of Union Square, between Fifteenth and Seventeenth streets, if the site shall seem in their wisdom to be advantageous to the public good.

I will add that the contract with the artist provides for the completion of the fountain in time for its erection in New York about eighteen months from the present date, and as I shall shortly receive from Prof. Doundorf plans and specifications for the granite base, which must be in readiness upon the arrival of the bronze work, I should be grateful for as prompt a response to my application as may be consistent with the convenience of the Board.
