



The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore iven to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by trenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have o, curred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. House-owners are further notified that whenever their fremises become wearant, and are likely to reman vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
