**For Modification of the Building Law, during the Three Months ending September 30, 1898.**  
 Bessie L. Martin, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title VII., section 1318, chapter 19 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, so as to allow the occupancy of building as a tenement; premises, one building, north side of St. John's place, about 245 feet from the northwest corner of St. John's place and Eighth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn. Granted in Board of Buildings, July 1, 1898.

Bessie L. Martin, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title VII., section 1318, chapter 19 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, so as to allow the occupancy of building as a tenement; premises, one building, north side of St. John's place, about 225 feet from the northwest corner of St. John's place and Eighth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn. Denied in Board of Buildings, July 1, 1898.

William H. Kowenhoven, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title XIV., section 5, chapter 481 of the Laws of 1894, as amended, so as to allow the erection of a building on a foundation consisting of 6-inch chestnut posts, instead of solid stone or brick foundation; premises, one building, southeast side of Alton place, 40 feet northeast of Flatbush avenue, Borough of Brooklyn. Denied in Board of Buildings, July 14, 1898.

A. B. Chandler, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title XIV., section 22, chapter 481 of the Laws of 1894, so as to allow the construction of a mansard roof of wooden rafters, filled in between with plaster fireproof blocks, instead of angle iron construction; premises, one building, No. 389 Clinton avenue, near the southeast corner of Greene avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

Petition to modify said laws so far as to allow the extension of bay window on the west end of addition for a distance of 2 feet 6 inches instead of 1 foot; same premises. Granted in Board of Buildings, August 10, 1898, as regards the construction of mansard roof of wooden rafters, filled in between with fireproof blocks, instead of angle iron construction. Denied in Board of Buildings, August 10, 1898, as to extension of bay-window.

The Bush Company, Limited, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title XIV., section 8, chapter 481, Laws of 1894, so as to allow the construction of three (3) one-story brick warehouses, 66 feet 8 inches by 250 feet each, without crosswalls; premises, east side of First avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, Borough of Brooklyn. Granted in Board of Buildings, August 10, 1898.

Mary J. Doty, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title VII., section 1318, chapter 19 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, so as to allow the present hall partitions to be used not filled in with fireproof materials, and to allow the building of new hall extension to the present hall, not filling in with fireproof materials; premises, Bay Thirteenth street, southwest corner of Bath avenue, Borough of Brooklyn. Denied in Board of Buildings, August 15, 1898.

Mary A. Prendergast, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title VII., section 1318, chapter 19 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, so as to allow the alteration of a building into stores and tenements without carrying an open area in front of the house (it being a corner house with areas on front and side), and without making the construction of halls and stairs slow burning and dumbwaiter shaft fireproof; premises, northwest corner of Henry and Baltic streets, Borough of Brooklyn. Granted in Board of Buildings, August 15, 1898, in so far as to allow petitioner to dispense with the carrying of an open area in front of building, and on condition that the dumbwaiter shaft and two interior light shafts be constructed of fireproof material.

Cord, Meyer & Co., petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title VII., section 1318, chapter 19 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, so as to allow the construction of light court in connection with light court of adjoining flat house, of which petitioner is the owner, together to be at least three feet in width; premises, southeast corner of Vanderbilt avenue and Sterling place, Borough of Brooklyn. Granted in Board of Buildings, August 15, 1898, on condition that the easterly wall adjoining light shaft, marked "A" on drawing, shall be set westerly 1 foot, instead of 2 feet 4 inches, as required by law.

John Hassall, petitioner, by W. C. Dickerson—Petition to modify the provisions of title XIV., section 5, chapter 481 of the Laws of 1894, as amended, so as to allow petitioner to use foundation of 2-inch by 2 feet yellow pine strips, the sill of house 6-inch by 8-inch yellow pine resting on same; premises, frame building, west side of Clay avenue, commencing about 100 feet south of southwest corner of Oakland and Clay avenues, Borough of Brooklyn. Denied in Board of Buildings, September 8, 1898.

Edward P. Gaylor, petitioner—Petition to modify the provisions of title VII., section 1318, chapter 19 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, so as to allow the occupancy of two buildings as a tenement; premises, two buildings south side of Penn street, 100 feet west of Marcy avenue, known as Nos. 218 and 220 Penn street, Borough of Brooklyn. Denied in Board of Buildings, September 14, 1898.

## BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

### BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Meeting of the Local Board of the Borough of Queens was held in the Hackensack Building, Long Island City, on November 18, 1898, at which was present Councilmen Van Nostrand and Cassidy, Aldermen James and Geiser and President Bowley.

Minutes of previous meeting read and, on motion, duly approved.

Public hearing was had on the petition to open De Lap place through to Bergen avenue, in Jamaica, Fourth Ward, this Borough. Opposition thereto was made on the grounds that the same matter had been before the Board of Trustees of the Village of Jamaica in the year 1897, and was not successful; that it was doubtful that said De Lap place is a public highway, as its width is but forty-five feet, whereas no duly accepted street is less than fifty feet wide, that Bergen avenue is a wide thoroughfare, with long blocks, and in such improved condition and prospects as to be destined to become a very desirable avenue for dwellings of no mean pretensions; and that the value of lands along said avenue are held accordingly high, and that the extending of De Lap place through into Bergen avenue would be to the advantage of said place to the greater detriment of values on Bergen avenue in vicinity of said place.

The owner of lands on Bergen avenue, across De Lap place, stated that he had purchased said premises for the benefits which said avenue held forth; that the condemnation of so much of his lands as would be required for the cutting through of De Lap place would leave him two corners, the area of which would not be sufficient to utilize in accordance with the general character of said avenue, both present and prospective.

On behalf of the petitioners it was claimed that at the time they purchased land on said place the same was described as so many feet from Bergen avenue, which, naturally, made them believe that De Lap place commenced at Bergen avenue, in which they claimed to have been assured by reason of the County Clerk having searched title and passed same as good.

That they now find said place as being in a pocket, hence their application to this Board for relief in the premises.

On motion, the President appointed Councilman Van Nostrand and Alderman James a committee to make a personal inspection of the lands involved in the subject matter of said petition, and to report thereon to this Board at its next meeting.

In the matter of public hearing on petition to construct public sewer on Twenty-first street, from Seventh to Eighth avenues, Whitestone, Third Ward, this Borough, the representative thereof stated, that he was in possession of another petition by property holders on same street, which together would be from Fifth avenue to Eighth avenue, in which sewer is required.

Said last mentioned petition having been delivered to the President of the Board, he designated Friday, December 2, 1898, at 10:30 A. M., as time for public hearing thereon.

Whereupon, on motion, the further consideration of petition for sewer, from Seventh to Eighth avenue, was postponed to December 2, 1898, and Councilman Van Nostrand and Alderman James appointed a committee to confer with the signers of both petitions as to the construction of said sewer under private contract.

The following was read:

Hon. FREDERICK BOWLEY, President, Board of Local Improvements, Borough of Queens:

We the undersigned property owners on Water View place, Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, do respectfully request your Honorable Body to direct the Queens County Water Company to extend their mains, from Trist place, along Baywater avenue and through Water View place, Far Rockaway, Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, in order to supply tenants and owners of property along said line with water. This block is about eight hundred feet, and without a supply except that taken from wells, which is not satisfactory either in quantity or quality.

The question arose as to the precise obligations as between said company and City of New York, of which the Board required to be informed before taking any action thereon, for which purpose the Secretary was instructed to obtain same from the Corporation Counsel.

Communication from Alfred A. Gardner, headed Long Island Railroad Company, Law Department, No. 32 Nassau street, New York City, and dated 15th instant, with letter of W. E. Potter, General Superintendent, was read:

The latter contained the following:

"The switch engines in our North Shore yards are burning a mixture of soft and hard coal and coke, which is the only mixture which can be used to advantage on these engines."

"The engines will not burn hard coal alone."

Drs. Kennedy and McKeown, on behalf of the complainants, asserted that the conditions have not been changed, and urged that action towards abatement of the nuisance be taken.

Dr. Kennedy stated also that he had been keeping himself posted as to the use of other than all soft coal on the locomotives, and was informed by those having opportunities to know that no change in the objectionable fuel has been made by the company. Councilman Cassidy's suggestion to defer action until next week, during which time the committee appointed to investigate would do so and report, was adopted.

 place of householders or freeholders. The envelope  
 must be indorsed "Estimate for Printing and Dis-  
 tributing the City Record," together with the  
 name and place of business of the party making the  
 estimate, and the date of its presentation. The security  
 required on the contract will be Thirty-seven Thou-  
 sand Five Hundred Dollars.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by  
 either a certified check upon one of the National or  
 State banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order  
 of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of One
