### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, February 10, 1903, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and the Chief Engineer.

The minutes of the meeting of February 3, 1903, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 14,953 to 14,955, inclusive, amounting to \$25,972.21, and of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 14,956 to 14,969, inclusive, amounting to \$2,497.32.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—5.

The President submitted the following report of the Chief Engineer in regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam:

NEW YORK, February 10, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, February 6, 1903, I would report as follows:

Rock excavation work was continued on the spillway extension. (The location of this work is shown in Photo No. 36, previously submitted.)

On the core wall, work of excavation progressed at about Station 1+00, near its junction with the Aqueduct and Gate House No. 1.

The hand gangs have continued excavation on both sides of the core wall, between Stations 1 and 2+50, with three derricks, and on the lower side of the wall the ledge rock has been reached for a considerable part of this distance.

The necessary excavation was completed and masonry work was started in the pit adjacent to Gate House No. 1 and the Aqueduct, on January 29, for the "screen chamber" foundations. This work has continued steadily since, except when stopped by bad weather.

Excavation continued in the cut at the south end with the steam shovel, both day and night, at Elevation 70±, on the down-stream side in a cut south of the wing wall toward the core wall.

(The location of the above-mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 65, 66, 67 and 68, submitted with this report.)

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 1,500 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 1,700 cubic yards for the week. (This includes core wall excavation.)

The amount of spillway rock excavation was about 375 cubic yards for the week. The amount of masonry laid was about 160 cubic yards for the week.

The average number of men employed was as follows:

Total..... 346

For the week ending January 2 the average was 345 men.

For the week ending January 9 the average was 405 men.

For the week ending January 16 the average was 311 men.

For the week ending January 23 the average was 284 men.

For the week ending January 30 the average was 290 men.

A larger force should be employed. The small force and light amount of work done, however, is due to a considerable extent to the continued cold and stormy weather.

The President was directed to transmit the same to the Mayor.

The President called up Report of the Chief Engineer No. 488, dated February 26, 1903, giving the result of the remeasurement of the work heretofore done by Williams & Gerstle on their contract for the construction of the Muscote Dam.

Whereupon Phillip M. Brett, Esq., representing Kellogg & Rose, counsel for Williams & Gerstle, contractors, stated that he was present in the unavoidable absence of L. Laflin Kellogg.

There were also present Adrian T. Kiernan, representing The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company, and Leonidas Dennis, attorney for the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, sureties on said contract.

Mr. Brett made an argument and suggested, in view of the assurance of the contractors that the work would be expedited, that no action be taken by the Commissioners before May 1, 1903, when the contractors' progress could be made apparent. (Full notes of argument were taken by the Stenographer and filed.)

The contractors, their counsel and the representatives of the sureties then withdrew.

After consultation the Secretary was directed to notify said contractors, their counsel and the sureties that the Aqueduct Commissioners would allow the work to proceed with the understanding that the matter may be called up for further hearing on ten days' notice to the contractors, their counsel and their sureties.

The Chief Engineer submitted progress report for the week ending February 6, 1903, which was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The Construction or Executive Committee referred to the Commissioners the following report of the Chief Engineer:

REPORT No. 491.

NEW YORK, January 30, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—The contract drawings of the New Croton Dam show a bridge from the dam across the spillway channel to the northerly slope of the valley. They show no elevation, section, or detail of its form or the character of the material to be used in its construction. It is shown in plan only by two parallel lines with the word "bridge" printed between them. The lines are a continuation of the outer lines of the top of the stone dam. There is no dividing line between the bridge and the dam, or anything to indicate but that the bridge is to be of the same material as the dam.

In the "Aqueduct Commission Reports on the New Croton Aqueduct, Reservoirs and Dams, 1887 to 1895," the bridge is shown on the page preceding Sheet No. 1, and again on Sheets Nos. 21 and 22, in sketch elevations, as of iron or steel trusses. On Sheet No. 21 it is noted that the road approaching the bridge is to be a private road. The bridge is not otherwise referred to in the report.

On January 6, 1900, the Supreme Court approved a map showing the dam and bridge to be used as a public highway.

The contract of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman for building the New Croton Dam was executed August 31, 1892; no mention of this bridge is made in the contract other than is shown in the contract drawings, as above noted.

The third clause of paragraph 3 of the specifications is as follows:

"All earth, rock and timber work, all iron work, all masonry work and all other work of a permanent or temporary character, necessary to complete the dam, are described in this agreement."

No detail plans of an iron or steel bridge have been made, and there appears to be no provision in the contract for the payment for such a structure. The estimated cost of a steel bridge would be \$30,000. The contract contains prices for the different items of work that would be required in building a masonry arch bridge, the estimated cost of which would be \$90,000. Still, a stone arch bridge would be more in keeping with the stone dam, and it would be more durable, as a steel bridge would require repainting, repairing and a renewal of the timber flooring from time to time.

Will you please direct me as to your wishes in relation to the construction of this bridge.

—with the recommendation that the President be directed to transmit the papers to the Corporation Counsel and request his opinion as to whether the contractors for the New Croton dam must be allowed to build a masonry bridge which they claim is within their contract, or whether the Commissioners can let a contract for a bridge of other than masonry construction by advertisement in the usual manner.

The recommendation of the committee was approved and adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—5.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report:

REPORT No. 492.

NEW YORK, January 30, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—In Report No. 250, dated May 15, 1901, I informed you that at three places the core wall of the embankment surrounding the Jerome Park reservoir was built upon quicksand for an aggregate length of 1,190 feet. I expressed the opinion that "the reservoir will not be a water-tight structure if completed under the present plans," and suggested the appointment of three engineers to examine the plans and the work of construction. The Aqueduct Commissioners thereupon appointed Messrs. J. J. R. Croes, Edwin F. Smith and Elnathan Sweet to make such an examination and report. On November 18, 1901, they submitted their report, which did not agree with my views, but they recommended a modification of the plans of the inner slope of the embankment.

In Report No. 318, dated January 14, 1902, I recommended that "before any definite plan should be adopted a further investigation of the material underlying the site of the reservoir should be made." The recommendation was approved and the investigation ordered. This resulted in the disclosure of the conditions shown in annexed memorandum and diagram, and they are such that I think further expert engineering opinion should be obtained before completing the construction under the present plans.

I recommend that you procure expert engineering opinions on the boundary walls and embankments as built and projected.

The report was ordered filed, and in connection therewith the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Nicholas S. Hill, Jr., Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, be requested to examine the boundary walls and embankments, as built and projected, of the Jerome Park reservoir and report their views thereon to the Aqueduct Commissioners, making any suggestions they see fit, and that they be asked to confer with the Chief Engineer of the Commission, and that a copy of his Report No. 492 and of the papers referred to therein, and also all the expert reports or other papers heretofore submitted to the Commissioners in this connection, be transmitted to them for their information.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—5.

The President was authorized to transmit copies of the foregoing resolution to the Mayor and Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and invite them to request the respective Chief Engineers to make the examination and report desired.



The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 495, dated February 7, 1903, relating to a communication of the Corporation Counsel, dated January 26, 1903, regarding proposed changes in the location of small portions of certain highways to be built in the Croton Valley, and recommending that the necessary consent and authority to make the changes be procured, and stating that the changes in all cases are very slight, but that they would result in improvements to the roads and the adjoining property as well as a saving of \$33,000 in the cost of construction.

The report was referred to the Corporation Counsel in accordance with his suggestion, and the President was directed to request him to take the necessary steps to change the location of the roads in accordance with the report of the Chief Engineer.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 496, dated February 9, 1903, stating that Abner L. Crosby, Superintendent of Dam Construction, died February 4, 1903.

Which was ordered filed.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 497, dated February 9, 1903, which returned Report No. 483, together with papers therein referred to, relating to a communication of H. T. Dykman, Special Counsel, dated December 1, 1902, regarding the taking of the necessary steps to remove the occupant from Parcel No. 427.

The report was ordered filed and the Secretary was directed to request H. T. Dykman, Special Counsel, to take the necessary steps to have the occupant vacate the premises known as Parcel No. 427.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 498, dated February 9, 1903, regarding a communication of Lon Sniffen asking information regarding a cemetery at North Castle, N. Y., which was ordered filed and the Secretary was directed to give Mr. Sniffen the information therein contained.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 499, dated February 9, 1903, asking that the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to hold examinations for promotion to the positions of Assistant Engineer, Transitman, Leveler, Rodman, Chainman and Axeman; which was ordered filed and the Secretary was directed to comply therewith.

A communication was received from the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, dated February 4, 1903, acknowledging receipt of a letter of February 4, 1903; which was ordered filed.

Letters were received from the Departments of Docks and Ferries, Parks, Fire, Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Police, and Public Works of The Bronx, and President of the Borough of Richmond, stating that their respective departments had no use for the double hoisting engine which the Aqueduct Commissioners desire to dispose of; which were ordered filed.

A communication was received from H. T. Dykman, dated February 9, 1903, regarding a bill of Stephen A. Purdy for removing bodies from the Katonah Cemetery, and was referred to the Secretary for reply.

A letter was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated February 5, 1903, stating that no awards have as yet been made by the Commissioners of Appraisal covering the ownership of monuments in different cemeteries situated within the boundaries of the New Croton Reservoir; which was ordered filed and a copy transmitted to the Chief Engineer.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

CITY OF NEW YORK, February 9, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commissioners:

SIR—In accordance with the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, I transmitted to you by Mr. Maurer of your Department, on February 7, two maps entitled "Final Plan Sheet Exhibit No. 1 of 1903," showing additional lands required for the construction of the New Croton Reservoir in the towns of Cortlandt and Yorktown, Westchester County, New York, approved February 7, 1903.

Also six similar property maps, described "Exhibit No. 2 of 1903."

In connection therewith the following was offered:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication dated February 9, 1903, has submitted final plan sheet, described as "Exhibit No. 1 of 1903," showing certain additional parcels of land required for the construction of the New Croton Reservoir in the towns of Cortlandt and Yorktown, Westchester County, New York; therefore be it

Resolved, That, for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York, and the acts amendatory thereof, we, the Aqueduct Commissioners, do hereby approve and adopt the aforesaid final plan sheet, showing certain additional parcels of land required for the construction of the New Croton Reservoir in the towns of Cortlandt and Yorktown, Westchester County, New York, and direct that the same be duly certified and filed in this office and designated "Final Plan Sheet No. 1 of 1903;" and that a copy thereof be certified and transmitted to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for filing in his office, as required by section 25 of the aforesaid act.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication dated February 9, 1903, has submitted six similar property maps, described as "Exhibit No. 2 of 1903," showing certain additional parcels of land required for the construction of the New Croton Reservoir in the towns of Cortlandt and Yorktown, Westchester County, N. Y.; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the six similar property maps received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, described as "Exhibit No. 2 of 1903," showing certain additional parcels of land required for the construction of the New Croton Reservoir in the towns of Cortlandt and Yorktown, Westchester County, N. Y., be and the same are hereby approved and adopted, and directed to be certified to the Corporation Counsel for filing and delivery to the Commissioners of Appraisal, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York, and the acts amendatory thereof; and the Corporation Counsel is hereby requested to take the steps necessary to acquire for the City, under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York, the fee in the lands described on said maps; and the Secretary is hereby directed to furnish to the Corporation Counsel all maps, plans, etc., which he may require in the premises.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—5.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated February 9, 1903, suggesting what service should be given to the City by the New York Telephone Company in return for the permission asked by said company to erect and maintain certain telegraph and telephone poles and wires on the property of the City, which was ordered filed, and the Secretary was directed to communicate its substance to the Telephone Company in reference thereto.

Communications were received from Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the New Croton Dam, dated February 4, 1903, and from McDonald & Onderdonk, contractors for the Jerome Park Reservoir, dated February 4, 1903, regarding the progress of the work under their respective contracts, which were read and ordered filed.

A communication was received from Hildreth & Company, dated February 6, 1903, regarding the inspection of the work of bridge construction, which was referred to the Chief Engineer for reply.

A communication was received from John Lathrope, dated Albany, N. Y., February 2, 1903, referring to the furnishing of Legislative bills, etc., and was referred to the Secretary for reply.

A communication was received from F. L. Hunt, dated at Katonah, N. Y., February 6, 1903, which was read and ordered filed; and in connection therewith the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That in view of the scarcity of coal in the neighborhood of Muscoot Dam, the Chief Engineer be directed in his discretion to allow certain persons, on such

terms as he sees fit, to take wood in small quantities from the area to be cleared for the new Croton Reservoir.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—5.

The President called up the communications of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam, bearing date January 6, 1903, and January 20, 1903, in relation to the work of clearing the New Croton Dam Division.

On motion, the communications were referred to the Chief Engineer for an estimate of the cost of clearing.

The Commissioners then adjourned until Friday, February 13, 1903, at 11 o'clock a. m.

I estimate that it will cost \$13,600 to cut the timber and clear the grounds of this division in accordance with the specifications.

The following form of letter was presented and the President was directed to transmit the same:

NEW YORK, February 13, 1903.

MESSRS. COLEMAN, BREUCHAUD & COLEMAN, Contractors, Croton-on-Hudson, New York:

DEAR SIRS—I am directed to state that in reply to your proposal contained in your letter dated January 20, 1903, to do the work of cutting timber and clearing grounds in the New Croton Dam Division of the New Croton Reservoir that the Aqueduct Commissioners accept the same, and will contract with you therefor, the work to be done under the specifications now in the hands of our Chief Engineer for doing said work and at a contract price of four thousand dollars for the whole of said work.

### BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals held Thursday afternoon, January 22, 1903, at 4 p. m., in the library of Bellevue Hospital.

Present—Doctor Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Tierney, Townsend, Stine and Paulding, Trustees, and the Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Dr. William Mabon, the Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, made a verbal report, of which the following is a summary:

Repairs and Alterations—The repairs to the prison ward will be finished in a few days. The plumbing work in the new dormitory is now completed. Repairs are now being made on the doors of the gate house. A swinging door to replace the sliding door leading to the reception office is being constructed. A large section of the ceiling in the amphitheatre has been repaired. Alterations in the college building are now in progress. The covered passageway from the cook house to the administration building is progressing satisfactorily. The work on the electric wiring is being rapidly pushed by the contractor. Estimates have been asked for installing the apparatus in the Crane room of the amphitheatre; also estimates for three storm doors at Bellevue and sinks in wards 21, 22 and 28.

At Gouverneur Hospital the painters are making satisfactory progress, and estimates have been asked for on the repairs to the roof.

The work on the new dispensary at Harlem Hospital has been delayed by failure of the plumbers to get material in time.

Estimates have been asked for on the work of painting three rooms at Fordham Hospital and the advisability of painting the building was also pointed out.

Contracts for Supplies—An arrangement has been concluded with the Brown Insecticide Company, No. 700 Eighth avenue, to keep the hospitals free from vermin under the same arrangement as that made last year.

Recommendation was made to strike from the list of articles to be purchased by contract a number of items for which better terms can be secured by purchase in the open market.

An arrangement for the removal of manure on the same terms as last year has been concluded.

A special arrangement with Doctor Park of the Board of Health for the inspection of the milk coming to the Department has been concluded.

The new regulations concerning the signing of bed cards and transfer slips have been communicated to the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital.

Arrangements have been perfected for telegraphing to the friends of patients in critical condition, and this plan will be resorted to in the future whenever the circumstances render it necessary.



Notices concerning the private use of the telephone have been prepared and posted about the hospitals.

Inquiry has been made concerning the behavior of Ambulance Surgeons while on duty and no evidence of improper behavior has been discovered.

Wages of Employees—The annual payroll of the Department is now being prepared and will be ready in a few days. The wages of Firemen and Enginemen have been raised in accordance with the resolution passed by the Board of Trustees and their hours have been made eight per day.

The Superintendent reported that he was present at the hearing given by the Municipal Civil Service Commission on the Board's request that Ambulance Drivers be placed in the non-competitive class. The Superintendent explained to the Commission the reasons of the Board for requesting this change, and was informed that the Board of Trustees would be notified in writing of the action of the Commission in this matter.

Communications—A communication was received from George W. Blake, Secretary to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, acknowledging the receipt of the request of this Board that the sidewalk in East Twenty-sixth street be repaved and that asphalt be laid in front of Gouverneur Hospital. The President of the Borough reports that work upon the asphalt in front of Gouverneur Hospital will surely begin as soon as the weather permits, and that instructions have been given to the Commissioner of Public Works to prepare the necessary specifications and contract for the work of relaying the sidewalk in East Twenty-sixth street.

A communication from the Secretary to the President of the Board of Aldermen acknowledging receipt of the Board's request to be allowed to purchase coal without public letting at an expenditure not to exceed ten thousand dollars was received.

A communication addressed to Mr. Tack, making complaint of certain charges made for the issue of a certificate of insanity to a private institution, was received.

It was explained that the rules of the hospital forbid the issue of such certificates by physicians in the employ of the Department, and investigation proved that the certificate in question had not been issued by any physician attached to the staff of the hospital.

On motion, it was resolved that the matter of the issue of certificates of insanity to private institutions be referred to Doctor Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, for investigation and report.

Mr. Paulding reported the receipt of a communication from John B. Prest, Inspector of the State Board of Charities, requesting to know what action, if any, had been taken by the Board of Trustees in the matter of submitting plans for the new dispensaries at Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals to the State Board of Charities for its suggestion and report.

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the matter of a reply to this request be referred to Mr. Stine, with power to take such action as he may deem fit.

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the action of the President in ordering the above repairs be and hereby is approved.

New Business—Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying minor or incidental expenses, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals be directed to write to the Board of Aldermen for permission to draw by requisition upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding \$300, the drafts to be renewed as often as deemed necessary by the Board of Trustees, but only to such extent as there may be available appropriations against which such expenses are properly chargeable, and in no event to exceed the sum of \$3,000 in any one year. No such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified by the Board covering the expenditures thereon.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Superintendent it was, upon motion, duly seconded, resolved that bids for ball blue, butchers' wax, kindling wood, Welsbach mantles, water pails, brass barrel locks for wardrobes, comb grained pine flooring, Portland cement, lime (common), lime (finishing), plaster paris, plasterers' hair, brick, building sand, fire clay, fire brick, lath, orange, shellac, body varnish, glass, anhydrous ammonia, wrapping paper, laundry nets, sputum cups and chamois skins be rejected for the following reasons:

The use of ball blue is to be discontinued.

The use of butchers' wax is experimental.

Kindling wood is at the highest price and is more than double that of last year.

The price of Welsbach mantles is too high.

Water pails can probably be bought as cheap, if not cheaper, in the open market.

Brass locks for wardrobes are too expensive, and we have but little need for such locks.

Comb grained yellow pine was specified as four inches instead of two and should be readvertised.

Portland cement is specified as "Atlas" or equal. This gives too wide a latitude for an important supply for repairs, and as there are only 18 barrels for the year it can be purchased to advantage in the open market.

Lime, common and finishing; plaster paris, plasterers' hair, brick, building sand, fire clay, fire brick and lath—quantities required are small and can be purchased according to the needs of the institution.

Orange shellac in grain alcohol, price \$1.45. Last year we paid \$2.38. It does not seem possible to get orange shellac in grain alcohol for the price quoted.

Varnish, body finishing. The price this year is only half as much as last year and an inferior varnish would probably be furnished. No standard sample was established for this article.

Glass. As but sixty boxes are needed it can be bought to better advantage in the open market at prices with established trade discounts.

Anhydrous ammonia can be purchased to better advantage from a manufacturer than a dealer.

Wrapping paper can be obtained from the City Record office.

Laundry nets. Limited quantity asked for can be purchased to better advantage in the open market.

Chamois skins. It is not believed, at the price quoted by the lowest bidder, that satisfactory goods can be furnished.

Sputum cups of china are to be discontinued and agate ware substituted.

Reporting upon the condition of the floor of the drug store in the cellar of Bellevue Hospital.

### Supplies.

The matter of providing pictures and palms for the pavilion for the insane.

On motion, the following resolution, having been duly seconded, was adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution passed by the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, authorizing the Superintendent to purchase pictures for the pavilion for the insane at a cost not to exceed on an average \$1 each, and also artificial palms, be and hereby is rescinded.

Resolved, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase pictures for the pavilion for the insane at a cost not to exceed one hundred dollars.

Resolved, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase one-half dozen artificial palms for the pavilion for the insane.

Calling attention to the need of new horses and the possibility of exchanging some of those now in use.

Moved, seconded and carried that the matter be referred to the Superintendent with power.

The Superintendent reported upon the desirability of giving life-saving instruction to the doctors and nurses in charge of the wards of Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved to request the Superintendent to secure estimates for the same.

Calling attention to the frequency of transfers from other hospitals to Bellevue after eight o'clock in the evening.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Superintendent be authorized to investigate this matter.

Reporting receipt of a letter from Miss Carrie Gray, Supervising Nurse of Fordham Hospital, in regard to cases turned over to Fordham Hospital by the Lebanon Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that a letter be sent to the Commissioner of Police calling his attention to the fact that ambulance cases in the district of the Lebanon Hospital are declined by it, and asking him to notify this hospital that it must respond to these cases or relinquish the district.

### Communications.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the Secretary communicate with the Corporation Counsel and obtain his opinion as to the validity of this claim.

Mr. Stine, to whom was referred the request of the State Board of Charities for copies of the plans for improvements in the dispensaries of Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals, reported that in his opinion the law does not confer upon the State Board of Charities the right to insist that plans for new dispensaries be submitted to it, but merely provides that the State Board may co-operate with and assist other departments and boards in the erection of buildings for charitable purposes.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, To submit to the State Board of Charities for its suggestion only the plans under which improvements at the Bellevue Dispensary are at present going on.

Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported upon the following:



## Alterations and Repairs.

Repairs to elevator car and elevator engine are now under way. It is necessary to make a sewer connection to the new dormitory. This has not been provided for in the contract.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proper sewer connection with the new dormitory be made, at a cost not to exceed forty-eight dollars.

An estimate has been received and approved for placing metal ceilings in Ward 31, receiving room, dressing room and Apothecary's bedroom.

Recommendation is made that the buildings at Fordham and Harlem Hospitals be painted. The lowest estimates received for this work are: At Fordham Hospital, two hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$225) for the administration building and passageway and one hundred and eighty dollars (\$180) for the Hospital proper; Harlem Hospital, three hundred and fifteen dollars (\$315) for the main building and two hundred dollars (\$200) for the new building in which the Dispensary is located.

## Supplies.

The Superintendent submitted a statement of the poultry purchased in the open market during the month of January, 1903, and recommended that permission be obtained from the Board of Aldermen to purchase poultry in the open market at a cost not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars.

The following resolution, having been moved and seconded, was passed:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northwesterly line of Webster Avenue with the northeasterly line of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth Street; running thence northwesterly along said last mentioned line to its intersection with the southeasterly line of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse; thence northeasterly along said last mentioned line to its intersection with the southwesterly line of Kingsbridge Road; thence easterly in a straight line to a point formed by the intersection of the northwesterly line of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth Street with a line parallel to and 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Valentine Avenue; thence northeasterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line parallel to and 100 feet northeasterly from the northwesterly line of East One Hundred and Ninety-eighth Street; thence southeasterly along said last mentioned parallel line to its intersection with a line parallel to and 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Bainbridge Avenue; thence southwesterly along said last mentioned parallel line to its intersection with a line parallel to and 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth Street; thence southeasterly along said last mentioned parallel line to its intersection with the northwesterly line of Webster Avenue; thence southwesterly along said last mentioned line to the point or place of beginning; as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened as such area is shown upon our benefit maps deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Courthouse, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 5th day of May, 1903, at the opening of the court on that day.

## PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
