NEW YORK, February 19, 1908.

To the Honorable, the Senate of the State of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District respectfully submits herewith its reply to the resolution of the Senate, dated February 5, 1908, concurred in by the Assembly February 12, 1908, received by the Commission February 14, 1908, requesting information as to what steps the Commission has taken towards the speedy operation of the Steinway Tunnel, and any other information received by the Commission in connection therewith.

The so-called Steinway Tunnel has been constructed by the New York and Long Island Railroad Company and financed by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which controls the tunnel company through stock ownership.

The City of New York and the New York and Long Island Railroad Company have been engaged in litigation since February, 1906, over the right of the company to construct this tunnel. The City claimed that the company was not a legal corporation; that it had no right to construct the tunnel; that even if it ever were a lawful corporation its corporate existence and powers ceased on January 1, 1907; and that its New York City franchises also expired at the same time.

In passing upon the claim of the City, Mr. Justice Davis, of the Supreme Court, in an opinion rendered December 9, 1907, said:

"The failure of the defendant to comply with the Railroad Law as to completion and operation of the railroad was *ipso facto* an extinction of the corporation, and it does not require the bringing of an action to dissolve the corporation (Matter of Brooklyn, Winfield & Newtown R'y, 72 N. Y., 245). And the so-called franchises mentioned in the complaint were immediately extinguished (see Brooklyn, Q. Co. & Sub. R. R., 185 N. Y., 185).

"It thus appears from the complaint that the action is brought against a defendant that has no existence. The defendant being dead in the sense referred to above there can be no pleading to the complaint on behalf of that defendant. * * *

"I do not agree with the demurrant's view that the property rights and franchises mentioned in the complaint survive the extinction of the defendant's corporate existence and pass to the directors as trustees for the benefit of those concerned, and that these trustees are the proper parties defendant. If this were so the trustees might take their own time to build the road and thus defeat the very purpose of the statute to insure a speedy completion of the work for public uses (Matter of B'klyn, Q. Co. & Sub. R. R., 185 N. Y., 171, 185). * * * My conclusion is that the demurrer is not properly interposed and has no standing in the case. The demurrer really admits that there is no defendant here. As a matter of fact there is no action pending, nor was there at the time the demurrer was served. Submit decision and judgment in accordance with these views."

An appeal in one of the actions between the City and the Company is now on the calendar of the Court of Appeals and may be argued within the next two months. The entire litigation on behalf of the City is in the hands of the Corporation Counsel.

More detailed information in relation to this tunnel and to the matters in controversy will be found in the report herewith transmitted, entitled "The Steinway Tunnel."

If the New York and Long Island Railroad Company has forfeited its corporate rights and franchises, the Commission is without present power to compel the operation of the tunnel, and pending the final determination of the rights of the parties to the litigation any attempt to do so would be premature and improper.

THE STEINWAY TUNNEL.

The tunnel extending from Manhattan to Queens, along the line of Forty-second street, commonly called the "Steinway Tunnel," has been constructed by a private company, and is not a part of the rapid transit system laid out by the Public Service Commission, or its predecessors. No application has been made to the Commission, under any section of the Public Service Commissions Law, by the owners of the tunnel, and no proposition looking towards the granting of a franchise to operate has been presented to the Commission for consideration. But the present situation is so peculiar and so many inquiries have been made at the office of the Commission that a statement of the facts up to December 31, 1907, may be of interest and value.

Origin of the Company.—The tunnel was originally begun by the New York and Long Island Railroad Company, which was incorporated July 30, 1887, under chapter 140 of the Laws of 1880, known as the General Railroad Act, and the amendments thereto. The articles of association provided that the company was to continue in existence for ninety-nine (99) years; that the capital stock was to be \$100,000, consisting of 1,000 shares, at \$100 each, and that a railroad was to be constructed and operated about five miles in length, extending from a point near Borden avenue, Queens, one mile from the East river; thence under the river and under certain streets and lands in Manhattan to a connection with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at or near the intersection of Ninth avenue and Thirtieth street, New York City, with a branch northerly to connect with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, near the Grand Central Depot, and a branch southerly to connect with the Hudson River tunnel in the vicinity of Washington square.

The General Railroad Act of 1880 was amended by chapter 775 of the Laws of 1867, which provided, among other things, that if any corporation organized under the Act of 1880,

"shall not, within five years after its articles of association are filed and recorded in the office of the Secretary of State, begin the construction of its road, and expend thereon ten per cent. on the amount of its capital, or shall not finish its road and put it in operation in ten years from the time of filing its articles of association, as aforesaid, its corporate existence and powers shall cease."

Work not completed.—It therefore became incumbent upon the New York and Long Island Railroad Company to have begun construction of the tunnel and to have expended thereon \$10,000 by July 30, 1892, and to have finished it and put it in operation by July 30, 1897, under penalty of forfeiture of its corporate existence and powers.

The company's contractor started work in May, 1892, and it is claimed that up to July 30 of that year the sum of \$11,718.33 had been expended. Work continued down to December, 1892, when an explosion occurred, and for nearly thirteen years nothing further was accomplished. In resuming operations in 1905, eight years after the charter would have expired, under the Law of 1867, above quoted, the company relied upon a series of acts, the last of which, adopted in 1903, is claimed to have extended until January 1, 1907, the time within which the road should have been finished and put in operation. As a matter of fact, the tunnel was not finished and put in operation by this date.

Franchise Grants.—Incorporation did not of itself confer upon the company the right to begin work. Consents had still to be obtained from the local authorities and from the State of New York, which are as follows:

"(1) Resolution of the Board of Aldermen of the old City of New York, approved December 31, 1890.

(2) Patent issued by the State of New York, January 5, 1891.

(3) Resolution of the Board of Aldermen of Long Island City, approved October 27, 1891."

By the first resolution the City assented

"to the construction of a double track railroad by the New York and Long Island Railroad Company, in, by and through a tunnel beneath the surface of Forty-second street, from its easterly end, to a point therein between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, in said City, with such connections, branches, turnouts, sidings and switches, as may be requisite and necessary, in accordance with the plans and profiles of such railroad heretofore deposited with this Board, or such modification thereof as shall be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works of said City."

For compensation to The City of New York, the ordinance provided that the company should,

"pay annually to the City of New York three per centum of its gross earnings or receipts from transportation of persons and property on its railroad within said City; such payment to be exclusive of all taxes levied by and payable to The City of New York on the real or personal property, capital stock or income of said company, and the books of said company showing the amount of its said gross earnings or receipts shall, at all reasonable times and hours be open to the inspection of the Comptroller of the City of New York (or to his duly authorized agents) for the purpose of verifying the returns thereof of said company."

The consent of the State of New York was granted by the following patent:

"The People of the State of New York, by the Grace of God, Free and Independent: To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

"Know Ye, That, pursuant to chapter 140, Laws of 1880, as amended by chapter 601, Laws of 1886, and a resolution of the Commissioners of the Land Office adopted November 25, 1890, we have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant unto the New York and Long Island Railroad Company, its successors and assigns, a right of way ninety-nine feet in width and fifty feet in height within which to construct a tunnel for the use and operation of the above-named grantees' railroad beneath the waters of the East River upon and along the route of said railroad, between the City of New York and Hunter's Point in Long Island City, as shown in plan and profile, upon the charts filed in the office of our Secretary of State, with the water grant papers of the month of January, 1891.

"Together with all and singular the rights, hereditaments and appurtenances to the same belonging, or in any wise appertaining; to have and to hold the above described premises unto the said New York and Long Island Railroad Company, its successors and assigns forever."

Long Island City, by the last resolution referred to, assented to the construction of a double track railroad upon and along the following lines and routes:

"Route One—Beginning at a point under the ground at or near the westerly end of Fifth street and in the middle line thereof at low water mark, on the east side of the East River in said city; thence running easterly beneath streets and private property to a point at or near the intersection of Fourth street and West avenue; thence along Fourth street to or near Van Alst avenue, with a station hereafter to be located between the easterly shore of the East River and Van Alst avenue; thence northeasterly by a curved line to Meadow street; thence along Meadow street to Beach street; * * *

The whole route may be indicated as follows:

A (New York City), B (Dock Property), C (East River), D-E (Long Island City), F. A is Forty-second street at "a point therein between Tenth and Eleventh avenues," Manhattan.

B is "beneath the surface of Forty-second street from (at) its easterly end," Manhattan.

C to D is "beneath the waters of the East River upon and along the route of said railroad, between the City of New York and Hunter's Point in Long Island City, as shown in plan and profile, upon the charts filed in the office of our Secretary of State, with the water grant papers of the month of January, 1891."

E is "At or near the westerly end of Fifth street and in the middle line thereof at low water mark," Long Island City.

F is Meadow street at Beach street, Long Island City.

Route as Constructed.—It will be noted that the route above described differs from the route set forth in the articles of association and from the location of the tunnel as actually constructed. The company claims to have obtained the legal right to make such alterations, but the Corporation Counsel of the City has denied this. The route as actually constructed is approximately as follows: From a loop at the intersection of Park avenue and Forty-second street, somewhat below the present subway, the line extends under Forty-second street, under the wharf property of the City at the end of Forty-second street, East River, to the west end of Fifth street, Long Island City; from thence it runs under private property to Fourth street, and under Fourth street to a point between Jackson and Van Alst avenues. The portion from Forty-second street to a point between Tenth and Eleventh avenues has not been constructed. The line is composed of two tracks for its entire length and for most of the distance each track is located in a separate tunnel.

A comparison of the route as actually built with the rights granted by The City of New York, the State of New York and Long Island City, shows how a difference of

opinion has arisen as to whether the company has obtained the proper legal authority for the construction of a tunnel under dock property in New York City; that is, the section between "B" and "C" in the above diagram. The company claims that the resolution of the Board of Aldermen covers this section. The legal representatives of the City have claimed that jurisdiction over this strip of land 300 feet in width was vested in the Department of Docks, and that it was necessary to secure the consent of this Department for the construction of the route. The courts have not yet passed upon this point.

City's Efforts to Stop Work—When the company resumed work in 1905 it obtained from the Fire Commissioner of The City of New York licenses to use and keep explosives at the four shafts where it was prosecuting its work, and later in the year obtained permission from the Building Department to erect certain temporary structures. About this time there arose considerable discussion regarding the legal right of the company to proceed with the work. Many claim that the company had forfeited its charter because of its failure to complete the tunnel by July 30, 1892, and that it was proceeding illegally.

Upon January 22, 1906, the Inspector of Combustibles of the Fire Department, New York City, informed the contractors doing the work that four permits for blasting had been revoked "by direction of the Corporation Counsel." Two days later the Superintendent of Buildings informed the contractors that certain building permits had been revoked "for the reason that the right to build this tunnel is disputed." No infractions of the permits themselves were alleged. Thereupon the railroad company brought a suit to stay the revocation of the permits, and a preliminary injunction was granted. The main contentions of the Corporation Counsel in opposing an injunction were that the company was not a legal corporation and that it had no right to construct the tunnel. The case came first before Justice Blanchard of the Supreme Court, who said:

"Independent of the foregoing considerations, however, the validity of the plaintiff's franchise, in which a large amount of capital is invested and great public interests are concerned, cannot properly be determined upon affidavits. To resolve this question now against the plaintiff would permit such interference with the plaintiff's work as would prevent its completion within the time set therefor, upon which its franchise is conditional. The plaintiff will be irretrievably damaged if the doubt were now resolved against it. The defendant, on the other hand, cannot be prejudiced by the postponement. For this reason the Court may well refuse to determine the question upon the present motion, and instead may properly make a restraining order permitting the continuance of the work under the alleged franchise until the question may be tried in court according to the rules of evidence. Upon this ground, as well as upon the merits, the plaintiff's motion for a continuation *pendente lite*, of the preliminary injunction, is granted."

The case came on for trial before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald in June, 1906, who concluded that:

(1) "The plaintiff had acquired at the time of the beginning of this action, and now has, due legal power and lawful authority to construct and operate its tunnel and railroad."

(2) "There was no warrant or authority in law for the attempted revocation of any of said licenses and permits, either for the use of explosives or for temporary buildings; and said licenses and permits were and are of full force and effect."

(3) "The time of the plaintiff to complete the construction of its tunnel will expire on the 31st day of December, 1906."

In his opinion Mr. Justice Fitzgerald said:

"The validity of plaintiff's incorporation under the provisions of the General Railroad Act of 1850, as affected by various subsequent statutes, particularly the prohibition of chapter 10, Laws of 1860, applicable only to The City of New York, the constitutionality of the Tunnel Act, chapter 582, Laws of 1880, the alleged failure of defendant in any event to comply with its provisions, the legality of the consents of the local authorities and of the abutting owners, the lapsing by expiration of time of the defendant's franchises and its failure to comply with statutory requirements in the matter of the change of route, were all sharply presented and definitely determined,"—when the matter was before Mr. Justice Blanchard. Accordingly a decision was rendered for the company.

As to the contention of the City that the railroad company had failed to obtain the consent of the Dock Department for the 300-foot strip referred to above, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald said:

"It is claimed that this land under water is within the exclusive control of the Dock Department, and that no action of the Board of Aldermen can confer any right of way or easement under this portion of the bed of the East River. * * * This is a proposition not affecting the validity of plaintiff's charter, but challenging its right to construct its tunnel upon a portion of its designated route. It does not appear that any application for consent was made and refused, nor was the failure to obtain such consent made a ground for the revocation of the permits. There is some suggestion of acquiescence. If plaintiff becomes a trespasser it does so at its peril, and no adjudication now can deprive the City or the Dock Department of their remedies, while irreparable loss might result to the plaintiffs if it were, by the revocation of permits, prevented from prosecuting a work the failure to complete which within a short period of time might involve the forfeiture of its charter and the consequent loss of the vast sum of money already expended."

The Case in the Appellate Division—The appeal from this judgment was argued in the Appellate Division in October, 1907, and the Appellate Division, by unanimous opinion, affirmed the judgment of Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. Although the case was not decided until 1907, it was begun in 1906, and therefore the Court did not assume to decide these two questions:

(1) The effect of the failure of the company to construct and operate its road by the prescribed time, namely, January 1, 1907.

(2) The effect of the failure to get the consent of the Dock Department of The City of New York for a portion of its road as at present constructed. The Appellate Division did say, however:

"The articles of association were filed on the 30th of July, 1887; the company entered into a contract for the construction of its road in June, 1890; work was begun thereunder, and by July 30, 1892, upwards of 10 per cent. of the capital had been expended. The time for completion had been extended by chapter 700 of the Laws of 1895; 647 of the Laws of 1901; 487 of the Laws of 1902; 597 of the Laws of 1903; to January 1, 1907. As this case was commenced in February, 1906, and tried in June of the same year, the time limit for completion had not expired."

As to the second question, the Appellate Division said:

"For the purpose of this suit it is unnecessary to decide where the power is lodged. The permits at bar were not revoked because the permission of the Dock Department had not been granted to pierce this strip of land under water."

Direct Action Brought by the City—In February, 1907, an action was brought by The City of New York against the New York and Long Island Railroad Company, the substance of this action being that the corporate existence and powers of the railroad company ceased January 1, 1907, that its work since that time had been carried on without legal authority and that its franchises were forfeited and void. The City asked judgment permanently enjoining and restraining the construction and operation of the railroad. To this complaint the company demurred, and the demurrer was argued before Mr. Justice Davis, of the Supreme Court, in October, 1907.

Mr. Edward P. Bryan, President of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, testified before the Commission upon August 20, 1907, that he was Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company. He also stated that the company ceased to have a Board of Directors about January 1, 1907, when the Board became a Board of Trustees, "practically under the advice of our legal department." He further testified that all the corporate assets which, prior to January 1, 1907, were under the direction or control of the Board of Directors of the company, were then (August 20, 1907) under the direction and control of the Board of Trustees and that he signed himself, not as President of the company, but as Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Justice Davis, in his opinion handed down December 9, 1907, ruled that the demurrer put in by the company was not properly interposed. He said:

"The failure of the defendant to comply with the Railroad Law as to completion and operation of the railroad was *ipso facto* an extinction of the corporation, and it does not require the bringing of an action to dissolve the corporation (Matter of Brooklyn, Winfield & Newtown R'y, 72 N. Y., 245). And the so-called franchises mentioned in the complaint were immediately extinguished (see Brooklyn, Q. Co. & Sub. R. R., 185 N. Y., 185).

"It thus appears from the complaint that the action is brought against a defendant that has no existence. The defendant being dead in the sense referred to above there can be no pleading to the complaint on behalf of that defendant. * * *

"I do not agree with the demurrant's view that the property rights and franchises mentioned in the complaint survive the extinction of the defendant's corporate existence and pass to the directors as trustees for the benefit of those concerned, and that these trustees are the proper parties defendant. If this were so the trustees might take their own time to build the road and thus defeat the very purpose of the statute to insure a speedy completion of the work for public uses (Matter of B'klyn. Q. Co. & Sub. R. R., 185 N. Y., 171, 185). * * * My conclusion is that the demurrer is not properly interposed and has no standing in the case. The demurrer really admits that there is no defendant here. As a matter of fact, there is no action pending, nor was there at the time the demurrer was served. Submit decision and judgment in accordance with these views."

Present Condition—Such was the situation of the litigation at the end of the year. The tunnel was almost if not quite completed, and it is stated that operation could be begun in a short time so far as physical conditions are concerned. Cars have actually been run through for purposes of inspection, but not for public use. The stock of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company is practically all owned by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which has furnished the funds to build the line (see Mr. Bryan's evidence before the Commission in the Interborough-Metropolitan investigation). The same company owns practically all of the stock of the New York and Queens County Railway Company, the company that operates the street car lines in Long Island City and most of the Borough of Queens. Thus the Interborough Company controls the subway in Manhattan, with which the Steinway tunnel would at present naturally connect; the Steinway tunnel itself, and also the surface lines in Queens, which are naturally the feeders of the tunnel. It would easily be possible within a short time to make an operating connection between the tunnel and the Queens surface lines. In Manhattan a transfer station certainly could be built and possibly an operating connection provided. But no proposition has been made to the Commission by any company looking to this end.

The following statement has been filed with the Commission of the expenditures of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in connection with its acquisition of the stock, etc., of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company and the construction of the tunnel, including the estimates of the amounts required to complete the work by the Chief Engineer of the company:

Amending subdivisions 1 and 2 of section 53 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

"1. There shall be in each training school for Teachers a Principal, First Assistants, Assistant Teachers, Critic Teachers, Library Assistants, Laboratory Helpers and Clerical Assistants; and in each model school a head of the model school, and such Assistants to the Principal, Model Teachers and Clerical Assistants as may be necessary.

"Nothing herein shall affect the tenure or position of any person or persons holding the position of Principal of a model school or head of a model school at the time of the passage of this by-law.

"2. There shall be established, as a part of each training school for Teachers, a model school for observation. The duties of the head of the model school and of the other Teachers and Assistants shall be assigned by the Principal of the training school."

Amending subdivision 16 of section 65 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by striking out the words "A Principal" at the beginning of the second paragraph thereof, and substituting therefor the words "A head"; by striking out the words "woman Principal" in the first line of the third paragraph thereof, and substituting therefor the word "head"; and by striking out the word "Principal" in the fifth line of said paragraph and substituting therefor the words "head of the model school."

Amending section 66 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education in the following respects, viz.:

1. By inserting in the schedule headed "Training School Licenses" between the lines reading

"Substitute Library Assistant

"Model Teacher"

a line reading

"Laboratory Helper."

2. By changing the line reading "Principal in model school" so as to read "Head of a model school."

3. By striking out in the schedule of age limits headed "Training School Licenses," in the seventh line and in the eighth line thereof, the words "Principal in," and substituting therefor in each case the words "head of."

Amending the caption and first paragraph of section 93 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

VII.—Head of a Model School.

Sec. 93. To be eligible for license as head of a model school, the applicant must have one of the following qualifications:

Accepting the offer made by the Macmillan Company for the sale of the plates and stock of the work entitled "The New York Public School" for the sum of \$100, and authorizing the Secretary to sign a formal cancellation of the agreement for the publication of said work, which was made and entered into on November 29, 1904, the form of such cancellation to be subject to the approval of the Chairman of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation, and accepting the offer made by B. Stating that it shall be the duty of the incumbents of the positions of Machinist, Boilermaker, Coppersmith and Blacksmith in the New York Nautical School to render service as instructors, under the direction of the Superintendent of said school, in addition to their other duties.

Congratulating and commending the Principals, heads of departments, Teachers, Clerk, Janitor and pupils in Public School 86, Manhattan, for their presence of mind and devotion to duty as evidenced by their splendid conduct during the time of the recent fire in that school, at which time excitement and confusion would have been the natural consequence had not those entrusted with the charge of the children shown themselves to be eminently fitted to meet any emergency, and noting the appreciation of this Board upon the minutes, and that copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the Principals of Public School 86, with a request that they read the same to all those connected with them in their work.

Recommending to the Board of Education the re-election of Dr. Henry M. Leipziger as Supervisor of Lectures for the statutory term of six years.

The following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Executive Committee on the Nautical School has received from Commander Charles P. Eaton, U. S. N. (retired), who was appointed as Chief Engineer in the New York Nautical School on December 1, 1907, a communication, dated January 6, 1908, in which he tendered his resignation, to take effect January 20, 1908, for the reason that he has had considerable trouble with his eyes, which was the cause of his going on the retired list of the Navy in 1905; and

Whereas, His resignation was accepted with much regret, and inasmuch as Commander Eaton will sever his connection with the New York Nautical School in a very short time; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board expresses its thanks to Commander Charles P. Eaton, U. S. N. (retired), for the very satisfactory manner in which he has fulfilled his duties as Chief Engineer in the New York Nautical School during his incumbency of that office, and that his resignation be accepted with regret, to take effect January 20, 1908.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be forwarded to the Secretary of the Navy.

Whereas, Miss Stella V. Dodge, a special Teacher of Cooking, died on November 10, 1907, after an absence of nine days on account of illness; and

Whereas, Her absence for six and one-half days of that period has been excused by the Board of Superintendents in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board of Education; and

Whereas, Miss Dodge rendered faithful service in the public schools as a Teacher of Cooking; therefore be it

Resolved, That the absence of Stella V. Dodge for the period of two and one-half days in November, 1907, be and it hereby is excused with pay, and that all provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent herewith be and they hereby are suspended for the purpose of this resolution.

Whereas, On November 27, 1907 (see Journal, page 2394), the Board of Education adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to a renewal of the lease of premises at Stone and East New York avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied as an annex to Public School 84, with Antonio Scocca; and

Whereas, A communication, dated December 27, 1907, has been received from John La Barbiera, of No. 4 Sunnyside avenue, Brooklyn, to the effect that on September 24, 1907, D. Rubbo was appointed administrator for the estate of Antonio Scocca, deceased; therefore be it

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on November 27, 1907, relative to renewing the lease of premises at Stone and East New York avenues, Brooklyn, be, and the same is hereby, amended by striking out the words, "Owner, Antonio Scocca, Stone and East New York avenues, Brooklyn, New York," in the fifth and sixth lines from the bottom of page 2394, and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "Lessors, Estate of Antonio Scocca, D. Rubbo, administrator, No. 4 Sunnyside avenue, Brooklyn, New York;" and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be, and they are hereby, requested to amend the resolution adopted by them on December 18, 1907, relative to authorizing the execution of a renewal of the lease of the said above-mentioned premises, by striking out the words, "Antonio Scocca," and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "Estate of Antonio Scocca, D. Rubbo, administrator."

Whereas, Ferdinand Rice, Office Boy in the Draughting Division of the Bureau of School Buildings, has been absent from duty, without leave, since October 21, 1907; therefore be it

Resolved, That the name of Ferdinand Rice, Office Boy in the Draughting Division of the Bureau of School Buildings, be dropped from the payroll of the Department of Education.

And whereas, The Superintendent of School Buildings reports that these estimates are reasonable and that the work is necessary; therefore be it

Resolved, That the sum of three hundred and forty-five dollars and seventy-five cents (\$345.75) be, and the same is hereby, appropriated from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said amount to be applied in full payment for extra cost to William Werner, A. Nugent's Son and John Auer & Sons, contractors, for additional work in connection with their contracts, as hereinbefore stated; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

The following resolutions were also adopted:

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation to report to the Board of Education amendments to the By-Laws providing for an increase in the number of additional teachers in schools of the first order, for the establishment of centres from which substitutes may be obtained, for the regulation of the supply of substitutes, and for the organization of a preferred list of substitutes:

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on Supplies to take measures to connect all schools by telephone with the District Superintendents' offices and with the Hall of the Board of Education.

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Board of Education that the Board of Superintendents should not decrease further the average number of pupils to a class until the supply of teachers is more ample and the appropriation for the General School Fund more adequate.

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation to report an amendment to the By-Laws extending the limit of age in the case of applicants for license No. 1.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Board of Education, examinations for license No. 1 should be held during the last week in the month of December, instead of the first week in the month of January.

The lamented death of Mr. Philip H. Grunenthal, Principal of Public School 27, Borough of Manhattan, occurred on December 27, 1907.

Mr. Grunenthal was appointed a Teacher in Public School 79, Manhattan, in October, 1872, and became Principal of Public School 27 in March, 1899. This position he held until his death, being identified with the public school system for upwards of thirty-five years.

The Board of Education desires to place on record an expression of its sorrow at the death of Mr. Grunenthal and of appreciation of his long and faithful services.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing minute be transmitted to the family of Mr. Grunenthal.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

Recurring in the event of the necessity arising of augmenting or supplementing the General School Fund for the year 1908, to such trust funds within the possession of the Board as the Committee on Finance may deem available for the purpose, and submitting in future, all propositions involving any increase in number of classes to the Committee on Finance, for the purpose of ascertaining financial ability before authorizing or permitting the organizing of such classes.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock or Special Revenue Bonds, as said Board in its judgment deems best, to the extent of forty-one thousand seven hundred and fifteen dollars (\$41,715), the proceeds thereof to be applied in payment of contracts to be entered into for the erection of fire escapes on sundry school buildings.

Rescinding the first and second resolutions of the report of the Committee on Buildings adopted by the Board of Education on April 25, 1906, relative to declaring the United Heating Company in default on the work of alterations of heating and ventilating apparatus of Public School 147, Borough of Queens, and directing that the security deposit of \$250 on their bid for said work be forfeited to The City of New York, and requesting, in accordance with the advice of the Acting Corporation Counsel, as above stated, the Comptroller to turn over the security deposit mentioned in the foregoing resolution to the Trustee in Bankruptcy of the said United Heating Company.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of a lease to the City of the store floor of the premises No. 288 East Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, used as an annex to Public School 147, for a period of one year from February 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$900, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; all of the foregoing to be subject to the approval of the Department of Health as to satisfactory sanitary conditions. Owner, A. E. Isaacs, No. 240 East Broadway, New York City.

Rescinding the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on December 11, 1907, relative to the leasing of premises on East Fifty-third street, near Beverley road, Borough of Brooklyn, and requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease to the City of the following described premises:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Church avenue with the easterly line of East Forty-eighth street, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of East Forty-eighth street ninety-three (93) feet five and one half (5½) inches; thence easterly and parallel or nearly so with Church avenue one hundred and twenty (120) feet; thence southerly and parallel or nearly so with East Forty-eighth street ninety-six (96) feet six (6) inches to the northerly line of Church avenue; thence westerly along the northerly line of Church avenue one hundred and twenty (120) feet to the easterly line of East Forty-eighth street, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

—for a period of three years from March 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$325, the City to assume the taxes during the life of the lease. Owners, Wood, Harmon & Co., G. J. Luhn, Agent, Church and Utica avenues, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Miss Elizabeth Rinn, of No. 688 Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, whose name was certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as Clerk in the office of the City Superintendent, at a salary of \$50 per month, the appointment taking effect January 16, 1908, and to continue for a temporary period not to exceed three months.

Promoting Mr. Frank V. Daly, Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the City Superintendent, from grade 1C to grade 2B, subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission (the grades specified being those which appear in the new schedule for the clerical service adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and pending before the Board of Aldermen).

Amending Schedule XIII, as appearing in subdivision 18 of section 65 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education, by inserting therein the following additional clause:

"(d) Female Inspectors of public school athletics shall receive a salary of \$1,750 per annum."

—and that the clause of Schedule XIII, now designated by the letter "(d)" be hereafter designated by the letter "(e)."

Ro. L. Harrison, A. Stern, Geo. W. Wingate, Committee on By-Laws and Legislation.

Mr. Barrett moved that the resolution attached to the report of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation be amended by striking out the amount \$1,750, and substituting therefor the amount \$1,500.

The amendment was accepted by Mr. Harrison, on behalf of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation.

The report was then approved and the resolution, as amended, was adopted.

Amending subdivision 7 of section 51 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education in the first sentence thereof by inserting after the word "first" the words "order two Teachers, and in schools of the," so that said sentence shall read as follows:

"7. In schools of the first order two Teachers, and in schools of the second and third orders one Teacher, in excess of the number of classes may be appointed," etc.

Amending section 40 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by striking out subdivision 14 in its entirety and substituting therefor the following:

"14. The Board of Superintendents shall assign to the office of each District Superintendent such number of substitute Teachers as it may deem necessary, not exceeding one for every thirty regular Teachers under his supervision. Each substitute so assigned shall receive regular substitute's pay when employed in teaching, and fifty cents per day when reporting but not so employed. In assigning substitutes as herein provided the Board of Superintendents shall give preference to those who have rendered the longest and most efficient service as regular Teachers or as substitutes. A list of such persons shall be kept on file in the office of the City Superintendent. The Board of Superintendents shall remove from such list the name of any person who shall, in its opinion, unreasonably refuse to accept or perform service when the same is offered."

Amending section 40 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto a new subdivision, to be known and designated as subdivision 15, reading as follows:

"15. Licensed substitutes other than those specified in subdivision 14 shall be assigned by the Board of Superintendents to the office of each District Superintendent in numbers as nearly as possible proportionate to the number of regular Teachers in his districts. Substitute Teachers so assigned shall receive pay only when actually employed."

Amending section 41 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto a new subdivision, to be known and designated as subdivision 24, reading as follows:

"24. District Superintendents, may, whenever necessary, designate substations for substitutes in school buildings within their districts."

Amending the schedule of age limits appearing in section 66 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education headed "Elementary School Licenses—Day Schools" in the line reading "Teacher's license No. 1..... 18 to 35" by striking out the figures "35" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "40."

Amending section 66 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by inserting in the schedule headed "Elementary School Licenses—Day Schools," after the line reading "Inspector of public school athletics," the following:

"Assistant Inspector of public school athletics."

Requesting the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation to consider the advisability of action looking to the amending of clause (d) of section 84 of the By-Laws by inserting, after the words "experienced in teaching" (Manual, page 133, fourth and fifth lines), the words "satisfactory experience in teaching stenography in the evening schools of The City of New York may be accepted, year for year, in lieu of any part, not exceeding two years, of the required experience in teaching."

Discharging the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation from further consideration of the resolution offered by Mr. Higgins, referred to it by the Board of Education on November 13, 1907.

Vacating in view of the circumstances hereinbefore recited, the suspension of Miss Johanna A. Murphy, a Teacher in Public School 114, Borough of Brooklyn, and that she be reinstated as a Teacher.

Approving the suspension of Frances Smith, a Teacher in Public School 69, Borough of Manhattan, requesting the City Superintendent to accept the resignation of said Teacher, and relieving the Committee on Elementary Schools from further consideration of the matter of the charges preferred against her.

Dismissing the charges of neglect of duty preferred by District Superintendent Chickering against Mary E. Texido, a Teacher in Public School 79, Borough of Queens, as said Teacher's license expired on December 1, 1907, and has not been renewed.

Approving the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents that Public School 27, Manhattan, be closed Monday and Tuesday, February 3 and 4, 1908, so that the school furniture therein may be transferred to the new building.

Whereas, The Principals' Association of The City of New York has adopted a resolution requesting the Committee on Codes of the Board of Aldermen, in remodeling the ordinances for the regulation of traffic, to include a section providing a penalty for driving through lines of pupils established by principals exercising their schools in fire drills in compliance with the requirements of the State Law and the rules of the Board of Education; and

Whereas, It is very desirable that a penalty should be provided as set forth in the resolution referred to; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby requested to give careful consideration to the request of the Principals' Association of The City of New York, as above set forth.

Whereas, Mrs. Celia A. Mulready, a Teacher in Public School 19, Borough of Manhattan, was absent from school from November 4 to December 5, 1907, twenty-one days, on account of quarantine by the Board of Health; and

Whereas, Under section 44 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education Mrs. Mulready can be allowed only ten days' refund for this absence; and

Whereas, Mrs. Mulready has rendered faithful service as a Teacher since March 2, 1903; therefore be it

Resolved, That so much of the absence of Mrs. Celia A. Mulready from November 4 to December 5, 1907, as cannot be excused under section 44 of the By-Laws, be and it hereby is excused with pay, and that all provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent herewith be and they hereby are suspended for the purpose of this resolution.

Whereas, The Department of Superintendence of the National Education Association will hold its Forty-sixth Annual Convention in Washington, D. C., on February 25, 26 and 27, 1908; and

Whereas, It is desirable that the Department of Education of this City be represented at this convention; therefore be it

Resolved, That the City Superintendent, one Associate City Superintendent and one District Superintendent be and they hereby are authorized to represent the Department of Education at the Forty-sixth Annual Convention of the Department of Superintendence of the National Education Association, to be held in Washington, D. C., on February 25, 26 and 27, 1908, and that their expenses be paid.

Mr. Barrett moved that the resolution of the Committee on Elementary Schools be amended so as to provide that the City Superintendent attend the above mentioned convention at his own expense.

Mr. A. Stern moved, as a substitute, that the resolution be amended so as to provide that the City Superintendent and one Associate City Superintendent attend said convention and that their expenses be paid.

Seconded and adopted.

The preamble and resolution, as amended, were then adopted.

Whereas, A communication has been received from the Westchester Temporary Home for Destitute Children, to which institution certain truants are committed under the provisions of the Compulsory Education Law, stating that the cost for each child in the institution is \$4.13 per week, exclusive of charges for improvements, and that the deficiency resulting from the present charge, \$3 per week, is so great as to make its continuance impossible; and

Whereas, The Executive Committee of said institution adopted a resolution on November 26, 1907, to the effect that the charge for each truant committed after January 1, 1908, will be \$4 per week, but that such truants as may be in the institution on January 1, 1908, will be continued at the rate of \$3 per week until March 1, 1908, after which date the charge for all truants will be at the rate of \$4 per week each; and

Whereas, It appears that the rate of \$4 per week is being paid by all counties from which truants are committed to the above mentioned institution; therefore be it

Resolved, That the arrangements with the Westchester Temporary Home for Destitute Children for the reception and maintenance of truants committed thereto by the City Superintendent of Schools be renewed for the current year in accordance with the terms of the above mentioned resolution of the Executive Committee of the said institution.

Whereas, The Special Committee on Educational Museum has consented that the room set apart on the ninth floor of the Hall of the Board of Education for the purposes of the Educational Museum may be used temporarily by the Committee on Supplies and by Associate City Superintendent Stevens; therefore

Resolved, That the Committee on Buildings be and it is hereby authorized to fit up the above mentioned room for the purposes specified, it being distinctly understood that the occupation of the same for said purposes shall be for a temporary period only.

Mr. Kanzler moved that this preamble and resolution be laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Coudert moved, as a substitute, that the resolution offered by the Committee on Care of Buildings be amended by adding thereto the words "such period not to exceed six months."

The amendment was accepted by Mr. Higgins, on behalf of the Committee on Care of Buildings, and the preamble and resolution, as amended, were adopted.

Whereas, A communication has been received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, requesting consent to the transfer of Andrew T. Brice from the position of Mechanical Engineer in the Department of Education to a similar position in his office; therefore be it

Resolved, That consent be and it is hereby granted to the transfer of Andrew T. Brice, Mechanical Engineer in the Department of Education, to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Whereas, The New York Nautical School was established in pursuance of the Act of Congress of June 20, 1874, entitled "An Act to Encourage the Establishment of Marine Schools;" and

Whereas, By section 1157 of the New York City Charter the Board of Education is authorized and directed to provide and maintain a nautical school for the education and training of pupils in the science and practice of navigation, etc.; and

Whereas, The work of said school, in scope and effect, is to a large extent national, and has to do with the improvement of the merchant marine, the education of pupils for that purpose, and, incidentally, for a naval reserve; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education of The City of New York, in view of the foregoing, is of the opinion that the expense of maintaining nautical schools should be borne in part by the Federal Government.

Resolved, That Congress be petitioned to enact an amendment to the above mentioned Act of June 20, 1874, as amended, so as to provide that Congress shall appropriate annually an amount equal to that appropriated by any State or municipality for the support of a Nautical School.

Resolved, That a copy of this report be forwarded to each of the Representatives in Congress of the State of New York, and to the Chamber of Commerce, with the request that they aid in the passage of such amendment.

Whereas, Commander G. C. Hanus, Superintendent of the New York Nautical School, recently applied to the Navy Department to be detached from the "St. Marys," and also to be ordered to the command of the "Newport;" and

Whereas, The Navy Department has detached Commander Hanus from the "St. Marys" and has declined to order him to the command of the "Newport," merely giving him permission to go beyond the continental limits of the United States for the purpose of commanding the "Newport" and the "St. Marys;" and

Whereas, Under the Act of Congress of June 20, 1874, entitled "An Act to Encourage the Establishment of Marine Schools," it is provided that the "President is authorized, when in his opinion the same can be done without detriment to the public service, to detail proper officers of the Navy as superintendents of or instructors in such schools," and, in pursuance of such Act, the Navy Department, for upward of twenty years after the establishment of the New York Nautical School in 1874, regularly ordered an active officer of the Navy to the command of the "St. Marys," and thereafter and until the present time ordered a retired officer of the Navy to the command of the same vessel; and

Whereas, It is manifest that the Marine Schools Act of 1874 was enacted by Congress in accordance with the national policy of encouraging industrial education—a subject which is now exciting the keen interest of our most prominent educators throughout the country—and was in line with the apparent purposes of the Act of Congress of July 2, 1862, known as the Agricultural College Act; and

Whereas, The educational work of the Nautical School is largely national in its scope and purpose, making, as it does, for the upbuilding of the merchant marine, and for that reason should receive the active interest, support and encouragement of the Federal Government; and

Whereas, The failure or refusal of the Navy Department to order an officer of the Navy to the command of the "Newport" is tantamount to a withdrawal by the Federal Government of its recognition and support, and is in violation of the spirit and intent of the Acts of Congress hereinbefore alluded to, and, moreover, takes away from the "St. Marys" and the "Newport" the prestige and status attaching to ships of the United States Navy, and imposes upon such ships, when in foreign ports, the expenses and charges incident to merchant vessels; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education deplores the refusal of the Navy Department to order Commander Hanus to the command of the "Newport," as an act which cannot fail to exert an injurious effect upon the New York Nautical School; further

Resolved, That the Navy Department be respectfully requested to grant the request of Commander Hanus to be ordered to the command of the "Newport;" further

Resolved, That the President of the Board of Education be and he is hereby requested to forward to the President of the United States and the Navy Department copies of this report.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 6.25 o'clock p. m.

BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.

No. 1—Brooklyn Bridge.

The service of trolley cars across the bridge during the quarter totalled 377,521 round trips, an increase of 15,750 round trips in comparison with the corresponding quarter of 1906. The train service on the elevated tracks of the bridge was maintained up to its maximum capacity. The vehicular traffic on the bridge for the quarter showed also an increase, the receipts for this quarter being increased by \$507.16 in comparison with the corresponding quarter of 1906.

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.

The trolley car service on this bridge has been maintained up to the maximum capacity of the present terminal accommodations, in spite of the fact that various construction work in progress has had to be carried on in conjunction with maintenance of traffic.

The construction of the subway station in Manhattan, of the elevated railroad connection on the Brooklyn plaza, and the alteration of the Manhattan steel viaduct are being vigorously pushed.

A shelter house for the accommodation of railway passengers using the bridge is being constructed on the Brooklyn plaza.

No. 3—Manhattan Bridge.

The Brooklyn anchorage has been practically completed so far as is possible until after the bridge cables have been erected. Work on the Manhattan anchorage is being pushed toward the same stage of completion.

Under the contract for the construction of the steel towers, cables and suspended superstructure all the steel required for the anchorages has been delivered and set in place, all the steel pedestals required for the steel towers are in position on the masonry piers and erection of the towers is going on.

No. 4—Blackwells Island Bridge.

The manufacture of all the steel required for this structure is practically completed at the mills and the shops. Rapid progress was made in the erection of the main superstructure.

The work of constructing the approaches in Queens and in Manhattan is under way.

Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge.

The preparation of a general design of the structure is nearing completion.

Borough Bridges.

The borough bridges in maintenance have been operated, cleaned, painted and repaired by the usual forces in the employ of the Department for such purposes, with very little assistance from outside the Department except for repairs to pavements.

The construction of the new bridge over Pelham Bay Narrows, in the Borough of The Bronx, is progressing.

The construction of a new bridge across Dutch Kills at Borden avenue, in the Borough of Queens, continues.

No new bridge construction was undertaken in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond.

No person shall use or cause or allow to be used any receptacle which is used in the transportation and delivery of milk or cream for any purpose whatsoever other than the holding of milk or cream; nor shall any person receive or have in his possession any such receptacle which has not been washed after holding milk or cream or which is unclean in any way.

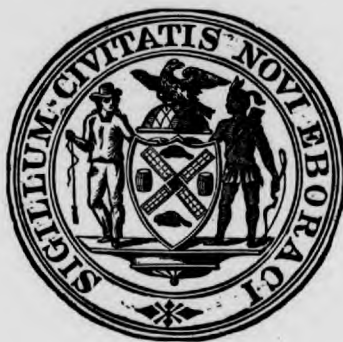
