Sec. 48a. (a) No person shall break out eggs for sale or conduct the business of breaking out eggs to be canned, frozen, dried or used in any other manner in The City of New York, and no eggs broken from the shell, whether canned, frozen, dried, or treated in any other manner shall be received, held, kept, sold, offered for sale or delivered in The City of New York without a permit from the Board of Health and

subject to the conditions thereof. Eggs broken from the shell intended for food purposes shall be promptly cooled to a temperature not to exceed 50 degrees Fahrenheit and shall be deemed adulterated for the purposes of this section if the temperature at the time of delivery to the

consumer be above said temperature. No person conducting the business of trucking or draying, or engaged in the transportation of goods or merchandise, or conducting the business of storing food or other products in cold storage buildings, shall be required to have a permit for receiving, holding, transporting or keeping eggs opened from the shell, whether canned,

frozen, dried or treated in any other manner, provided that such person shall show to said Board, when required, satisfactory proof of the ownership of such eggs.

(b) No person shall receive, hold, keep, sell or offer for sale or deliver, as or for food, or to be used in food, in The City of New York, any canned, frozen, or dried eggs or eggs broken from the shell, which are adulterated or to which has been added any poisonous ingredient or any ingredient which may render such eggs injurious

to health, or to which has been added any antiseptic, preservative, or foreign substance filthy, decomposed or putrid animal matter.

(c) No person shall wilfully or intentionally crack or check eggs intended for sale in the shell, the shells of which are whole and sound, with intent to make any false representation in respect to the quality thereof or as being what the same are not, as respects wholesomeness, soundness, or safety for food. Wilful cracking or checking of eggs to be sold in the shell shall be prima facie evidence of intent to de-

(d) No person shall receive, hold, keep, sell or offer for sale or deliver in The City of New York any eggs known as "spots" except in cases which shall be plainly and indelibly labeled at both ends with the printed words "Spot Eggs," with block letters at least two inches high and one and one-half inches wide, with no intervening marks or lettering between the words or the letters composing the words.

The term "Spots" and "Spot Eggs" when used herein means all unsound eggs, including those affected by moulds, partly decomposed, broken volked, blood ringed or veined, partially hatched, sour, or eggs the shells of which are so broken or cracked that the contents are leaking therefrom.

For the purposes of this section a case of eggs shall be deemed to be a case of spot eggs if fifty per cent. or more of the eggs in the case are "Spots" as defined

Every person who shall receive, hold, keep, sell or offer for sale or deliver in The City of New York any eggs known as "Spots" shall keep a record in a manner approved by the Board of Health, of all such "Spot Eggs" received or held by him and the disposition of such eggs, and every person who conducts the business of breaking out eggs for canning, freezing, drying or other purposes or for preparing eggs for tanners or manufacturing usages shall keep a record in a manner approved by the Board of Health, of all eggs received or held by him and the disposition of such

(e) No person shall receive, have, hold, sell or offer for sale, or deliver in The City of New York any eggs broken from the shell, designed for use in manufacturing processes or for tanning, unless the same shall have been denaturized with some de naturent approved by the Board of Health. The cans or receptacles containing eggs broken from the shell designed for use in manufacturing processes or for canning, shall be plainly and indelibly labeled with the words "for manufacturing purposesdenaturized with," to which shall be added the name of the denaturent.

(f) The term "denaturized" where used herein as applied to eggs, means eggs that are broken into receptacles into which has previously been placed a denaturent or denaturents approved by the Board of Health in proportions as may be prescribed and the mixture thus made thoroughly stirred, or which are transferred to receptacles promptly after breaking and on the premises where broken to receptacles into which has previously been placed a denaturent or denaturents approved by the said Board in proportions as may be prescribed, and the mixture thus made thoroughly stirred.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, GAS AND ELECTRICITY.

Changes in the Electrical Rules and Regulations.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bureau of Electrical Inspection,
May 16, 1910.

Beginning this date, the interior wiring rules of the City comprised in Classes D, E and F, as printed on pages 86 to 128, inclusive, will be withdrawn. At the same time the interior wiring rules of the National Electrical Code, edition of 1909, comprised in

Class D-Fittings, materials and details of construction; and Class E-Miscellaneous,

-will become effective, with the following modifications, which are rendered necessary by local conditions:

Class D.

50-B-e. Omit the fine print note relating to the neutral of an Edison three-wire system.

54-a. Omit the fourth fine print note, relating to 6-inch spacing in front of fuses. 54-b. In the first paragraph, after "sheet metal" omit "wood or approved composition."

54-c, 54-d and 54-e. Omit these three rules relating to wood or composition cabinets.

Omit the note and paragraph "a" of Rule 55 and substitute therefor the following:

(For installation rules, see No. 27.)

Owing to the interchangeability of carbon and metallic filament lamp bases, sockets must be rated, for installation purposes, at not less than 55 watts each (see No. 21-d), except for sign and outline lighting.

Sockets of all kinds, including wall receptacles, must be constructed in accordance with the following specifications:

(a) Capacity—The standard key socket must be suitable for use on any voltage not exceeding 250 and with any device requiring not more than 250 watts

The standard keyless socket must be suitable for use on any voltage not exceeding 250 and with any device requiring not more than 500 watts.

The rated capacity in amperes is 2½ for the key socket and 5 for the

keyless. For larger capacities or higher voltages sockets of special and approved design must be employed.

55-q. Substitute for the present rule and the fine print note relating to inlet bushings the following:

When the socket is not attached to a fixture the inlet must be so constructed that it will have a perfectly smooth hole at least 9-32 of an inch in diameter, or the inlet must be protected by a strong insulating bushing at least 9-32 of an inch in diameter, and the upper portion of this bushing must present a thoroughly smooth opening which will protect the cord from any cutting or wearing action.

60-c. Omit the fine print note relating to terminal clamps for rheostats.

Class E.

64-a. Omit the fine print note relating to separation of signalling and electric light and power circuits.

64-1-3. Omit, in the first paragraph, the following:

If attachment is made to gas pipe, the connection in all cases must be made between the meter and the street mains. In every case the connection shall be made as near as possible to the earth,

—and substitute therefor:

If the piping system is metered, the ground connection must be made between the meter and the street mains unless an approved jumper is employed to carry the grounding current around the meter.

65-A-a. Insert after "constructed" in the second line the words "so far as practicable"

65-A-c. Omit the first sentence and substitute therefor the following:

The top reel must be encased in a steel box or magazine with an opening of approved construction at the bottom, so arranged as not to permit entrance of flame to the magazine.

65-A-d. Omit the first two sentences and substitute therefor the following:

The bottom reel must be encased in a steel box or magazine with an opening of approved construction at the top, so arranged as not to permit entrance of flame to the magazine.

entrance of flame to the magazine.

Add a new paragraph to read as follows:

The front side of each magazine must consist of a door hinged to swing horizontally and provided with a substantial latch.

65-A-f. Omit the present rule and substitute therefor the following:

An automatic shutter, permanently attached to the gate frame, must be provided and must be so constructed as to shield the film from the beam of light whenever the film is not running at operating speed.

65-A-h. Substitute for the parenthetical clause the following sentence:

Departure from this rule will be authorized only under special permission in partial graphs in advance.

in writing, given in advance.

The following additional rule, which is to be known provisionally as 64-A, is

hereby promulgated:

(a) Aerial conductors to be permanently and effectively grounded at all

(a). Aerial conductors to be permanently and effectively grounded at all times when station is not in operation by a conductor not smaller than No. 4 B & S gauge copper wire, run in as direct line as possible to water pipe at a point on the street side of all connections to said water pipe within the premises, or to some other equally satisfactory earth connection.

(b). Aerial conductors when grounded as above specified must be effectually cut off from all apparatus within the building.

(c). Or the aerial to be permanently connected at all times to earth in the manner specified above, through a short-gap lightning arrester; said arrester to have a gap of not over .015 inch between brass or copper plates not less than 2½ inches in length parallel to the gap and 1½ inches the other way

with a thickness of not less than ½ of an inch mounted upon non-combustible non-absorptive insulating material of such dimensions as to give ample strength. Other approved arresters of equally low resistance and equally substantial construction may be used.

(d). In cases where the aerial is grounded as specified in paragraph "a," the switch employed to join the aerial to the ground connection shall not be smaller than a standard 100-ampere jack-knife switch.

It will be noticed that Class F, Marine Work, disappears entirely from the City's rules under this rearrangement. This is for the reason that that class of work comes under federal rather than that of municipal jurisdiction.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Monday, April 25, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present-Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification, as follows:

1. By including in the non-competitive class for the Department of Correction the following: "Prison Helper, with compensation not exceeding \$480 per annum, without maintenance.

"Mr. F. A. SPENCER, Secretary, Civil Service:

"Dear Sir-Your communication of April 12 regarding the non-competitive class of appointees has been carefully considered. This, as you will remember, was the matter I was before you about yesterday. I just wish to put in writing what I stated. I would say during the first three quarters of 1909 we had 3,068 appointments in the whole Department, divided as follows:

"First quarter "Third quarter 952

"That is about the average of the number of appointments made during each year. These appointments are, of course, in the small grades. Ninety-five per cent. are at least in the grades of \$150 per annum and under.

"We at present comply with the resolutions adopted except we do not have any Schedule 'F' paper for those appointed at \$150 and under. To comply with the request in full, that is, to give a Schedule 'F' paper for everybody employed in the non-competitive class, would entail quite a lot of extra work upon this Department, and I do not see that it would serve any purpose, because while we made during the first three quarters of last year a total of 3,068 appointments, we also made the following changes:

"You will therefore see that the people appointed at the small salaries stay not more than about ten days or a month at the outside on an average.

"I enclose you herewith forms we use in making appointments as well as our Schedule 'F' paper. Your Schedule 'F' paper submitted is practically the same as ours, except we do not have a physician's certificate attached. Even that would be quite a hardship as our people are all over at different institutions and at some institutions we do not even have a doctor. To send a doctor to examine every one of our applicants would take all of his time. We are willing to send you, however, after having recorded the same, a Schedule 'G' paper in order that they may be filed in your office. As to the last paragraph of your communication, asking for the name, address, title and compensation and date of employment of all employees now in the non-competitive class in our Department, there are around about 2,000. would say to do that would take me at least three or four weeks to compile, and by that time I presume half of them or more would be gone. I do not see therefore what would be gained by that proposition. If you will notice in the CITY RECORD of July and January, the name of every person who has been in the Department during the previous six months is always published, with their date of appointment, salary and title. So, generally there is a record of everybody whom we appoint.

"I therefore trust the resolution will not be extended beyond what we are doing at present; that is, sending Schedule 'F' papers of all people appointed over \$150 per annum.

"In my judgment the foregoing cases are sufficient authority to establish the proposition that boards of education, which are vested with corporate powers exercised independently of the municipal corporations in which they exist, form a part of the state system of education and that the employees of such boards are not in the civil service of the municipality. This is true in reference to the board of education of New York City and also of boards of education similarly constituted and vested with powers and duties as in New York City. My conclusion, therefore, is that employees of the board of education in New York City are subject to the jurisdiction, not of the municipal, but of the state civil service commission.'



The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak-ing the estimate that the several matters stated

herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat-ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality

of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who

is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.
