Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Deputy Tax Commissioner.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of the Queens, dated February 4, stating that through error the names of Ernest Roggelin, Jr., and Bernard Winter had been included in a list of suspended employees forwarded to the Commission under date of February 2. The Secretary was directed to amend the records accordingly.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting that an open competitive examination be held for the position of Foreman Asphalt Worker, for the reason that no applications had been filed for the promotion examination ordered for that position. It was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Foreman Asphalt Worker.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated February 9, containing a notice of the appointment of Louis Scaramuzzo, of Rosebank, as Foreman in the Bureau of Engineering-Construction, to take effect February 14, 1911, at \$1,050 per annum, and enclosing a waiver of appointment from James Baker, whose name appeared first on the preferred list for that position. The appointment was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated February 11, 1911, requesting approval of the reinstatement of Andrew S. Thompson as Janitor of Public School 33, Brooklyn, from which position he had resigned to take effect February 18, 1911. The Secretary was directed to state that there was one person on a preferred list of Assistant Engineer (stationary), who would have to be considered for the position.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education making requisition for an eligible list from which to appoint one Inspector of Masonry (4th grade), in the Bureau of Buildings, with compensation at the rate of \$36 per week. It appearing that there was no preferred list for Inspector of Masonry (4th grade), the Secretary was directed to certify from the preferred list for the 3d grade.

Dressel, of 295 East 160th street, Manhattan, be and he hereby is excepted from examination to render service as Expert Examiner in the Department of Finance in the work of the reconciliation of accounts of other departments with the corresponding accounts on the books of the Department of Finance; provided, however, that the total compensation during the year 1911 shall not exceed \$750.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated February 6, stating that Myer Zaslaw, Charles N. Pinco, Carl T. Forsberg, James E. Barber, Jr., and Louis D. Koop had been promoted to the position of Assistant Engineer at a salary of \$1,800 per annum, and enclosing a communication from Cornelius J. O'Connor, whose name appeared on a preferred list for that position, waiving his right to appointment in favor of the persons mentioned. After consideration, the promotions were approved.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, stating that the dismissal of Frank J. Farnan, Patrolman, for absence without leave for more than five days, had been rescinded. The Secretary was directed to amend the records accordingly.

The appointment of Richard Hand, of Storm King, N. Y., to the position of Mining Fireman, with salary at the rate of \$3 per day, was approved, pursuant to paragraph 7 of Rule XII.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII., Miss Rose Feuerlicht be and she hereby is excepted from examination to render expert services as Stenographer and Typewriter in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, from time to time during the year 1911; provided, however, that her total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated February 14, transmitting a supplementary payroll in favor of Jacob Ganz, an Automobile Engineman in his department, approval of which had been withheld by the Finance Department for the reason that Mr. Ganz was actually engaged in driving a horse and wagon instead of an automobile. The Commissioner explained that provision had been made in the Budget for an Automobile Engineman, but that action on the purchase of an automobile had been delayed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for which reason Mr. Ganz had been employed in driving a horse. In view of the explanation, the Secretary was directed to certify the payroll under the title, Automobile Engineman (Driver).

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated February 14, requesting approval of the appointment of S. R. Chenoweth, of 601 West 139th street, as Auditor, with compensation at the rate of \$4,000 per annum, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 5 of Rule XII., and setting forth Mr. Chenoweth's qualifications. The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

The following reports of departmental boards of examiners for positions in the non-competitive class, were approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner: Department of Correction, February 3; Department of Health, February 1; Department of Public Charities, February 7.

A letter was presented from Charles E. Clarke of the Law Department (Bureau of Street Openings), suggesting an amendment of Rule XIV., section 2. The matter was referred to Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, for a report.

Communications were presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated February 1 and 14, requesting approval of the change of title of Hugo E. Goenner from Assistant Engineer to Transitman and Computer, at a salary of \$1,650 per annum, and of the decrease in salary of Carl L. von Logan, Draftsman, from \$1,800 to \$1,650 per annum. The request was granted, both employees having consented to the reduction.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated February 14, requesting an amendment of the Non-Competitive Class by including therein the title "Hospital Attendant." On motion, the Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment for Wednesday, February 23, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The Secretary presented a communication from G. L. Sterling, Esq., Acting Corporation Counsel, dated February 10, 1911, reading as follows:

Hon. JOHN C. McGUIRE, President, Municipal Civil Service Commission: Sir—I am in receipt of your letter of February 3, 1911, enclosing copy of the letter of Harold V. Brockway, Clerk in the Department of Finance, whose annual salary has been increased by the Comptroller from \$1,650 to \$1,800. Such increase involves a promotion from a third to a fourth grade clerkship. In Mr. Brockway's letter it is stated that because of the presence of two fourth-grade Clerks on the preferred eligible list your Commission has refused to approve of his promotion, acting under an opinion received from this office, dated January 16, 1911, in reference to certain proposed changes of title of employees in the Bridge Department. He also states that the number of clerks has not been increased and that his duties have not changed. It is, therefore, apparent that the Comptroller must either cancel Mr. Brockway's increase of salary or reinstate an additional Fourth Grade Clerk, of the necessity for whose services he has given no intimation.

I am also in receipt of letters from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Secretary of the Health Department setting forth situations somewhat similar, where your Commission has refused to approve of increases in salaries of Clerks made by the heads of such administrative divisions of the City government, such increases involving the promotion of such Clerks from one grade to another in the clerical service.

In the case submitted by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, he provided in his departmental estimate for the year 1911 for increases in salary of four Clerks, which involved promotions for the Clerks whose salaries he desired to raise from a lower to a higher grade. The Board of Estimate and Board of Aldermen adopted the schedules to the Budget with the proposed salaries as requested by the Borough President. Here also it was not designed to change the duties of the Clerks sought to be promoted or to appoint any additional Clerks, and the number of such employees was not increased.

In the letter from the Board of Health, it is stated that your Commission has refused to approve of the promotion of W. R. Hill from a Third to a Fourth Grade Clerkship, by reason of the presence on the preferred eligible list of a Fifth Grade Clerk. The same facts in regard to a lack of intention or appropriation to appoint an additional Clerk are present here as in the other cases, and the duties of Mr. Hill have not been changed.

I am of the opinion that these cases present a situation to which my opinion of January 16 last has no application. The cases considered in that opinion all related to proposed changes of title of employees, with or without increases of salary, which involved a construction of your rules on transfer (Rule V., paragraph 5, Rule XIV., paragraph 2), in connection with section 1543 of the Greater New York Charter.

I have gone over that opinion carefully and I do not think it warrants the construction put upon it by you in connection with the present cases. It must be read in the light of the facts under consideration therein, which presented entirely different situations from those here disclosed.

My conclusion is that where it is proposed to change the title of one or more persons, even though the total number of employees is not increased, that the presence of suspended employees on the preferred list of the same or similar titles to those to which the proposed change is to be made, should prevent your Commission from approving of such proposed change of title. On the other hand, where the number of employees under a given title in a department is not increased by the proposed increase of salary of certain of their number, then the fact that such increases in salary involve a promotion from one grade to another of the same position or title should not prevent your Commission from approving of the same, even though there are persons on the preferred list whose titles are the same or similar.

As was pointed out in the People ex rel. Birmingham vs. Grout, 45 Misc. 47, previously cited to you, wherever the head of a department desires to increase the number of incumbents of a certain position or title he has in effect said that he needed additional employees to perform work appropriate to that title, and he must first resort to the preferred list for his appointees. In the case of Clerks or others who are graded according to salary received, the difficulty of stating what duties are appropriate to a given grade throughout the City service must be apparent. Such duties depend largely on the department to which the employee has been appointed. Rate of salary also depends to a great extent upon experience and departmental knowledge. The distinction between the two classes of cases which I have cited is, therefore, largely a practical one. Consequently it does not seem to me proper to consider that a vacancy is being filled by the increase in salary of an occupant of a position which involves no increase in the number of persons under that title, while it is proper to consider that a vacancy is being filled by the increase in the number of employees of a given title. As thus interpreted, I am of the opinion that section 1543 of the Charter, in reference to certification from the preferred list, refers only to cases where vacancies in positions occur and they can be said to occur only when additional appointments under a given title are sought to be made or positions which previously had incumbents are sought to be filled.

I am sending a copy of this opinion to the Board of Health and to the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held on Tuesday, February 21, 1911.

Present: President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh. The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held February 15 were approved. The following communication was presented from the Police Commissioner, dated February 10, relative to the appeal of Lieutenant Edward J. Burns and other Lieutenants who took the recent examination for promotion to Captain, and their seniority be rated from the date of their appointment as Detective Sergeants:

To the Honorable Municipal Civil Service Commission:

Gentlemen—In response to your letter of February 4, 1911, having particular reference to the appeal of Lieutenant Edward J. Burns for a rerating, and general reference to the cases of other Lieutenants who took the recent examination for promotion to Captain, and whose standing depends upon the credit given them for services as Detective Sergeants, you are informed as follows:

On April 3, 1903, the Police Commissioner directed the following action with regard to Edward J. Burns:

"On reading and filing the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated April 3, 1903,

"Ordered, That Edward J. 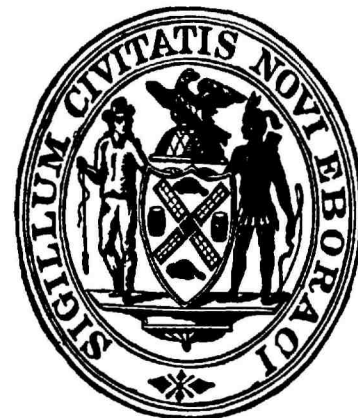

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to Section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of filing such consents of the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Richmond, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge for passengers more than five (5) cents for any continuous ride, from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter, mail matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

The rate for the carrying of such property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, and no greater sum shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheelguards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, and hereafter, during the term of this contract, to be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, to be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars of the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall, if required by the President of the Borough of Richmond, cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such street or avenue, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Provided, however, that the Company may, with the approval of the City official having jurisdiction over such matters, oil that portion of the surface of the streets and avenues between the tracks, the rails of the tracks and two (2) feet beyond the rails on each side thereof, at least twice each summer season, in such manner as may be necessary to prevent the rising of dust, and if the Company shall so oil such portions of the surface of the streets and avenues, then the Company shall not be required to water such streets and avenues as herein provided.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, of free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the President of the Borough, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In the event of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Richmond, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement.

The Company shall cause to be paved a strip sixty-four (64) feet in width across the entire roadway of New York Avenue and Tompkins Avenue at their intersections with Wadsworth Avenue, and a strip sixty (60) feet in width across the entire roadway of Richmond Avenue at its intersection with Ocean Avenue. The precise location of such pavement and the kind and character of the same shall be as determined by the President of the Borough of Richmond and the work shall be done in the manner directed by said President.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other sub-surface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—The Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon the route beginning at the intersection of New York Avenue with Wadsworth Avenue; thence upon New York Avenue to Richmond Avenue; thence upon Richmond Avenue to Ocean Avenue, and the Company shall, within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of Section 184 of the Railroad Law in regard to the abandonment of said route so abandoned and relinquished, and shall remove therefrom any and all existing tracks of the Company within such time, and restore the pavement in the manner prescribed by the President of the Borough of Richmond. If the Company shall fail to secure the approval of the Public Service Commission or shall fail for any other reason to comply with the provisions of this subdivision within the time stipulated this contract shall be void and of no effect, and the grant made herein shall thereupon cease and determine. Provided, however, the Board may extend said period for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months.

Twenty-sixth—Should the City at any time during the term of this contract lay out a street of sixty-four (64) or more feet in width, the lines of which shall approximately correspond with the proposed street shown upon the map hereinbefore described, and made a part of this contract, as Wadsworth Avenue, then the Company shall convey or cause to be conveyed the free and clear title to a strip of land sixty-four (64) feet in width lying within the lines of such new street and extending from New York Avenue to Tompkins Avenue, and the Company agrees on one year's notice to alter the position of the curbs in said Wadsworth Avenue to such position as shall be directed by the municipal authorities having jurisdiction and the Company shall cause to be paved the entire portion of the roadway between the new curb lines of said Wadsworth Avenue which is not now paved under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters and such authorities shall designate the kind and character of the pavement to be laid.

Should the City at any time during the term of this contract lay out a new street along all or any portion of the railway hereby authorized, between the northerly line of Richmond Avenue and the westerly line of Tompkins Avenue, then the Company shall convey or cause to be conveyed the free and clear title to all of that portion or portions of land now claimed to be owned by the Company and shown upon the map hereinbefore described and made a part of this contract, which shall lie within the lines of such new street or any portion of the same as may be laid out by the City, and should the City at any time during the term of this contract lay out the portion of such new street immediately north of Richmond Avenue, then the Company shall convey or cause to be conveyed the free and clear title to all of those two triangular pieces or parcels of land, one of which lies immediately south of the property of the Company, as shown upon said map and between the easterly line of Florida Avenue and the easterly line of such new street, being shown upon the hereinbefore described map as Parcel A, and the other of which has a frontage on Richmond Avenue and lies between the westerly side of Florida Avenue and the westerly side of such new street, being shown upon said map as Parcel B.

The conveyances hereinabove required shall be executed within thirty (30) days of the date of the approval by the Mayor of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopting the map laying out such new street or streets.

The Company hereby agrees that if the City is, or shall become, entitled to acquire, and shall at any time during the term of this contract acquire or otherwise come into the possession of any of the property on which railway tracks shall be constructed on the portion of the route described herein as private property, no compensation shall be awarded for the right to have railway tracks thereon.

When the City shall have acquired or come into possession of any property, as provided above, then the rights hereby granted in the streets and avenues shall be extended to cover such property and all the terms and conditions of this contract shall be applicable thereto.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the Corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall at all times keep accurately books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-ninth—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein granted, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this

contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirtieth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirty-first—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders and wheelguards, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheelguards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-third—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fourth—The words "streets or avenues," and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-fifth—At any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 5, and the other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be leased or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary workmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
