### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, December 13, 1911, at 10 o'Clock A. M.

Present-President James Creelman and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling.

The President, Mr. James Creelman, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Exempt Class the following:

Public Recreation Commission-Secretary, Stenographer.

Mr. James Sullivan, President of the Public Recreation Commission, appeared in favor of the proposed exemptions. Mr. Robert W. Belcher, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the same. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Street Cleaning,"

the title Sanitary Engineer.
Mr. Charles A. Whitney, Secretary to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning. appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. Mr. Robert W. Belcher, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the same. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the competitive class, Part 1, Group 3 (positions of a special or miscellaneous character), the title Specification Writer.

Mr. A. W. Ross, Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition.

Henry Kehrer, of 584 Coney Island ave., Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman, under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule 7, he having lacked one of the preliminary requirements of the examination in that he received but 57.30 in his mental examination.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated November 21st, transmitting a report of Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, relative to the method of keeping efficiency records in the Department of Finance. It appeared that an inspection of such records had been made in connection with an examination for promotion to Third Grade Clerk in the Auditing Bureau of the Department of Finance for the reasons that the transcripts submitted by the department had not been based on methods required by the Civil Service rules. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Comptroller that the Commission was compelled to decline to rate the papers in the examination for promotion to third grade Clerk, for the reason that the Department of Finance had failed to keep efficiency records uniform with those kept in other departments of the City government in accordance with the Civil Service rules; that in the opinion of the Commission it would be both unlawful and unjust to permit public employees to be promoted according to standards different from those applied to the employees of other departments; and further, that unless the right of access to the efficiency records of the department were extended to the examiner designated by the Chief Examiner for that purpose the Commission would cause all the records and papers concerning the efficiency of the graded employees to be brought to the office of the Commission for inspection.

The present situation has been brought about, in my opinion, by a number of causes, chief among which is the publicity | formances. which the newspapers have given to our efforts here in the direction of preventing fires. This result has been brought about by more numerous and more thorough inspection of hazardous premises, and these inspections have been made, to a large extent, by the uniformed force for conduct prejudicial to good order and in the absence and anticipation of a Bureau of Fire Prevention. It indicates what can be done in the City by a well manned and equipped Bureau of Fire Prevention.

Another considerable factor has been your Honor's attitude on Civil Service appointments, under which the Fire Department has literally obeyed your execu tive order to take the men from the eligible lists in the craes set down by the Civil Service Commission. I am sure that this has heartened the men in their work and vastly increased their efficiency.

During all this time the uniformed force has perhaps done better work than ever before in the extinguishment of fires.

As further indicating the possibility of preventive work, may I mention the fact that New York, on the figures of 1910, has 300 fires for every 100,000 inhabitants, London only 81, Paris only 74, Berlin only 97, St. Petersburgh only 73, and Vienna only 59.

At present there is a fire loss of a dollar for every dollar expended by the City for the Fire Department. That is, the fire losses and the Fire Department budget are about the same, namely \$8,250,000.

Would it not be wise for the City to spend half a million dollars a year on fire prevention and probably cut the fire losses in two?
