

The 905 deaths for the week represent a death-rate of 30.82, as against a death-rate of 35.37for the previous week, and of 44.75 for the corresponding week of 1887. The decrease of 133 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 8 in scarlatina, 10 in cancer, 11 in apoplexy, 16 in convulsions, 17 in meningitis, 17 in other diseases of the nervous system, 7 in bron-chitis and 58 in sunstroke, partially offset by an increase of 34 in diarrheeal diseases and of 24 in pthbis: phthisis. The increase of diarrhoeal diseases was greatest in the Twentieth, Twenty-second and Twentythird Wards
