

The 751 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.56, against 23.70 for the previous week, and 24.66 for the corresponding week of 1890.

There was an increase of 4 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 5 from phthisis, and a decrease of 4 in deaths from diphtheria, of 8 from bronchitis, and of 14 from pneumonia. There were 10 suicides, against only 2 for the preceding week.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, from scarlet fever in the Tenth, Eleventh and Nineteenth, and from measles in the Twelfth and Twenty-third Wards.



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The 797 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.99, against 23.56 for the previous week and 23.77 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Diphtheria and measles show a slight increase, and scarlet fever a marked decrease, the cases reported for the week being respectively 119, 384 and 147, against 115, 367 and 185 for the previous week. Diphtheria and measles both increased slightly between Division and Rivington streets, east of the Bowery, and diphtheria on the west side between Canal and Eighty-sixth streets, and on the east side between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets. Measles showed its greatest increase on the west side above Fortieth street, and between Houston and Fourteenth streets, Sixth avenue and Broadway. There were also to cases reported from the Barge Office. Scarlet fever showed a general decrease, excepting between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets, east and west, and above Eighty-sixth street, where there was a slight increase.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.
