## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Fublic Parks for the week ending Saturday July 6, 1878.

MEETING HELD JULY 3, 1878.

Present-Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

The following opinion was received from the Counsel to the Corporation:

Hon. JAMES F. WENMAN, President of the Department of Public Parks:

Hon. James F. Wennan, President of the Department of Public Parks:

Sir — I duly received your letter of the fourteenth instant, inclosing a copy of chapter 411 of the Laws of 1878, which authorizes the Common Council to direct the Park Department to restore Tompkins Square as a public park or square. You request my opinion whether this act has the effect of repealing chapter 593 of the Laws of 1866, or any portion of it.

Tompkins Square was established by an act of the Legislature passed April 9, 1833, being chapter 130 of the Laws of that year. This act declared that all the land bounded by Tenth and Seventh streets, Avenue A and Avenue B, was thereby laid out, and should thereafter be known on the map or plan of this city as a "Public square or place," by such name or designation as the Common Council should direct; and authority was given to take proceedings for opening the same under the act of March 3, 1807. Such proceedings were taken in 1834, and the Common Council subsequently designated the parcel of land as "Tompkins Square."

Section 1 of chapter 503 of the Laws of 1866, referred to in your letter, declared that Tompkins

designated the parcel of land as "Tompkins Square."

Section 1 of chapter 593 of the Laws of 1866, referred to in your letter, declared that Tompkins Square should be a public parade ground for the use of the National Guard of the First Division, State of New York, at such times as commandants of regiments in said division should designate by orders. Section 2 of said act made it the duty of the Street Commissioner, on or before July 1, 1866, to remove all trees and other obstructions from said square, except the necessary lamp-posts and such trees as should stand within a line of ten feet from the fence surrounding said square; and also to remove the fountain or water-tank from said square, and level and grade the surface of said square in such a manner as to render it available as a parade ground. The expense was to be charged against the city, and to be taken from the usual appropriations for public parks.

Section 1 of the act, transmitted with your letter, is as follows: "The Common Council of the City of New York is hereby authorized to direct the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York to restore Tompkins Square as a public park or square." Sections 2 and 3 of the act authorize the issuing of stock of the city to the amount of fifty thousand dollars, to meet the expense to be incurred under the first section, and also authorizes the raising, by taxation, of such amount of fifty thousand dollars during the year 1879.

In the act of 1833, above referred to, Tompkins Square is not spoken of as a park, but as a public square or place. It is evident, however, from the provisions of the act of 1866, above referred to, that it was treated not as an open place, but as a square or park. It appears to have been inclosed with a fence, and it would seem that there were trees and a fountain in it, from the fact that the act directed the Street Commissioner to remove such fountain and trees.

I think that the Act of 1878, transmitted with your letter, was passed with direct reference to said Act of 1866, and that it was the intention of the Legislature that the Park Department, if directed by the Common Council, should in good faith proceed with the improvement, as a park, of the entire parcel of land included in Tompkins Square. The provisions of the second section of the Act of 1886, which require the removal of all trees and other obstructions from the square, except necessary lamp-posts and such trees as should stand within a line of ten feet from the fence that surrounded the square, and which also require the removal of the fountain, and the levelling and grading of the surface, are, therefore, superseded and repealed. As the Act of 1878 merely provides that Tompkins Square shall be restored "as a public park or square," it would seem that the Department has the same discretion in regard to the laying out, regulating and improvement of this square that they have in reference to other parks and squares in this city.

You do not state in your letter what the plans of the Department are for such restoration, but whatever those plans may be I presume they will cause such changes as to make it impracticable, if not impossible, for the military to hereafter use the square as a parade ground. I think the Department has the power to make such changes as will have this effect, and if the restoration of the square as a "public square or place" necessarily or properly involves such changes it is the duty of the Department to make them. Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be, and is hereby respectfully requested to direct that Eighty-first street, from Eight avenue to Ninth avenue, be graded, curbed and paved, and that the sidewalk on the north side of said street be flagged.

Resolved, That the license between this Department and the New York Elevated Railroad Company, dated the 3d day of July, 1878, be adopted. That the map of the routes of said railway across the Battery be also adopted, and that the President be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to execute and deliver the said license, and to certify the map, and that the map be thereupon filed. Resolved, That after said license shall have been duly executed and delivered, the same shall be printed, together with the map accompanying the same, as a document of this Board.
