

GRANT, Mayor, and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportument: DEAR SIR—In reference to the letter of the East River Bathing Co., addressed to the Comp-troller, under date of 11th instant, and referred to me by your Board for examination and report as to the offer of said company to sell to the City the three swimming baths, "Stuyvesant," "Man-hattan" and "Knickerbocker," I beg to say I have caused a thorough examination to be made of the baths, and it is now reported to me that they are old, and, to a considerable extent, dilapidated. I also find that the structures are seventy-five feet wide, making them difficult to handle and place in narrow slips. 




