Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—In accordance with the requirement of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter we submit the following report of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending September 30, 1901.

The books containing the assessment roll of real and personal estate for 1901, duly certified, were delivered to the Municipal Assembly on the first Monday of July, as required by section 907 of the Greater New York Charter.

Upon delivery of said books to the Municipal Assembly, advertisements were inserted in newspapers and in the CITY RECORD, as required by law, for a period of fifteen days, that said assessment rolls were open for inspection at the office of the City Clerk, and during that period and up to the present time, we have been served with one hundred and ninety-seven writs of certiorari to review our action in the matter of the assessment of property of various corporations and individuals. This is a decrease of sixty-three over 1900, and of one hundred and seventy-three over 1800. three over 1899.

Upon the delivery of the assessment rolls to the Municipal Assembly a request was made and communicated to us, as follows:

whereas, The tax and assessment rolls having been finally submitted to the Municipal Assembly on Monday, July 1, 1901, the undersigned, in the name of the Municipal Assembly and as one of its acts, and by virtue of law, authorizes and requests the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, by themselves, and such clerical assistance as may be at their disposal, but without expense to the City, to cause to be properly estimated and computed the taxes to be imposed under and by virtue of said rolls, and to cause the said estimation and computation to be properly set down and extended in the said tax or assessment rolls or books; to cause the item of said taxes to be carefully added, and set down the amount of the same in the said rolls or books, and to perform such other duties connected with the said tax or assessment rolls or books as the undersigned is, by section 909 and 910 of the Greater New York Charter, authorized or required to have done.

In compliance with such request the Commissioners caused the work of the extension of said tax to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, and without additional expense to the City.

For such purpose the books containing the assessment roll were received from the Municipal Assembly on the 23d day of August, and returned to said Board with the computation and extension of the tax completed, on September 18th.

A synopsis of the following tables shows that of the total tax payable, \$88,241,852.75, real

estate pays \$75,632,266.44, and personal estate pays \$12,609,586.31.

The State Board of Equalization paid its annual visit to this Department on August 27 last, and on that occasion we again urged upon their consideration the injustice enacted against this City year after year in overvaluing its real estate by comparison with the other counties of the State, and cited as indicative of the methods habitually pursued by them, the increase by this Department of seventeen per cent. on the real estate valuations of this City for the year 1899, while the State Board credited us with but three per cent, increase in that year. Nor is this studied indifference and wilful disregard of the plain statements and vigorous protests of our Department against this annually reoccurring injustice the measure of the iniquities that we must bear.

The inequality of the apportionment of the State tax was exhaustively reviewed in our report of July, 1899. At that time, basing our statements upon the reports of the State Comptroller and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for 1899, and the census of 1892, we conclusively showed that in thirty counties of the State the cost of government to each inhabitant was 2 3-10 cents, while to each inhabitant of Greater New York for direct taxation, it was at the same time \$1.70, and recent legislation has aggravated this condition for the City.

We have before sounded a note of warning on the subject of the invasion of our assets by the State Board and the Legislature through many mediums, viz: the excise tax, the transfer tax,

the trust company tax, the savings bank tax, exempting the unearned premiums of insurance companies and others. The figures given below are a few instances which show that these taxes are very largely paid by the citizens of this City.

These are not all, but they will serve to illustrate our contention that the State Board and the Legislature are reaching out for our assets. All of which is repectfully submitted.

An Ordinance to regulate Third avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:
That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 9th day of January, 1901, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided tor is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense there of shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,
Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of Third avenue, between Sixtieth street and the Shore road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the setting or resetting of curbstones, the paving of the carriageway between the railroad tracks and the curb with asphalt pavement, and with granite-block pavement between the street railroad tracks and rails, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being two hundred and sixteen thousand dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is one million three hundred and thirty thousand dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, except the cost and expense of paving with granite-block pavement between the
