### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

#### LOCAL BOARD—FLATBUSH DISTRICT.

Monday, December 22, 1902.

Meeting in Borough Hall at 3 p. m.  
The roll was called and the following members answered to their names:  
William C. Redfield, Commissioner of Public Works, presiding; Alderman Wentz, Sixty-first Aldermanic District; Alderman Wirth, Sixty-second Aldermanic District; Alderman McInnes, Sixty-third Aldermanic District.  
The Commissioner submitted the following:

No. 206.

Petition for the construction of sewer in Seeley street, from Gravesend avenue to Eighteenth street.

Following communication from the Commissioner of Public Works:

(Copy.)

City of New York, Borough of Brooklyn,  
Office of Commissioner of Public Works,  
November 14, 1902.

Hon. J. EDWARD SWANSTROM, President, Borough of Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—I return you herein petition for the construction of sewer in Seeley street, together with the report thereon of the Superintendent of Sewers. This would be sent in the regular order, without a letter, were it not that there are several special elements demanding particular care in this instance.

1. Seeley street will be torn up by the improvement of Prospect avenue in the spring and thereafter must be wholly repaved from end to end. This sewer, therefore, should be expedited so as to be constructed prior to the pavement.

2. The drainage problem involved in the rest of Windsor Terrace, covered by the outlet sewers named herein, is very serious. I know of local conditions there most injurious to the health of residents which only this work will remove.

3. Petitions are pending for the improvement of Vanderbilt street, and one is promised shortly for the improvement of East Fifth street, neither of which can be done until this sewer is built. For this special reason and because of the urgent need of drainage, I commend that portion of the report which includes Vanderbilt street, between Prospect avenue and Eighteenth street.

4. Note that the present 36-inch sewer on Prospect avenue has only a 12-inch outlet; an abnormal condition, only to be removed by the construction of this sewer.

5. The sewer herein is an important connection to the great Foster avenue sewer and cannot, on the one hand, be used until the latter is built; on the other hand, it is so badly needed as to constitute a potent argument for the expediting of the Foster avenue sewer, already specially brought to your attention by my recent letter.

Let me suggest, therefore, that the necessary legal papers required for the street openings, or evidences of dedication, be progressed as rapidly as possible, and particularly that communication be sent to Mr. D. Cuzzo, Secretary of the Taxpayers' Improvement Association of Windsor Terrace, No. 38 Sherman street, Brooklyn, in order that he may appear at the meeting of the Flatbush Local Board when this is considered, with a delegation from that association of property owners, in order that all the facts may then be brought out.



In view of the importance of this matter I send this letter in duplicate, one copy being for the personal use of the Borough President.

Following report from the Superintendent of Sewers:

(Copy.)

City of New York, Borough of Brooklyn,  
Bureau of Sewers, Office of Superintendent,  
November 13, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I herewith return a communication which you referred to me, the same being from the Secretary of the President of the Borough, addressed to the Bureau of Sewers under date of October 31, 1902, relating to the construction of a sewer in Seeley street, from Gravesend avenue to Eighteenth street. I also return original petition which accompanied this communication.

The Chief Engineer of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, reports to me as follows: I beg to report that the estimated cost for above-mentioned improvement is \$5,200, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$77,180.

The items of work necessary to be performed are: 330 feet 24-inch pipe sewer, 780 feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 11 manholes, 4 receiving basins and appurtenances.

In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is requested, I beg to state that such will be required in Eighteenth street, between Seeley street and Vanderbilt street; Vanderbilt street, between Eighteenth street and East Fifth street; East Fifth street, between Vanderbilt street and Ditmas avenue; Ditmas avenue, between East Fifth street and Ocean Parkway, westerly side; Ocean Parkway, westerly side, between Ditmas avenue and Foster avenue.

I also include, although not an outlet sewer, that portion of Vanderbilt street between Prospect avenue and Eighteenth street, for reasons hereinafter more fully set forth.

The estimated cost for these outlet sewers, and the one block added by me, is \$183,800, the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment being \$2,956,771.

The items of work necessary to be performed are: 3,395 feet 72-inch brick sewer, 2,640 feet 66-inch brick sewer, 1,352 feet 60-inch brick sewer, 648 feet 48-inch brick sewer, 890 feet 42-inch brick sewer, 300 feet 30-inch brick sewer, 370 feet 24-inch pipe sewer, 300 feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 57 manholes, 30 receiving basins and appurtenances.

Other outlet sewers are necessary in Foster avenue, Bergen lane and Nineteenth avenue to Fifty-seventh street, which have been reported upon from this office, and are now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for their consideration.

I know of no length of sewer which is more needed at this time than that portion just mentioned.

The construction of the outlets necessary for the sewer petitioned for is a matter of much importance, because, when completed, it will relieve that section in the vicinity of the Prospect Park Circle, at the Ocean Boulevard, from the ponding of water after rainfalls, said outlet being also the main artery for draining the Windsor Terrace section of the borough, where minor sewers have been constructed and provided with temporary connections to drain into the small sewers existing in the Town of Flatbush.

I have added that length in Vanderbilt street, between Prospect avenue and East Eighteenth street, in order that this main artery should be entirely completed. By its construction the discharge of sewage from a 36-inch sewer, through a temporary connection, to a 12-inch sewer will be discontinued. Receiving basins in Windsor Terrace could then be opened, and a much desired improvement as to drainage completed.

In regard to the legal opening of these streets, information of which is requested, I beg to state that for:

Seeley street between these limits I find no record.

Eighteenth street, between these limits I find no record.

Vanderbilt street, between Coney Island avenue and Gravesend avenue, was opened under the old Town of Flatbush.

East Fifth street, between Vanderbilt street and Fort Hamilton avenue, was declared open by Common Council, City of Brooklyn, April 26, 1897, and also September 27, 1897.

East Fifth street, between Fort Hamilton avenue and Avenue D, no record.

East Fifth street, between Avenue D and Eighteenth avenue: this street and a number of others in the vicinity were petitioned for and came up for a hearing before the Local Board April 13, 1899, when the representative of the Morris Building Company, the owners, declared their intention of improving the streets, opening them to the public and dedicating them to the City, and the petition was thereupon laid over, to be called up by the petitioners. ("City Record" for 1899, page 2688.)

Ditmas avenue, between Coney Island avenue and West street: on May 29, 1902, the Local Board for the Flatbush District passed a resolution to open this street within the above limits, except between the lines of the railroad owned by the Prospect Park and Coney Island Railroad Company. ("City Record," page 5034, August 15, 1902, Resolution No. 93.)

Ocean Parkway was opened under an act of the State Legislature.

Mr. HENRY R. ASSERSON, Chief Engineer of Sewers:

Dear Sir—Replying to yours of October 21, inquiring if certain streets are open streets or not, I would say that:

Seeley street, between Gravesend avenue and Eighteenth street, does not have a record of having been legally opened, although it is paved with cobblestone, and I think there is no question but that it is opened.

Eighteenth street, between Seeley street and Vanderbilt street, has not been legally opened, although this block is paved, and I think it can be considered legally opened.

Vanderbilt street, between East Eighteenth street and East Fifth street, is legally opened.

East Fifth street, between Vanderbilt street and Ditmas avenue, was declared open from Vanderbilt street and Fort Hamilton avenue by resolution of the Common Council on September 27, 1897.

Ditmas avenue, from East Fifth street to Ocean Parkway, has no record of having been legally opened, but opening proceedings are now pending.

Ocean Parkway, from Ditmas avenue to Foster avenue, is legally opened.

—and also extending sewer in that portion of Vanderbilt street between Prospect avenue and Eighteenth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Dear Sir—I herewith return a communication which has been referred to me, the same being from the Secretary of the President of the Borough, addressed to the Bureau of Sewers under date of October 31, 1902, requesting information in relation to the construction of sewers in Kenilworth place, between Germania place and Avenue F; also in Germania place, between Flatbush avenue and Kenilworth place.

I also return original petition which accompanied above-mentioned communication.

The Chief Engineer of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, reports to me as follows: I beg to report that the estimated cost for above improvement is \$5,680, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$70,750.

The items of work necessary to be performed are: 50 feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 792 feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 1,050 feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 20 manholes and appurtenances.

In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is requested, I beg to state that such are now under construction, but cannot be used for a year or more.

In regard to the legal opening of these streets, information of which is requested, I beg to state that I can find no record of same.

Mr. HENRY R. ASSERSON, Chief Engineer of Sewers:

Dear Sir—in response to yours of the 3d instant, asking if Kenilworth place, between Germania place and Avenue F, and Germania place, between Flatbush avenue and Kenilworth place, are open streets or not, I would say that there is no record of Kenilworth place as ever having been opened, although the street is in use and has water and gas mains.

As regards Germania place there is no record that this street has been legally opened, although it is in use. There is no record even that it has been laid down upon the map. If proceedings are taken to open it it should first be laid down on the map, and when the opening proceedings are taken they should read, "From Flatbush avenue to East Twenty-ninth street."

In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is requested, I beg to state that such will be required in Glenwood road, between East Thirty-fourth street and Nostrand avenue, beyond which point the sewers are under construction. The estimated cost for said outlet is \$5,800, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$661,770.

Appeal No. 44 of 1903, Alteration No. 204 of 1903, Nos. 165 and 167 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Nos. 168 and 170 East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, Manhattan; Hackett-Hankinson Company, architects and appellants.

The building now occupying site is composed of what was formerly two three-story buildings on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, joined with a more modern five-story building on One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, by the removal of the rear walls of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street buildings, thereby creating one building out of three.

As shown and specified, this alteration comprehends the partial destruction of the five-story part and the erection of a theatre, and the buildings on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street are substantially restored to their original independency.

Reference made to the objection cited in the examination sheet attached to application:

No. 1. Building should be fireproof throughout.

No. 2. Building should be provided with two exits on each tier on each side not less than 5 feet wide, with outside balconies embracing both exits and fire escapes.

No. 3. Distinct and separate places of exit should be provided for each gallery stair.

No. 4. Two independent stairs for each gallery on opposite sides should be provided, enclosed with fireproof materials.

No. 6. At least three exits 5 feet wide should be provided for first floor and two exits for balcony and gallery.

No. 10. State how second and third stories of the two buildings on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street will be occupied.

Argument—Relative to objections 2 and 6, the attention of your honorable Board of Examiners is respectfully called to the fact that the width of this property is 72 feet; that if appellants were required to maintain the side courts in strict accordance with the language of section 105 of the Building Code the width would be reduced by at least 14 feet, making the width of building 54 feet in the clear, which would give too small a building.

To overcome this practical difficulty 8-foot courts are reserved on either side, as shown, with 5-foot exits leading to same, and outside balconies and stairs are provided leading from exits to One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street.

Relative to objections Nos. 1 and 10:

We ask to be relieved of these requirements, for the reason that the theatre building is separate and apart from the buildings on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. The theatre will be built absolutely fireproof, but it is intended to have the others remain as now existing. The only way the buildings are connected with theatre is by two doorways in cellar, which are provided with fireproof doors, and by the lobby and entrance, which will be fireproofed in every particular.

Relative to objections Nos. 3 and 4:

We are compelled to plead practical difficulties, which we can better explain verbally, if you will kindly grant us privilege of appearance and argument.

Mr. Martin Hackett and Mr. Kraus appeared.

On motion, laid over.

Appeal No. 45 of 1903, Alteration No. 625 of 1903, Nos. 281 and 283 Hicks street, Brooklyn; Messrs. Parfitt Bros., architects and appellants.

Your petitioners respectfully report that the St. Christopher's Hospital for Babies has been domiciled at No. 283 Hicks street, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, for the past seven years; that the increasing need for more room induced the Board of Managers to purchase an adjoining building (of the same size and type) to meet the enlarged demands for their work.

After the purchase, and upon application to us as architects, we advised, first, to reduce the height of both buildings, the one now occupied by them and the new purchase, about 14 feet in height, from a double-attic building to a flat-roof building, placing the roof on the floor of the present first attic story, such roof to have a fireproof covering, and, further, to provide that no hospital ward be placed higher than the second story, the third story to be occupied by the nurses as sleeping rooms only. But even after such reduction the building is about 42 feet high from the curb to the highest part of the roof beams, in conflict with section 105 of the Building Code.

The building is in all respects strong, well built and well adapted to the needs of this grand charity, and the Board of Managers have spent large sums of money in the improvement of the building now occupied by them, by the erection of a fireproof laundry, etc.

The location is singularly adapted to this charitable work, first, because it is near an old, poor and thickly settled section of the City; and, second, is also near the wealthy section, where the patrons and Board of Managers reside.

The above are the reasons for appealing to your honorable Board of Examiners to permit said Board of Managers to alter, use and occupy said No. 281 Hicks street, after alterations have been made in accordance with plans filed by us.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
